

Sermon by Bro. Fred Witzig, Indianapolis, IN

Exodus 20

A week and a half ago in Altadena, a brother went through these Ten Commandments in a Bible study. He had us read verse eighteen. The study was more focused on the commandments themselves, but he had us read eighteen. At first, he went around and different people read different verses, and he included eighteen with seventeen. I thought he made a mistake. I thought he meant to tell them just to stop at seventeen. But the young man dutifully read verse eighteen. He said, I had you read eighteen because it indicates how serious God was about these.

Not having been there, not having seen this, we sort of envision the Ten Commandments being in stone. As being a monument. That is often how we treat them in public spaces. It is kind of a monument in marble or something, which is all good and fine. But I think in a certain way we kind of lose the sense of the greatness of what was going on here. That God, as He gave these Ten Commandments, was really serious. As He gave these commandments, it struck fear. The process of giving the commandments struck fear in the people's hearts (Exodus 20:18,19). They were amazed by it.

If you stop and think about it, it would be a pretty incredible thing to be standing at the foot of a hill and have this lightning come down and the thunder and know that some tremendous thing is happening up there. Then have somebody come down with stone tablets with them engraved. It doesn't strike me as something that you do real quick. God having inscribed these on the stone. And he brings them down. This was really serious stuff and God meant it. As He gave His commandments on the mountain, He really meant it. I just appreciate that comment. As God gave them, He did it in a spectacular way that would grab their attention. He said, this is what I want.

A while back I was challenged, in a good way, by the question, are these

things wrong because God said them? Or did He say them because they are wrong? In other words, 'Thou shalt not kill'. Is killing wrong because God just flipped a coindon't kill? So they are wrong? Or did He say them because they were wrong? This group that was listening to this person say this, went back and forth. Some said, well they are wrong because God says it. God says something, it just has to be wrong. He can just say whatever He wants to say. If He says it, they are wrong. It is just how it is.

Other people said, no, there is something intrinsically wrong about killing and these sorts of things and therefore God said it. One person's response, which turned out to be according to the person giving this study, was they are wrong because they violate the nature of God. When God says, Thou shalt not kill, when God says, Thou shalt not commit adultery, when He says, Thou shalt not steal, He said these, not because He just arbitrarily picked out some commandments, dreamed up some commandments and therefore we've got to treat them as wrong. Neither are they somehow just sort of abstractly wrong and therefore God is just telling you what is right and wrong.

God does not murder. God is not unfaithful to His commitments. which is what adultery is. God cannot take something which is not His own. Of course, He owns everything. But He cannot take something which is not His own. God cannot lie. Therefore, these commandments reflect the very nature of God. Therefore, as He, in His spectacular fashion, revealed to the people the Ten Commandments, He was revealing to them His very nature Himself. Taken that way, if you really think about this scenario, the way it was given, it makes me take it a lot more seriously.

We live in an age when we just don't like to tell people right and wrong. I was sitting in a meeting, Franklin College's Five Values, one of them being honesty. So we had this meeting about how we teach students the five values of Franklin. It was actually kind of humorous. Be-

Trust In God's Faithfulness

Writings based on God's Word

"With my mouth will I make known thy faithfulness to all generations" (Psa. 89:1). When David exclaimed that he would speak of God's faithfulness to all generations and show forth His faithfulness every night (Psa. 92:2), he knew that this attribute was something very special for a follower of God. In this article we want to take a look at what God's faithfulness means, and then consider what this signifies in a believer's life.

Faithfulness implies unchangeableness, constancy, and trustworthiness. Jeremiah proclaimed, "Great is thy faithfulness" after stating: "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not." He introduced this teaching on God's faithfulness by saying, "This I recall to my mind, therefore have I hope" (Lam. 3:21-23). Whenever we think about God's faithfulness, it should bring a calming sense of hope to our heart that "all will be well," since God is in control. The Apostle Paul asked, "If God be for us, who can be against us?" (Rom. 8:31).

God's faithfulness is not dependent on what we do or what we think about Him, for we read in 2 Timothy 2:13, "If we believe not, yet he abideth faithful: he cannot deny himself." We note that this attribute is also ascribed to Christ in the New Testament. Jesus is called the faithful high priest (Heb. 2:17), the faithful witness (Rev. 1:5) and the Faithful and True (Rev. 19:11).

So what does God's faithfulness signify in our everyday lives? And what does it mean to trust in God's faithfulness in practical, personal terms?

The next time we are tempted to sin, let us go back to the verse in 1 Corinthians 10:13 where we read that because God is faithful, He "will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." Here we can find assurance that God has given us a way to escape sin, and strength to endure, and that He will do it, because He promised it, and He is to be trusted.

Perhaps there are times in our lives when we are faced with doubts about our faith, doubts about our salvation, or

doubts about the future. At these times let us also go back to Hebrews 10:23 where we read: "Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering; (for he is faithful that promised)." And this faithful God has promised us His salvation and eternal life as well as His peace and assurance as long as we keep our trust and faith in Him. He is the One who holds the future in His hands.

It is undeniable that we Christians must deal with the weights and sins which so easily beset us (Heb. 12:1), and at times Satan would try to get the upper hand in discouraging us in our walk of faith because we have yielded to temptation (1 John 2:1-2). We may feel unable to overcome evil, and unable to do good. In 1 John 1:9 we read: "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." A confession means a giving up of all pleas of self-righteousness and acknowledging guilt without excuse. We are also taught to turn away from sin. "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy" (Prov. 28:13). Because of God's faithfulness and the mercy which is available through Christ's sacrifice, we can be assured of His forgiveness when we continue in faith, confess our sins and apply the scriptural remedy.

