Sermon by Bro. Wally Ramsier, Mansfield, OH

I Kings 3 and Colossians 2

We hear many times of the wisdom of Solomon. Here in this chapter it explains how that God asked him what his desire, what his wish was. He chose that he would receive wisdom to guide God's chosen children at that time. The Lord blessed him for this, for asking wisdom and not asking Him for riches or honor or the life of his enemies. But to ask wisdom. (I Kings 3:5-14)

Then as we read on of the two women, that each had a child. The one had died. How that the king brought out of the women really whose child it was. (I Kings 3:16-27) We could certainly have the feeling of those two women. Especially the one whose the living child was. Even to the point that she would give up the child so that the living child's life would not be taken.

There are many times in our life that we have opportunities to do one thing or another. As we ponder over those things, we should stop and think, what would the Lord's will be? Not my will but Thy will be done.

We read so many times that the enemy is in our land, upon us, around and about us, wanting to mislead and to misguide us. Today as we look out into the world, there is much chaos and division. Certainly the Word of God is being fulfilled, the prophesies that have been brought forth, of how the world will not calm down. As we would think with highly educated people and resources to no end. we would think that everybody could be content in this world. It seems that more and more there is discontent in the whole world, including our own land. There is much division and so forth, just as was prophesied.

It just behooves each one of us to stop and think of how are we living

our life and what are we asking God for? And then are we willing to follow the directions that God does give us? Not just to seek our own and our own will and our own pleasure, shall we say. But if we give our heart and our soul to the Lord, that we find that there is much comfort and much pleasure in doing the Lord's will. And that we have a promise that He will be with us and direct us and guide us and will give unto us a heart that we can overcome the world. It is not something that is impossible, but it is possible. It is pleasing to God if we give of our self and our time and our mind unto the Lord, here as Solomon did at this time. He asked the Lord that He would give unto him wisdom to guide His people. Because he realized at that time, he of himself did not know how to guide these people and what would be the Lord's will. So we just need to ask the Lord to direct us and guide us, that we too would be willing then, regardless of what the Lord would ask of us, willing to follow.

We don't all have the same circumstance. We don't have all the same opportunities in life. We don't all have the same trials in life. But we do all have the same opportunity that we can call upon the Lord and if we give of our self, the Lord will provide.

Paul here, of course, is writing this letter (Colossians 2). It says here that he has great conflict. "...I have for you, and for them at Laodicea, and for as many as have not seen my face in the flesh;" (Colossians 2:1). Paul was, of course, one of the original missionaries. As he went out into the world at that time, he desired to speak openly to as many as would listen. And even to many that would not listen to his words. Even at that yet, he would write these letters to

those that he had seen before and those that he desired to see.

He sees here "That their hearts might be comforted, being knit together in love, and unto all riches of the full assurance of understanding, to the acknowledgement of the mystery of God, and of the Father,

An Independent Spirit I

Writings based on God's Word

The strength of a church is dependent upon a strong biblical foundation and unity of the brethren based upon biblical principles. Only by the grace of God, and by working together and submitting to His Word, can a church survive.

Satan will use any method he can to try to destroy God's children and the faith that they have. One very powerful tactic that Satan uses is to encourage individuals to determine for and by themselves what is right. This method of disruption, often referred to as having an independent spirit, is a major concern in our brotherhood today.

An independent spirit can be defined as having an attitude of not feeling much need for others and as looking at things our own way. In everyday language we could call it "doing our own thing". Those with an independent spirit are much too strong in their opinions or are too sure of themselves. In the book of Judges it was described as "...every man did that which was right in his own eyes" (Jud. 21:25).

There are numerous examples in the scripture of those who had an independent spirit. King Saul exhibited an independent spirit a number of times. He offered sacrifices (I Sam. 13:9-13) when Samuel didn't come when expected. He saved the best sheep and oxen for sacrifices when he was told to destroy them (I Sam. 15:13-26). He was rejected of God because of his disobedience.

