Hast thou perceived the breadth of the earth? declare if thou knowest it all. Job 38:18 February 2006 Sermon by Bro. Matthew Rassi, Chicago, IL

I Samuel 24 and I Corinthians 6

That is the conclusion of that chapter that Paul wrote to the Corinthians but certainly not the conclusion of the book, is it, as he would have much instruction for this church that was struggling.

Fascinating, dear ones, these two chapters that opened up unto us. The one of David. What nobleness! What honor! It is almost a lost emotion in this world today. I guess I would think of it more, since I don't deal day by day with the president or those that are in authority directly above me other than my boss at work, but to see the interactions of men with those that have authority over them, do we see this same respect that David had? He had the opportunity, dear ones, to take vengeance into his own hand. He had been chased around the countryside for years by Saul. He had to live as a nomad. He could not have a home. He could not enjoy his family. He was not in peace and safety because this man was trying to take his life. But this man was the king.

David recognized and he shared with his men, he taught them, what a lesson he taught his men. What a lesson he teaches us today. That Saul was the Lord's anointed. And to recognize that those that are in authority have been placed there by God's hand. (I Samuel 24:6) And whether we agree with them, whether we like them or not is of no account. It does not matter. Now if they would ask us to do something that is against the Word of God, we can say no. Because we submit to a higher authority. But otherwise, dear ones, we are to submit to those that are over us.

That is what submission is, isn't it? It's to do something when we don't want to but we should according to God's law of order. He is the One that placed everyone where they are at, in terms of power. In terms of as the world would think, whether it would be with our families, with church, with the nation, at work. All of those things. Now if we

don't believe in God fully, if we think it is just circumstances, it just happens, it would cause our faith to waver, wouldn't it? To doubt when things would go wrong. Isn't it interesting, dear ones, when things are going well, we just consider it that we are in the right place at the right time. We are doing well. But when things go wrong, we hardly ever say we are in the right place at the right time. We say we ended up in the wrong place at the wrong time. Yet we turn to Corinthians and we read about the reason that these things happen to us. Things that don't necessarily go the way that we would anticipate, that we would desire.

When we would think about our will, have you thought about, what is your will for your life? What would you like to see happen? Maybe you are young, looking at the future, career, a family, a spouse. All those kinds of things might run across your mind. Then we consider God's will and we know that each one of us want God's will to be done. We say it in our prayers, don't we? Not my will but thine be done, we are taught by Jesus to pray. Do we recognize what that pertains to? What does God's will for your life consist of? See, that is the portion that we don't know. We have to take it on faith. Yet the assurance is there, the promise is there, dear ones, that to take life on faith, to just trust in God that He will lead and direct, who better to trust in than our God? The One who created all things. We can go outside and we can just marvel at the creation. We can look at one another and marvel at the differences! We are all the same and yet we are all different. Every one of us created by God. And He knows us to the innermost depths.

He speaks about brotherly love here in Corinthians. He says, "Dare any of you, having a matter against another, go to law before the unjust, and not before the saints?" I Corinthians 6:1. I would like to just conclude that verse after the first few words. Dare any of you having a matter against another, go to law? Aren't we just all so sick of law suits? I think about it as a parent with the children.

Appreciating the Value of Standards - I

Standards are the parameters that are established as rules or measurements by a power to which we are subject. Governments, businesses, schools, civic organizations, churches and all other "groups" of people have standards that enable the members of the organization to function in a way that helps the organization achieve its mission. Could we live without them?

Governments establish standards (laws) that citizens must follow. We are commanded to "...be subject to the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God" (Ro. 13:1). We sometimes question how it is possible that some of the terrible rulers throughout history could be ordained of God, but it is not for us to question God. We do understand, however, that even "bad" governments are better than no government at all. When there is no government, the result is anarchy. There is no one in control. People tend to do what they think they can get away with. The lawless environment results in confusion, violence and in many cases, death. Rarely are conditions worse than in periods of anarchy.

Most businesses have a policy handbook that helps employees know what is expected of them. Those who manage the business establish these guidelines to make the day to day operation of the company more pleasant for all concerned.