Perhaps you feel that you are not growing in your spiritual walk. Take courage, for we read in 2 Thessalonians 3:3, "But the Lord is faithful, who shall stablish you, and keep you from evil." Again, because of God's faithfulness in working patiently with us, we will become established, by His grace. The word "stablish" means to strengthen, set fast, and turn resolutely in the right direction.

Trusting in God's faithfulness means to have a confidence in Him as our Creator and Lord and Master. We can be assured that He holds the future. We can have assurance to know that all things work together for good to them that love God (Rom. 8:28). He alone is worthy of our love and confidence, who has promised us His blessings, His help in persecution and afflictions, and direction in difficulties, enabling us to endure and ultimately to bring us into glory.

At the same time, let us give a note of warning that just as the Lord promised the resurrection of life to those that believe, He also promised eternal damnation to those who die in their sinful state (John 5:29, 8:24). His faithfulness also means that He will surely fulfill these warnings just as He said.

David declared in Psalms 36:5 that "Thy faithfulness reacheth unto the clouds." He experienced God's continual help in his life. And so he said in Psalms 31:1, "In thee, O Lord, do I put my trust; let me never be ashamed: deliver me in thy righteousness." God's faithfulness became a basis for David's confidence and hope of deliverance. In the same way it became a basis for the confidence of Paul in preaching the gospel of Christ (2 Cor. 1:18-20), knowing that what he was preaching was true, and there was no wavering in believing in the promises of God.

The New Testament states several times that "God is faithful" (as in 1 Cor. 1:9), and each time it uses the Greek word Pistos. In other passages of the KJV Bible this Greek word is also translated as "to be trusted," "reliable," "sure" and "true." These passages make it clear that God is dependable, loyal, and very stable in His relationship with us. When He makes a promise, He will never break His word. Because He promises to never leave us or forsake us (Heb. 13:5), we can be assured that He will always be there. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Heb. 13:8). There is a complete constancy in God, and His very attributes are exactly the same as when He first created the heavens and the earth.

God's faithfulness is closely tied to our salvation as well as our spiritual walk. Our hope is built upon the faithfulness of our Lord from the time we believed. "Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it" (1 Thes. 5:24). By trusting in His faithfulness we can have victory over the temptations of Satan, and are given assurance, hope, and confidence to help us in our spiritual journey. "Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and stedfast" (Heb. 6:19).

Bible Distribution

semi-truck load of Bibles is distributed each year by our brotherhood. Even Johann Gutenberg, inventor of the printing press, would be impressed by the speed of modern printing presses and the availability of the Word today. Bibles were painstakingly printed by hand for hundreds of years, one letter at a time with a quill pen. Now knowledge has been increased and there is no end to the publication of books, as prophesied in Daniel 12:4. These advancements in technology have made our extensive Bible Distribution effort possible. "And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal: that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together" (John 4:36).

Needs being met

About a thousand Bibles are sent into prisons each month. Most of these are part of the Berean Bible Study Program. Bibles and pocket testaments go to nursing homes, hospitals, carnival workers, truck stops, gas stations, or anywhere our brethern are led to make them available. Bibles are placed in food packages and sent everywhere there is a need. Our brothers respond to many needs after disasters strike and place Bibles in the homes of the victims.

Three thousand Spanish Bibles are sent to Mexico each year with the medical teams. More are carried to Mexico by work teams. A growing number of Spanish Bibles are distributed around our churches and into prisons. Egermeier Bible Story books and both 25 and 101 Favorite Bible Story books are also distributed, some to young people who had never heard that they have

a soul. Some of these materials are given to young mothers, children, and others. We also provide tapes, CD's, and large print Bibles.

Sharing what Christ has given to us

"Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life" (John 4:14).

The Apostle Paul is exhorting us to share the Word with one another. Printing presses make this a lot easier. So do trucks and airplanes. Many of us were blessed with loving parents who both taught and showed us the Word by their example. We have been surrounded by loving church family most of our lives. What a great contrast this is to many who have grown up with little training or proper example. Satan is a master enslaver and ties people up with deceit and addictions. One small New Testament can help us keep our focus as we watch for someone with whom to share.

Thirst for the truth in our time

"And I have declared unto them thy name, and will declare it: that the love wherewith thou hast loved me may be in them, and I in them" (John 17:26).

We are living in what is called the Post-Christian Era. Many people do not believe in God or teach their children anything of faith. Many people profess some belief but are unconcerned about their soul's welfare. They faithfully lock their doors and pay all the monthly bills, but eternity is not on their mind. Yet there is a great emptiness in

their souls and they are continually searching to fill that void.

Opportunity to help

"Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of scornful. But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night" (Psalm 1:1-2).

Bibles cost a few dollars and thousands of Bibles cost thousands of dollars. In a few years we spend nearly a million dollars purchasing Bibles and Bible story books for distribution. God has provided and our Brotherhood has been willing to share; their dollars have opened the way to distribute Bibles to many people.

We pray that these books will be read, and the will of God revealed to many. As this effort is continued, we consider not only the hearts we wish to touch but our own heart as well. Jesus compared heaven to a treasure found in a field and a man sold all that he had to purchase the field and possess the treasure. Can you imagine him running to claim the land and insure he will receive the treasure? There is opportunity for all of us to help in the important work.