Jonah displayed an independent spirit by refusing to preach to the people of Nineveh. He paid dearly because he followed his own stubborn will.

Perhaps the most striking example of an independent spirit is the fall of Lucifer. Lucifer exalted himself when he said "...I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God: I will sit also upon the mount ... I will ascend above the heights of the clouds; I will be like the Most High" (Is. 14:13-14). If an independent spirit can lead to the fall of angels, it certainly can destroy us.

One of the strongest influences in our culture today is the attitude of an inde-

pendent spirit. We need to be sure we examine ourselves to keep the spirit of self under the control of the Holy Spirit. We need to learn to recognize the independent spirit in ourselves. Jesus said "...If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Mt. 16:24).

How serious is the problem of having an independent spirit? Paul wrote that we must bring "...into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ;" (II Cor. 10:5). Solomon wrote "...as he thinketh in his heart, so is he:..." (Pr. 23:7). Jesus said "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Lk. 12:34). From these scripture passages we can see that it is very serious for even our thoughts, not just our actions, to be brought under the submission of the Holy Spirit.

It is possible that the influence of an independent spirit can impact us and we don't realize it. Job recognized that this can happen. He was concerned lest his "...heart hath been secretly enticed..." (Job 31:27).

How can we recognize if we have a problem with an independent spirit? A good start may be to examine how we spend our time and our resources. Do we find plenty of time to read the newspaper and other types of pleasure reading and yet struggle to find fifteen minutes each day for serious Bible study? Do we diligently keep up with financial markets or the foolishness of sports and yet have very little of the Word of God memorized? Are the private and very personal aspects of our lives focused upon God and His Word, or on thinking of the things of the world?

How do we react when things do not go our way? If we experience struggles in our marriage, do we entertain the thought of being free? Do we secretly wish we could get out of the situation rather than working our way through it?

If something happens in our church, locally or nationally, how do we respond? Do we consider changing congregations instead of working through the situation.

Or do we carry it further by entertaining the thought of leaving our church altogether? Do we entertain the thought that we are not leaving the faith, just the fellowship; when in fact, what we are doing is walking away from the faith to a broader way?

Do we have a casual attitude about things such as apparel? Do we take worship seriously? Are we in the house of God as often as we can be? Do we plan to get to church early or do we barely make it before services begin? Do we walk away from a church office or responsibility in which God has called us to serve because it might require us to change our lifestyle or because something has not gone our way? Holiness and a casual attitude are opposites.

If we have an independent spirit, it is a lot easier to justify our actions when we disagree with what is happening. How much is at stake if we are allowing an independent spirit to prevail in our lives? Does it really matter if our commitment to the principles of our church is weak?

There is much that is at stake. Our church has many unique and valuable attributes. The orderliness and reverence in our assemblies are very important. The concept of brotherhood and the concern that we have for one another are very important. The concept of brotherhood requires us to put the welfare of the body, Christ's body which is the church, above our own welfare. It requires that we forebear with one another as we help each other through this life. There are times when we will need to accept some criticism about some things we have done in order to more closely align ourselves with the body of Christ and the Word.

The degree of willingness to submit to the biblically based standards of the brotherhood tells a lot about our love for the body of Christ. Self sacrifice and obedience to God's Word will help us defeat the independent spirit.

World Relief Project Presentation

At our last meeting, a young Brother posed the question with tears in his eyes, "Why don't more people come to these meetings? This is awesome!"

Things have come a long way since World Relief was a night for the older sisters to get together to sew layettes with kimonos and string diapers, dresses and piecing together and tying quilts. Today the whole church family is involved. Our annual meetings then were focused only on sewing needs.

Today's meetings present a wide range of information. This past March they talked about Europe, Haiti's Seeds Ministry, Haiti well drilling (with the well drilling rig present), local project ideas, Child Sponsorship, Gateway Woods International Adoption, Goodfield Distribution Center (with tour), Jamaica Rocking Chairs, Empty Tomb, summer work projects, Apostolic Christian Mission opportunities, World Relief Administrative Office, and Haiti's political situation.