Guidelines in business are also necessary to control the quality of the product. While manufacturing parts that are interchangeable from one piece of equipment to a similar piece of equipment, precise standards must be met or the parts will not fit. Therefore, standards of tolerance are set and must be strictly followed. If the standards are ignored, the company will lose its customers.

We would not consider sending our children to a school that had no standards of conduct because we would fear for their safety. We would be concerned that they would not be prepared for adult life if they were not required to meet reasonable standards of academic achievement.

Families without a well defined structure and without clearly explained and enforced expectations often are families in disarray. Without standards, parents have difficulty being consistent. When parents are not consistent, children are often confused.

Children who grow up in a family mired in confusion frequently have a difficult time adapting to situations that require structure - such as school, work or as a member of some organization. They often have trouble submitting to authority at any level. This, of course, can have serious consequences in their performance in almost everything they try later in life. It is especially difficult for them to function well in their family and, as a result, the cycle often repeats itself in succeeding generations. "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Prov. 22:6). On the other hand, "For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work." (James

This discussion could be continued to include social and civic organizations as well. We can readily see that every organization that has a purpose must have a structure for making decisions. Also, every organization with a purpose must have someone, or a relatively small group of people, who is charged with the responsibility of making decisions for the organization. Those who have this responsibility must also be accountable for the decisions that they make. We simply cannot function unless we have a reasonably clear understanding of what is expected of us.

We may ask what all of this has to do with our faith and living according to the "standards" of the church. Is salvation not a matter of faith? It is true that "...by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast" (Eph. 2:8-9). It is very important that we understand the grace of God and that we are saved by faith in "... the precious blood of Christ..." (I Peter 1:19).

It is also important that we understand that Jesus said "Go ye therefore, and teach

all nations, ... Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you..." (Mt. 28:19-20). We are also taught "That there should be no schism in the body; but that the members should have the same care one for another" (I Cor. 12:25), that "... all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility..." (I Peter 5:5) and "Obey them that have the rule over vou, and submit vourselves: for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy and not with grief..." (Heb. 13:17). The apostle Paul carefully explained in I Cor. 12 that all parts of the body are important, all must function together but different parts have different responsibilities. His analogy of the human body with the church helps us understand that the church cannot operate effectively if we do not all function within our

We would like to believe that we would all remain faithful without guidelines or without someone having the authority to enforce the guidelines. History teaches us that such is not the case. There was a time when "... there was no king in Israel, but every man did that which was right in his own eyes" (Ju. 17:6). We can see how this soon led to idolatry and the destruction of Israel.

The church was given the authority to uphold the principles (or standards) that were taught by Jesus Christ. The church was given the power to bind and loose (Mt. 16:19; 18:18) and to remit or retain sins (Jn. 20:23). The church was also to deliver the decrees throughout the cities that were to be kept by God's people (Acts 16:4). When there were disagreements about positions that the church should uphold, a method for settling these questions need to be developed. Acts 15 explains how this was done: "And the apostles and elders came together for to consider of this matter (v. 6). They prayerfully considered the matter, reached a conclusion, and sent a letter to the brethren to explain the decision (v. 7-25).

Mission Policy and Guidelines

The Mission Committee wishes to share the steps by which brothers and sisters can pursue a Spirit-directed calling to serve in various aspects of Church supported mission work. These steps are also outlined in Mission Committee brochures available in our churches.

Christ taught: "If ye love me, keep my commandments" and "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you (Jn 14:15; Mt 28:19-20).

The first of the four pillars of our church mission is to present the Gospel to the lost. This pillar also represents the purpose of our Church Mission Policy. We believe the Scripture calls us to do this in harmony with the other three pillars of our church mission: to nurture the believer, to preserve and promote true doctrine, and to serve in humility and love. The church prospers when all four pillars are functioning together and in accordance with Scripture, all by the grace of God (Acts 11: 19-30).

As we create proper balance among these four pillars, we can further God's plan for "all men to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth" (I Tim 2:4). Our Mission Policy prioritizes four objectives to accomplish this.

