

Sermon by Bro. Jim Koehl, San Diego, CA

II Samuel 14:1-33, St. Matthew 22

We extend greetings to each of you, and we're thankful to God that we can all be here today. That we can gather around this Word. Isn't it precious to come to gather together as brethren in the Lord and friends of the truth, expecting that God will bless us. For many of you, no doubt, it's been a very busy week, a lot of things have taken place. But isn't this the highlight of the week? Isn't this what we look forward to? That we can once again gather around God's Word. We can be fed from His Word, we can be strengthened, encouraged, we can meet our brethren and friends.

On a percentage basis of the time of the week, we aren't going to be here very long. So let's be prayerful, let's be attentive and have open hearts and minds and may His Spirit speak to us as we part His Word and meditate thereon, and let His Spirit talk to us today. The book of II Samuel is opened before me. Let's read from chapter 14 in the book of II Samuel. This pertains to Absalom and King David in the 13th chapter. Absalom had to flee because he had slain Amnon. (II Samuel 13:37) Absalom was separated from David, and I believe in this chapter that Absalom will return.

It speaks of a king. It speaks about his son. Our first reading, we read about David, and one of his sons. It seems as we can read about Absalom and David, we can consider their relationship. Many questions can come into our minds. We can get the feeling as we read that, the anguish in David's heart over the behavior of his son. As we read through Absalom about the different things, and how Joab conspired, really trying to deceive David. We wonder, did David really not know what was

going on? Did David really not realize how sly, how cunning Absalom was? How then when he came back he sat in the gate and the heart of the people went after Absalom. But we, in the chapter we've read, can see how that God had revealed certain things unto David.

Just a thought, it just seems that David was maybe more aware of what Absalom was doing than anyone realized. But as we read through that, it just seems that Absalom became as a son that David really didn't know how to handle. It just wasn't a good solution. He didn't know what to do. And we know that without a doubt, David loved Absalom. How he mourned for him here, and how he mourned for him after his death. He had no greater desire than that he would have been obedient to God's words and to have followed in His ways.

I don't think it's only for sons with children. We are all children. aren't we. As often as we read these different accounts of relationships between father and son, daughter, children, whatever it is, do we stop and consider, Are we doing the desire of our parents? Or grandparents? But we can take it a step further, can't we. The one who wants to be our Heavenly Father. Are we doing what pleases Him?

Absalom wasn't ignorant. He knew what his father wanted. Much the same as we, as we grew up. We knew what our parents wanted. We knew what they wanted for us. We didn't always do it. Did it make us feel good?

But there was one who was in control of our life. I don't know if we really realized it. How subjected, how dominating, how much power Satan had over us. The grief we would cause our parents, the sorrow and anguish.

It wasn't just David and Absalom. It comes to mind, Esau, Jacob and Esau, Isaac and Rebekah. They wanted nothing but the best for their children. But Esau, so much (I can't quote it exactly) he knew what his parents wanted, and because they wanted him to

Writings based on God's Word

The Hand of the Lord Is Stretched Out Still

"Because I have called, and ye refused; I have stretched out my hand, and no man regarded;" (Pr. 1:24). We read in the scripture many times that the children of Israel forsook the Lord and found themselves in difficult circumstances because of their sins. Even though they strayed from the truth, God never left them without a solution to their problem.

Because of God's anger with the children of Israel when they had fallen into sin. He often pronounced a sentence against them. When they "...call(ed) evil good, and good evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter!" (Is. 5:20) However,"...For all this his anger is not turned away, but his hand is stretched out still" (Is. 5:25). Is. 9:12 and 10:4 have nearly identical passages. His anger against the children of Israel was designed to get them to turn away from their wickedness and again serve the Lord: "...As I live, saith the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked: but that the wicked turn from his way and live..." (Ex. 33:11).

In Psalm 107 we read of a number of situations where the children of Israel rebelled against God, they found themselves in distress and "Then they cry unto the Lord in their trouble, and he bringeth them out of their distresses ...Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men" (Ps. 107:28-31).

