

Sermon by Bro. Ted Schock, Belvidere IL

#### Esther 8:1-8; Romans 12:1-21

For our first reading I've opened to the book of Esther. I've opened to chapter 8, towards the end of the story of Esther. But here was a person that was in a foreign land. The Israelites were taken from their land of Israel, and Judah, and Jerusalem because of the unfaithfulness of the nation towards God; the worshiping idols and turning to the ways of the people around about them. And yet there was still a faithful remnant even among those Israelite people, and Jews. We can think of Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah. Their names were changed to Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego by the king. (Daniel 1:6-7). And Mordecai, and Esther. And even though they were way out numbered, they were in a foreign land of Babylon, or Assyria or whatever the nation happened to be that they were in, they were faithful to God and God used them to work His work upon the earth.

We know the story of Esther, how she was raised by Mordecai (Esther 2:5-7). Her parents had died, (I don't know if they were ill, or if they were killed when Jerusalem was sacked), but anyhow, she might have a reason to feel all alone in the world with just her cousin Mordecai, and in a foreign land. And maybe there were little neighborhoods of Jews around about. We get that idea from what we read here. And then she was not only in a foreign land, but then she was taken out of her own little household when the king decided that he was going to gather up all the fair maidens to choose a new queen. (Esther 2:8) And so she is taken out of her house and taken away and put in the harem, or whatever it is called. And yet she was still faithful to God, and God was faithful to her.

So when we feel all alone, we can rely, we can lean upon God, we can lean upon Christ, we can lean upon His Word, and His promises, and His Holy Spirit. And we can believe also that there will be ministering angels to minister unto us. We don't often think of that, but we sang in the hymn how, when Jesus was in the garden of Gethsemane in agony, angels came to com-

fort Him. And we read in Hebrews how the angels are ministering spirits to comfort us. (Hebrews 1:14) And so when we think about it, we have Christ our intercessor. We have God who loves us so much that He gave His only begotten Son. We have the comforter that He sent to be our comforter – the Holy Spirit. We have angels. We really have quite a bit here on this earth.

So, let's read here from Chapter 8. This is after Haman, his plot was found out, and he was hung because he was angry at the Jews because of Mordecai and he wanted to destroy them. But then his plan came to light through Mordecai and Esther, and King Ahasuerus had him hung on the gallows he prepared for Mordecai. (Esther 7:10)

And then we could read on how, we believe, it is said (you could confirm it) that if the Jews were attacked, that it was okay for them to defend themselves and to take the spoil of those that attacked them. (Esther 8:11) And you know, God promised through the prophets even before Jerusalem fell to Babylon, that He was going to preserve a remnant for Himself, and that some day they would return back to the land of Israel. (Jeremiah 30:3)

We see how Satan also works. Sometimes it's given us to see, like with Job no one else saw what was going on, but we have the benefit of God's Word. How Satan came before God and God said, have you seen my servant Job who is perfect before me? (Job 1:8) And Satan got permission to tempt Job, and to have horrible things happen to him. And we see how in the Garden of Eden, how Satan came and caused Eve to be deceived. (Genesis 3:1-6) We see when David numbered the people, we read in one of the accounts how Satan tempted him. And I believe here, maybe, that Satan (even though we don't read it) he was working in the heart of Haman through pride and through emulation that he himself wanted to rise up. We know that that's how Satan got cast out of heaven, because he wanted to raise up to be like God, and there's no one that can be like God but God. God's it.

But we see Haman, here, he wanted to kind of start raising himself up to be like the king. Remember when the king asked him, what would you do to someone who saved the king's life, or something like that? Because, remem-

### **Light From The Word**

For The Lord Hath Spoken It



Writings based on God's Word

One of the advantages human beings have over other creatures is that we have the ability to learn from the mistakes of others. If we are willing to do so, we could learn from their experiences and avoid much of the suffering previous generations have endured.

In no segment of our life is this privilege more important than in our relationship with God. We have many wonderful examples of godly men and women who have followed the Lord with diligence and their lot in life, and more importantly in eternity, was blessed. Unfortunately there are also many examples of individuals who refused to follow the Lord and their lot in eternity is one of unending grief (Lu. 16:19-31).

A man, only identified as a rich man, seemed to care only about his own comforts. An opportunity to serve God was laid at his gate - a poor man who only wanted crumbs was denied. The rich man apparently knew of God, of heaven and hell but chose to ignore what he knew until it was too late. In hell, all of his requests were denied.

One lesson we must heed carefully is the seriousness and certainty of the results that will follow when the Lord has spoken. From the first chapter in Genesis through the last chapter in Revelation, we can see the power of God's Word. "And God said, Let there be light: and there was light" (Gen. 1:3). "He which testifieth these things saith, Surely I come quickly..." (Rev. 22:20).