- 1. Sharing the Word expressing our eternal hope, teaching, preaching, being an example. The word provides illumination. (Psalm 119:105)
- 2. Inviting others to worship with us. (Rom 10:14)

- 3. Supporting small churches. (I Thes 3:12-13)
- 4. Establishing churches within and outside the USA according to the Word of God and its directives as outlined in our Statement of Faith (Acts 11:22-26); and with the discretion, gentleness and leading of the Holy Spirit (I Cor 9:19-23).

Guidelines for Sending Brethren on Mission Projects

- 1. Prayerful discernment of calling a time of fervent prayer with a surrendered, humble heart; wanting only the will of God to be revealed (Acts 16:9-10, Ps 139:23-24).
- 2. Initial counsel establish open, candid, respectful communication and accountability with your local elder, enabling him to understand your heart and to confirm his consent and blessing with what you believe the Lord is calling you to do (Pr 15:22).
- 3. Mission Committee assessment—interview by the Mission Committee or its designated sub-committe. A time of listening, counseling, learning and seeking the Lord's will together (Philemon 14).
- 4. Confirmation of steadfastness upholding the Word and being sound in faith, grace, doctrine and example (I Thes 1:7-8); so that the church can "earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints" (Jude 3).
- 5. Responsive placement following the biblical pattern for brethren being sent with the authority and accountability of the church. Effort is made to align the individual's gifts and calling with the current needs of our various mission projects (Acts 11:22).

- 6. Accountability sending brethren on mission work is sobering as well as inspiring, and it calls for loving and wise accountability among the elder, the church and the brethren being sent (He 13:17). Each assignment is carefully reviewed in order to avoid ecumenical doctrinal intermingling and deception (Rev 17).
- 7. Counting the cost directed by God so that individuals may be sufficiently prepared for the work: sufficient in terms of spiritual health, humility, faith, grace and sanctification; having a love for the brotherhood and for the lost; and addressing the various logistical issues (Lu 14:28).
- 8. Ongoing oversight and sup**port** – from the chief shepherd Jesus Christ, from the Holy Spirit to lead us in truth and to moderate any tendency toward individualistic decision making, from our over-seeing elder and from our brethren. We are our brother's keeper. Therefore we want to understand the needs of those on mission assignments – the struggles within their families and within the work. We desire to communicate and fellowship with them appropriately so that we can weep and rejoice together and be fervently and responsively prayerful for them (I Thes 2:11-12).

We sincerely entreat your cooperation and your Holy Spirit-inspired submission to the spirit and the letter of this Mission Policy and Guidelines. May we as a church work together in singleness of spirit, mind, faith and judgment (Ph 1:27; I Cor 1:10), and may God grant us grace to fulfill His commission to spread the Gospel in a manner which will have His full blessing (Mt 28:19-20).



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

Expansion of Work Projects

Good works are a vital part of the Christian life. The theme of Apostolic Christian World Relief, Galatians 6:10, "do good unto all men." is a present and constant reminder of our responsibility to assist our Brethren, friends, and neighbors.

As our Brotherhood seeks to be obedient to the Scripture, the Spirit has urged us to become neighbors, as is related in Luke 10:36-37. As travel became more affordable, our Brethren found desperate needs in areas not familiar to many of us. The late 1970's and early 1980's was the beginning of many years of assistance to poor people in Haiti. This effort expanded to include Jamaica, during a time when the political climate in Haiti did not allow our Brethren to travel or send work teams there.

In the mid 1980's, the earthquake damage and human suffering in Mexico City opened the opportunity to send humanitarian assistance and work teams to help build shelter for the victims. With the exception of our support to our Brethren in Eastern Europe, this was the first time funding and work teams were sent outside our country in that magnitude.

Work projects in the U.S.

The first major work project in the United States was near Charleston, South Carolina, to help the victims of Hurricane Hugo in 1989-90. We were able to provide funds and volunteers to help the poor and needy, a successful and blessed project.

Early in the 1990's, the World Relief Board found it advantageous to establish the USA Committee,

similar to other areas with work projects, such as Caribbean and Mexico. The USA Committee was given the responsibility to seek out work project opportunities in the continental United States. During the 1990's, the larger work projects were efforts with Christian Aid Ministries. CAM furnished funds. project management, and volunteers. We furnished funds and volunteers. By the late 1990's, CAM had increased in size and support from their own constituency, and there were fewer opportunities for us to participate in their projects.