At these meetings, we ask speakers who have been involved personally to share God's blessings and opportunities. Sometimes it is a short talk, but usually they incorporate a talk with slides or a PowerPoint presentation.

There is also room for displays of sewing projects, Haitian linens, pictures of children waiting to be sponsored, Gateway Woods information, new information for the World Relief Representatives and Sewing Sisters, ideas for family nights, and local project samples.

We have broadened ideas and opportunities and would like to

share them with you. Everyone (this means any friend, brother, or sister, who has a thread of interest in helping others) is invited to witness first hand experiences of those who are involved with a variety of projects. When it is in a church nearby, or if your church is hosting it, what an convenient opportunity for you to attend! And what a blessing!

The dividing line for the Western and Eastern churches is the Illinois, Indiana line. The meetings held for the 52 Western churches and the 38 Eastern churches are held once a year.

The Eastern Meeting is always the second weekend in November. The next meeting will be held in West Lafayette, IN on Nov 13, 2004.

The Western Meeting is always the second weekend in March. The next meeting will be held in Cissna Park, IL on March 12, 2005.

An invitation for a church to host our upcoming meetings is always appreciated. We also welcome any requests or suggestions on topics that would be of interest to you.

Upholding World Relief

These meetings are inspiring, interesting, and informational. They explore the different avenues World Relief is reaching out to help as well as the ways that you can help.

Come to the Eastern/Western World Relief Project Presentation meetings and bring someone with you who has interest in World Relief to pick up ideas. Some ideas would be for the young group, Sunday School children, a project where a family could work together, someone wanting to go on a work team, those who would like to do something close to home, or local summer construction projects.

Some of these local church projects are soap making, meat canning, kit packing, comforter marathons, getting to know what your community needs and filling those needs.

Since we can't all be doing kits, you can also search out new projects concerning local needs at nursing homes, children homes, crisis centers, crisis pregnancy centers, schools and any other unique situations you may have around you to see what you could do to help them.

Committee Meetings

Mission Committee meetings held on April 27 and July 20, 2004 are reported in this article. As has been the custom for many years, one elder brother from the World Relief Committee is present at each meeting as many projects are jointly supported by World Relief and Mission funds. The Committee is encouraged by the generous contributions which have come forth from the Brotherhood in support of our various mission projects. May God bless each one who has given in the name of the Lord and may He bless the many worthy endeavors being supported by these funds.

Communication

The Technology Committee is developing the official web site for the Apostolic Christian Church of America. This listing will provide a description of our basic doctrine and history and will enable inquirers to obtain the locations of our churches as well as other relevant information. It is expected that the site will be launched in the not too distant future.

As reported previously, several members of the Mission Committee met with a group of representatives from Illinois and Indiana college campus groups in December 2003. A follow-up letter from the Committee was distributed to the representatives. The Committee was grateful for the group's insightful questions and suggestions. It is felt that additional efforts need to be made to communicate to our Brotherhood the opportunities for mission work as well as the biblical teachings with regard to being "called" and being "sent" with a servant's heart. Ongoing communication will help strengthen our focus for the

future as we seek to present the Gospel message.

Interview

The Committee was blessed with the opportunity to meet with Bro. Bill and Sis. Joan Schick at the April meeting. They described how the Lord has worked in their hearts through the years as they served at Gateway Woods, on various work teams and currently at Rio Bravo, Mexico. Many experiences were shared which were very helpful to the Committee. They noted the significant benefits of the Child Sponsorship program and urged that it continue to be supported, as the needs are very great. They discussed the major impact on their lives of adapting to a different culture and devoting full time to the Lord's work. They emphasized their sincere desire to work under the authority of our church in whatever assignment they may be given.

Financial reports

Financial reports of contributions and expenditures were reviewed. Allocations were approved for a variety of projects including: Christian Aid Ministries, MedSend, Spanish language Bible Story coloring books which are placed in World Relief school kits, the Magdalena, Mexico orphanage, RGMMI, monthly sermon distribution, Berean Prison Ministry, and distribution of Bibles in the Congo and China.

