Sermon by Bro. Brian Huber, Francesville, IN

Job 1 and St. Mark 4:1-23

When we gather together on a Wednesday evening, it is in a different kind of a feel, a setting than it is on a Sunday. It is not nearly so busy. We did hear one little child cry and Brother Steve said, "That is the sound of my grandson, I believe." It is precious to have the little ones with us. But it is mostly just the church family, the believers together on a Wednesday evening. We are thankful for the friends that are with us. But it is a time to maybe just think of, what is the Lord trying to tell us, as His followers? What is it that we can learn from these two scriptures? Both of them very familiar. The first chapter in the book of Job. Let's just touch on some points and then try to think, how we can apply that to our lives.

First of all it talks about Job "...in the land of Uz ... was perfect and upright, and one that feared God, and eschewed evil." (Job 1:1). So I don't know if the last part of that line is what it takes to be perfect and upright in God's eyes, but I believe that we could take it that there is a connection there. One that feared God and eschewed evil.

Eschewed evil means to hate it. To want to do away with it. Don't want to tolerate evil, I believe would be a - I am not a walking, talking dictionary and maybe a lot of times I have the wrong thought of what a word means - but that is the thought that comes to mind. He did not want anything to do with the evil. And had a fear, a reverence of God, even as we prayed.

Can we as believers, as brothers and sisters, men and women anywhere, can we be bold before God? Do we have any reason to be bold? Now the Word tells us we should come boldly to the throne of mercy (Hebrews 4:16). That means we shouldn't be afraid to come to God and let our petitions be made known. But I don't believe that we can bold, like we deserve anything. Or come bold like we can challenge God in any way. That we can come

bold and say, "God, why did You do this or that?" Sometimes those thoughts might come to us. Job, before this chapter is done, certainly had reason to maybe have that kind of a thought. He was one that feared God.

I don't believe we need to be afraid of God. That is not what it means. But to have a reverence of God. Recognizing God for who He is. Really our life and our breath is in His hands. We could think of those places - one of the kings, rulers there in the New Testament, he was making a speech and the people said, "Oh, it is the voice of a god and not a voice of man." He was just eating it all up. Because he was wanting to be looked at in that way. God struck him down just on the spot.

There are other places where, because of a transgression, not just in the New Testament, in the Old Testament, whatever, there's examples of transgression that evidently just were so grievous in the sight of God that people lost their lives in just a moment's time. So we have a God that needs to be reverenced. There should be a fear of Him for who He is.

Then when we think of that, doesn't it bring just such a thankfulness to our heart when we think, but we know Him as our heavenly Father because of Jesus Christ. We have the adoption to Him. We know Him as a God of love because we felt His love. We felt the forgiveness.

When we are in a time of great need and we pray, and we feel the direction that we pray for - sometimes we need help and strength and we feel it coming and we know it is not us. We say that is the grace of God. I couldn't have done that. I was feeling weak and the grace just gave me the strength. Thanks, God! I don't deserve it. So we have reason to be so thankful because God cares about us so.

It seemed like, as we consider Job's life here, didn't he have it going pretty well? He had a nice family. He had abundance of everything. As we read down through here, Satan said, "well, why wouldn't he serve you because you even put a hedge about all that

Self-Sacrifice

Writings based on God's Word

"Let your whole life be an offering to God and to Christ the Lord. None who here to Him surrender will regret it, for His Word gives us peace and release, Sweet rest after battles cease" ("Self-sacrifice" vs. 1, p. 159, Zion's Harp).

The world suggests that we take care of "number one", to indulge ourselves, or to believe it is about time you do something for you. Human nature is such that the more we have the more we want and the more we want the less satisfied we are with what we have.

What does the scripture tell us about self indulgence versus self sacrifice? There are numerous places in the Bible that explain the folly of trusting in riches. "He that loveth pleasure shall be a poor man:..." (Prov. 21:17). "But she that liveth in pleasure is dead while she liveth" (I Ti. 5:6). To the church in Laodicea John wrote "...thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked:"(Rev. 3:17).

It is quite obvious from the scripture that material wealth does not bring peace with God. It tends to make one self centered and is deceitful. Solomon, in all his glory, had many problems that were made worse because of materialism. Jesus said that all of Solomon's glory did not even array him as a simple lily of the field.