Disaster work projects

In early 1999, the World Relief Board approved the USA Committee's recommendation to acquire and equip tool trailers to assist with work projects. A new sub-committee, "Disaster Work Projects", was selected. Disaster Work Projects has two types of projects: 1st Response, for assessment and cleanup after disasters, and long term Work Projects, for repair, rebuilding, or new construction following disasters.

The initial 1st Response project was April 1999 in Hoisington, KS and the first Disaster Work Project was in the summer of 2000, in Camilla, GA., both in response to devastation caused by tornados. Additional projects were in Pontotoc, MS, during the summer of 2001, due to a tornado, and in Wauchula, FL, during January thru March 2005, due to a series of hurricanes. A total of twelve new houses have been built and many repaired during these efforts, with the help of hundreds of Brethren and friends.

Katrina hurricane

The Katrina Hurricane Project, in the Biloxi, MS area, is now in process. A total of 500 volunteers are expected to take part in the building of houses and rehabilitation of the structures that can be restored. Only a few openings for volunteers remain. Local summer projects

With the combined effort of World Relief and Gateway Woods Illinois, local summer projects were started. to give occasion for the churches in Illinois to have opportunities for volunteers that did not require a specific number of day's commitment, nor long travel time and miles. An effort was made for each congregation to suggest and organize a project of approximate one week in length. This proved so successful that the effort was extended to include Kansas, Missouri, Iowa, Minnesota, Indiana, and Ohio. There are five representatives on the Disaster Work Projects subcommittee that cover the various geographic areas.

While the greatest effort is in the "disaster" area, building projects are also being accomplished for organizations such as the Navajo Nation, Galilean Children's Home, Esther House, and the International Services of Hope (ISOH). When any of our congregations construct or repair church or fellowship buildings, the USA Board stands ready to support these efforts by loaning them tool trailers and notifying our volunteers of these opportunities.

May the Lord continue to give the wisdom and discernment to continue with this work for His glory, praise and honor. Anyone wishing to make contributions may do so by sending funds through their local World Relief Representative.

work in the lives of children and families.

Before we get too far into this year, it is good for us to stop and reflect on God's continued provision in the past year. A few highlights from 2005 include:

- 1) In 2005, Gateway Woods opened up a home for young women in need of our Christ-centered services who are pregnant or have young children. This program has been a huge success, and the young women are quickly learning what it means to be a godly, loving mother. The young children are also certainly benefiting!
- 2) Because of this new program, Gateway Woods is building a 4th group home on our campus. We praise God for each and every one of you who has supported or plans to support this effort through your church's special collection. We are prayerfully hoping to break ground in March 06.
- 3) Our Christian Adoption Services Program continues to have a significant impact. To date, we have helped over 40 families adopt more than 50 children from countries as diverse as Guatemala, Russia, Liberia, and China.
- 4) The 2005 Auction raised over \$345,000 to support our Christ-centered services, which is about 15% of our operating budget. This was the highest amount ever collected! We praise God for meeting our needs through you. This year's Auction is August 19, 2006.
- 5) Last year, Gateway Woods provided free or subsidized services totaling over \$1,000,000. Hun-

dreds of children and families in our community, across the country, and literally around the world have benefited from your generosity. This includes, not only meeting the children's physical needs of housing, food, and clothing, but also their spiritual needs of hearing, learning, and seeing the love of Jesus Christ in their lives. "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."



Can't you just get along, we say? Then I think about God up in heaven looking down on the children of men. Can't you all just get along?

Sure, accidents are going to happen. Sure, offenses are going to come. Let's just each one try not to cause that offense. That is what the Bible says. But then it speaks about, and even referenced in the prayer, about forgiving. About forgiving one another. We are to forgive with such liberality as we wish to be forgiven. That takes grace, dear ones, because it is not natural. It is not the way of man.