Throughout the scripture, through His prophets, His Son and His followers, the Lord emphasized the importance of following His Word. "Thus saith the Lord" and "for the Lord God of Israel hath spoken it" occur many times in His Holy Word. In a short article, it is not possible to cite more than a small percentage of the times the Lord spoke, but a few examples should help us understand the seriousness of God's Word.

In warning of calamities to come to those who disobey God's teachings, He often told of the consequences that would follow. "...the mighty men of the children of Kedar, shall be diminished: for the Lord God of Israel hath spoken it"

(Is. 21:17). "Thus shall mine anger be accomplished, and I will cause my fury to rest upon them, and I will be comforted: and they shall know that I the Lord have spoken it in my zeal..." (Ez. 5:13). Daniel warned Belshazzar of his impending doom because of his sin. "In that night was Belshazzar the king of the Chaldeans slain" (Dan. 5:30).

Of course, not all of God's words are negative. "...Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call His name Immanuel" (Is. 7:14). "...the angel of the Lord appeared unto (Joseph) in a dream, saying, Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost ...then Joseph ...did as the angel of the Lord had bidden him..." (Mt. 1:20-24).

What does all of this have to do with us in the twenty-first century? There are many messages from God that have a direct bearing on our life. Just as the Lord spoke to His people in the past, He speaks to us today. "For the Word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword ...and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Heb. 4:12). The power, and certainty of the Word of the Lord has not diminished since the beginning of time.

Through His Word, He has told us that the time will come when we will be judged according to the way we have lived. He has told us that we will either spend eternity with Him or be eternally separated from Him. The Bible outlines the plan of salvation that explains how we are to live.

Among the first words that Jesus spoke after He was baptized, had fasted in the wilderness, and had resisted the temptations that Satan brought upon Him were "...Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Mt. 4:17). Throughout the gospels, Jesus explained the plan whereby mankind can escape eternal damnation.

In addition to allowing us to read His Word. God also speaks to us through His servants. Most of us have the opportunity to sit under the sound of the Word of God every Sunday and at midweek services. We have the opportunity to be reminded that the Word of God is just as applicable to our everyday experiences today as it was when it was written.

Not only does the Lord speak to us through His written Word and through the spoken words of His children, but there are times when He speaks to us directly. When we pray for direction, we must be willing to listen. To make it possible to hear Him, we may need to remove ourselves from the confusion and the noise of the world. When Elijah was trying to discern the Lord's message to him, he went to the mount before the Lord. The Lord passed by Elijah but it was not in the strong wind, nor the earthquake, nor the fire, "...and after the fire a still small voice" (I Ki. 19:12). When Elijah heard the still small voice, he went and stood in the entrance of the cave "...And, behold, there came a voice unto him,... (I Ki. 19:13). It was only after Elijah was willing to listen to the voice of the Lord that He could be reassured that he was not alone. God reassured him there were seven thousand men that had neither bowed to Baal nor kissed him. Elijah then left the cave and found Elisha, who was to carry on the work of the Lord after Elijah was gone.

Perhaps we do not want to hear God's message. We may be quite content with our life as we serve self. God is not content to let us serve self. Fortunately, He is often patient with us and may speak to us many times before we answer Him. We must be careful that we do not ignore the voice of the Lord too long. "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith..." (Rev. 3:22).

God will help us through the trials of life. He will help us overcome our weaknesses as we battle daily against Satan. His power has not diminished. When we are tried on every hand and fear that Satan may overcome us, we can take courage. "Be still, and know that I am God..." (Ps. 48:10). For many years God spoke to us by the prophets, but "Hath in these last days spoken to us by his Son..." (Heb. 1:2). When the Lord speaks, we would do well to listen as Samuel did when he said "Speak; for thy servant heareth" (I Sam. 3:10).



...The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest. Matthew 9:37-38

#### **Being Sent to Mexico**

The call for us to go on the mission field came at a time unexpected in our lives. We were looking forward to 'empty nesting,' but God had a better plan. He interrupted our happy existence to move us out of our comfort zone and into a world of expanding horizons spilling over in untold wealth of new friendships and experiences. The call brought a critical look at our lives. As we examined ourselves, we wondered if we were doing everything God wanted us to do, or if He were asking for more.

We spent a year reevaluating, praying and earnestly seeking His will. God showed us His plan in many ways. He showed us through the conviction that He placed in our hearts about serving Him in Mexico, through his Word, and by speaking to us from the pulpit, "Would you go if it meant one more name in the Lamb's Book of Life?" God was faithful to provide many signposts to encourage us on.

**Preparation** 

As the weeks passed, we saw God moving in a mighty way. Every hindrance about leaving, we took to God. He answered every one. Some simply vanished as though they had never been. Some, appeared to be a hindrance, but He showed us a clear way around. Others, He said would be hard and cause us to cry. He said that tears were OK and promised to walk every step of the way with us.