The European Board reported on several church building projects in the Ukraine and Serbia as well as additional work being done at the Antioch building in Romania which is being used for food and clothing warehousing and distribution. The needs in Eastern Europe abound and

we are fortunate to be able to share the gifts given by God to us with others who have so little.

Reports from Mexico

It has been decided to discontinue the strawberry growing project in Ixtlan as it has not proven to be successful. A church school is under consideration and support was given by the Committee for this to be investigated.

Bro. Bob and Sis. Joy Huber and their children have moved from Imuris to Magdalena to assist with the development of our recently approved orphanage and school project. It is hoped that they will be ready to begin accepting girls into the orphanage by January 2005. A draft plan has been developed for staffing and future growth of the project. Approval was given by the Committee to allocate funds for paying off the loan for the site and for additional upgrading efforts. The prayers of the Brotherhood regarding this effort are greatly appreciated.

Small churches study committee

A committee will be appointed to study the unique needs of small churches and make recommendations regarding steps by which our Brotherhood can help to support and nurture these congregations. This effort is being made to help provide guidance and encouragement for supporting small churches, which is one of the objectives of the Mission Committee.

The Mission Committee continues to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit as it works toward the goal of bringing the Gospel message of salvation to the lost in the "regions beyond," in accord with the teachings of God's Word.

One of the reasons for this is that the pain involved in changing their lifestyle does not appear to be worth the benefits of living free from these sins.

As believers, our lives need to be a testimony of the joy and peace that a life changed by God can bring. But Christians often resist change just as much as an alcoholic or drug addict. Believers are instructed to grow in grace but growth always involves change and is rarely easy. Our flesh is constantly trying to build habits that keep us in our comfort zone, but out of our comfort zone is exactly where Jesus calls us to be. It is sometimes very uncomfortable to tell our co-workers about Jesus or to resolve a conflict with our brother or to lovingly submit to one another. These tasks are not easy, but Jesus asks us to deny our flesh, pick up our cross every day and walk down a narrow road. What He offers us is not comfortable living but it is Christian living and He promises us the grace to be victorious.

and of Christ." (Colossians 2:2). Of course there was only a few people that were right close to Jerusalem that witnessed the crucifixion and again the arising of Christ. But how that God in His mercy would bring up these prophets and missionaries to go out into the world at that time. To remind everyone and to bring it as a first time to many, what God's will is and what really we will be confronted with in this life. That we know that so many things that are going on in the world today are against God's will. The forces that are out there against God. And then that we have those that are willing to follow God's Word and to forego much in the world today. But to seek to do God's will, for as we learn from the scriptures, there will be a time after our time here upon this earth. That there are two destinations.

You know how it is whenever we go to travel to a place that we have not been before, we look to a map or to someone's instructions of how do we get there. Because we know there are many, many roads. Many cross roads. Many opportunities to turn this way or that way. Yet if we are mindful and look at the trap and pay attention, we can arrive at our destination safe and sound. So that is what we are looking for here and that was Paul's mission, that these people at that time would be guided right. He gave of himself, not only appearing before them, but also in writing of letters.

He said, to the understanding, to the acknowledgement of the mystery of God. To the understanding of the ways of God, what God would want us to do. "...and of the Father, and of Christ; In whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge." (Colossians 2:2,3). If we want wisdom and knowledge, we need to put our trust in the Lord and ask the Lord for that divine guidance. For the answers to our questions of things in this life.

As in the fore reading, we read of Solomon. At that time, he asked God for wisdom, for direction, for guidance. How he should make judgment. The same is open and available to us in this day. We are a blest people. Just to be awakened. To know that there are two ways.

We recognize there are probably a lot of people, even in our own communities, do not realize this. There are different ways to go in this life. There are different ways to live our life. We see many that seem to be lost. That they don't understand. They are hurting. As time goes on, it doesn't get any better. It probably gets worse for them. They seek comfort but don't know where to find it.

