
The Silver Lining

Sermon by Bro. Ted Luginbuhl, Smithville, OH

Ecclesiastes 1 & St. John 19:1-37

In this chapter, loved ones, we have a small part of the wisdom that God gave to Solomon as he...as it was his prayer that he would be given wisdom to rule and to reign the people of Israel (I Kings 3:9). And then he was given wisdom to write these things down so that we today can think about them. And he brings it to our heart here, how that all of the things of the earth, all the things of the world round about us that we see, he sums it up as, "...vanity of vanities; all is vanity," Ecclesiastes 1:2. But dear ones there is one thing that is not vanity... and that is God. That is of His Spirit. Things that are of the Word. Things that are of Jesus Christ are not vanity. And that is why we, in our lives, have to humble ourselves and we have to get rid of that vanity. We have to get rid of that vexation of Spirit so that we can be filled with the Holy Ghost. We can be filled with God's wisdom, and His knowledge and His understanding.

As Solomon here was given to recognize the evils around about him, so let it be a prayer on our heart that we likewise would be able to recognize when evil comes knocking at our door. That we would look out, before we open the door, we would look out through the peep hole and we would recognize it, and we'd leave the door locked. But when Jesus Christ knocks, let us swing the door wide open and let Him come in and let Him fill us and guide us and direct us in this evil time.

For as we have read, how that we really are...nothing. It tells us here about the sun rising and the sun going down. (Ecclesiastes 1:5) That's nothing that man has anything to do with. How it says, "All the rivers run into the sea: yet the sea is not full..." and the water goes back again. Ecclesiastes 1:7. We watch that, and we watch it in amazement and wonder of the creation. Let us keep our eyes focused on those things that are not vanity and vexation, but those things that are of wisdom and understanding and knowledge of God, the Father. Of His Creation. Of His love in sending his Son Jesus Christ on our behalf.

As we have sung, as that hart for water panteth (As Pants The Hart, Zion's

Harp #157), let us be thirsty for the Word. Let us be thirsty for His Spirit. Every day let us pray that His Spirit would fill us and guide us and direct us in that day. Let us pray for grace one day at a time. Let's not worry about tomorrow's troubles. Tomorrow may not come. We have today.

The friends that are with us tonight, those who have heard the Word, or those who have been touched by that call...Answer today. Because we have no promise of tomorrow. Get rid of the vanity and vexation in your life, and come. Come and taste and see of what God has to give us in this night...so that you too have the opportunity to see Christ face to face and to spend all eternity with Him. It tells us in the Word, dear loved ones, that all of us, every knee shall bow and every tongue shall confess (Romans 14:11). We shall all see Jesus face to face...whether saved or unsaved. But many, it tells us, will come short and will be turned away (St. Luke 13:24-25). What a fearful thought that is.

Hold fast the faith! Hold fast that which the Word says. Hold fast to those things that we know. That when evil surrounds us and we grow weary, if we can hold fast to that faith we know, that we shall obtain the victory.

Such a wonderful, and blessed part of the scripture (St. John 19). Not that there isn't scripture that's all good. It's all given to us for our learning and for our understanding. But this portion of scripture we should each hold so dear to our hearts. Because it is of the time when our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ was brought to the mockery of the trial that He was put through and He was scourged and He was mistreated for you and for me. Knowing that He had the power to escape these things. He continued on because of the love He had in his heart. Not because of anything that we had done, but because He loved us. And He wanted to give Himself for us because He knew there had to be a price paid for sin. That all the blood that was shed of the animals of old time was just a covering. It was just a temporary thing.

We know how that even those of his closest associates, the twelve disciples

that he had chosen by His own might, by His own wisdom - He had picked them out of the crowd to be His closest friends - we know that how they forsook Him (St. Mark 14:50). One of them, Judas, had sold Him. And sold Him there, and had betrayed Him, and yet we know that how right before that, before Judas went out, Christ showed the perfect example of humility as He

Afflictions

ctions

"Afflictions, tho' they seem severe, In mercy oft are sent; They stopp'd the prodigal's career, And caused him to repent." (The Prodigal's Return, Hymns of Zion #22).

It is apparent from the Word of God that His people will suffer affliction. Sometimes it will be light and sometimes it will be heavy. David often suffered affliction and sought help from the Lord. "Look upon mine affliction and my pain; and forgive all my sins" (Ps. 25:18). Sometimes people are nearly overcome by affliction: Elijah was so distressed that "...he ...went a day's journey into the wilderness, and came and sat down under a juniper tree: and he requested for himself that he might die; and said, It is enough; now, O Lord, take away my life; for I am not better than my fathers" (I Ki. 19:4). Some choose affliction over a life of ease that would lead to wickedness. "By faith Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter; Choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season," (Heb. 11:24-25).