Just like for David when he was there. Here was his enemy. He was ready. Saul even said, he said, would you let your enemy go if he was in your hands (I Samuel 24:19)? David let his enemy go. Jesus, when He preached the Sermon on the Mount. He said that we are not just to love our friends and our neighbors and our family. But we were to love our enemy. How then can any of us take up arms and go fight in a battle against the enemy? But much rather that we are to give and give and give more than they ask when they ask us for something.

But particularly, as we discuss now, amongst the brotherhood. If we would have a disagreement, perhaps we would see things a little differently. This happens, doesn't it? We would think to ourselves, now why would it happen if each one of us are following after the Holy Spirit? And in this chapter it speaks about that, that the Holy Spirit dwells within our hearts (I Corinthians 6:19) and so no longer am I walking after Matthew's way and you walking after your way, but now we are walking in God's way. Listening to what God says. Agreeing and believing in that which He says. Yet we have to take that Word which He says and apply it to our lives, don't we? That portion that we might call the wisdom, walking in the wisdom of God, to know how to take the words that are written, the thoughts, the ideas, the ex-

pressions and apply it to the activities and the way of life. How does this apply to me? How would this apply to my neighbor? That is where we would see some differences, don't we? Because each one of us grew up differently. We saw different examples. We have a different view point of it. Yet the purity is there, dear ones, if we can take ourselves out of the picture. Our own viewpoints, our own thoughts, our own directions and rely fully on the Word, we will be one. We'll be united. We'll be even as Jesus was with His Father and as He desires we would be with Him. Of one mind, walking in one Spirit, minding those things that are His.

"Do ye not know that the saints shall judge the world?..." I Corinthians 6:2. We can read this in those prophecies about the kingdoms that will be established, about the responsibilities that will be given. Jesus gave the example of the man that was given the talents and he came back with ten more. He was given the twenty cities. And the man that came back with one. He had done nothing with it. It was even taken from him and given to the man with ten. (St. Luke 19:11-24) As a responsibility to carry out the work. If then we would be used, dear ones, as believers in this life or perhaps for all eternity to be used as judges to judge the world with Jesus, to be there with Him, shouldn't we be able by His grace, to handle the matters that are here upon this earth?

Perhaps this verse could be read also: if you cannot handle it here, if you cannot be used even as the example, consider the others that are watching, and you would drag them down, how then can you expect to enter? I think about that often as we consider the children of the Old Testament, the children of Israel, and how often they displeased God. All the nations around them were watching them. They wanted to see what they were going to do. They had heard of the miracles of crossing the Red Sea, of the walls of Jericho falling down. They knew this was

God's chosen people. They wanted to see how they worked, what they did. What did they do to receive God's blessing? When they would flee and walk away and serve idols, it displeased God greatly. One; because they were disobedient but two; because their example was so poor. And it is all given to us for an example, that we would not walk in those ways.

"...if the world shall be judged by you, are ye unworthy to judge the smallest matters? Know ye not that we shall judge angels?..." I Corinthians 6:2,3. I don't know how that works, dear ones, but it is stated here in the Word so it is truth. Do you feel qualified to judge an angel? Do we feel qualified to judge anyone? Let's consider that fact. It speaks in the Word that we are not to be judging one another (St. Matthew 7:1). When we stop and we consider it, we get to those times in life, maybe when a life is taken, when we are really sobered and we are thinking about the soul, we are thankful, aren't we, that it is not our judgment as to whether a soul has sought the grace to be in God's will or not.

But we do have responsibilities in this role of judgment even now, dear ones, as we live. That is with each one of our souls. Individually we are to judge, to consider where we are at. What does a judge do? He takes the action that has occurred. He compares it to the law and he sees if they are guilty. We need to take the Word of God, compare it to how we are walking in life and see if it matches. If it doesn't, we are guilty, we are condemned.

Verse three continues. "...how much more things that pertain to this life?" I Corinthians 6:3. Maybe we say we can't understand it. Maybe we don't know. Maybe it is unclear to us. But I think in the depths of our hearts we know when we are doing that which is right and when we haven't. Because it bothers us.