We know we have opportunities. It isn't that we need to be out standing on the street corners preaching. But just our life style. Yet as we each one, if we stop and think, as we were growing up, how many that were a living example to you and me to be obedient to God's Word, that they wouldn't get themselves troubles? We many times didn't listen. But we went ahead on our own and found out that it was not the right way. That if we wanted comfort of body and soul, and soul particularly, that we had to make a change in our life. We know that there are some sitting here today that through example of some individual, that they are here today. They can make that change in their life. And today that they can have comfort in body and soul.

"And this I say, lest any man should beguile you with enticing words." (Colossians 2:4). There is so much today, the advertising and the offering of so many things for the enjoyment, so to say, in this world. Of the comfort of the body to offer to mankind today. The entice-

ment, in some ways, we would say is getting out of hand. We just need to stop and think, we are not exempt. Those enticing words and individuals would want to misdirect and misguide us that we would not have the comfort that we have in this day.

He makes excuse here. "For though I be absent in the flesh, yet am I with you in the spirit, joying and beholding your order, and the stedfastness of your faith in Christ." (Colossians 2:5). Apparently he had been to Laodicea. He had spoken to them and there were many followers. Now is he writing to them to continually comfort them, to guide them, to remind them that he is in their mind. That he is praying for them. That they would continue to follow the Word of God. That they would not again fall away. But that they would have the comfort of God's Word. Then they could have the fulfillment of the promise. That when their time on this earth is over, that they could then rest in peace.

"As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in him: Rooted and built up in him, and stablished in the faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with thanksgiving." (Colossians 2:6,7). We need to thank God every day for sending His Son into this world for each one of our benefits. Without Him, without Christ, we cannot have this promise. We cannot have this comfort. We would be the same as the lost in the world today.

"Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ." (Colossians 2:8). In this we can see Paul realized the many things that are in the world today. Paul felt very much alone. Him and those that were close to

him. They were out there bringing this Word. He realized that for every one of him, there were a thousand others that were trying to, not necessarily trying to, but just as our life was for the world, that they would soon be falling. Those that love the Lord are still a minimum in this world. They are a minority. We have to come out from them, come out from the masses. Live a life according to what we desire.

I am sure that each one of us has in the back of their mind that, when this life is over, then I'll have comfort. The enemy will not be there to misguide and misdirect. But that wherever I look will be good. And here today we see, when we are out in public, the many things that are going on today. The many things that are happening. The advertisements are full of things that we could entertain our self with. Or that we could indulge in. They are enticing. We just need to realize that.

It says, "for in him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily. And ye are complete in him, which is the head of all principality and power: In whom also ye are circumcised with the circumcision made without hands, in putting off the body of the sins of the flesh by the circumcision of Christ:" (Colossians 2:9-11). We know that before the time of Christ, all the males were to be circumcised. There had to be the shedding of blood. We know how they had to bring a sacrifice to the temple, that blood was shed. They found that it didn't fulfill God's will.

But yet He loved His creation. So He sent His only Son into this world. He also

taught the masses and traveled with them. He performed miracles that would get our attention. And it certainly did. It got our attention. It got the attention of many. But many still didn't follow.

Christ knew, when He came into this world, that the day would come when He would give His life. That His blood would be shed to fulfill God's work, that there needed to be blood shed. It was so. Those that were against Him, crucified Him. They killed Him. They took His life. They didn't like what he was saying. Whether they understood or not, I know not. But it remains that they took His life. His divine blood was shed for you and me. Now we have the opportunity to follow or to turn it away.

There were so many of the prophets that came and prophesied of what would come to pass in this world, from the time of Christ until the time the world, as we know it today, will end.