What is affliction? Why do we suffer affliction? How can affliction help or hurt us? How do we respond when we "suffer affliction"?

Affliction is a state of suffering pain or distress of the body or mind.

There are, of course, a variety of reasons why we suffer afflictions. We can bring affliction on ourselves because of inappropriate behavior. The children of Israel often suffered affliction because of their lifestyle. Many of their kings led them into idolatry and many other sins. Psalm 107 is a powerful description of what happened to the children of Israel when they followed their selfish will rather than following God's will. "They wandered in the wilderness in a solitary way..." (v. 4); ...they rebelled against the words of God,..." (v. 11); they were "Fools, because of their transgression,..." (v. 17); "They reel to and frolike a drunken man, and are at their wit's end" (v. 27). In each case they cried unto the Lord and He brought them out of their distresses. The Psalmist recognized that it would not have had to be that way. "Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men" (v. 8,15,21,31)! Bad choices caused them to suffer. The prodigal son (Luke 15:11-32) clearly brought his affliction on himself because of inappropriate choices.

Not all afflictions are brought on by bad choices. Some are tests from God. Job suffered incredible heartbreak, but "In all this Job sinned not, nor charged God foolishly" (Job 1:22). The New Testament gives us many examples of individuals who suffered for their service to the Lord. Peter and others, when called to appear before the Sanhedrin refused to yield to their demands. Instead, "...they departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name" (Acts 5:41). Paul, Steven and others willingly gave their lives for the cross of Christ.

The scripture describes many benefits of affliction. Job recognized that affliction can purify us. "But he knoweth the way that I take: when he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold" (Job 23:10). When we suffer hardships, it can keep us from going astray. "Before I was afflicted I went astray: but now have I kept thy word" (Ps. 119:67). Paul reminded us that we can come to a peace as a result of our troubles. "Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless, afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby" (Heb. 12:11).

Not only do we have difficulties that God allows to come upon us as tests, Satan can also bring difficulties as a way of tempting us to sin. Temptations are afflictions from Satan designed to make us fail. Ever since man has been on the earth, Satan has tried to make him fail. In the Garden of Eden, Satan, in the form of a serpent caused Adam and Eve to fall into sin. Numerous times Satan has caused God's people to fail. "And Satan stood up against Israel, and provoked David to number Israel" (I Ch. 21:1). After this sin, David was reguired to make a very difficult choice. Gad, David's seer was instructed to tell David to choose one of three tribulations: three vears famine, three months to be destroved before his foes, or three days of the sword of the Lord. David was in a great affliction and chose to fall into the hand of the Lord.

Jesus was tempted also. After forty days of fasting and prayer, Satan was allowed to question Jesus whether He was the Son of God and to bring various other temptations. In each case, Jesus resisted Satan by using the Word of God (Mt. 4:1-10). Satan was then required to leave him "...and, behold, angels came and ministered unto him" (Mt. 4:11).

Paul recognized that the followers of Christ would be tempted so he urged us to be careful and to forgive "Lest Satan should get an advantage of us: for we are not ignorant of his devices" (II Cor. 2:11).

Our reactions to affliction no doubt vary from time to time and from situation to situation. We can be despondent, we can become angry or we can recognize that it is an opportunity to grow. Whatever our reaction, we are assured that there are promises from God to the afflicted.

We know the afflictions will not last forever. "For his anger endureth but a moment; ...but joy cometh in the morning" (Ps. 30:5). We are also promised that the Lord will deliver us from our afflictions: "Many are the afflictions of the righteous: but the Lord delivereth him out of them all" (Ps. 34:19).

We know that sometimes God allows us to remain in troubling situations for some time, but during those times He will be with us: "When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overthrow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee" (Is. 43:2).

The greatest promise of all, of course, is the promise of ultimate victory. Jesus said "Let not your heart be troubled:... I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also" (Jn. 14:1-3).

Just as the father forgave the prodigal son and welcomed him home, we also have a Father who loves us, cares for us and will welcome His children home.

Casa Vida y Esperanza (CVE)

A little one shall become a thousand, and a small one a strong nation: I the Lord will hasten it in his time. (Isaiah 60:22)

Praise be to the Lord our God for the work that He is doing here at CVE (House of Life and Hope) in Magdalena, Mexico and the generous, loving support that makes our orphanage truly a casa hogar [house home] for the children under our care. CVE is located in the town of Magdalena, a community of close to 50,000 people.