Surely we know God is not unreasonable. He wants what is best for His people. He often pleads with us to do what is best for us. "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool" (Is. 1:18).

The Lord has many promises to those who serve Him, but there are consequences for those who refuse. "If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land: But if ye refuse and rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it" (Is. 1:19-20).

The outstretched arm of the Lord has

continued even to our day. He has so much mercy for lost mankind that He was willing to take extreme measures on our behalf. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). Jesus Christ gave his life so mankind would have the opportunity to repent, be converted and be redeemed by His shed blood.

There are those who abuse the love of God and live as though His mercy will save them from all of their distress regardless of how they live. In the message to the Church in Thyatira, Jesus warned those who sin and do not repent, that He "...will give unto every one of you according to your works" (Rev. 2:23). This rejection by Jesus Christ will also include those who simply drift away from God. "So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spew thee out of my mouth" (Rev. 3:16). But thankfully, Jesus also told of the reward for those who are faithful unto death: "I know thy works, and tribulation, and poverty,...be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" (Rev. 2:9-10). God's outstretched arm is especially visible in the lives of those who come to Him in repentance. This applies to those who have straved deeply into sin and to those who have tried to live a good life but were not repentant. When the realization of the need for the redeeming power of the blood of Jesus Christ is finally allowed to work in our lives, the compassion of God's mercy and grace is apparent.

We come to recognize that only by the mercy and grace of God is it possible for anyone to have faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ and to be redeemed of their sins. We also recognize that we must follow the teachings of Jesus Christ by applying His instructions to our lives. The love of God reaches out to us, but we must be receptive to His call.

As we listen to the testimonies of converts, we hear over and over that they want to escape the wrath of God that awaits the unrepentant. Many times we also hear they tried for some time to do it their way. Fortunately, by the grace of God, the convert realized their way would not work. When

they were finally willing to surrender to the call of God, they were able to recognize that God was waiting, and calling for them with His outstretched arms.

It is vital that we remember it is not enough for God to be willing to reach out to us. We must be willing to be submissive to the call of God. There are numerous examples in the scripture where souls wanted to serve God on their own terms. The rich, young ruler came to Christ to see what he needed to do to have eternal life. Christ reminded him that he must keep the commandments. It appears that he had been quite successful in keeping most of the commandments. Jesus did not dispute his claim to have kept them from his youth. However, Jesus recognized that the young man had an idol which had to be removed from his life. He needed to give up his material goods, give them to the poor and follow Jesus. He was unwilling to give up his wealth and follow Jesus (Mt.19:16-26). We must not allow anything to be more important than serving our Master.

At another time, as Jesus was instructing His disciples, He told them they must eat His flesh and drink His blood (Jn. 6:56-57). To some, this was such a hard thing to do that they left Him and did not walk with Him anymore. Jesus then asked His twelve closest disciples if they would go away also. Peter recognized there was no other way to eternal life. He said, "...Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life" (Jn. 6:68).

We do not know if any of those disciples ever came back to Jesus. We do know Christ's love for them did not change. He continued to preach the coming of God's kingdom and the need to become children of God. This did not stop until His death. Even as His life slowly drained away while He was hanging on the cross, He prayed for those who rejected Him. "...Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do..." (Lk. 23:34). With His arms stretched toward heaven, He died for all who would come and be saved.

Asummary of several items considered at recent Mission Committee meetings is presented in this article.

Missionary support

The number of brethren sent by the church to serve in various mission programs has increased in recent vears. The Mission Committee intends to take appropriate steps to provide ongoing spiritual support for these individuals as they seek to carry out their challenging assignments. This will include visits by Mission Committee members to the various mission sites. Time will be spent with each brother and sister and there will also be group meetings with the staff at each site. Additional plans are being developed to provide a forum for sharing and learning from the experiences of our missionaries.