Just this last week, didn't observe, but we understand of the hurricane or the typhoon that landed on our land. Again, a fulfillment of God's Word. That these things would come to pass. I am sure that many of those people that were in the center of the activity, whether they remained or whether they traveled away from it, they had to stop and think, what came to pass? Why did it come to pass? What does it mean? Perhaps there were a few that turned to God. There were probably just as many cursed God. Yet God let this come to pass, that you and I, our minds would be re-fortified. Maybe it would awaken some, that they would realize what happened.

There is a lot of material damage. But it can all be replaced. The soul of man lives on. Where do you want your soul to end? That is the question. That is what Paul wanted to bring to these people's attention. We are thinking of long term. We are thinking of the soul. Today is a day of decision.

Just because we repented and

fulfilled all that God has asked us to do, to be forgiven of sin, doesn't mean that we cannot be enticed back into this way of the world. But very easily, we can be enticed. The enemy does not rest. The enemy apparently has a lot of soldiers. So let us not let this happen to us. But let us remain faithful, that we would be soldiers of Christ.

We are not all asked to be Pauls or Peters or Johns. Those that personally went out and brought this Word to the multitudes, it was not easy for them. Very few died what we call a natural death. Very few today, in our land, are sacrificed. There are our fore fathers. The fore fathers of the anti-Baptist movement, many of them gave their lives. They were separated from families, which may even have been worse. They were in prison or, sent to slave camps. Their family was sold individually. It is unimaginable how man will treat man. There is no respect. But with God, there is all respect. It is His creation. Today we are benefactors. We just need to stop and realize it.

"Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead" (Colossians 2:12). We know how it is in baptism. The sinful nature is buried. Then as we can arise unto a new life and live for Christ, that we would make a total change in our life. That we would then be risen in a new life and a new walk.

"And you, being dead in your sins and the uncircumcision of your flesh, hath he quickened together with him, having forgiven you all trespasses;" (Colossians 2:13). Not that we are worthy. Not that we earn it. But we are forgiven. It is something that we cannot repay. There is no way that we can pay for our past deeds. But we can be a soldier of Christ.

We are all examples of one kind or another. Today as we have more and more opportunities to be a witness, and many times a silent witness, just of our life, we have opportunities to mingle in the world, in many places and many stations. The question is, what kind of a witness are we? If someone is looking today to change their life, or if they see something in us, what will it tell them? Will we be different from the world? Perhaps in the way we dress, perhaps in our conversation, in our dealings, our whole life. As we sing in one song, Let your whole life be an offering... (Self-Sacrifice, Zion's Harp #159). Not just sometimes or some places, but always. That we can be that witness that the Lord would want us to be.

We know that many think that I am a nobody. I don't see anybody. I don't know what to say. We don't need to say anything. Our deeds and our actions - and if we just stop and think, in our own life, when we

were growing up, wasn't it those that were silent? Wasn't it because of what they said in conversation and in dealings and how they dressed and what they did in this life? Wasn't that a greater witness? So we just need to stop and think of these things. To think of all those that gave so much more than we. Of the early church, how many martyrs were there? The least we can do is be obedient to the Word.

"Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross: And having spoiled principalities and powers, he made a shew of them openly, triumphing over them in it," (Colossians 2:14,15). They lied, there were false witnesses, there were so many things that they tried to suppress Christ with. And not only Christ, but many, many of the prophets. The soldiers, how they tried to find fault. Yet, the more they tried, and when Christ was dead, they

thought it was all over. But He surprised them. He arose. That is what you and I are looking forward to.

We live in a wicked world. There are pleasures. And you and I have pleasures doing God's will and living that life. We can enjoy many things in this life. Today we can come here together peacefully. We are not worried today that somebody is going to come in and overtake us and imprison us, if we just stop and think, there are those in the world today that have that hanging over their head. Whenever they are assembled together, even in small groups, they are afraid somebody may break in and haul part of them off to jail or to eliminate them. We have so many benefits today, we can't hardly realize what some pay for salvation. The least we can do is be obedient to the Word of God.