Every day as we see the darkness that Satan uses to obscure God's promises, we also see that God shows His love to as many as possible. Through faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ, we are prayerful that they too can come to a saving knowledge of life eternal.

Our children

Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it. (Proverbs 22:6)

It is only through the prayers offered for this endeavor that much

can be accomplished, and we give thanks that the Lord has blessed these past few years for us. The orphanage is now home to twenty-three children who range in age from fourteen months to thirteen years. Many of these

children have lived at CVE for over 2 years now, and our desire is that they will grow to know Christ and become strong Christian men and women.

Daily we give thanks that these children are here with us, and that

we can see them learning, searching, and finding the love that their Father in heaven has for them. Although there are difficult moments, we trust that the Lord is faithful and will lead us to give our utmost in loving and raising these children to know Him. We also are thankful for the opportunity to be a part of the lives of children and young adults outside of CVE. At the present we have an independent living program for young ladies that do not have families to help them through some of the early years of adulthood. We also consider many of the children that attend church every week as our extended family.

Our church

Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it: except the Lord keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain. (Psalms 127:1)

As the children continue to grow, so does the attendance at our church services. Over a hundred men, women, and children fill our dining hall to overflowing every Sunday, and we give thanks that a new church building has been approved.

The foundations have already been laid.

Also, we give thanks for the Mexican men and women who have begun a new life in Christ, and challenge us daily to keep searching out the truth in His word. One day we pray they will

be the spiritual examples of our congregation. We ask for your continued prayers as our church makes this transition to a new building, and that the Mexican families will feel that this is truly their house of worship.

Work projects

We have been blessed to have the support of many work teams, and are thankful for the work that has been accomplished with the help of willing hands. Work continues on the first perimeter house at CVE. We pray that soon we will be able to have houseparents here, and that the opportunities for family living will materialize. Already God's hand is moving, and we look forward to the Christian couples that could soon be part of our family. Both the perimeter house and the church, as well as our refurbished buildings, are a direct result of the help of work teams, and we thank those that have given their precious gift of time.

Prayers & needs

Show me thy ways, O Lord; teach me thy paths... for thou art the God of my salvation; on thee do I wait all the day. (Psalms 25:4-5)

As our children get older, we are giving prayerful consideration to their schooling environment. We are waiting on the Lord's direction in moving forward with plans for a fully accredited Christian school, and ask that you would keep these opportunities and plans in your prayers.

God is also moving our staff in many directions, and we ask that those individuals interested in serving in various roles, including houseparents, would prayerfully consider this calling.

It is truly a blessing to wait on the Lord, and to watch His perfect timing. We thank you again for your loving prayers and support, and believe that His harvest will truly be plentiful after the seeds are sown and watered with His life-giving Spirit. Dios les bendiga! [God bless you all!] As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

Haitian Trade Schools

The Haitian trade schools project is under the supervision of the Apostolic Christian Water Aid project (AWA). AWA was formed in 1986, and while the original focus was providing fresh water for Haitians throughout the southern peninsula of Haiti, the organization now consists of three committees involving brethren from five congregations who oversee well drilling, trade schools, and a small orphanage. AWA is under the auspices of the Apostolic Christian World Relief Caribbean Committee.

Vision

The MEBSH organization is divided into 14 regions throughout the southern peninsula of Haiti. Currently there are trade schools in four of the regions. As the Lord continues to open doors our vision is to assist the MEBSH organization in their effort to establish a trade school in each of the 14 regions.

Port A Piement Trade school #1

In 1986 a committee was formed to assist a German missionary, Detlift Guinner, by providing WR funds to start up a trade school in the village of Port A Piement. The German missionary presence in Haiti is staffed by men who seek to avoid bearing arms in the German military because of their religious convictions. The German government allows them to come to Haiti and serve as trade school teachers and administrators instead.

The current role of the Bluffton AWA committee is to assist with tool maintenance, determine World Relief funding levels, and provide accountability to the Caribbean committee regarding the use of those funds. The school offers classes in metal, wood, masonry, and sewing. The Germans do an excellent job teaching life skills and discipline to the approximately 60 students.

IRD Les Cayes Trade school #2

This school was constructed in the early 90's near the MEBSH compound in Les Cayes. There are no full time missionaries at the school; it is indigenous as all of the administration and teachers are Haitian. The school offers the same courses as those at Port A Piement. There are approximately 100 students. Since the school is located in Les Cayes, electricity is supplied by the town, avoiding the expense and maintenance involved when a generator is required. The Bluffton brethren have worked very hard to overcome the language and culture barriers, while assisting the school with tool maintenance, funding, accountability, and general oversight.