Perhaps not. I know with Pharaoh it said his heart was hardened (Exodus 7:3). It didn't seem to bother

him. Sin right before him. Disobedience to God. It said his heart was hardened. But praying, dear ones, that each one of us would find enough grace to have soft hearts that we could be affected when we see sin in ourselves, in others, that it would convict us. We pray that, don't we? That the Holy Spirit would be convicting ourselves. For those that are not yet converted, that the Holy Spirit would convict their hearts. That they would recognize their need for salvation before it is too late.

"If then ye have judgments of things pertaining to this life, set them to judge who are least esteemed in the church." I Corinthians 6:4. Why, dear ones, would we go to one that we do not esteem highly in the church to make the judgments? I believe this is a safety for us. Can you imagine the popularity contest or the political-ness that would come into the church, if those that were popular, those that were gifted in different gifts were given total authority and we would go to them to settle our disputes? How much safer is it to go to one, that from the world's viewpoint is the basest of men? To go and ask for wisdom from the Word. One who has nothing to gain from the judgment.

Isn't that what we want from our judges in this land? We don't want them to be gaining financially or in any way if they make a judgment one way or the other. We want them to be impartial. Such would be one who is least esteemed. Who would have nothing to gain from the judgment but to look into the Word and to say yea or nay.

This next verse, dear ones, it is so true. "I speak to your shame. Is it so, that there is not a wise man among you?..." I Corinthians 6:5. We think about this also - forgive me for always referencing children but when we talk to the oldest child, we say, you know better. Don't get dragged into it just because the younger one is bickering. You know better. That is how it is with you and I, dear ones, as believers. We know

better. We know the Word. We are to rather take the fault, it says. "...to be defrauded?..." I Corinthians 6:7, that is the word it uses here. To take the short end of the stick. We hear that. Isn't that what Jesus was speaking about when He said, when you are asked to go a mile go with them two? When they ask for your coat, give them your cloak also. Willing to take the short end or willing to give the long end, is really how it comes down to.

It said, "But brother goeth to law with brother, and that before the unbelievers." I Corinthians 6:6. Think about the example there, dear ones, that is given. If we would just think upon a circumstance like that, we would think, well, they can't understand the Bible enough to reconcile their differences so they are seeking out men for their wisdom to reconcile the differences. How absolutely backwards that is, dear ones and yet that is how the world looks at it. The world is no longer going to the Word as absolute truth. It is going to men to try to come up with ideas and new philosophies and ways that will work to bring peace to the world. Are any of those things going to work? We know they won't. They will come to naught. It will pass away, is what the Word says. But the Word will not pass away. (St. Matthew 24:35) That is why we want to use the Word for our judgments, within ourselves, amongst ourselves and with others.

We get to this portion here that speaks very clearly about the kingdom of God. It talks about the inheritance of the kingdom of God. What have we done to inherit? What does somebody do to inherit something? Is it anything that they do of themselves? It is not. If the parents would die, it goes to the children or however it is worked out. You receive an inheritance, having done nothing of vourselves to deserve it. So it is as we are adopted into God's family, those that are believers, and we become children of God, brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ.

Who died that we might receive the inheritance? It is not God that is going to die, dear ones. But Jesus died and He rose again. So it is a bit of a different inheritance than we might think of today. And yet, is a full giving of all that He has, that we would receive it to inherit the kingdom of God.

But it says, "Know ve not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God?..." I Corinthians 6:9. We know this don't we? We know what is required to receive the kingdom of God. Receiving the gift of salvation through Jesus Christ and His shed blood. It is not of ourselves lest we should boast. But it is good for us to be reminded. Paul recognized here that they knew this. Because what did he say before he started this list? He said, be ye not deceived (I Corinthians 6:9). Because the world would say that some of these things aren't that bad anymore. It's okay. It's not okay. Don't be deceived. The Word says it is wrong.

Fornication (v.9). We know this and yet what do young people do? Living together, all these kinds of things, even before marriage. It is wrong. Don't be deceived.

Idolatry (v.9). Following after anything besides God. Giving praise and honor to anyone besides God. Think about our sports, entertainment in general. Hollywood. Any of those things. Giving praise to anyone but God. Idolatry. Don't be deceived. It is wrong.

Adulterers (v.9). Those that are married. Families breaking up, getting divorces, getting remarriages. It is wrong! It is not to happen. Don't be deceived.