Self sacrifice, on the other hand, if done in humility and in accord with the Word of God can bring joy, peace and contentment. The church at Smyrna was regarded as a poor church. However, Jesus said "I know thy works, and tribulation, and poverty, (but thou art rich)..." (Rev. 2:9). Because of their faithfulness and willingness to sacrifice all for God, they will receive a crown of life and, if they overcome, "...shall not be hurt of the second death" (Rev. 2:11).

Jesus said to his disciples "...If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Mt. 16:24). To truly live a life of self-sacrifice, we must put Jesus Christ

ahead of self, home, family, friends, business, or anything else that would come in the way of serving Jesus Christ as our Lord and Master. It may seem a bit harsh and demanding to be required to put all these things in their proper place, but Jesus recognized the seriousness and deceitfulness of idolatry. Therefore, he wanted to make certain that our priorities are in order.

To encourage the importance of putting our relationship with Christ first He said "if any man come to me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple" (Lu. 14:26). The desires of the flesh must be mortified and put off (Col. 3:5-9) so we can put on the new man and the characteristics of a godly man (Col. 3:10-16).

It is very encouraging that the Apostle Paul was inspired to recognize that simply emptying our heart and mind of sin (mortify and put off) would not be enough. An empty heart would leave a vacuum for Satan to fill. Therefore, he went on to instruct us to "put on" those characteristics that would fill our lives with godly attributes that will defeat Satan.

We sometimes find ourselves too absorbed in our work. It may cause us to ignore our families as we work our way up the financial ladder. It may also cause us to miss regularly scheduled church services. It may consume our mind and energy to the point that we cannot focus on our spiritual needs even on Sunday.

We know that we are commanded to work, to provide for our own and "in the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread..." (Gen. 3:19). We also know that if we place too great of emphasis on materialism, it could be our downfall. "And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry" (Lu. 12:19). What did Jesus say about our work? "...he went forth, and saw a publican, named Levi, sitting at the receipt of custom: and he said unto him, Follow me. And he left all, rose up, and followed him" (Lu. 5:27-28). Certainly not all are called to leave their work completely as the disciples were, but we need to keep our priorities in godly order. It is not likely that many men on their death bed wish they would have spent less time with their wife and children and more time at the office.

There are many rewards awaiting those who are willing to sacrifice self and serve God. We are promised that if we are willing to sacrifice self, the fleshly lusts will be subdued. "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin" (Ro. 6:6).

Self-sacrifice will help us control the desire for the cares of this life. "And take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be overcharged with surfeiting, and drunkenness, and cares of this life, and so that day come upon you unawares" (Lu. 21:34).

The Apostle Paul recognized the value of self-sacrifice in helping him serve Christ. "Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung, that I may win Christ" (Ph. 3:8).

Jesus gave a very clear summary of the value of self-sacrifice. "...There is no man which hath left house, or parents, or brethren, or wife, or children, for the kingdom of God's sake, who shall not receive manifold more in this present time, and in the world to come life everlasting" (Lu. 18:29-30).

What inheritance do we want to leave for our children? Do we want to leave them many material blessings so they are not required to do without any of the creature comforts? Or do we want to leave them with a rich heritage of faith that will sustain them when Satan brings trials upon them?

When we realize the value of serving God and the fleeting nature of the things of this world, we can better appreciate the words "Tis important to be striving for this goal, O, child of God, and to realize the calling wherefore we live on this sod, not that we gathering be riches here that only flee" (Self-sacrifice, v.4, p.159, Zion's Harn).

Mission Policy and Guidelines

The steps by which brothers and sisters can pursue a Spirit-directed calling to serve in various aspects of Church supported mission work are outlined in Mission Committee brochures available in all of our churches. Additional avenues are being utilized to communicate this important information to our Brotherhood. Following is a summary of the presentation on Mission Policy and Guidelines given at the recent Peoria Conference.

Christ taught: "If ye love me, keep my commandments" and to "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you (Jn 14:15; Mt 28:19-20).