We could see Him at work, giving us experiences that we knew would be beneficial to our future, getting things in order in our lives, changing and molding us to better fit His purpose. It was a great relief to finally go public and tell our Elder

all of the things God was doing in our lives and how we were feeling. It was so reassuring to have his support, help and encouragement.

#### **Opportunities**

It took a few months to move out of our house, disperse our belongings, end our jobs, and close our life, as we knew it in Indiana. The journey of our lifetime began. We served in Rio Bravo for a year and a half, then felt God's mighty hand move us on. What we thought was the destination of our journey, was only a steppingstone. We knew God was moving us, and told Him we were ready to go. Our greatest desire being to follow where He leads no matter where or when.



We received a call from Casa Vida y Esperanza, the House of Life and Hope. They needed help and after much prayer, we felt that this is where God was leading us. We were interviewed by Mission Committee brothers and received the approval of the Committee to be officially sent by the church to serve in Magdalena, Mexico.

Casa Vida y Esperanza is an orphanage located two hours south of Tucson, Arizona. Currently there are twenty-two children, ages one to fourteen. The children come from a variety of backgrounds. Most have seen more in their few years than we would care to see in a lifetime. The children are intelligent and hungry

for love and to learn about the truth found in God's Word. They are eager to memorize new Scriptures and to share their budding faith with family, friends and work team members. They talk about their desire to follow God and to lead Christian lives. God has called us to love these children and what a blessing it has been.

An ongoing journey

God has not called us because we are perfect Christians. We are not. We are not called because we have great gifts to offer. We are not called because of great faith. We falter daily. We are simply called to be obedient. It is with great humility that we continue this journey. He allows us to witness on a daily basis His great love for humankind.

We are humbled by the faithful prayer warriors who spend time on their knees to intervene for us, and the many who give selflessly so that we can do this work. We want to thank each of you and ask for your continued support and prayers. We give all praise to God for bringing us to this place, for wanting more for us than we could ever imagine, and for loving us through it all.



We have grown closer to our Heavenly Father in a way that would have never been possible had we stayed in the comfort of our old life. We are excited about what He may bring our way, and the new paths He will lead us through as we journey on.

#### Opportunities in Our Homeland

The USA Committee & Disaster Committee have reorganized to be one entity under the name of USA Committee. This committee will help the brotherhood reach those that have needs through hardship in their lives. The committee will also provide assistance after natural disasters like fire, wind and storm.

As many of us are aware, storms like Hurricane Katrina cause the brotherhood to ask "How can we help?" The God of heaven and earth has blessed our brotherhood with everything we need, which allows us to become quite secure in this life.

Visiting with those who have lost everything makes us aware that everything we have, even our own lives, are very fragile. God knows the state of our heart above how we see ourselves. It is our prayer that each of us will continue to ask for His direction to open our hearts to help those with extensive needs and in despair.

Previously a Disaster Committee worked alongside the USA Committee responding to disaster projects such as storms and tornados, and work projects for individuals burdened with difficult circumstances. Over the years the work projects have included building handicap ramps for the elderly and repairing and remodeling living quarters for individuals having the bare necessities of living and unable to help themselves. In a few situations, complete homes have been built by volunteer construction teams.

After much prayer and soughtafter direction from the Lord, the National Board supported the decision to combine these two committees in 2006. The committee began praying for a brother with the heart to be an administrator of this new entity. This administrator would be paid a stipend so that he would be available for helping on projects such as the reconstruction in Biloxi and other local projects.



Looking at the world around us through Christ's eyes, one can always see the needs of others by simply observing his neighborhood and regional community. Work projects allow the brotherhood to work together toward a common goal of helping others. It is a great blessing to work side-by-side and glorify and honor our Father's name. God's Word tells us we will always have the needy with us to assist and that he who gives a drink of water in His name shall not lose his reward.

"For whosoever shall give a cup of water to drink in my name, because ye belong to Christ, verily I say unto you he shall not lose his reward." Mark 9:41

Brothers who have given of themselves for such projects share that they have received the greater blessing by giving versus receiving. The faith of those who have lost so much can shine bright; meanwhile, those of us who have nearly everything can allow the love of Christ to become clouded by personal ambitions.

The USA Committee gives direction to several projects needing financial assistance from the funds available through the generous donations of the Apostolic Christian Church brotherhood. In addition to national disasters, supported projects include: Galilean Home, Southside Mission, His Ranch, Midwest Food Bank, Peoria Rescue Mission, Berean Prison Ministry, Harbor House, Navajo Indian Nation, Bethany Home, Echo Project, and Empty Tomb. All of these projects have been or currently are supported with physical labor as well as monetary funds by the outpouring of the brotherhood's heart to help where they can.

Jesus Christ showers his blessings on us in addition to His great sacrificial love and desires that we give in return to others; though not just of our plenty. As with the Biblical story of the widow who gave all she had, giving of our time when we feel that we have none to spare brings great honor and glory to our Lord.