Servant Fund

The Servant Fund has been established to provide support for brethren sent by the Mission or World Relief Committees on long term missionary or humanitarian assignments. It provides opportunity for individuals and local churches to make contributions for this worthy cause. This arrangement allows our serving brethren to devote their time and attention to their calling, rather than being required to raise their own funds. Web Site Communication

There is increasing utilization of our National Church website, which allows anyone interested to obtain basic information about our beliefs, location of churches and other important information. The Mission Committee gave approval to the request of Apostolic Christian Publications to have a linkage to the Church website. This provides ready access to Apostolic Christian Publications offerings. In addition, the Mission Committee is working with World Relief to develop a website which will post information regarding the policies and the many service opportunities related to these outreach programs.

Small church study

It was reported that there has been encouraging follow up by individuals and some churches since the Small Church Study Committee report was presented at Goodfield last August. Local brethren who attended the meeting have reported back to their respective congregations on various suggestions and opportunities. Some churches have begun local outreach efforts in their communities and some have instituted increased fellowship activities. It was also encouraging to learn that several of the small churches have recently been blessed by the addition of some new families.

Long range planning

The Committee plans to move forward in the coming months to establish a subcommittee to develop increased trust, clarity and sponsorship among the Brotherhood for mission outreach activities. It is expected that there will be increased efforts to provide opportunities for brethren to utilize their gifts and to be sent by the church to spread the Gospel message to the lost. This is one of the four pillars of the mission of our church, and it is essential that

we have a balanced approach in fulfilling all four pillars of this mission. These outreach activities will all be developed and implemented within the Guiding Principles for Presenting the Gospel, which have been published in previous Silver Lining issues, and will be posted on the Mission Committee website when it is available.

Reports

Encouraging reports were given on the growing programs in Mexico. There continue to be converts in Ixtlan. Construction of the new school building is underway as well as plans for development of the educational program to be implemented when the structure is completed. The single brothers sent to serve in Ixtlan have proven to be a great help to Bro. Marshall and Sis. Jan Heinold in their labors.

Construction of a new church building as well as the first residential home will soon be underway in Magdalena. Individuals from the community have been joining the orphanage staff and residents for worship services.

Reports were shared regarding the Lord's work in Europe, India and Japan. The Building Advisory Committee has supported the recent purchase of a building to provide a church home for the congregation in Washington D.C., which is proving to be a great blessing.

Thanks and prayers

We are grateful for your prayer and financial support, the faithfulness of God and for the leading of the Holy Spirit in this important calling and opportunity to share the Gospel. As the needs and opportunities increase, we entreat your ongoing prayers.

Southeast Asia Tsunami Aid

The Silver Lining article "Tsunami Aid for Southeast Asia", published in the March 2005, detailed the initial World Relief response to this disaster. The generous outpouring of donations for Tsunami assistance continued through the first six months of 2005. These donations permitted World Relief to provide additional assistance to the affected populations of Indonesia, Sri Lanka and Southeast India.

To assist with the distribution of these funds, World Relief solicited grant requests for relief projects from four international Christian relief organizations; International Aid, Map International, Northwest Medical Teams, and Global Operations and Development. World Relief has partnered with these organizations on many relief projects and is confident in their capability to use our financial assistance in a responsible manner.

World Relief selected projects that focused on three areas; medical assistance, housing, and development of work opportunities. Working in Sri Lanka with Northwest Medical teams, World Relief sponsored the construction of ten homes. These homes were completed and ready for occupancy early in 2006.

In Indonesia, World Relief supported the medical outreach of MAP International, International Aid and Global Operations and Development. This assistance provided for the construction of many medical clinics and the establishment of a training center for medical equipment repair technicians. This facility provides a much needed location for the repair of medical equipment and creates many new job opportu-

nities for the graduates.

Indonesia is a country of islands. Tello, one of the smallest group of islands with a population of around 35,000 had only limited medical capabilities. World Relief sponsored the construction and equipping of a new 43 bed hospital on that island. MAP International supervised the construction and staffing of the hospital and will be providing medical supervision for at least the first year of operation.

Dedication of the hospital is scheduled for mid-February 2007. Three brothers representing World Relief will be attending the dedication. These brothers will also be visiting the other islands to evaluate many of the additional relief projects funded by the Tsunami Disaster donations.

World Relief also provided funds to build two fishing boats and two bakeries on the Indonesian island of Nias. These projects provide income for many families.