"It's not what we have or how much we spend,

It's what we give away that will count in the end.

The oil in our vessel is gathered drop by drop,

When we end our last mile, only then can we stop.

So cast your bread upon the water, for kindness does pay,

It will come back to you in a wonderful way."



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

Eastern Europe

Although it is now 19 years since the oppressive communist regimes fell in Eastern Europe, our struggling brethren, the Nazareans, continue to face ongoing challenges.

The economic situation is growing steadily worse, not better, with inflation raging, and uncertainties in governments as well as in the daily lives of everyone.

The European Committee continues to monitor the situation very closely, as three groups have gone into Eastern Europe in the last several months, and constant communication is maintained. Quite clearly, without the faithful and loving support of our American brethren, the elderly in particular would find it hard to have food and heat at the same time.

Several years ago Antioch was able to purchase a number of chain saws, which remain the property of the corporation, but are being used by individual brethren to cut firewood. Needs are great, although the people reduce the temperature in the homes, heating only the area in which they are living, so that they can have enough money to buy food.

Fuel prices are rising rapidly everywhere in the world, and incomes are not keeping pace at all. Old sisters living in the apartments built by the communists cannot cope with rent and utilities, much less have enough to buy food.

Our joint international effort, through the corporation known as Antioch, has many programs in place to address these needs. Food packages are made up each month with supplies purchased locally. At this time, we have the good fortune

of being able to buy in volume from large stores much like our Sam's club. This has allowed us to keep this program going in spite of rising food costs. This, too, is funded with restricted donations specified for this purpose.

The bicycles purchased last year have had an impact upon their daily lives, becoming more valuable as gasoline and diesel costs go up. Auto fuel is now over \$7.00 a gallon, so travel obviously is reduced only to that which is necessary.

Heating Crisis Exists
Since nearly all Nazareans
are poor, they depend upon
us for assistance in winter
heating. Due to the current
situation, there is a shortfall
of \$70,000 needed for this
purpose. The brethren who
have the responsibility for the
various countries feel this is
a real need, and ask for your
support to help our suffering
brethren cope with the com-

ing winter.

At this time there are four honey projects functioning, with a processing facility being installed at the Antioch compound. This has capability of processing many tons of honey per year, which is a great help to enable our suffering brethren to become more self-reliant, and less dependent upon outside help. This has always been the stated goal of this endeavor, with future prospects looking good at this time.

Although there is no governmental oppression, the archenemy of our Lord's work never ceases to cause discord wherever possible, and this struggle continues to go on, as it

does everywhere men seek to serve God. Each nation and ethnic group seems to have their own difficulties with all trying to do their best.

Most Nazarean families are large, often with more than ten children, which brings its own problems in trying to keep the family functional. One of the big ways our US brethren can help in this situation is to help purchase school supplies. Research has revealed that costs for each child are about \$50 per school year. Few families have incomes of more than \$500/month, meaning that a family of ten needs one full month's income simply for school supplies.

Last year Antioch purchased school supplies by the pallet, cutting costs a lot, and this seemed to be a big help. It seems good to repeat and expand this program for this year. Therefore, the European Committee has approved the purchase of these supplies, with hopes of receiving enough restricted funds to finance this effort, not only in Romania, but all across Eastern Europe where these needs exist. Numerous Sunday Schools participated in supporting "Project Bicycle," which was highly successful, so it is hoped this will also be given consideration for this effort, which is called "Heft Project." Heft in the German language means "notebook" thus the reason for that name. This is a family-to-family project that hopefully will bring support from our Brotherhood.

In the past year we had to make some changes, including wage increases that we have been putting off. These were necessary to attract and keep qualified staff and to pay a fair wage to current staff. These changes have caused a significant increase in our financial needs. We are grateful to be a part of a church and people with generous hearts and a willingness to be used.

We know and believe that it is God that gives the increase and we have seen this year after year. Please continue to pray for God to raise up His people who are able to provide the necessary support for this work to which He has called us.

God blesses any gift given of a willing and generous heart. He taught us that He is not impressed with actual amounts but He is thankful when we give because we feel moved and as we are able.

The Bible study guide, "The Walk of Repentance" tells the story of one of the apostles, Andrew:

According to the early writer Jerome, Andrew went about preaching Christ all across the Roman Empire. While in Achaia, he was called in by Aegeas, the governor of the region, to answer for his actions before a council of officials. He was accused by the council of attempting to persuade men to join the outlawed "sect" called Christians. Andrew readily admitted to this and went on to say that the deities the Romans worshipped were nothing more than devils.

The proconsul, infuriated by Andrew's comments, warned him that if he continued to preach such things he would soon be fastened to a cross with all speed. According to Jerome, Andrew replied, "I would not have preached the honor and glory of the cross, if I feared the death of the cross." Aegeas immediately sentenced him to be crucified.

Andrew, going to the place of crucifixion, didn't shrink back nor show any fear. But out of his heart came the following exultation: "O cross, most welcome and long looked for! With a willing mind, joyfully and desirously, I come to thee, being the scholar of Him which did hang on thee: because I have always been thy lover, and have coveted to embrace thee."