Petit Trou Trade school #3

This village is very remote and the people of the area are extremely poor. The pastor of the local church pleaded with an exploratory committee from Wolcott, Remington, and Francesville to start a trade school in the village in order to keep their young believers from moving to the cities to find work. Access to the school has been difficult; the 75 mile trip sometimes takes 6 or more hours due to flooding and road conditions. In 1995 the school opened for the first time, and offers carpentry, sewing, masonry, and welding classes. The current enrollment is

approximately 50 students. Teacher salaries are subsidized with World Relief funds, and the committee visits the school three times per year to provide tool and generator maintenance, funding accountability, and administrative assistance.

Chantal Trade school #4

The Pastor of the Chantal church had been praying for a trade school for ten years. In October of 2005, his prayers were answered and the trade school at Chantal opened for the first time. The standard of living in the town of Chantal is much better than Petit Trou, but still very poor. Chantal offers three-year courses in sewing and masonry, and a two-year computer course. The pastor at Chantal is an excellent leader, and his son Dony is the school administrator. Dony has a college degree and is very computer proficient. There is also email access at Chantal that facilitates communication and accountability for the school which has approximately 100 students.

Appreciation

We would like to thank our brethren for contributions on behalf of the Haitian trade schools. They simply would not exist without your assistance via prayer, work teams, tithing, and child sponsorship. We covet your continued support and ask that you pray for the safety and wisdom of the committees as they travel and confront the many issues and differences that come as a result of our culture, language and economic disparities. 





washed their feet. And He looked into the face of Judas and He did the same to him as He did to the other twelve, knowing the deed that was done, He could share that love. (St. John 13:4-15) How is that for you and me? If there are those that have wronged us, are we willing to love them as Jesus Christ?

So Jesus had been brought before Pilate, and he had asked Him many questions...

Dear ones does that not move our hearts, to have a love for Jesus Christ that we would give anything? He gave it all for us. He gave up the glories of Heaven and He came to walk on this earth amongst the vanity and vexation that Solomon spoke of (Ecclesiastes 1:14). Christ Jesus knew what this earth was about. He knew what He was going to have to go through. And yet, out of love, and humility, and submission to His Father, He came and He walked a perfect life...no mistakes. That His blood, that blood that when they pierced His side, when that blood flowed out, that pure and precious blood, that blood paid the price for your sins and for mine (St. John 19:34).

What do we owe Jesus Christ? Can we ever repay Him for what He did for us there on Calvary's tree? Dear ones, let us think about it. Should there be anything in this life that the scripture asks of us that we cannot give up for Jesus Christ? Should there be anything that He asks us to do that we would be willing to look at Him, to look at Him hanging there on Calvary's cross and say, no I won't do that? Would it not hurt His heart?

He sits there now on the right hand of the Father in Heaven. He has no less love today for us than He did there on Calvary's cross. He begs and pleads with the Father for you and for me. When He left, after He died, after He gave His life, and He left and He ascended up to Heaven, He had told his disciples there that He would send the comforter, the Holy Spirit. That Spirit which affects your life and mine every day (St. John 15:26). He loves us. So what do we owe Him? Do we not owe him our every breath? We should think about it. Every moment of the day, dear ones, this should be in the back of our minds, what Christ Jesus did for us. How often do we thank Him? I hope we thank Him all the time. Because He did die for you and me.

We read hear a little of the torment that He went through, the mockery, when it says Pilate had scourged Him. There was blood shed there. The soldiers platted a crown of thorns and put it on His head. They put on Him a purple robe (St. John 19:1-2). There was blood shed when they crushed that crown of thorns down on His head. Dear ones, at times when we would go out and we'd walk in the woods and we'd see those thorn trees, those thorns that are long, and pointy, and sharp, that's what I think of when I see those trees. I think of that platted crown of thorns that they crammed down on top of His head. Have you ever been pricked by one of those? They sting. But He loved us.

It says He didn't say a word, He didn't argue with them (St. John 19:9). It tells us in the other scriptures how they spit on Him and they slapped Him. They blindfolded Him and they would slap Him and they'd ask Him to prophesy and say who did it (St. Mark 14:65). Mocking Him. Laughing at Him. Who of us would be willing to do that? It's a question I ask myself, to think about.

And they said, "... Hail, King of the Jews! and they smote him with their hands. Pilate therefore went forth..." St. John 19:3-4. And he told them, he said, "...I find no fault in him." St. John 19:4. He found no fault in Him because there was no fault in Him, dear ones. He was perfect. Not one of us here were perfect, nor shall we ever be until we gain the realms of Heaven above, by the grace of Jesus Christ, by the grace of God the Father. But we need to try. The Word says many times, Be ye perfect, even as I am perfect (St. Matthew 5:48). He pleads with us to try, to strive, to ask Him for grace day by day to obtain, to become overcomers.