The tsunami caused damage along the shoreline of the Southeast corner of India. World Relief, with the assistance of the staff of the Rural Gospel Medical Mission, was able to make a connection with the staff of a medical school in the affected area. Funds were provided to support medical teams which worked in the disaster area and who also went to the nearby country of Sri Lanka. One of the India coastline villages lost many adults, leaving

25 orphaned children. World Relief disaster funds are assisting with the education of these orphans.

These projects, which have provided homes, medical care and work opportunities, will have a positive effect on the lives of thousands of persons for years to come. The outpouring of love gifts from the brothers, sisters and friends of the Apostolic Christian Churches has made this work possible.

Working with international Christian relief organizations enables World Relief to reach out to many areas of the world not touched by the activities of the Eastern Europe, Caribbean, and Mexico Committees. The International Grants Committee reviews project proposals from these organizations and makes recommendations to the National World Relief Board for funding.

I am the child who cannot talk. You often pity me; I see it in your eyes. You wonder how much I am aware of ... I see that as well. I am aware of much whether you are happy or sad or fearful, patient or impatient, full of love and desire, or if you are just doing your duty by me. I marvel at your frustration, knowing mine to be far greater, for I cannot express myself nor my needs as you do. You cannot conceive my isolation so complete it is at times. I do not gift you with clever conversation, cute remarks to be laughed over and repeated. I do not give you answers to your everyday questions, responses over my well-being, sharing my needs, or comments about the world around me. I do not give you rewards as defined by the world's standards...great strides in development that you can credit yourself; I do not give you understanding as you know it.

What I give you is so much more valuable...I give you instead opportunities. Opportunities to discover the depth of your character, not mine; the depth of your love, your commitment, your patience, your abilities; the opportunity to explore your spirit more deeply than you imagined possible. I drive you further than you would ever go on your own, working harder, seeking answers to your many questions, creating question with no answers. I am the child who cannot talk.





marry of their people, he deliberately went off and grieved their heart and took a woman, I believe even from Hagar's lineage, and it was a grief of mind to them. (Genesis 26:34-35) Samson went down to the Philistines. His parents did not want him to do that. (Judges 14:3) We can go back to Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel. God even spoke to Cain, gave him warning, that he would bring the sacrifice that would please Him and he wouldn't do it. (Genesis 4:7)

I believe all of these different children, we might say, that we would look and say it just didn't go right with them, they were taught, they were warned. How many times, as we gather together, we sit around the Word, that as children do we hear the Word come forth in truth but we don't obey it.

I wonder if Absalom really wanted to cause that much grief to his father. I don't really think he did. But do you think he was in control of his life as much as he thought he was? Much the same it is for our friends who stand without. Same way it was with us before we repented. We thought we knew what we were doing, but Satan had us in his clutches, in his grip. We didn't want to grieve our parents. It really wasn't our desire. But through the one who had control over our lives at that time, we brought grief to him, and we brought grief to our Heavenly Father.

That's why He sent His Son. That's why He sent One who died and gave His life for our sins that we might have a more excellent way. That we could have our sins forgiven. That we could bring joy to our parents. That we could be a joy to our Heavenly Father.

It's not easy, though, is it? Or else there would be many more that repent. There's no limit on who can repent and who can't. God's grace is sufficient. Young or old. We might think we're a small sinner or a great sinner; nothing is too great for God. The blood was shed, it says in Hebrews, once for all. (Hebrews 10:10) It doesn't say once for 80% of the people, or once for who have committed a certain sin, but once for all!

We are without excuse, we can read. We've read, people come, they had excuses (St. Matthew 22:5). Excuses have no place with God. Maybe that's something we've gotten used to in this life and on this earth or maybe it's something we grew up with. The society we live in has more effect on us than what we want to admit. The laws and the judicial system, that we can make excuses and we can work our way out of something. We can convince somebody. The only thing that's going to stand with God is a true and upright confession, admitting that we've done wrong, confessing our sins. Not making excuses saying it was somebody else's fault or I didn't know what I was doing.