Effeminate (v.9). I don't know exactly what that means. But it comes to mind that it's men with men and women with women, working those things which are unseemly. Don't be deceived! It's wrong! The world is trying to pass laws that it's okay. It is not okay. Think about Sodom and Gomorrah and God's hatred for it. Rained down fire and brimstone to kill them all except for Lot and his

two daughters. (Genesis 19:12-25) Even they had it sticking to them.

"...nor abusers of themselves with mankind," and the list continues "Nor thieves..." I Corinthians 6:9,10. We would not doubt the thieves, would we? We know that is wrong and yet what happens? It is no longer like we think of breaking into a house and taking things. The world has come up with different ways to rob. Think about the corporate scandals. Think about taxes. All these kinds of things. It is no longer you have to break into a house to steal. But it is wrong. All of it.

Covetous (v.10). Desiring more than we have. Desiring something that somebody else has. Keeping up with the Jones', the society says. It is wrong! Don't be deceived! It says here, will not inherit the kingdom of God (I Corinthians 6:10). We can get caught up in these things, can't we? We have to push them off, actively resisting Satan.

"...nor drunkards, nor revilers..." I Corinthians 6:10. What is a reviler? Speaking back. Speaking harshly. "...nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God." I Corinthians 6:10. And I don't believe, dear ones, that this is a complete list. But it was to give the example, the intent, the recognition. Don't be deceived when the world starts to sway the values. Use the Word as the standard. It is so needful.

And so beautiful how he says here in verse eleven because it's true and every one of us knows it. "And such were some of you..." I Corinthians 6:11. Every one of us, dear ones, were defiled in sin, weren't we? And yet if we could recognize it and be willing to humble ourselves and say, "I am a sinner, God forgive me," God is willing to forgive us as much as we are willing to forgive others. He will go so much further if we will just let Him. There is no limit to that. To

forgive and forget.

I know I have said this before. But it is just amazing. We can't hardly remember anything; names, places. Yet we remember when someone's wronged us. And when we try to forgive and forget, we can hardly do it. Yet there is God, who knows everything. Who doesn't forget anything! He knows it all! Except those things that we've asked forgiveness for. And He'll forgive. They'll be covered and gone from His sight and from His mind. That's beautiful!

"All things are lawful unto me, but all things are not expedient..." I Corinthians 6:12. What a difference from the way the world takes the Bible. What a difference from the way that sometimes we take the Word, isn't it? We consider the Word as the upper limit rather than the lower boundary. Just like they did in the Old Testament when somebody was killed and they had to put an upper limit. An eye for an eye. The maximum sentence you could require from somebody if they would poke out your eye was their eye. (Leviticus 24:19,20) You could not kill them. You could not slay them. That didn't mean you had to take out their eve. That was the upper limit. Yet it became the lower boundary, to make sure that vengeance was taken at least that far.

So it is in the Word. Especially in the New Testament now, when Jesus speaks these thoughts. Where He doesn't define, He doesn't necessarily give the lists. He speaks about it as a matter of the heart for our consideration, using that Godly wisdom to apply it to our lives.

"...all things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any." I Corinthians 6:12. That certainly applies today, doesn't it? We think of things that are addictive. The smoking, the gambling, the internet. I will not be brought under the power of any. Why is that, dear

ones? Because we need to be guided by the Holy Spirit. And if we are under the power of something else, our mind is not going to think properly. We are not going to consult with the Holy Spirit when we make decisions. We are going to be making the decisions off our own mind, our own wants, whatever power we are under. Which is always Satan if it is not God.

"Meats for the belly, and the belly for meats: but God shall destroy both it and them. Now the body is not for fornication, but for the Lord; and the Lord for the body." I Corinthians 6:13. He speaks now directly to these things of our body. Of the sin of fornication and adultery. The wickedness that is there. The incorrect use of that which God made to be holy.