But there was a mob there. There was a mob that had delivered Him for jealousy and for envy, for hatred because Jesus Christ came and He brought the truth. He brought the truth of the Word. The hierarchy of the Jewish nation at that time had taken the truth and they had twisted it to make themselves feel good, to bring

praise on mankind and when Jesus Christ came and spoke the truth, it

I think about how many times in my life when I hear the truth, how it cuts. How about each of us? When we sit under the sound of the Word or when in the quietness of our home we open the Word with a prayer on our heart that God will show us where we have erred. And it hurts. And that's good! Because when it hurts, then we'll beg and we'll plead the Father to show us, to help us, to grant us His grace. That pain will humble us, dear ones. We need to ask that day after day. Because as we walk on the face of this earth we will fail. We will come short, because we have an adversary. The same adversary that was alive and well here, when he who entered into Judas, when Judas went out and he made a deal with the Chief Priests. And he sold Jesus for. I believe. it was 30 pieces of silver (St. Matthew 26:15). And if I err not, that was the price of a slave.

And we have that same adversary today. I often wonder what Satan must have felt like. Was he glorying in the fact that Jesus Christ was hanging on the cross? Did he think he finally had won? Approximately 4000 years had transpired since he met Eve in the garden there, and it was his goal ever since that time to tear down mankind and to make them fall and to take them to Hell. And that hasn't changed.

And it was the same way it was there on the cross, at the time of that trial, when he put it into the hearts of those His disciples, as they, I believe it tells us that each one of them said they would follow Him unto the death. Peter was even more bold about it, and Christ said you'll deny me three times before the cock crows in the morning. No, No I won't (St. Mark 14:29-31). But we have the account, don't we loved ones? Satan is so strong. Let's not ever one of us try to fight him by ourselves. God has given us so many weapons to fight him off with. He's given us His Word, He's given us each other. And yet we find among ourselves that we can fight and we can tear down, and we bring strife and then we let it come into our lives, and instead of helping one another we're actually

tearing one another down.

God doesn't want it that way. How many times in the Word does He preach about the church, and does He speak about His children? He says, Be of the same mind (Romans 12:16). Have the mind of me, Christ Jesus (I Peter 4:1). Don't fight among yourselves. He has given us one another.

Let's think about those disciples that walked away, that didn't have enough courage to stand up against the mob that came. Place ourselves in their shoes. Would we have done any better? Dear ones, there may come a time when we have to stand up, strong and bold against Satan. We do in personal ways, every day. But there may come a time in this nation, we have brethren we can read of, we have brethren whom we can speak of that have now come to this country, who have had to face that. That persecution. That which has been delivered by Satan to try to snuff out the church. Let's pray for faith. Let's pray for that assurance that we can understand and we can believe the Word.

Dear ones, we read this account here of Christ's crucifixion. None of us were there. But I would dare say that if we went up and down the aisles in this church, every one here would say that it is true. I don't think there is one person in this room that would deny that Jesus Christ died on the cross for their sins. How about those that are unconverted here? Do you really believe it? Do you believe it enough to take it personally? I hope so. Because He did die for you and for me.

"The Jews answered him, We have a law, and by our law he ought to die, because he made himself the son of God." St. John 19:7. It continues on and it says, "When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he was the more afraid;" St. John 19:8. Pilate obviously had some knowledge of God. We don't know to what extent, but it brought fear in his heart. That he went and he asked him, "...Whence are thou?..." St. John 19:9. Who are you? It says Jesus gave him no answer. Pilate said, ...Speakest thou not unto me? knowest thou not that I have power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee?" St. John 19:10. Pilate was trying to throw his power around there. Yes, he had extreme amount of power among men, but he was not dealing with man. He was dealing with God. He was dealing with His Son Jesus Christ, and Jesus answered and said, "...Thou couldest have no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above..." St. John 19:11.

As I read that, dear ones, I think about our foe. We know that God only allows Satan to go so far (Job 1:12). We read that in the book of Job, and we know that God has the ultimate power. But Satan is running to and fro on this earth. He's seeking those who are willing to listen to him, who are willing to serve him. And once he finds a heart that's not quite right and not on the strait and narrow way, he'll snatch it up. If he sees a void in our life, where an emptiness is there, that we've allowed, we have not taken the opportunity to fill our life full of the Holy Spirit, he sees that void. He'll grab it. He'll take ahold of it. He knows you and I better than we know ourselves.