MAKING A COVENANT WITH GOD

A Promise

Entering into an everlasting covenant with a holy and eternal God is a very serious matter. So serious, in fact, that a soul intending to erect such a covenant must possess a clear understanding of its enormous substance, importance, meaning and enduring quality. Reducing the definition (of a covenant) to its simplest form, a covenant is an agreement between two persons, both of whom intend to keep their end of the bargain.

In the spiritual realm we find a deeply important covenant: that in which God promises eternal life through Christ Jesus to all who will turn to Him in repentance, live in obedience to Him, and hold fast by His grace until life's end—a two-way promise.

Biblical Covenants

There are two major Biblical covenants: the old covenant, found in the Old Testament, and the new covenant, found in the New Testament. The old cove-

nant gave way to the new because Christ came to fulfill the old Jewish law.

The old covenant was conditional, predicated on the faithfulness of the people. In Exodus 19:5, God uses the language, ...if ye will obey my voice indeed, and keep my covenant. Thus, it is easy to see that on one side of the covenant are great and precious promises; on the other is man's obligation to be faithful. God's reaction to covenant-breakers (in the Old Testament) was chastisement.

Covenant-making

In the New Testament, God's covenant is salvation by grace through faith. This is made possible by Christ's death on the Cross. From this, God extends great and precious promises, and the believing, converted soul makes a declaration to be true and faithful—that is, to keep his end of the two-way promise (a covenant with God).

The public act of making a covenant (with God) reveals the believer's recognition of the covenant and his readiness to keep his side of it. Because there is the possibility, through carelessness, that one could break the covenant with God, it is necessary for a soul to promise in the beginning an all-out intent (by His grace) to

keep the covenant with his Maker.

If the church believed in the dctrine of eternal security — once saved, always saved — there would be no need to make a covenant (a public promise). Recognizing the need for faithfulness (to the end) prompts the necessity to make a promise (to God in the presence of the church) to be true and faithful to the end.

Bro. Samuel Froehlich wrote, in Baptismal Truth (p.139), "The new covenant is mutual (as was the old) and not one-sided. As God gives and fulfills the promise, so the regenerated person takes over his responsibilities and must fulfill them."

In his Meditations on Hebrews (p.290), Bro. Froehlich states, "Whoever does not, with his whole heart, wish to become a subject of Christ does not belong to the congregation and to the new covenant."

"The new covenant consists herein that God puts His laws into our mind and writes them in our heart, so that we live accordingly, and that our heart becomes the living law of God, and our mind a mirror of His holiness." (p. 291).

"Jesus is become the surety of a new covenant, which, however, is

mutually made between God and man so that God on His part makes all promises in Christ 'yea and amen'." (p. 254)

"No one will be saved unconditionally, but only under two conditions, that man accept the offered grace and then rightly use and preserve it unto the end." (p. 230).

Summary

The making of a covenant is an official acknowledgement of God's promises to man and man's intent to accept and be obedient to God's promises and commandments. The covenant with God is conditional on man's obedience until life's end.

Diligent fathers of old thought the new covenant belongs "only to the one who covenants himself to God and promises himself to Him in the power of the Holy Spirit in faith."

Making a covenant with God while standing in those baptismal waters is an impressive ceremony, which serves as an inspiration to the church, and leaves a lasting imprint and obligation on the heart and mind of the one who has entered into such a holy commitment to the Lord.

"Enjoying vs. Enduring"

There is a great deal in the Bible about enduring. In Matthew 24:13, the Lord Jesus said, "But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved."

The Apostle Paul wrote "All your persecutions and tribulations that ye endure." II Thessalonians 1:4.

The Apostle James wrote in James 5:11, "Behold, we count them happy which endure."

The word "endure" indicates that something very difficult has come upon us. That could be a temptation, an illness, or an accident. Or it could be that we have no food, clothing, or shelter, or that someone is shooting at us, in case of war. These things require endurance.


The enjoyment that one has who follows Christ, is much deeper and longer lasting than the enjoyment

In this way, the words of the Lord Jesus Christ are fulfilled, "He that loseth his life for my sake shall find it." Matthew 10:39.