The disappointment that has to be there from the sins that came about. It was so beautiful with Adam and Eve in the garden as they would have children (Genesis 1:26-31). But they lost it, wanting to live forever. That was what Satan tempted them with, wasn't it? Wanting to know the difference between right and wrong. The tree of the knowledge of good and evil. They ate from that tree. dear ones, and now we know the difference between good and evil. (Genesis 3:1-7) And we have the choice. We can read here in this chapter what is evil and we know what is good. We want to mind those things that are good.

Thankfully, dear ones, they did not eat of that tree of life. That tree is still in the garden. It says it will be in heaven above. (Revelation 2:7) That is when we will live for all eternity, the soul of man. May it be that our souls can be prepared, that we can enter into that kingdom of God. That we would stay true and faithful. That we would not be deceived. That many souls would yet come to recognize and realize the joy of salvation that is given freely to mankind.

History Update

At the Morton, Illinois, conference in August of 2003, the Elder Body voted to commission an updating of the current history book *Marching To Zion*. Work thence began to update all the information on each church and all the work associated with projects such as World Relief, etc.

The work was complicated by the fact that due to technical advances since the first edition was published in 1984, the disks would no longer fit today's technology. As a result, it became necessary that the entire book be re-written and re-typeset. This, of course, slowed the process and made the ultimate completion of the task much longer.

The first edition of *Marching To Zion* consisted of 650 pages. Very likely the second edition will total 700 pages or more. To date (as of January 20), approximately 500 pages have been sent to Sekan Printing Company in Fort Scott, Kansas. The remainder of the pages will be sent as soon as they are re-written.

As most authors will likely admit, the real work begins when the proofreading begins. Writing a book can become burdensome at times, but a heavier weight of responsibility is the proofreading phase. To date, proofreaders have been enlisted to help complete this time consuming process. Also, at some point, each church's history will be given to the local Elder for approval, and for a final review.

Another task in the overall process is to complete a topical and name index in the back of the book. This requires going through each page and listing all the names, and most of the topics. While this will add to the time of production, it is valuable for the readers, and for any subsequent researchers who might use the book.

The question is often asked, "When

will the new *Marching To Zion* be available?" An explicit answer cannot be given. The only thing that can be said with certainty is that the author and the proofreaders are working to complete the project. A definite date cannot be given. There is no deadline.

One thing that is evident in this work is the change that has taken place during the past 25 years. This is referring to the number of new leaders, new churches and the significant expansion of World Relief and work projects related to serving others. It is remarkable, and the expansion phase will be covered in the new book.

New Elders

As mentioned above, there have been new leaders ordained to lead the local flocks. Up until January, 2006, there have been 48 new men ordained as Elders since the first edition Marching to Zion. In working on our heritage, one becomes familiar with all the American Elders since 1847 beginnings here in America when the first Elder, Benedict Weyeneth, aged 29, came to establish the first church in Lewis County, New York. Since that time many men have served in leadership capacities. The historian learns about these men but a good many were from past eras, and many more have gone on to their reward. In this, the historian does not know them on a personal basis. Thus, in listing the new 48 men ordained since the first edition, it was special in that the author knows every one of them. It was a privilege to work on this phase of the book.

The Importance of History

The percentage of persons interested in history does not reach a very high number. Often, history is seen as somewhat boring and irrelevant. Yet, it demonstrates how our foreparents dealt with the problems and opportunities of their eras. If they made mistakes, or had successes, we can learn from that, and apply their wisdom to our time.

The faithful examples from history often inspire us to do better, to want to become more devoted to the faith and to try to be more pleasing to the Lord. If we are to "keep" the faith of our fathers, it is necessary to know what that faith — and its distinctives — were. As we learn from the past, it can help us to apply the Scriptures in a better way and become more effective in learning how to preserve unity among the churches.

Freedom

In working on a denominational history it becomes glaringly apparent that freedom to worship is one of the most wonderful facets of our brotherhood. In America, it is not as it was sometimes in Europe and especially in Eastern Europe where religious suppression was the norm. Here in America, the Bill of Rights has preserved an open door into our churches with no intervention regarding our beliefs and how we administer the churches. This is a blessing we can hardly comprehend, but one for which God is to be thanked on a daily basis.


In Romans 8:27 we read, the Spirit maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God. The Spirit can do that because He knows the will of God in all things,