"And he called unto him his disciples, and saith unto them, Verily I say onto you, that this poor widow hath cast more in, than all they which have cast into the treasury. For all they did cast in of their abundance; but she of her want did cast in all that she had, even all her living." Mark 12:43&44

Let us make our ambition match that of Christ's when he said in the Gospel of John 17:4, shortly before his arrest, betrayal and crucifixion, "I have glorified thee on the earth: I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do."

God through the Holy Spirit started leading me to Gateway back in 2000. After wrestling with this for 3 ½ years, finally I completely surrendered and found peace through faith believing God is in control and

He knew better than me.

In August 2004, Joy, Courtney, Tyler, Landon, and I started on a journey that would remind me often that complete surrender and self sacrifice for a Christian would not be a once in a lifetime experience. Rather God would begin to teach me that this happens often if not daily.

One of my favorite verses in the Bible is Romans 12:1-2. "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

First, God tells us here it is only "by His mercy".

Secondly, our lives will be a "living sacrifice". This means often, if not daily, not just once in a lifetime. This tells us that we won't be dead but rather "alive". People will see the effects of our self-sacrifice.

"Holy and acceptable" tells us that our sacrifice will reflect the character of Jesus Christ.

"Which is your reasonable service". Wow! That means no pats on the back! People often say to me, "That sure is a wonderful work you are doing out at Gateway Woods, it takes special people to do that kind of work." This statement should never be said. Forgive me if my response to that statement is anything but "it is only my reasonable service". God never calls us to a work that will cause fellow believers to marvel at OUR gift, rather He calls each one of us to a work that will build up the body of Christ, and spread the message of salvation. Men should only give glory to GOD for the good works that are done by His body here on earth. ("Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." St. Matthew 5:16)

"Transformed by the renewing of our minds". I suppose that most of us would agree that unless we are daily renewed in the scriptures, our minds will quickly be "conformed to the world" around us. It would also be appropriate to say the world around us is the culture we live in. Strangers in a foreign land wouldn't be interested in settling into the culture of the land they are quickly passing through, correct?

"That ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God." This tells us that only with a transformed mind will we know the will of God. So don't think it strange if someone conformed to this world doesn't understand the will of God in your life.

I leave with this one thought. Life as a house parent has given me opportunities to grow in Jesus; undoubtedly you have experienced growth in your life, too. Don't ever question your "reasonable service" for the Lord, with the reasoning of man. Remember the words in Isaiah "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord." According to human logic, Elijah would have never gone to live by a brook to survive; in the same land he had just declared a drought upon in the name of Almighty God. Neither would any person have told him to do that: it didn't make sense. It wouldn't take much common sense to know that the brook was going to dry up soon! But God said GO, and it was Elijah's "reasonable service" to go. That doesn't make sense to me, but it was reasonable for God, and it was sacrifice for Elijah.

Are you called to be reasonable, or are you called to sacrifice?





ber, Mordecai heard outside the gates that these two guys wanted to kill the king. And it was brought to light, and the king forgot about it until he couldn't sleep one night and he was reading through the books of what happened in the kingdom, and he remembered that account and he asked Haman, what would you do? And Haman thought he was talking about him. And so he said, well I would get the king's horses, and the king's chariot. and have everyone go out before him and say, this is what the king does to someone who he really likes. And then it was done unto Mordecai. (Esther 6:6-11)

So Haman, we can see, had it in his heart to rise himself up even if it took treading down other people. And Satan, perhaps, wanted to see God's chosen people wiped out in the foreign land. But God had promised long before that He would preserve that remnant, and that they would return again someday to Israel. And by the faithfulness of Mordecai and Esther, that was carried out.

So we're here on this earth for a purpose. Sometimes we don't know exactly what's going on. We don't see what Satan's doing, clearly. We don't see what God's doing, clearly. But we have His Word, we have His promises, and we do know this - that it's God's will that none should perish but that all should come to the knowledge of salvation. (I Timothy 2:4) And we know that Jesus said things like, See the fields. They're ripe for harvest but the laborers are few. (St. Luke 10:2) And so, I believe, we're called here to be a city upon a hill, to be the salt of the earth. To be faithful wherever God puts us. To let our light shine. And it will be in different places in our life. (Matthew 5:13-16) Sometimes it will be, maybe at home, still living under our parents' roof. Maybe being an encouragement or a light to our parents, or our brothers and sisters. And it may transfer to school, or to a workplace. It may transfer to the point where we're parents and we're supposed to be lights and examples to our children or our neighbors. But always there's opportunity to be used by God while we still bear this body here on this earth.

As we get to partake of this in this afternoon hour, you know the world would look at going to church, maybe, as kind of boring when there's other things that could be done or maybe there's work to do. And even though there's not a big crowd here, we still have this opportunity to partake in the fellowship of the saints, and the believers.