The first of four pillars of our church mission is to present the Gospel to the lost. This pillar is also the purpose of our Church Mission Policy. We believe the Scripture calls us to do this in harmony with the other three pillars of our church mission: To nurture the believer, to preserve and promote true doctrine, and to serve in humility and love. The church prospers when all four pillars are functioning together and in accordance with Scripture, all by the grace of God (Acts 11: 19-30).

As we create proper balance with these four pillars, we can further God's plan for "all men to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth" (I Tim 2:4). Our Mission Policy prioritizes four objectives to accomplish this.

1. Sharing the Word – expressing our eternal hope, teaching, preaching, being an example. The word providesillumination. (Psalm 119:105)

- 2. Inviting others to worship with us. (Ro 10:14)
- **3. Supporting small churches.** (I Thes 3:12-13)
- **4. Establishing churches within and outside the USA** according to the Word of God and its directives as outlined on our Statement of Faith (Acts 11:22-26); and with the discretion, gentleness and leading of the Holy Spirit (I Cor 9:19-23).

Guidelines for Sending Brethren on Mission Projects:

- 1. Prayerful discernment of calling a time of fervent prayer and a surrendered, humble heart; wanting only the will of God to be revealed (Acts 16:9-10, Ps 139:23-24).
- **2. Initial counsel** take time to establish open, candid, respectful communication and accountability with your local elder, enabling him to understand your heart and to confirm his consent and blessing with what you believe the Lord is calling you to do (Pr 15:22).
- 3. Mission Committee assessment

 an interview by the Mission
 Committee or its designate. A time
 of listening, counseling, learning and
 seeking the Lord's will together
 (Philemon 14).
- 4. Confirmation of steadfastness It is so necessary that brethren wanting to be sent by the church uphold the Word and be sound in faith, grace, doctrine and example (I Thes 1:7-8); that the church can "earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints" (Jude 3).
- **5. Responsive placement** we want to follow the biblical pattern for brethren being sent with the authority and accountability of the

church. We seek to align the individual's gifts and calling with the actual needs that are known (Acts 11:22).

- 6. Accountability sending brethren on mission work is sobering, inspiring and calls for loving and wise accountability among the elder, the church and the brethren being sent (He 13:17). We need to circumspectly discern and avoid ecumenical doctrinal intermingling and deception (Rev 17).
- 7. Counting the cost prepared by God that we may be sufficient for the work, sufficient in terms of our spiritual health, humility, faith, grace, sanctification, a love for the brotherhood and for the lost, and logistical needs (Lu 14:28).
- 8. Ongoing oversight and support from the chief shepherd Jesus Christ, from the Holy Spirit to lead us in truth and to moderate any tendency toward individualistic decision making, from our overseeing elder and from our brethren. We are our brother's keeper. Therefore we want to understand the needs of those on mission assignments – the struggles within their families and within the work. We desire to communicate and fellowship with them enough that we can weep and rejoice together, and be fervently and responsively prayerful for them (I Thes 2:11-12).

We sincerely entreat your cooperation and your Holy Spirit inspired submission to the spirit and the letter of this Mission Policy and Guidelines. May we as a church work together in singleness of spirit, mind, faith and judgment (Ph 1:27; I Cor 1:10), and may God grant us grace to fulfill His commission to spread the Gospel in a manner which will have His full blessing (Mt 28:19-20).



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

Florida Hurricane Disaster Work Project

During the late summer and early fall, people living in Florida experienced stress and fear, due to an unusual series of severe hurricanes. The State of Florida was struck by four major hurricanes, Charley, Frances, Ivan, and Jeanne, between August 8 and September 25, 2004. The cost of the resulting damage was estimated by one source as \$20.1 billion.

An evaluation team from the Disaster Work Projects Sub-Committee, including Bros. Jerome Witzig, Martin Zaugg, and Arnold Gerst met at the Tampa International Airport on October 19. With Bro. Terry Miller, from the Sarasota congregation, the team visited the devastated areas of Port Charlotte, North Port, Punta Gordo, Cleveland, Arcadia, and Wauchula, Florida.