"...Jesus answered and spake unto them again by parables, and said. The kingdom of heaven is like unto a certain king, which made a marriage for his son, And sent forth his servants to call them that were bidden to the wedding: and they would not come." St. Matthew 22:1-3. This king called his son, well, he made a marriage for his son, and he sent all these to come. We can compare this as to the Israelite nation; that they rejected, they refused. But, I don't know if that will really help if we stand up here and spend a lot of time talking about Israel. We have a desire for them that they would come. But let's apply it to each one of us gathered here today, that we're bidden to a feast. We're bidden to a wedding feast. How did

Jesus say it, there before He was crucified, with His disciples, it was the last time He was going to eat and drink with them (St. Luke 22:16)....until we would drink and eat again anew, and we would sit down. You know, it says also, about we will sit down with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob (St. Matthew 8:11). What a feast! It speaks here of a wedding, and we're all familiar with that. We've all been to a wedding. We've different times been to weddings. It's nothing new. Something everyone can relate to.

"Go ye therefore into the highways, and as many as ye shall find, bid to the marriage." St. Matthew 22:9. This is a scripture that applies to all of us. "So those servants went out into the highways, and gathered together all as many as they found, both bad and good: and the wedding was furnished with guests." St. Matthew 22:10. We've all been invited, some have answered the reply and come, and some still wait. Some of us were bad, some were maybe better, and some were good. But all had to come in repentance. And all who stand without still need to.

"And when the king came in to see the guests, he saw there a man which had not on a wedding garment: And he saith unto him, Friend, how camest thou in hither not having a wedding garment? And he was speechless. Then said the king to the servants, Bind him hand and foot, and take him away, and cast him into outer darkness; there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. For many are called, but few are chosen." St. Matthew 22:11-14.

Fifth verse, those that were bidden, they made light of it, went their ways; one to his farm, another to his merchandise. We can read another place they were in-

vited. One had a wife he had to take care of, another one had bought oxen and there was a list, and we can go on and on. We all had our list. And many still have their list. It doesn't us take very long, we read through here, to see how much it is going to do. What did that man have to say?

Twelfth verse, he came in to see the guests and he saw there a man which had not on a wedding garment. For our dear friends that stand without, that haven't been given that robe of righteousness, haven't taken part of the plan of salvation and the shed blood of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. haven't repented and confessed their sins...vou're going to be speechless. We can have a whole list of things. You can have a lot of things I do wrong. And I maybe don't do everything you think I should, or other brothers, other sisters; some things in their lives. That isn't going to get you anywhere. There may be some concerns in life, maybe things haven't been quite right. Maybe there's been grief and sorrow. But we all stand in the need of repentance. Jesus wants us all to come. He paid the price. Those sins can be taken away. The great love that God has for each one of us, that we can all have this wedding garment. And it can be!

He went on in the twenty-ninth and thirtieth verse talking about the resurrection because there were those that came; the Sadducees. They didn't believe in the resurrection, so they came at another angle to him because he had just talked to the Pharisees about the money, about who we should give to and who we should honor in the government, what we should do. (St. Matthew 22:15-21) So now it was the Sadducees' turn. Well, they didn't believe in the resurrec-

tion. So how can this be? They thought they really brought a good account unto him, a good example.

And "Jesus answered and said unto them, Ye do err, not knowing the scriptures, nor the power of God." St. Matthew 22:29. Do we limit the power of God, what He can do in our life? He can make us clean. He can give, as David in the Psalms wrote about "Create in me a clean heart..." Psalms 51:10, a new heart. Solomon spoke of the understanding and getting wisdom. We can't get that on our own. We can go to all the schools and all the education and talk to all kinds of people. But we're never going to get the wisdom and understanding of the Word of God and the Spirit of God until we are His own and He opens our eyes and opens our understanding, that we can have that power of God. "For in the resurrection they neither marry, nor are given in marriage, but are as the angels of God in heaven." St. Matthew 22: 30. We really don't understand how all this is either. do we? It's going to be so much better than what we have on this life.