But the Word also promises us, dear ones, that when we want, if we have the desire in our heart to overcome. that He will not let anything come upon us, but that He'll make a way of escape (I Corinthians 10:13). And we need to look for it. He doesn't want us to fall. It tells us in the Word. He has no pleasure in the death of a sinner (Ezekiel 33:11). But it is his desire that all should come to the knowledge of the truth (I Timothy 2:4). That all should repent. That all should become converted. That all should live an overcoming life. And that He could say, "...Well done, thou good and faithful servant..." to everyone. (St. Matthew 25:21) But he also tells us the truth.

Satan is powerful enough. There are many whom he has deceived, many whom he has just swerved from the truth, just enough. They have a part of the truth. Satan doesn't usually come with a full, outright lie. He mixes it with just enough truth so that it looks good. That's why the Word says so many times, 'take heed', it says 'watch', it says 'Beware!' Because we have an adversary. And he was alive and well at that time when Christ was crucified, and he's alive now.

It says, "...therefore he that delivered me unto thee hath the greater

sin." St. John 19:11. We think about that, dear ones. Our mind automatically goes to Judas Iscariot. But how about me? How about you? Was it not because of you and me that Christ Jesus died? Was it not because of you and me that He had to go to the cross, that He had to give his life? Yes it was.

If we look at the brother or sister next to us, or we look at the friend or the convert next to us, it was for them. What are we willing to give for them? Would we be willing to lay our life down for our brother or sister? Maybe not even...let's think about that in more than a physical way. Let's think about that in a way, dear ones, of our life that we live. Often the Word refers to our life as our conversation. Is our conversation such that we would be willing to give it up for our brother or for our sister? Or for our friend? If we're living an offensive life, if we're living a life that maybe would lead them to sin? Perhaps we're strong enough. The Word would tell us that's our responsibility. We are our brother's keeper. We're our brother's helper. Let us think about that. That's what Christ did for us.

It says, "And from thenceforth Pilate sought to release him..." St. John 19:12. But the power of the mob, they wanted His life. They wanted it, and they said here, "... If thou let this man go, thou art not Caesar's friend: whosoever maketh himself a king speaketh against Caesar." St. John 19:12. Here they were applying a little peer pressure there. Have any of us ever been affected by peer pressure? I don't think there's one in this room that could say we haven't been. Sometimes it's good. So often it's bad. Our friends are doing it, so we're kind of pressed into doing it too. Maybe in our, as growing up, through our high school years we knew the things that our friends were getting involved in were wrong. But we didn't want to look like the odd man out. So we went along. That's how Satan works. One step at a time he brought us into sin. He's still trying to do that today.

It says, He went forth to the place called Golgotha, and they crucified Him with the two malefactors, one on either side. And they placed a sign over his head that said 'JESUS OF NAZARETH THE KING OF THE JEWS'

(St. John 19:19). And those of the Chief Priests said to Pilate, don't put that He is the King of the Jews. Write that 'he said' - I said I was the King of the Jews (St. John 19:21). Because, they wanted to make it clear that Christ had claimed that for Himself. They didn't want to admit that that's who He really was. Sometimes when I read this scripture and I read the superscription here that was written above His cross, 'Jesus of Nazareth,' and what Pilate's answer was, "...What I have written I have written." St. John 19:22, was he coming to the knowledge of the truth? Was he coming to the knowledge that this really was Jesus Christ, the King of the Jews? And not only the King of the Jews, but the King of you and me, the King of all that would come throughout the ages of time that would believe on Him.

"Then the soldiers, when they had crucified Jesus, took his garments, and made four parts, to every soldier a part; and also his coat: now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout." St. John 19:23. And it's those prophesies fulfilled again and again throughout this entire account here. Just hundreds of prophesies throughout the old testament being fulfilled, all coming to this point. And so many more, dear ones, that point to the time when Jesus Christ will come back again. We can read in the end of the Revelation how it says that when He comes back again He's going to have His name written on His thigh that says, "...KING OF KINGS, AND LORD OF LORDS." Revelation 19:16. That once and for all He's going to snuff out Satan's reign.

And the victory can be ours along with Him...if...we are overcomers. If we use the weapons of warfare that He has given us. We heard so much about that in the conference, dear ones, and we look forward to hearing the tapes, those of you that weren't able to go to conference. About the armor of God. The weapons that He has given us to fight against our enemy. He provides all we need. There's no doubt about it. He gives us all the training we want. All the training that we need, it's right here in His Word. All it needs is a willing heart, a willing heart to use it. To fit it to us personally. To defend not only our own selves but to defend our

neighbor, our brother, our sister, our friend, our convert. To help them, to help each other gain eternal life.