So we come here with our hearts united in love, to seek upon God's heart repose, and so that He could take our love and ignite the flames once again. Because as we go through life it seems like our wick becomes a little damaged or sooted up by the world and the things around about us, and it needs trimming. And our love maybe grows a little weak because of the cares, and concerns, and pleasures of the world. So that the flame could yet be ignited again and could flow upward to the Saviour. Because He's the head, and we're his members, and He's the light, and we want to show that light through His glow. He's the master, and we're His brethren. We're also His friends, He said in John, I think. He said, I tell you these things because you're my friends. If you were my servants, I wouldn't have to tell you anything, I would just tell you what to do. (St. John 15:14-15) But He says, you're my friends so I let you in on this information, that we might in true fellowship grow, both here when we assemble together, and then that we may grow in fellowship with Christ as we go through the week, sometimes seemingly alone.

I've opened to Roman's chapter 12 for our second reading. There's 3 subtitles in this chapter, in this Bible, that we could keep in mind as we read. First one says, Proper response to God's grace. And we know earlier in Chapter 6 it says, "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid." Romans 6:1. And then later on it says, Proper use of God's gifts, and we are all given gifts. Sometimes we may realize them. Sometimes it takes time before we can see what perhaps our gifts are. And then, in the last section it says, Overcome evil with good.

A beautiful chapter to those who are born again and renewed in faith

and transformed by the renewing of our mind and hearts. That we accepted the sacrifice of Christ Jesus for our sins and have found salvation through His shed blood. By grace, not doing anything really to deserve it, that we should then live for Him, and present our bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God because that's our reasonable service. (Romans 12:1)

God once called out to a lost people through his prophet Isaiah. He said, Come now, saith the Lord. He said, come now let us reason together. Though your sins be as scarlet, I shall make them white as snow. (Isaiah 1:18) He said, now, look - think about that deal. You can't really pass it up. And there's no other way to take your scarlet sins and make them white as snow but through Jesus. And with that said, it's our reasonable service that we should offer our bodies a living sacrifice.

I once read that the problem - and this is our problem, that's why we have to come to church and read God's Word through the week - because the problem with the living sacrifice is it tends to want to crawl off the altar and go somewhere a little bit more comfortable sometimes. Because sometimes the heat gets turned up on that altar. And so He has to remind us with chapters like this one, how we ought to live our life as a sacrifice unto Him, because it's different than the ways of the world.

The world teaches us that we should. I mean through advertisement and everything, that we need new clothes, that we need new perfume, that we need new cars, that we need to take out loans that we can get more stuff, that we need to stand up for ourselves. In the workplace we're taught by other people that we need to put our husband or wife in their place or our boyfriend or our girlfriend or whoever steps on our toes, that we need to put them in their place. And if they won't see things our way, we ought to divorce them or get rid of them, or do whatever. That we should stand up for ourselves.

So we have a job that we should cleave to the things which are good,

and stay away, that we would abhor evil. So that we can prove to the people around about us (and it ends up usually we prove it to ourselves, because it's hard for us to actually believe it, because we don't quite have the faith of Abraham, sometimes) that we can prove that which is good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God. (Romans 12:2) And sometimes that takes time. It doesn't happen right away. But we just, sometimes, we just have to follow one rule upon the other, upon the other, and build until we see the whole picture.

You know, if you remember back when you took geometry, there's those things call proofs or theorems, or whatever they're called, and you build on it. Why is it that such and such is true? And you start out, well this is given. And we're given that God created the heavens and earth in the beginning, and we have the foundation of God's Word (Genesis 1:1). And then we take each truth or each law of geometry and build upon it. And we build upon God's Word. We have the foundation of Christ Jesus and His shed blood and the forgiveness of sins laid, which is a stumbling block unto those who don't believe it or don't understand it. (I Corinthians 1:23) And then we build upon it. This is a building chapter here, where we build upon our salvation, that we can be made useful and that we can use the gifts that He has given us.

And so, he says, that we have gifts. This is how we can use, one way we can prove, the good and acceptable and perfect will of God. First, that we don't think of ourselves more highly than we ought to. But we would think soberly according as God has dealt every man the measure of faith. (Romans 12:3) So that we would seriously think about how God has dealt with us. About how Jesus was with God in the beginning, and the glories above. We can read it in Philippians 2, He was willing to humble Himself as a man and to take our sins upon Him. Even though He created the heavens and earth, and He created, you might say, Caesar, and He created Pilot, and Herod, and He created soldiers who nailed the spikes in His hands. He created Judas, because we read in Colossians that without Him was not anything created. (Colossians 1:16) He was willing to be despised by them and crucified so that He could shed His blood for the sins of man. So when we think about that, and we think of how we needed Him as a Savior, that will help us to not think of ourselves more highly than we ought to.