How easy it is for us to back down from the truth in our present-day culture when truth is often tossed aside as an old-fashioned notion. When working with kids and parents, it is many times easier to "sugar-coat" the boldness of the gospel and soften the sting of the truth, so that we won't suffer the "persecution" of those so affected by today's culture. I am challenged by the stories of those who, like Andrew, have been persecuted, even to the point of excruciating deaths, yet did not shrink back. Much the opposite, they spoke all the more boldly and when martyred because of it, they rejoiced.

"Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong." (II Corinthians 12:10)



Love Languages in Marriage -Loving Well (Part #2)

In last month's issue, we introduced the idea of love languages in marriage and explored the first two love languages: Words of Affirmation and Quality Time. In this month's edition, we continue the topic by learning more about the final three love languages: Gifts, Acts of Service, and Physical Touch.

3. Gifts.1

From the beginning of time, our heavenly Father has revealed himself as a generous giver of good things: "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above" (James 1:17). God has given us his Son (John 3:16), the beauty of Creation (Genesis 2:15), and gifts of the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:4). Proverbs 17:8 tells us that "a gift is as a precious stone in the eyes of him that hath it." An individual with the primary love language of Gifts sees gifts as visual symbols of thoughtfulness and expressions of love. Gifts can be purchased, found, or made; and the price of the gift is usually of little regard. Small or large, gifts are appreciated when they are given as genuine tokens of love and give evidence of consideration.

Examples of giving Gifts

to your spouse include:

Finding a picture of the two of you, framing it and giving it as an unexpected gift.

Making a homemade greeting card.

Putting thought into anniversary, birthday, and Christmas gifts. Ask close friends and family for ideas and try to recall things your spouse mentioned that he or she would like.

Finding opportunities for spontaneous, unexpected gifts such as flowers (hand-picked or bought), or a refreshing beverage on a hot day.

Hiding a small gift or note in your wife's purse or in something your husband takes to work.

NOTE: Buying things for your spouse without showing interest in or spending time with him/her, etc. will seem like you are trying to buy love. Remember that spouses with a Gifts love language feel loved because of the thoughtfulness that the gifts reflect.

4. Acts of Service.²

Jesus gave us the example of being a servant. In Matthew 20:26-28, He was clear that we, as His followers, are supposed to have servants' hearts: "...whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister; And whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant: Even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." Individuals with an Acts of Service love language feel loved when their spouses

display a servant attitude by their actions. You can express love to a spouse with this love language by helping out with everyday tasks/chores. This will include acts done "on the spur of the moment" as well as times when you plan to set aside time to help out. Acts of Service require various degrees of time, energy, and effort; however, the key is performing them out of love. Also important is receiving them out of love, and not out of a sense of entitlement. Jesus provided us with a clear illustration of expressing love in an Act of Service. He humbly took the role of a servant and washed his disciples' dirty, calloused feet (John 13:1-10). Jesus performed this act not out of obligation, but out of love and desire.

Examples of giving

Acts of Service to your spouse include:

When your spouse requests a chore to be done, trying to get it done before he or she has to repeat the request.

Getting up a little earlier than normal to do one of your spouse's duties he or she normally does in the morning. For example, if your spouse usually makes the coffee in the morning, take on that job once in a while and then prepare him or her a cup just the way they like it.

Washing your spouse's car and filling it up with gas.

Offering to run errands for your spouse. Taking the initiative to clean up a room in the house or do some yard work outside.

Sorting through some of the boxes or piles of stuff that have been neglected for a while.

Working with your spouse on one of his or her regular tasks such as scrapbooking or working on the car.

NOTE: An attitude on the part of the giver or receiver of the Act of Service that radiates "you owe me for this" is not appropriate. Also, an attitude of "I'll do it, but I don't like it" doesn't qualify for Acts of Service. Your attitude is the key. Also, Acts of Service shouldn't be used as a way to get something for yourself. That is, don't just help your spouse when you are trying to get on his or her good side so you can then get him or her to go along with your plan on something. Remember that the purpose of Acts of Service is to express love to your spouse.

5. Physical Touch.³

Jesus understood the power of touch. He took the time to hold the young children that were brought to him. Jesus "put his hands upon them, and blessed them" (Mark 10:16). Also, even though He had the power to heal without physically touching, He took that extra step with many of the people that He healed (e.g., Matthew 8:3, 15; 9:29). Hugs, kisses, and other loving touches are appreciated by nearly everyone. However,

for someone with the Physical Touch love language, physical reminders are the most important messages of love. If your spouse has this love language, you must learn from him or her what things he or she appreciates the most. Also, your spouse may have preferences for certain types of touch that he or she finds most appropriate when you are home alone versus out in public. For people who speak the Physical Touch love language, drawing close physically parallels drawing close emotionally. Expressions of Physical Touch may be as simple as a hand on the shoulder or may be as complex as a massage or physical intimacy.

Examples of showing love with Physical Touch include:

Making touch a part of your daily routine, hugging or kissing when leaving for the day or coming back together.

Learning how to give back rubs or massages in a way your spouse enjoys.

Putting your arm around your spouse when sitting next to him or her.

Holding hands or linking arms: while praying, when walking side by side, when you are sitting by each other.

NOTE: Even within marriage there are appropriate and inappropriate ways to touch. Make sure that you are not touching in ways that seem intrusive or uncomfortable for your spouse. Don't confuse the Physical Touch love language with being intimate. Most physical touches are simple reminders of love that do not lead to physical intimacy.