You know, I sat here this morning. It's a little different when you don't live here for a while. When you come every Sunday, you just expect to see everyone. But it's always interesting to watch the church fill up in the morning. Sometimes we forget who repented, who's begun repenting. Oh yes, there's another one repenting. It just warms our heart. There's also sorrow, there's some missing. But, as we think about sitting there, and we read this, how that will be in heaven, or those that are there, one by one are we going to come in. Are we all going to be there? We step across that threshold, and we enter in. And we recognize one thing that's different as we, the only people we

know here are the ones that have lived during our lifetime. But in heaven, we will know from the ages gone by. Abraham, Isaac and Joseph, Solomon and whoever all is there. It just seems that we will know them, because the disciples were on the mountain during the transfiguration with Jesus Christ. Moses and Elijah appeared there also (St. Matthew 17:1-3). They didn't live during their time, but they knew them. They knew who they were.

What a blessing that will be! What do you think, how the ones that are there waiting for us, as one by one we come home, what a joy that is! What a great singing, what a rejoicing is there. We gather together on Sunday or Wednesday night, and we sing and we rejoice that we can be counted among God's chosen host.

What if we aren't? We're going to be speechless. No singing, no rejoicing. We won't have a word to say, just deep sorrow. What did he say? ...weeping and gnashing of teeth into outer darkness (St. Matthew 22: 13). Such a sharp contrast, no comparison. The decision doesn't take very long, does it?

We have a lot of decisions to make in life. How many decisions did each of you have to make in the past week? But how many decisions are easier to make than this one? It's clear cut. There's no question as to the outcome, the difference. You know, many times when we make a decision we just don't know how it is going to go. We decide to go this way. Is that the right decision?

But the decision to come in repentance; we just know that's the right thing. It's the easiest decision we can make in our life, but it can be the hardest because we let Satan be in control of our life. Those bands and those bonds, they have to be broken free and we

can't do it on our own. God will help us.

We remember Samson the great power and the great strength he had; they could bind him with whatever they wanted. When he had the power of God with him, there was nothing that could contain him. He could break loose. But the instant the power of God and the Spirit of God was gone from him, he was powerless. Not any different than any other man. Thanks be to God, that great power, as we read it here, the power of God, how he will give that to you and I.

We who are redeemed are so thankful that we could humble ourselves and by the grace of God we could break loose and be healed of that disease of sin. The most incurable disease among mankind today is sin, and it always has been. Because God is the only one that can heal that, and He made the provision in the sending of His Son.

We can go on here a little further. The Pharisees, now they heard that He had put the Saduccees to silence. They were gathered together, and isn't it they just over and over keep coming deceitfully, trying to trick Him, trying to portray that they really care about him or what He has to say? All they were trying to do was to destroy Him, that they would look good. They, so many times we can read, so much an illustration of the works of the flesh, and not the fruit of the Spirit.

Then there was this lawyer. It says he "asked him a question, tempting him, and saying, Master, which is the great commandment

in the law? Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." St. Matthew 22:35-40. Maybe that's just a good question to close with. Can we of a truth, and a total conviction within our heart today say that we are serving God, and loving God, with all our heart, all our soul, all our mind and all our strength?

The keeping of records and the writing of history helps to perpetuate existing institutions. A famed historian once said that if you want to destroy an institution, a church or a government, you can do so by cutting off its history. Likely this is true, or at least it hastens the demise of any institution if its history becomes distant and foggy in the minds of the current generation. The statesman, Cicero, wrote, "To know nothing of what happened before you were born is to remain ever a child."

To be cognizant of history, and to understand the past, is encouraged in the Bible. Isaiah said, "....look unto the rock from which ye are hewn, and to the hold of the pit from which ye are hewn." (Isaiah 51:1) Luke wrote unto Theolophilus "that thou might know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." While in these two instances, the writers were making reference to spiritual beliefs, the principles could also refer to the knowing of history and what was believed and practiced in the past.

A Long Tenure

In our church history we can claim that a man served for 72 years in the ministry. This is cited in Marching To Zion on page 140: "A man who served for many years as an Assistant Elder was John W. Schmidt. He was born June 5, 1844, in Hessen Darmstadt, Germany.