Then he goes on to say, you're all members of the body of Christ, and you're all different (Romans 12:4-6). He goes on to talk about different gifts that we may get into. But here's two things that may happen if we start to think of ourselves more highly than we ought to. One, we might have a strength or a special zeal for a certain area in our life, whether it's evangelism or, I don't know, reaching out to the downtrodden and homeless or whatever, or something totally different. We might think, why in the world isn't everyone lining up behind me and supporting this one thing that's SO important? We have to remember, well, other people might have different gifts and different callings than us. If we all did the same thing, the body wouldn't be complete.

We might also go the other way. We might see someone's gift that they have, and we see that we don't have that gift, and we think, God, why am I so worthless? Why is this person so good at this, and I'm so lousy at it? But that might not be what God's calling us to do. He's maybe given us a different gift, maybe vet to be developed or realized within us. But we each have a gift, maybe some of us have several. Maybe as we go through life, and we're faithful in one gift or one talent. He'll give us others too as He sees fit. So we shouldn't get discouraged if we don't have the same gift as someone else. But we should diligently pay attention to the gifts that we have been given.

So He says, "Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us..." Romans 12:6. So, if we happen to have the gift of prophesy or teaching, let's do it according to the proportion of the faith. In the beginning of Romans, Paul said something like, he was going to go ahead and preach the gospel, as much as in me is. That's what he says in Chapter 1:15.

he says, "So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also." Maybe he didn't know how it was going to turn out, but he felt that he was called to do what he could, and he said, as much as is in me is, I'm going to do it. Maybe it would be a lot, maybe it would be a little bit, but he knew that God would use it, whatever it was.

Think of the widow lady, we heard about this morning, who just threw in her two mites into the treasury. That's as much as in her purse was, but she gave it. (St. Mark 12:41-44) Jesus saw and He said, I tell you that the widow lady has put in more than these men who put in maybe hundreds of dollars-I don't know how much - because He saw that she gave her all. And that's the great thing about God. He doesn't expect us to give more than we have; just our all.

"Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering..." Romans 12:7. That doesn't mean like to sit around and wait for something to happen. It's like, at least the way I understand it, it's like a waiter. Now, when you go down and sit down in a restaurant at a table. you don't expect the waiter to just sit there and wait for you to get up and go over to her and put your order in. The waiter sees you sit down and she gets up and she does her job. She waits on you. So if we're called to minister unto someone, let's get up and do it. Let's not wait around. If we see opportunity, we need to get up and be doing, as much as in us is.

And you know what, it may not turn out the way we think it should. It may look like it totally flopped. God may move in our heart that we should go talk to someone - maybe a complete stranger - and share the gospel with them. They may just kind of look at us and maybe their facial expressions might make it seem like they think we're crazy. We might think, Well, I don't know, maybe God didn't want me to go talk to them because nothing happened. But the seed may have been planted. Or maybe the seed was watered. Maybe they heard about God in Sunday School at one time, or from their grandma or grandpa or parents. They've gone out on their own. Maybe that seed's kind of been drying up in

their hearts and they've forgotten about it. They haven't thought about 'Jesus loves me this I know' for a long time. That Jesus left His throne on high and came into this world to die. Maybe they forgot that, and by mentioning that, we've maybe watered it. Not that a person doth sprout right away, but it watered it so that that seed can start soaking up some moisture. Maybe God will send another person later in the day or the next week as He sees fit. So let's be diligent. Let us be good waiters as we minister to those around about us.

"...he that exhorteth, on exhortation: he that giveth, let him do it with simplicity;..." Romans 12:8. Jesus talked to his disciples about how we shouldn't make a big deal of it when we, you know, donate money or whatever, or give to someone. He said we shouldn't let our right hand know what our left doeth, but with simplicity. (St. Matthew 6:3)

"...he that ruleth..." Romans 12:8. There may be those of us who are called to be rulers. Maybe not of countries, but maybe of a company. Maybe we don't rule the whole corporation, but maybe we're in charge of a small part of it. Or maybe we're in charge of our own house. Or maybe we're the dorm leader, or whatever it is. But let's, if we have a duty, he says, let's do it with diligence. Not with the diligence of just like so that we can be the best, like Haman wanted to be the best, or like Satan wanted to be better than God. But that we would do all things as unto God. Not as eye service to men that we would look good in the eyes of men, but that we would look good in the sight of God. (Ephesians 6:6)

Sometimes, that may make us look worse in the eyes of men, if we have to do something that we would not compromise our faith or eternal righteousness and truth which is laid out in God's word. That we would be diligent. If we have opportunity to show mercy, not that we would grudgingly, but that we can do it with cheerfulness. (Romans 12:8)

And so on it goes, and he says, "Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another;" Romans 12:10. In Co-

rinthians chapter 13, we can read about love that is the greatest gift. It never fails. It hopeth all things, endureth all things, charity never faileth. (I Corinthians 13:8-13)

Then it says, "Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord;" Romans 12:11. Not slothful in business, we could take that to mean from our German heritage that we should work hard from sun up to sun down. That we should be frugal and that we should get ahead. And that's not bad. Or maybe it's to be not slothful in the busyness of life. But definitely we shouldn't be slothful in whatever we do as it pertains to God's Word, and His work for us here on this earth as ambassadors of Christ to those around about us. That we should be fervent in spirit. So sometimes, as we're not slothful in business, maybe there's not opportunity to do much, but our Spirit should still be fervent within us looking for opportunity to do something.