Learning about each other's love language

Remember that your spouse will most likely respond best to a combination of all of the love languages even though he or she is likely to have one or two that are most important. Don't be surprised if you and your spouse have different love languages; this is very common. Your goal should be to continually learn about your spouse's love language(s) and to teach your spouse about your love language(s). Expressing love in marriage is part of an ongoing process. It is not a "one-time-fix" or saved only for special occasions. An attitude of, "I told him/her I loved him/her when I married him/her, he/she should just "know" it now. Why do I have to keep saying/showing it over and over?" is neither Christ-like nor healthy in marriage. Making the effort to express love to your spouse in the ways that are most important to him or her is a true act of love and is honoring to Christ and your spouse.

cause the discussion was, how do we get them to think about honesty without defining honesty for them, letting them come up with their own definition of honesty? We don't want to impose on them our values. So, we want you to think about honesty but we want you to define it yourself.

We talked about cheating in the classroom. We all know what cheating is. Frankly, I don't have a problem of imposing my view of cheating on the students. In fact, no professor does. Yet we aren't really going to call it that. We do this little dance around, pretending like we are really teaching the students, but we don't really want to teach them because we don't want to impose anything. In consequence, these values become completely meaningless. Yet, that is kind of our age, we don't want to impose anything on anybody. Until it hurts us. When they cheat on me, I am not going to accept a student saying, well, my definition of plagiarism does not include what you just said.

To me being honest means to download....you know there is a website called Cheat. Cheathouse.com. You can download essays. Actually, the website was called Cheat. Cheat! It noted in there, we have come under a lot of criticism. Yeah, no kidding! But maybe somebody's definition of honesty does not include downloading something like that. So am I suppose to accept that, as a professor? 'Oh, I'm so sorry! My definition says vou shouldn't download from the internet but since you do and that's part of your definition, well then I have to let you go.' Of course not! We'd never do that. So we play this fiction.

God doesn't play the fiction. That's what's so remarkable about the whole thing. God doesn't play that fiction. He doesn't do that. He doesn't say, 'Thou shalt not commit adultery. Of course, I want you all to sort of just define it for yourself. Come to your own idea of adultery.' No, no, no. That's why we have the Scripture. To tell us what adultery

is. God is really very serious about it. Because it's His very nature Himself. So as we think about these, let's take them seriously also.

It's part of the Old Testament. We often think the Old Testament laws, that's the old thing. That's the 'Old' Testament. But Jesus upheld these and the early church upheld these. And if they really do reflect the very nature of God, and God does not change, then just because this is part of the Old Testament, the old law, does not mean that we can just dispense of them. We must take them in the sense that they are given.

Interestingly, I had never seen this done before. It was really neat. This brother, a week and a half ago, he found Scriptures in the New Testament which reflect on the Ten Commandments. The most obvious one, where Jesus was healing somebody on the Sabbath and He said the Sabbath was created for man, not man for the Sabbath (St. Mark 2:27). Or adultery, you have heard it said, Thou shalt not commit adultery. But I say if you look on her to lust after her, you have already committed adultery (St. Matthew 5:28). Thou shalt not murder, but I say if you hate your brother, you are murdering (I John 3:15). So Jesus commented on virtually all of these. Some of them were a little bit of a stretch. But it works for me. Where he is commenting on the original Ten Commandments and flushing them out and helping us really get the sense of it. It was a really worthwhile thing.

"I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage." Exodus 20:2. It is interesting because then He gives them some rules. In America, we often think of rules as being bondage. Sometimes they are. We talk about the government that governs least governs best. The government that governs best governs least. Something like that. Statement that may have come in some shape or form from Thomas Jefferson. It is our cultural ethos, that the fewer laws we have, the

better, because laws mean bondage.

God starts off here, I brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. Isn't that interesting. I am going to give you these rules and I want you to know I am not the God of bondage. I am the God of deliverance from bondage. Paul repeats this in the New Testament. as he talks about the Christian is really free (Roman 8:2)! We live in freedom! But what does that mean? We can't understand freedom as meaning simply doing as we wish! For then all we are doing is living in bondage to our flesh. Freedom means we are free to follow God! We are made, we are designed, we are fashioned to worship God and to worship Him only. We are made, we are designed, our purpose, our place in this life is to worship God. If we can worship God, the more we worship God, the freer we are.

We design things in our society. We design things. We make things for certain purposes. This may not be a very good analogy; I think of a sports car. Every once in a while I see someone driving a sports car and they are driving fifty on the interstate. I think, here you are driving a Corvette. What are you driving fifty for? I can do that in my Cameron. I don't need to spend eighty thousand dollars on a Corvette to drive fifty. What do we say? Set it free. Don't we say that? Set that car free! What does it mean? It was made to cruise. It was made to go really fast. Maybe that is a poor example but we use that term, right? When something is used for the ultimate of what it was designed for, we say, set it free. It is free. It is doing what it was supposed to do. Driving fifty to a Corvette is like bondage, right? It is bondage! Set it

We are made to worship God! We often don't. We start worshipping our self. God says, look, I am going to free you from that bondage! I am going to set you free to do what you were really made to do! This is what you were made to do. This is what you were made for! The problem is, is sometimes we don't sense that be-

cause we have been corrupted by sin. Our bodies have been corrupted and bent out of direction toward God and direction toward self service. Because of that, we don't have peace. We sin as we grow older and we follow the flesh. We sense that war that Paul talked about. We know what is right. We know how we should be living and yet our flesh keeps taking us the other way. There is a war inside of me. I know what is right and I want to do what is right and yet my flesh is just constantly yanking me the other way! (Romans 7:14-25)

Peace comes when our body lines up with our Spirit. Peace comes when we are living the way that we are supposed to be living. God, in His graciousness, then says, now, I am going to tell you. I am going to tell you, this is what you are supposed to do. This is what you are made for. So walking in obedience then brings us peace. We are free. We are at peace. Because we in a sense, are doing what God has designed us to do.