He showed his compassion and his love here for his mother as she was standing there and he said unto his mother, "...Woman, behold thy son! Then saith he to the disciple, Behold thy mother!..." St. John 19:26-27. What compassion He had. In the agony that He was in there hanging on the cross, He still was concerned about his loved ones. He was concerned about you and me. And it says that disciple took her unto his own home (St. John 19:27).

Those precious words that we can read. Those words that hold so much power. In verse 30 He says, "...It is finished..." It is finished...the agony that he was going through...it is finished. What else was finished there? The plan of salvation. It was written. It was now complete. It was available for mankind. He had given His life.

And they came to him, because it was the day of preparation before the Sabbath day, they besought Pilate that they could break their legs so they would suffocate (St. John 19:31). But when they came to Jesus Christ, they found they couldn't take His life (St. John 19:33). They couldn't take His life because He had given it up. He had already given up the Ghost. He had laid His life down for you and me.

A precious, precious gift. How much value do we put on the gift of Jesus' blood? Can we put a price on it? Can we even put a value on it? Just think about it. Just think about the power that is in that blood. And let's think about the love that He had there. Let's think about the care and compassion He had. He was thinking about His disciples, those that were on the outskirts looking on. He knew about Peter who went and wept bitterly after he heard that cock crow. Because He knows all things. And we can believe that Jesus' heart wept too. He knows our tears, He knows our battles, He knows our strife, He knows our cares and concerns, He knows when we are hurt physically, spiritually, and He cares! And proof is in this chapter right here that He cares. What further need we?

Solomon knew someday there was going to be a Saviour coming. David knew, Abraham knew, Adam knew. All

through the lineage of Jesus they'd passed that on to their children. But somehow through the ages of time it got a little bit mixed up. But there was always a remnant, dear ones, that knew the truth and they knew it was going to happen. And we can rest assured that as the day of grace continues on that there is going to be a remnant. There is going to be a remnant that knows the truth and they know what we have to do to serve our Lord. That remnant is going to know the truth, and what it takes to obtain eternal life.

Is it our desire, our strong heart's desire today, to be a part of that remnant, that we can gain eternal life? That we can live free from sin and Satan, we can live free from turmoil and trial and temptation and strife for all eternity. Because there is not one of us here that hasn't heard the truth...time and time again. And if we don't live that overcoming life, and we stand before Christ Jesus, it tells us, every knee shall bow, and every tongue shall confess (Romans 14:11). We're all going to be judged individually by Jesus Christ. We're going to be judged by our deeds. Is our name written in the Book of Life? And if we are told that we came short of that mark because of disobedience, or we came short of that mark because we allowed this or that to come into our life when we were instructed not to, and we are turned away...that will be Hell in itself. Just knowing that we knew the truth.

So let's press on, dear ones. "...press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Philippians 3:14. Let's press on. Helping one another, holding one another up, encouraging one another along life's pathway. In love and in compassion. And let's look to this Word. Let's look to the life of Jesus Christ. Let's mirror it with our own. Let's try to pattern our life after the 13th chapter of I Corinthians, which explains Jesus Christ. We call it the love chapter...but that was His life. How are we doing today?

Having spent a recent weekend in northern Alabama, I was moved to include a short history of our church's presence in that area. The initial efforts of ministering Bro. Amos Hartzler, Rittman, Ohio — to spread God's Word — are of great interest. Excerpts are taken from "Marching To Zion."

Athens, Alabama

In the late 1930's minister Amos Hartzler of Rittman, Ohio, initiated efforts which resulted in the formation of an Apostolic Christian presence in northern Alabama. He was inwardly moved by the Scriptural teaching to "go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." He sincerely felt the church should do more in this realm.

His method of reaching people with the Gospel centered on placing advertisements in newspapers offering free Bibles. These advertisements appeared in newspapers in Alabama, Arkansas and Tennessee. The response to his notices was encouraging, particularly from areas in northern Alabama. Each person who responded to his advertisements received a free Bible and a personal letter from Amos Hartzler.

It soon became evident there was a hunger and thirst for God's Word in the Lawrence and Limestone County areas in the extreme northern portion of Alabama. The people who were attracted to the Lord, and to our church, at that time mostly lived in rural areas, and some were very poor. In time, there were four churches established at Athens, Hillsboro, Landersville and Huntsville. The first church was at Hillsboro (1940). A church at Athens soon followed. In 1952, church meetings commenced in Landersville (also called Munk City), and in 1971 a partially completed church was purchased at Huntsville. By 2007, the church at Athens was a part of the Apostolic Christian Church. It had 33 members with 15 in Sunday School. An average of 55 persons attend church services each Sunday. Bro. Mike Moore is the local minister of that congregation.