And prayer. So from "...fervent in spirit; serving the Lord;" Romans 12:11. Then, "Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer;" Romans 12:12.

I think in Thessalonians, towards the end of I Thessalonians, it says something like, "Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." I Thessalonians 5:16-18. That we should rejoice in the hope that we have in Christ Jesus. We don't hope in ourselves, necessarily. We don't hope in the next president. We hope in Christ Jesus. Rejoicing in hope, the hope of eternal life. We don't rejoice in the hope of this world, although we don't like to see bad things happen and we like it when leaders seem to be God-fearing. We rejoice, perhaps, a little bit when there is pollution control and things, but that's not our real rejoicing, and not our real hope. Our real hope is in the world to come. And the second coming of Christ, and the hope of eternal life.

Patient in tribulation and, here again, continuing instant in prayer. In Thessalonians, it said pray without ceasing. To be always in communication with God. We know, sometimes,

we can't be doing that consciously. There are some people who feel like they ought to go away somewhere and just spend the whole time in prayer. That's what real nuns do. They are cloistered, and they live in convents and they spend all their time in prayer. There may be certain monks who live in monasteries and do nothing but pray all day for the most part.

But there was a man who lived a long time ago, and there's many books written about him - not to lift up any man. But, he, it was noted in his life that he always seemed to be in communion with God. One of the things he shared, not that he went around blabbing about himself, but people were asking questions, I suppose, just like we read in Peter, and he was ready to give an answer for the hope that lied within him. (I Peter 3:15) He didn't have a great position in life, but he would say things like, in the morning, you know, God & Father, now I have to go to work and my mind's going to be occupied for a while on the things that are right before me. I want to do them the best I can for You, even though I can't be consciously thinking about You with my mind. I think in his spirit he was still in touch with God and was ready to hear Him.

Then we're reminded that God's ways are not our ways. That we should not overcome evil with force or with strength, but that we should overcome evil with good (Romans 12:21). That we should bless them that persecute us, I suppose remembering that they have a soul too (Romans 12:14). That we don't strive against flesh and blood, but that we strive against principalities and powers in high places, and spiritual things. It's a spiritual battle. The other people that we come in contact with, if they are living, perhaps, evil or ungodly lives, they're almost like pawns in the whole scheme of things.

It says we should rejoice with them that do rejoice and weep with them that weep. (Romans 12:15) We should be sensitive to those we come in contact with. You know, if we have something bad going on in our life and maybe we're going to a happy thing, say a wedding or something, that we

don't rain on someone else. That we don't drag everyone down by our problems. Not that there's not a time to share our problems with each other, but that when it's time to rejoice - and maybe their life is going better than ours at the moment - that we rejoice with them and we're happy for them. And that we weep with them that weep. That we're empathetic and that we're sympathetic to those that are less fortunate than us.

Then it says, "...Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own conceits." Romans 12:16. Sometimes it's hard to be patient with people who don't catch on to things as quick as we do. Who don't do things exactly like we want them to. Maybe they don't clean exactly like we do. They don't catch on to instruction right away. It's easy for me to get impatient. But let's not be wise in our own conceits, but let's, if people seem to be less than us - (And really we know that God is no respecter of persons. He doesn't care if we're high and mighty or if we're low. We're just really the same to Him.) let's not think we're too good to be patient with someone who seems to be lower than us.

Then we're instructed that we should recompense no man evil for evil. (Romans 12:17) That we should live peaceably with all men as much as lies within us. (Romans 12:18) To remember that vengeance is God's. He is a righteous judge. (Romans 12:19) You know, people in the end aren't going to get away with evil. On that final day of judgment God will judge, and those who have not yet been forgiven and

had their sins washed clean by the blood of the lamb, they'll receive their just reward. We should fear for them and pity them. "Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good." Romans 12:20-21. That may take faith, but God is able to provide.

I think it was II Corinthians, he says something like, God doesn't like to tear down governments and knock down strongholds or walls or fortresses the way we think He would. (II Corinthians 10:4) I think he's pretty much talking about the walls and fortresses of our hearts when we don't want to let Him in. But He does it in a subtle way by His goodness and by His mercy, and by His peace, and by reasoning with us that we can say, Well, how can I refuse such an offer that though my sins are as scarlet, He would make them white as snow? When we see that, there are people who believe in God's Word, who do good instead of evil. We see that that can work on a person's heart.