So these Ten Commandments are not ten bondage rules. They are not ten things that God, in His mischievous or His evil diabolical sense is going to say, ha! I am going to reach down and I am going to force them this way or that way. No. God, who is truth and life, says, this is what is truth and life. I don't like so don't you like. I am not unfaithful in my commitments. So you don't be unfaithful in your commitments. I don't serve stupid purposes. I don't serve dumb purposes. So don't you serve dumb purposes. I don't make something out of some burnable thing, some mortal thing that is going to go away. I don't fashion something and then give it more honor than it should. Neither should you. All of these things reflect God Himself. The more we follow them, the more we bring our life into line with His commands, the more we know Him and the more at peace we are. Because we are doing what we are made to do. We are doing what God has made us to do.

So He says, "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." v.3. Thou

shalt have no other gods before me. Isn't that interesting. I wonder what that means. No other gods before me. What is a god, anyway? What is a god? Thou shalt have no other gods before me. What is a god?

I think back then people perceived God or the gods as the powers that made the world go. I think in the context of this age and this society, a god was something that just did things in the world. That threw lightning bolts down. That made the rivers rise and fall. That drew the sun across the sky. Because of this, those who did not know the true God, worshipped a whole bunch of gods. There must be a god that pulls the sun across the sky. Or the sun itself is a god that flies across the sky. There is another god that keeps the moon up there, holds it up there and makes it go across. When your hut gets hit by lightning, the god of lightning got mad at you.

So there are gods all over the place. To worship them was simply a way to keep them off your back. You are here in this world surrounded by all these forces, all these powers. You don't really want to get hit by lightning. So you worship the god of lightning to make sure he stavs away. If you make him mad, he will throw a bolt down and fry you. You don't want to get fried so you offer some sacrifices so he stays away. Of course there is almost an infinite number of powers that govern the world. We call them laws of nature now. But back then they perceived them as gods, individual gods. So they have a whole bunch of different gods.

Of course, then they added to the phenomena the fact that different peoples had different gods. Well, there is a god of this area and a god of that area. A god of this people or that people. You see this in the Old Testament different times, where people say, oh, you have to stay away from 'the God of Israel'! As though God Himself was just simply 'the God of Israel', and just concerned Himself with the people of Israel. Or the god of the Egyptians. Or the god of these people or those people. Everyone has

their own little set of gods that they are worried about.

What do you do with these gods? You sacrifice to them. You do things for them. You try to obey them. You try not to make them mad! So they treat you right. In a sense, you try to manipulate them so they would treat you right.

He says, Thou shalt have no other gods before me. He reveals Himself, His nature and what He wants, in these verses and in later ones. In this chapter and through these first five books, and really through the Scripture, He reveals Himself as somebody different. Somebody different than that. First of all, He is not constrained. He says, Thou shalt have no other gods before me. I am the One. In fact, as you go on, He says, hear, oh Israel. The Lord thy God is one! One! You worship one God. As you go through the Scripture, He makes it so clear, not only is it that I am the top God, it is that I am the only God. So there is only one.

As you read through here, we get the sense of other things. For instance, the next one, I am not a graven image (v. 4). You think that fire is bad. So what do you do? You make some sort of idol that looks like fire. You think that a bull is really strong and powerful and you could get gored by a bull. So what do you do? You make a god that looks like a bull. I am not like that, He says. Don't make me into that kind of thing. Don't make me into something that can get burned. Don't make me into something that you fashioned yourself.

Several times in the Scripture, He talks about how people will take a piece of wood. They'll use half of it for fire wood and the other half of it to make a god out of it! Stop and think about this. One half goes in the fire and gets burned up. The other one you make a god out of it? It can't be a god. Come on, think about this. I am not a physical thing like this. I am transcended. I am above all of this. I created all this but I am above all this. And there is no other. This is

a profound thing!

As I sit here preaching, I notice that some people are fading out. Perhaps because - I know, we already know this. We already know. God is the only one. You know what? This is a huge thing! This is a huge thing! Especially for these kind of people right here. If you imagine that you had to please five hundred different gods and there is a god for the lightning and there is a god for the thunder and there is a god for the floods and a god for the rain, and a god for the sun and a god for everything else, and all of a sudden God says, don't worship any of those things, you worship me only, that takes faith! That takes faith! That takes faith that in fact, there are no other gods. Because if there is a god of lightning and you quit worshipping him, you're fried. You're done. You better be persuaded there is only one God!

How do you, sitting here falling asleep, how do you know there is only one God? Maybe there is another god out there and we are not worshipping him. Maybe so. How do you know it? It takes a certain amount of faith. In the revelation of the Scripture, I am very confident there is only one God. But the point is, we say, yeah I know, we already know this. But at this time, this was huge. There was no other god. Don't you dare worship anything else. Not only 'don't you dare', but the fact is, why would you? It's bondage. I am leading you out of bondage. Why worry about and stress about and sacrifice for a god that didn't even exist? Dumb. So God says, don't do that. Worship one God, I know that it's a step of faith, but worship one God. Only me. And I don't look like everything else.