After seeing the needs of all these locations, all four on the team, by secret ballot, voted to setup our Work Project Site at Wauchula. This area was hit by three of the four hurricanes and 75% to 80% of the buildings sustained severe damage. This county is one of the poorest in all of Florida, with many of the victims being migrant workers, and other permanent residents that have lower economic capabilities.

While in Wauchula, the team met with the Director of the Hardee County Office of Community Development. The information on the disaster victims and their needs are collected by this department, and this is where the selection of those we help is made. The team also visited with the Director of Facilities for the Board of County

Commissioners for Hardee County. He showed us the Hardee County Camping Area, where he gave us permission to set up campers and motor homes, and is furnishing hookups. An indoor pavilion for preparing meals and a fellowship area is available at the camping site.

Brethren have donated seven camper trailers and several vans to use on this project. Two World Relief Tool Trailers and pickups are being used at the job sites.

The project began January 3, with Bro. Harold & Sister Sheri Fritz as Job Site Volunteer Coordinators, and Bro. Jared Schieber acting as General Contractor. The first week, slab foundations were poured for three houses. Framing began the second week. The restoration process also began the first week on houses, which were not damaged to the extent that demolition and rebuilding were necessary. This restoration includes roofing, drywall removal, mold treatment, new drywall installation, trimming, and painting. It is desired that all the houses, new construction and restoration, be finished by the end of March 2005.

Volunteers are needed. Building skills are a plus, but anyone with a willing heart can find a blessing in helping in the worthy project. Many would desire to escape the rigors of the northern winter. This project provides the opportunity to give encouragement to those who have suffered loss and to fellowship with faithful brethren and friends, as you labor together.

he has?" (Job 1:10). God didn't deny that He had done that. So I believe we can take from that that there are times when God maybe does put a little protection around us. Maybe a hedge around. "Hast not thou made an hedge about him, and about his house, and about all that he hath on every side?..." (Job 1:10).

Sometimes I think, when we are going through a - isn't that the way we feel as parents for our children? Isn't that what we want for our familv? The Lord said how that He would have just loved, as He looked over Jerusalem, as a hen just brought them in under His wings and protected them (St. Matthew 23:37). Sometimes as parents, don't we feel that way about our children? We just would like to carry them through the hard times. We would just like to somehow or other protect them. Have a little hedge about them.

I believe that God will do that. We can pray for it. It doesn't mean that they will always be spared any kind of a heartache or test. This is life. There is learning to be had through the tough things of life, which is what Job is all about. But I believe there are times when God does put His arm of protection around. Evidently Satan didn't feel like he could touch Job at that point. Not to the point that he wanted. Aren't we thankful for a God that loves us that much?

Something that puzzles me sometimes when I read this, I don't know if it does you too or not. Verse six says, "Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan came also among them." (Job 1:6). Do you ever wonder what that scene was like? Ever just try and picture what heaven must be like? Where God is and how that is and who are these sons of men that came? I don't know who they are, I guess. When we really think about it, you think they could be the helpers of God. But it says, it doesn't say

the sons of men. The sons of God, so maybe it would be the angels or God's help. Somehow or other those that no doubt are part of the working of His kingdom. But there is a day, evidently, they have a meeting. How is it going? How are you getting along on your part and your part? Maybe, is that what is going on? I don't know but it sounds like they had a time to consider how things were.

I don't understand why Satan was allowed to come. Yet, maybe it was a - we don't understand things as God does. The fact that God allows Satan to come and He pointed out Job and they had a talk about Job. God said, "Have you considered Job, my faithful servant?" (Job 1:8). And Satan knew all about him. He knew all about Job. God didn't have to tell him anything that Satan wasn't aware of, it seems like.

I kind of wonder if that isn't, if that kind of thing isn't still going on. That there is times when whatever is going on with God and the sons of God and that Satan, the accuser of the brethren comes. He is there and he is accusing us before God. He is wanting a chance to kind of have at us and try to prove that if he just has a chance, that we won't be faithful. That is what he told God about Job. If you take that hedge away, he will curse you to your face. If you weren't blessing him so much, he would just curse you to your face (Job 1:11).