He was a tailor who moved first to Peoria and later lived in Eureka. He was an early forefather in America, having preached occasionally at the Partridge Prairie church. From 1929 to 1934, when various Elders from other congregations had the oversight at Roanoke, Illinois, John W. Schmidt had the title of Assistant Elder. In the German language this translates into Miteldister, meaning "with the Elder." He died on October 7, 1939, at age ninety-five after having served in the ministry for seventy-two years."

While Bro. John W. Schmidt would want no accolades for his years of ministering, his tenure should serve as an inspiring trait of endurance to all ministers in today's church. How thankful we should be for each and every brother who preaches from our pulpits; and we should thank God that He dispenses His Spirit to guide the message(s) of these brethren.

Sorrow and Joy

On June 14, 1924, about 20 members gathered in a home at Wichita, Kansas, for a singing. After the singing ended, Bro. Alfred Lambert took the Bible and began reading from St. Matthew, Chapter 24. At verse 15 he suddenly slumped and began falling out of his chair. His son, George, recalled that "we brothers (Alfred's sons) caught him and gently laid him on a bed, and soon he went to sleep."

His death that night instigated

the repentance of his three sons. These young men were "taken up" at the church at Burlington, Oklahoma, in December, 1924. With the consent of the congregation, Elder Gottlieb Kurz proved all three brothers at the same time.

George Lambert, who served for many years as a minister at Wichita, remembers the example his father set for the family. He said his parents were strict and demanded discipline. His father prayed and read the Bible after every meal, and often explained the meaning of what he had read.

History Progress

Work has been ongoing to update the 1984 edition of Marching To Zion. Because the computer disks of that era are now obsolete, the entire book had to be re-typeset for the new edition. The updated version is mostly typeset and proofreading is being administered by various brothers and sisters. Since the new book will likely exceed 700 pages, proofreading takes considerable time. Several proofs will be made to insure correctness. The time of printing is not known, but this is to report that significant progress is being made.

"Two Important Rules"

Two important rules that are vital for a good marriage are, "Never do anything selfish," and "Always praise your spouse for his or her good points."

In I Corinthians 13:4,5, we read, "Charity ...seeketh not her own." This indicates to me that we must not do anything selfish. The Apostle Paul wrote in Galatians 2:20, "I am crucified with Christ." If we, like Paul, are crucified with Christ, we can't very well do anything selfish. Our own wants and desires are out of the picture. We concentrate on what we can do for others, and thereby bring glory to God, not to ourselves. Matthew 25:40 reads, "And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." If we are going to do nice things for others, we should start with those closest to us, in the case of married people, our spouses.

The rule, "Never do anything selfish," should apply, not only

in marriage but in the church, in our schools, and in our places of work. To follow this rule is not a sacrifice or a loss, it is a gain. Jesus said, "And he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it." Matthew 10:39. This seems like a contradiction but it's true. The more you deny yourself for the sake of others, the more God blesses you with "Joy unspeakable and full of glory." I Peter 1:8. This is one of the astounding truths taught in the Bible.

Getting to the second rule, everyone has many good points so latch onto them. Make it a habit to praise your spouse or others, for their good points. Everybody has failures and that is why Christ died for us. In regard to failures, it is good to caution one another with love and respect, but never, I say never, criticize others with an attitude of being above them, or better than they are. In the case of marriage, such conduct or attitude hurts like a dagger. We can tolerate more of a hostile attitude from others

than we can from our spouses, or other close members of our family. People who live under the same roof have a special relationship that needs to be preserved. If you are going to be kind to guests, then please start with members of your own family.

Proverbs 27:2 reads, "Let another man praise thee, and not thine own mouth." This teaches us not to praise ourselves or boast about ourselves. Even Paul gave Christ, or God, the credit for everything He did. "But I laboured more abundantly than they all: yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me." I Corinthians 15:10.

The Bible does not say that we should not criticize others, but it does say, "But in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." Philippians 2:3. This is the exact opposite of human nature but it is what God asks of us. We may express concern about others, but we should not place ourselves above them.