The early Christians got in big trouble. One of the reasons why the church incurred persecution the first few centuries is because they didn't worship a physical object. The Romans did. They would go into a Christian church and they would say, 'where is your god? We don't see a god. Where is the god? We are in

your temple. Where's the god?' 'He is invisible. He is transcendent.' 'Oh, you are an atheist.' They actually accused Christians of being atheists because they didn't have a physical thing to kneel down before. 'You must be an atheist. You don't believe in gods.' 'Yes, we do. He is transcendent.' 'No you don't. There is nothing there. I don't see it. Show me your god.' 'I can't show you. He is above this. He is not a dumb piece of stone.' 'Well you must not...' They couldn't get it in their brain that God is transcendent. That God does not look like this. These are profound verses! Ones to wake up for!

Think for just a few seconds - and then go back to sleep - but for a few minutes, grasp the historical impact of what He is saying. We're used to that. In fact, to be honest with you, I think any time we get used to something in Scripture, we suffer for it. Anytime something becomes, 'yeah, the usual, I know that', we are going to suffer for it. Cause the next challenge is, do you really worship this God? What does it really mean to worship this God? What does it mean to worship Him?

Nobody brought in calves to be sacrificed today. Are you sure we didn't need a calf here? That's how people have been doing it for centuries, all over the world. For a millennia. Bring a calf. Bring a sheep. Bring a goat. Bring a pigeon. Bring a duck or a goose. Bring them in here. How do you know God doesn't want that? How do you know? All the other so called gods wanted them. How do you know that our God doesn't? How do you know the one, true, living God doesn't? How do you know? Well He says not. Okay, so He says, don't worship me with ducks and that sort of thing. So how do you worship Him?

I know. Through what we call 'relationships'. Just stick with me here for a couple of minutes. We go from an age where God is all around and gods are all over the place. You have to do all sorts of things to keep those gods at bay, to make sure they don't ruin your life. If you can manipulate

them to make your life better, then you are even better.

God comes and says, I am not like that. I'm not like that. I'm not an object. But He retains some of the worship. You will come and you will bring calves. You will sacrifice things to me. I accept that as worship. If you, in faith, in obedience to me, in a desire to worship me, bring calves and sacrifice those calves, I will honor that. That is worship. That is one aspect of worship to me. But you only have one God. You do it this way. This is how you sacrifice these things. If you are obedient, that is worship.

Then as you go through the Scripture, you get to the prophets and what do the prophets say? You know what? Here is a secret. God didn't want your calves. He wanted your heart. That's what He wants. Go ahead and offer those calves, but be aware it is the condition of your heart. You don't go out there and sin and do however you want and then just come in here and offer sacrifices and ...that's good! That's like it used to be. No. God doesn't want your calves. He wants your heart. You sacrifice from your heart.

Then you go to the New Testament. What happens? The sacrifices stop. Because of Jesus Christ, He fulfills those sacrifices. No longer do we bring things and offer them on an altar. Now the Scripture says, look, you don't have to do all of that. What you do is you worship Him in the Spirit and in truth. You worship Him in Spirit and in truth. Okay. So now we are that far. People still perceived that God was all around. There is only one God but He controls everything.

You can read diaries of a couple hundred years ago. It's really amazing and fascinating stuff. The diary of Samuel Sewall. He is a Christian colonist in the Massachusetts, New England area. He wrote this really great diary in which he talked about life as it was happening around him. It was very evident that he perceived the hand of God in so many things all around him.

A better one, Joslin, his first or last name, I can't remember. It's been longer since I read that one. Everything that happened he would interpret as an act of God. To where he would say things like, he would write in his diary, this morning my daughter got sick. It must be that I haven't been praying hard enough. My business suffered today. I think it is because I am not a godly enough father. I made more money this week. God is blessing me. It could be because I am reading the Bible more.

You see things in diaries like that. Things like, somebody's house gets hit by lightning. We had a neighbor get hit by lightning. We go over and say, I'm so sorry. Can I help you? You console them. Back then you would walk up to them and say, you made God mad! What did you do? Confess it. You did something wrong. Admit it because God threw lightning down and hit you. There is only one God but He still is very much involved that way.

Then you move through the seventeen hundreds. What happens? You get this idea that, actually, there is a God, but He designed the world that functions by itself. What happens is lightning is just a natural phenomenon, governed by the laws of physics. And I believe that. But a consequence of that is God becomes more distant.

Now here we are in the year 2008. Who is God? Who really is God? You're sick, you go to a doctor. Your house gets hit by lightning, you get a contractor to get it fixed back up again. Have insurance to repay it and it's just too bad. Your tree falls over on your house. That wasn't God. It was the fact that my tree was dead. I should have had it taken care of. I got sick. What was it, God making me sick? No, it was probably because I did this when I was young and it affects me now. Or I should be eating better and I didn't. It's all natural. We can explain everything by nature now.

In other words, what I am trying to say is, God is becoming more and more distant. You know what I am

saying? I think as Christians, sometimes, I wonder, as American Christians, if God isn't just sort of a useful thing now. What is Christianity? We say Christianity is a relationship. That's nice. That's manageable. It's a relationship. It's not a religion. Religion is bad. Now we say, it's a relationship. Yes, it is but what kind of relationship is it?