So then, it makes me wonder, and don't you wonder the same thing, when we have things come, sometimes we think we are having a bad day. Have you ever had those days when it seems like you should just go back and get back in bed and maybe try rolling out a little different. Pray a little longer and maybe I could start the day all over and it would go better because everything is going wrong today. Sometimes we have those kind of days, don't we? It seems like it sometimes.

If there is ever a bad day, this was the day, the day Job had. One thing after another. You know, when we have those kind of times, don't we kind of wonder, have you ever kind of wondered, it is unusual when it goes that bad. This day was so unusual, Job had to realize this is not a normal day. He didn't know about the conversation God had had with Satan.

But when we have those especially tough days, can we pause just a moment and say, why is it going so hard? Is it possible God is allowing Satan to test me especially today? I believe it is possible. I have had some of those days. Sometimes we just have to step back a little bit. If we take a little time to think about the message of this book, the message of this chapter, if it is really a challenge between God and Satan to see whether we will be faithful through the test that he can bring, then we would really want to try all the harder to not let those things we are going through that day just get us down, get us upset, wouldn't we? Because we want to prove to Satan that we love God. Not because life goes so smooth and everything is just the way we choose for it to be. But we love God because He loved us first.

Because of that, how did Job end that? "...Naked came I out of my mother's womb, and naked shall I return thither: the Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1:21). When we read that it almost sounds like - maybe this isn't right to say but - we might say, well he must have been in shock. It wasn't all sinking in. He just had a reaction. He just said something that came to his mind off the top of his mind. Maybe that is true. His heart was so fixed on God and trusting in God that that is what he said.

We know sometimes when we lose someone close to us, the hardest time isn't that first day a lot of times. It comes a little later on. When we think about it, all of his children gone in a day. Some of you have lost a child or more than one. You never forget that. Those special days that come around and all of

that, there is a heartache and a lonesomeness that you feel that those of us that haven't been through that never know. Job knew it and his wife knew it because they lost all of them.

If we had a flood, if we had a drought, we lost part of this or that, would be one thing. But he lost it all. Yet, it says, "In all this Job sinned not, nor charged God foolishly." (Job 1:22). Really, that probably sums it up. I can't help but just sum it up with those two thoughts. That where our treasure is, there will our heart be (St. Matthew 6:21). If his heart was set on these things, these treasures of life, all the blessings that God had given him, then he would have had to have been so distraught and not be able to bless God and trust God through it. Because we know what it is like when we lose something that we really care about. But obviously his heart was fixed on God and serving Him so he didn't charge God foolishly. We trust that we never will either, in the cares that we have.

As we turn to the New Testament, we want the Word to be what applies to our lives.

How can we take these familiar chapters that we have, this familiar parable, the parable of the sower? We don't need to go down through it verse by verse. We understand what it says. But where are we in the parable?

How did it say it? "And he began again to teach by the sea side: and there was gathered unto him a great multitude..." (St. Mark 4:1). So in that multitude, there were no doubt those that were believers. It doesn't say that His disciples were off somewhere else. It doesn't say that there were only those that had never heard Him teach before. We can assume that it was the crowds that followed Him day by day. So there were some, no doubt, following that had already started walking and trusting and believing Him and some that were just there maybe to hear it for the first time.

He taught many things by para-

bles and He told this parable. We know the parable is about the Word of God that is going forth. I had to wonder as we read through there, now where are we? Is this just a parable to try and get the attention of the friends on a Sunday morning? It opened tonight. Where are we in the parable?

There are several, we might say, different types of soil. It says the first is sown. "...when they have heard, Satan cometh immediately, and taketh away the word that was sown in their hearts." (St. Mark 4:15). As the Word goes out and it is like the birds, the fowls of the air I believe it says, come and as soon as that seed is scattered, as soon as it hits the ground, the birds are swooping down and they are picking it up and carrying it away (St. Mark 4:4). Never really gets a chance to settle in. That is one of the conditions it talks about. That, I don't believe is us, is it? Because we are those where it has sprouted and it is growing and we are willing to bring forth fruit.

Likewise, those on the stony ground. "...when they have heard the word, immediately receive it with gladness; And have no root in themselves, and so endure but for a time..." (St. Mark 4:16,17).

Those among the thorns hear the Word and the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches, the lusts of other things entering in, choke the word (St. Mark 4:18,19).