Those presiding over the Gospel-spreading efforts in Alabama were Elders from the northern states. Some of the first Elders to visit here were Elder Noah Hartzler, Rittman, Ohio (brother of Bro. Amos Hartzler), and Elder Ernest Graf, Sr., Akron, Ohio. Among other leaders who visited Alabama in the early days were Elder Rudy Graf, Akron, Ohio: Elder John Bahler. Rockville, Connecticut; and Elder Noah Schrock, Oakville, Iowa.

At a brother meeting in Cissna Park, Illinois, on November 17, 1949, Elders Noah Bauman, Rittman, Ohio, and Henry Kilgus, Forrest, Illinois, were given the oversight of the Alabama churches. Bro. Kilgus served until November 3, 1962, when heart trouble forced him to relinquish his Alabama duties. During his years of service, he made sixty-five trips to Alabama. Bro. Bauman died on January 29, 1974.

Although he began involvement in Alabama in 1962, Elder David Bertsch, Leo, Indiana, assumed oversight of the Alabama work in 1966. In a twenty-year period, he made 140 trips by automobile and air travel to visit the flocks in Alabama. Many others gave of themselves in a selfless way to move to Alabama and serve the Lord in efforts to expose souls to God's plan of salvation.

When meetings began at Athens, Alabama, they were held where suitable space could be rented. For a time a Legion Hall was rented. Later, the group assembled in an empty store on Main Street using nail kegs and planks for seats, and a large store box for a pulpit.

In 1952, an old Baptist Church building was purchased on North Clinton Street in Athens. This facility included a small apartment north of the sanctuary. John Wagler and family lived here for awhile as did the Lynn Klopfenstein family. In 1976, construction began on a large brick church on the eastern edge of Athens at 15284 Hastings Road. Dedication services were held on June 26. 1977. A significant portion of the cost of this new church was borne by the national Apostolic Christian Church.

Regarding the early worship services held in Athens, Bro. Henry Perry recalled (in a May, 1975, Silver Lining article) how the Gospel drew him to the Lord: "My wife started going to people's homes when Brothers Otto Norr and Matt Wackerle came to Alabama around 1940. Later, some more brothers came down, and the time came when they wanted to have church in our home. Some of those brothers would come out in the fields while I plowed with an old mule. I am so glad these dear brothers kept coming to our home. They just wouldn't give up on me."

In addition to the brick church on Hastings Road, a fellowship center exists north of the church parking lot. A pre-school program is conducted by the Athens church.

Bro. Lavoyd Moore, a native Alabamian, was placed in the ministry in July, 1964. He was ordained Elder on February February 10, 1980, the first resident Elder in Alabama. He passed away in 2001 from colon cancer at age 63.

"Who Gets The Credit"

All human beings like recognition. Children and spouses should be praised for the good things they do. However, when it comes to bringing God glory, the purpose for which we live, we must be careful about expecting credit from others for what we do. Jesus said, "So likewise ye, when ye shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say, We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do." Luke 10:17. What's this? If we do everything which is commanded us in the Bible, shouldn't we be given a little credit? Perhaps Jesus is telling us to serve Him just for the joy of serving Him, not for the recognition, credit, or praise from other human beings. At least, we are told to be humble enough to recognize that even if we do everything commanded, we are only doing our duty, nothing more.

This statement, "We are unprofitable servants," even after doing all, indicates extreme humility, to the point of belittling oneself. By this statement, the Lord Jesus put an end to the idea that we should try to build ourselves up, as if we were somebody. For sure, we should not think more highly of ourselves than we ought to think. Romans 12:3 "For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think."

It is clear then, that we ourselves should never say, and if possible, never even think, that we should take credit for anything we say or do. However, Proverbs 26:2, "Let another man praise thee, and not thine own mouth," indicates that it is all right for me to praise you, and give you credit for all you do, but I should never take credit for anything myself. Therefore, permit me to tell you that you are wonderful and that you should be praised for all you say and do, assuming that it is all good. I tend to be an optimist. Every human being is precious and valuable but don't get puffed up about it.

Scriptures indicate that God is keeping score and He knows who should be given credit for what. II Corinthians 5:10 "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad."

When we appear before the judgment seat of Christ and are told that we get credit for something, what are we going to say? Hopefully we will all say, "I am an unprofitable servant." Why? Because that's what the Bible teaches and we know, that credit for what we are, what we say, and what we do, if it is good, should go to Christ, not us. He bought us and we are His. I Corinthians 6:20 "For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's.

Let's not seek credit; credit belongs to Christ, and to others: never me.