I like the word 'religion'. I come up with these books I'd like to write but I never do. I probably never will. But I like to come up with the titles of them anyway. I'd like to write a book with the title 'Bring Back Religion; Why American Christians Need Religion'. The reason is because of what we are talking about right here. God has become an innocuous relationship. Somebody irrelevant to how I live day by day. And I excuse it by saying, well, I'm saved by grace and He's my friend. He's also the God who came down on a mountain and He shook the mountain and He threw lightning down and freaked the people out! To where they said, don't let Him talk to me anymore (v. 19). It's the same God! He's not a fuzzy little, cute little thing that we just kind of sing half hearted songs to. He's God! He deserves our worship.

Worship should not be constricted; 'Oh, I don't have to bring cows, I don't have to do that. Oh, these are the laws, I am not under the law'. You know what religion is? Religion is how you live out your relationship with God. Religion is when you get up in the morning and you guide your life by what He wants you to do! That's religion. Religion means you seek after Him by reading of Him and learning of Him. Religion

means when you reach a point in your day when you know you should be doing something and you don't want to do it but you do it anyway, because He's God and He deserves your obedience. That's religion. There's nothing wrong with it.

We need the relationship. But out of that relationship needs to come a whole life. Which is what God was wanting right here. He doesn't need the calves anymore. Thank the Lord He doesn't need calves anymore! Literally, thank Jesus Christ He doesn't need calves anymore. But what does that mean? We come in here and we just go half hearted in our worship? Because, after all, He doesn't need calves. What does that mean? I can sit here and fall asleep? No! It doesn't matter. I can fall asleep. It doesn't really make any difference. In the whole scheme of things, you are not going to be condemned to hell if you fall asleep in church. I am well aware of that or I would be condemned already. BUT, I can't sit there and say, 'it doesn't matter. I am saved by my relationship with Christ. I don't know Him very well. It's kind of like a distant cousin. Second cousin twice removed. But I've got a relationship with Him!'

He's God! He's still God. He needs to be the all encompassing purpose of our life. We need to be forming our days in worship in honor of Him. Seeking Him. Desiring to know Him. Keeping our eyes on Him. On no other gods but only on Him. Worshipping Him and worshipping as our God. May God give us the grace to do so.

In 1978 (thirty-years ago) the Gridley, Illinois, and Roanoke, Illinois, Young Groups combined their efforts to compile a 16-page booklet of interviews with elderly brothers and sisters in those two congregations. Favorite songs, verses and sayings formed the core of this booklet entitled, "For Where Your Treasure Is, There Will Be Your Heart Also." (Luke 12:34)

Many of these brothers and sisters (perhaps all) are now gone onto their reward. Very likely most of them were taken up in the church during the 1920's, 1930's and 1940's, and sometimes their responses reveal the mindset of that era.

Roanoke Brothers and Sisters

Anna Hernfeld listed her favorite Bible verse: "The Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." (Isaiah 7:14)

Her words of advice? "I know the Bible is true. Some people don't think it is, but I do. I believe we can say we believe this, too."

Ellen Siebenthal's favorite verse was "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." (Psalm 46:1)

Lloyd and Cynthia Aeschleman gave their favorite saying: "What sunshine is to flowers, smiles are to humanity. There are trifles to be sure—but scattered along life's pathway, the good they do is inconceivable."

The Light Of Hope

"Dead To Self"

When the Lord Jesus Christ came to earth, it was a big adjustment for Him. A hymn writer describes it in this way, "Out of the ivory palaces, into this world of woe." At the age of twelve He stayed in the temple in Jerusalem and visited with the teachers there. When Mary and Joseph came searching for Him, concerned for His safety, He replied, "How is it that ye sought me? Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" When Christ was 30 vears of age, He began His ministry by saying, "Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matthew 4:17. After that He healed people, taught the people about God, and predicted that He would die to pay a ransom for all. Matthew 20:27, 28, "And whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant: even as the Son of Man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." It was

a big change for Christ to move from heaven to earth, but He adjusted.

People resist change. Some things can only be explained by the word, CUSTOM. We may say, "We like what we are used to and we do not want to change even if your suggestion is an improvement and Biblical." I am not advocating change for the sake of change, nor am I advocating any change which moves us farther away from what the Bible teaches. But changes that are good, we must adjust to, especially changes that help us to be more spiritual.

It was a struggle for Christ to adjust to the idea of bearing all our sins on the cross, and to be reconvinced that it was the Father's will. But He adjusted, and went all the way to Calvary for us.

Peter was a fisherman. It was his means of a livelihood. The change in lifestyle from being a fisherman to following Jesus through the countryside, was tremendous. But he adjusted.

The Apostle Paul was a persecutor of the Christians until he met Christ on the road to Damascus. He became a Christian himself and preached the Gospel to many. This was a big change, but he adjusted.

My wife, Lois, and I, have spent over 54 years together here in Japan. We are acclimated and can speak the language. For us, stress from society is almost zero. In our church, we do not have to be so dressed up. Men members wear white shirts and neckties out of respect for God, but friends often come pretty much as they are. In a small church you are thankful for anyone who comes to church, even if they do not wear a white shirt and a necktie. On November 1 we moved into Skylines in Peoria, Illinois. America will be different, but with God's help through your prayers, we will adjust.