So we have the hard ground where it never gets a chance to sink in. Then we have the ground where it is stony. The seed maybe sinks in. That ground is warm because it is shallow. It will sprout but it doesn't have the ability to weather the hot, sunny, dry times and it withers (St. Mark 4:5,6).

The seed that gets choked out and then the seed that brings forth fruit (St. Mark 4:19,20). Probably there we are. Probably if we are honest with ourselves, we are somewhere in between. Sometimes we are bringing forth fruit and sometimes we are allowing cares to choke us

out a little bit, aren't we?

Is that something we can take from the Word tonight? Are there any thorns and thistles in your life and mine? I know there are things that come in my life from time to time. Satan tries to bring those things in. He tries to bring to us, just as he did to Job, something to discourage or something to make it hard. It is not just like what Job went through. Sometimes the things that Satan brings to us no one else ever sees. But there is a test. There is a thing that Satan tries to rob us of being fruitful for the Lord as He would have us be.

As we look out across the church and we see those that love the Lord and that is evident and we see fruit in your life and that is a blessing. It is a glory to God. We just want to encourage each other to, as the Apostles wrote in the New Testament, more and more, that you would abound more and more (Philippians 1:9). Because we are on the right track. We are doing what God wants us to do.

It seems like as we read this, it is like, what is the message tonight? It seems like it has to be, don't let the thorns and don't let the weeds start taking over.

We got a different combine this year. In this combine we have a yield monitor. So as we are going through the field, it is pretty obvious what it is intended to do is show you what the yield was as you are going along. On this yield monitor, there is a sixteen second delay. So you are going along and sometimes I am looking and I think, well that corn is doing pretty good. I look up and it doesn't say it is doing pretty good. But then a little while later, yes, it really is picking up. You kind of smile when you go through a real good spot where it is really yielding. But there are times when you go through a thin spot. In the thin spots, there are usually weeds. There are the grasses that came up, maybe the broad leaves. It is amazing what a

few weeds and a little bit of a thin stand does for the yield. It just drops way off.

So what do we do that can help us to bring forth abundantly the fruit that God would have in our lives? The seed has to be able to get into the ground. We don't have time to go into it too deep right now, but the soil needs to be prepared. In farming today we notill and there are special mechanisms to try and penetrate that harder soil and get that seed in the ground. One of the biggest problems we have with a no-till situation is getting good seed-to-soil contact. So that seed is in good contact with the soil. It can get started. It can germinate. It can grow. Once it is up and growing then you have a good chance. But the problem that leads to a poor, thin stand so often is poor seed-to-soil contact. So that is always the struggle.

Now how can we relate that to our lives? We know the seed, it said here, is the good Word that is being spread (St. Mark 4:14). What can we do to help it to sink in and get into contact with the soil where it can get the moisture out of the soil and it can be warmed by the soil around it and it can sprout and grow and bring forth fruit? We have to have something, some mechanism to make that contact. I believe it is a

preparation. Whether it is a prepared field that is just all ready for the soil or whether it is a no-till situation, it takes some effort. It takes some preparation so that that soil and that seed can make the contact.

In our lives, do we really come and do we really take the time to be prepared, that God's Word can sink into our heart and really make contact? I believe it takes time before we ever get to church. Sometimes, we have all heard it said, "Well, I don't feel fed at church. I am just not getting anything out of it. Or I go to church and I just wonder, I am just not getting anything there." But when we are really prepared properly for that Word to sink in is when we come to see what we can do to share the love of God.

Part of the fruit is not coming to church for what we can receive. But coming to church to worship God. Coming to be thankful to God. Coming to be thankful for the love that we feel and the love that we can show to one another. Coming to church maybe to see someone that has been through something that we are aware of. We can give a little word of encouragement. To help that seed to sink in, our heart has to be right and it takes some preparation ahead of time.

We are so thankful when we come

and we have a praying church. But the greatest blessing is when we have prayed at home and then we come and pray in church and we trust God. When our hearts are prepared, we will never go home without having been blessed. Not because the ministers are so great. But because God is faithful. When you pour out your heart and you prepare your heart before God, the Word is going to fall in there and it is going to bring forth fruit.