One example I can think of, is one man that was in prison for his faith's sake. And every day - it may have been a women actually - but the guard would come and get her every day. He'd ask h6er, OK, Are you going to give up your faith today? Of course, she'd say, No. Every day he'd beat her, hard. She'd go back to her cell and she'd think, Ohhh, I hate this guy. Every day he takes me out and beats me. But then, the spirit worked in her heart, and she started feeling sorry for him, that every day this guard would

come and get her and beat her. Maybe something in her countenance changed that when, instead of being rough and tough and not crying out in pain or whatever when she was beaten, she was praying for this man who was beating her. It wasn't long, this man couldn't do it anymore. He couldn't beat her anymore, because he was overcome with good. And the strong heart, and its toughness was weakened by her humility and love and submission to God's Word.

So may He bless the Word which we've heard today upon our hearts that it might bring forth fruit.



This concludes the series of a booklet compiled by deceased Elder William A. Stettner, Elgin, Illinois entitled, "To The King's Administration of Justice." This was a letter to state officials in Germany outlining our brethren's Christian beliefs. The contents below continue with their views of military service.

Although the few on earth who believe in Christ cannot take part in such combat but must look to Christ as their example, we do realize that we owe to our honorable Government such service as they request of us if we can serve in a noncombatant way.

Where it is asked of us to take up weapons to kill we cannot serve in such capacity, on account of our faith and conscience, even though we esteem our honorable Government. If we would kill others, we would sin against God and His word, and we do not believe that our honorable Government would force us to do such.

Rather than to commit sin we would choose to suffer and wait until it pleases God to turn the hearts of the Government to be favorable to us in such matters. We will gladly and faithfully perform any duties which the Government lays upon our brothers whose lot it becomes to serve in

the Army in a noncombatant way.

As our Government has had proof since the years 1847 and 1850, and in more recent years, that some of our brothers served their allotted time in the Army and were released with a very good record although on account of their faith they did not bear arms. It is not on account of malice or disobedience — therefore, God will look graciously upon us.

Since 1849, only five men in Wurttemberg have been called to serve in the Army, whereby our Government can clearly see that such few men can easily be replaced in such service whereby they need not bear arms. Should the Government grant us these favors we will accept them thankfully from our honorable Government which we esteem and honor very highly, and also thank God for His grace if He can lead the hearts of our Government according to His will.

However, should our honorable Government refuse and not be willing to grant us these favors, we will not sin against our God and His commandments, and there would be nothing else for us to do but take the consequences, suffering if need be.

This sums up the confession and foundation of our faith. We fully understand and apprehend that which we confess, and believe it also. We would add that the Bible, the Holy Scripture of the Old and New Testament, is the only book from which we read and teach every Sunday and other days when we assemble for services.

We also have a song book, the Zion's Harp, which contains spiritual hymns that are in accord with the Holy Scripture. A change of books we do not practice. Whatever does not correspond with the Holy Scripture we do not acknowledge as truth. Printed matter and programs we do not distribute, nor do we publish any of our proceedings through the newspapers.

#### "Following The Church"

The other night in a Bible Class in our home, I Thessalonians 2:14 was read. I was surprised. It reads "For ye brethren, became followers of the churches of God which in Judaea are in Christ Jesus: for ye also have suffered like things of your own countrymen, even as they have of the Jews."


I thought we were to be followers of the Lord Jesus Christ while being members of the church, but here the Apostle Paul writes about being followers of the churches. In I Corin-4:16 he writes, thians "Wherefore I beseech you, be ye followers of me." I have been acquainted with the latter verse and always thought that Paul put himself pretty much on a pedestal but that he was worthy of such a position because he was completely surrendered to Christ. I have heard it said that Paul was arrogant and I've always defended him by saying that God used him anyway because he was completely surrendered and those kind of people are hard to come by.

Now we have this matter of being followers of the churches, to deal with. I first thought that such a practice might be dangerous if you are in the wrong church, one that doesn't follow the Word of God. I have also thought that the believers at that time did not yet have the whole New Testament as we have it now, so Paul couldn't very well say, "Go by the New Testament." There was no such book as we have it today, only letters and perhaps the Gospel of Matthew which is thought to have been written in A.D.37, the other Gospels, much later. After the Gospels were written, it must have been a big problem to make copies. Gutenberg of Germany invented the first printing press with movable type and therewith printed the first Bible in Latin, between 1450 and 1455, according to one historian. The Christians at the time the Bible was written really didn't have much access to the Word.

Today we can say, "Go by the Word," but back then, in New Testament days, they probably did have to follow the churches and follow the church leaders. What else could they go by? We are so used to being in our own culture, our own environment, in our own time frame, that we cannot always relate to people in a completely different situation. There is an old American Indian saying, "Do not judge another Indian until you have walked a mile in his moccasins." If we were living in New Testament times, we would understand better.

So we conclude that it is all right for us to be followers of the churches and followers of the Apostle Paul, but only to the extent that they are a good example of the Lord Jesus Christ. When we say that, we are inviting others to start imitating us, and we have our hands full. I didn't realize we had that much responsibility.
