Sermon by Bro. Todd Graf, Akron, OH

Psalm 81 and St. Luke 2:1-40

Greetings dear ones, in the most precious name of Jesus. We sang a hymn this morning, if I could just reflect on the one verse that we sang. It was in the 'Morning Hymn' (Zion's Harp # 166, v. 6).

Come then, Lord of life eternal, Step into our midst, we pray: Help that we may not be merely Hearers of Thy Word today. To our teacher, O, be near; Bless the children gathered here; May we thrive in fullest measure, And Thy heart in us find pleasure!

How well that expressed our desire for the Lord to come, the Lord of life eternal, and to step into our midst. It also instructed us that we need help, not to be merely hearers of the Word today. It was a prayer unto our teacher to be near. Bless the children gathered here. Lastly, may we thrive in fullest measure and Thy heart in us find pleasure. Doesn't that so well express the desire of our heart as we gather around the Word of truth.

In the Psalm, we were instructed and encouraged to sing aloud unto God our strength and make a joyful noise unto the God of Jacob. To take a psalm and bring hither the timbrel and pleasant harp with the psaltery. To keep the solemn feast for this was a statute in Israel and the law of the God of Jacob. This he ordained in Joseph for a testimony, when he went out through the land of Egypt: where I heard a language that I understood not. I removed his shoulder from the burden: his hands were delivered from the pots. Thou calledst in trouble, and I delivered thee; I answered thee in the secret place of thunder: I proved thee at the waters of Meribah. (Psalm 81:1-7). We are reminded here in this Psalm, perhaps a number of years and generations after the time of the deliverance from Egypt, that the children of Israel remembered well from whence they were delivered. They were instructed to keep that solemn feast, for it was a statute in Israel and a law.

They were once a year to take the firstling from the flock, a lamb. They were to sacrifice it. They were to put the blood upon the door posts of their house. That when the death angel that made a difference between the redeemed people of Israel and the people of their bondage, the Egyptians, the death angel would pass over that, he would see the blood upon the door posts of their homes and he would pass over them.

In that solemn feast, they were also instructed to eat it standing up. They were also instructed to eat unleavened bread seven days. This was to remind them that they did not have time for the leaven to raise the bread, but they needed to prepare to depart, at a moment's notice, from their bondage. For they realized that they were in bondage. It speaks that He removed their shoulder from the burden. Their hands were delivered from the pot. Thou called in trouble and I delivered thee. They were to be mindful of God having chosen them for His people. Having prophesied to Abraham that they would serve a people in a strange land four hundred and thirty years, then He would bring them forth in a mighty way (Genesis 15:13,14; Exodus 12:41). This was a statute that they were to remember. that they might realize that they were once purchased. They were once bound and they had cried out to the Lord.

The Word of Life is so complete, Old Testament through the New, that all works together in such a wonderful way. How this even could be as a forerunner and prophecy of the deliverance of mankind from sin through Jesus Christ. That lamb that was. when the heavens were searched for one that could pay the price for sin, there was only one found. It was the lamb, Jesus Christ. There was much anxiety in heaven as they looked for one that could pay the price of the sin of man. There was much joy when there was one found that could bear that. They said, worthy is the lamb to open the book. (Rev. 5)

So we, likewise, are to remember,

those of the New Testament covenant,

Light From The Word

Courage

Writings based on God's Word

"O love the Lord, all ye his saints... Be of good courage, and he shall strengthen your heart, all ye that hope in the Lord" (Psa. 31:23-24).

Are you fearful, worried or discouraged? Perhaps the possible consequences of difficult decisions make the future seem frightening? Maybe the risks associated with changes in your life bring doubts? Are there seemingly insurmountable obstacles in your life? All of us experience fears, and whether they are rational or irrational, they can be debilitating. The Word of God teaches us to overcome our fears. In the case of irrational fears, overcoming requires faith. In the case of rational fears, it also requires courage.

Courage is the ability to face real or perceived danger, change, or risk in spite of our fears, trusting God and abandoning ourselves to Him. "Though he slay me, yet will I trust in Him" (Job 13:15).

Let's consider some examples of courage from the Bible. "And Moses called unto Joshua, and said unto him in the sight of all Israel, Be strong and of a good courage: for thou must go with this people unto the land which the LORD hath sworn unto their fathers to give them; and thou shalt cause them to inherit it. And the LORD, he it is that doth go before thee; he will be with thee, he will not fail thee, neither forsake thee: fear not, neither be dismayed" (Deut. 31:7-8).

Moses was full of years when he spoke these words. He wasn't speaking about theories. Moses knew what it meant to be strong and of good courage—he had learned the hard way. God called Moses to do a task that he felt ill-equipped to handle. He was afraid, and based on his experience his fears may have been justified. Nevertheless, at the commandment of God, Moses took courage and returned to Egypt, confronted Pharaoh, and led the children of Israel through the Red Sea, and on to the Promised Land. He did not go in his own strength or understanding. God was with him. Through obedience, Moses learned that God is faithful.

Soon after the death of Moses, God spoke directly to Joshua and repeated the exhortation that Moses had given. "There shall not any man be able to stand before thee all the days of thy life: as I was with Moses, so I will be with thee: I will not fail thee, nor forsake thee. Be strong and of a good courage: for unto this people shalt thou divide for an inheritance the land, which I sware unto their fathers to give them. Only be thou strong and very courageous, that thou mayest observe to do according to all the law, which Moses my servant commanded thee: turn not from it to the right hand or to the left, that thou mayest prosper withersoever thou goest" (Josh. 1:5-7).

Joshua obeyed the Word of the Lord. He promptly began to prepare the people to cross over Jordan. He instructed them to follow the priests into the swollen Jordan River. It took both faith and courage to tell the people that the Lord would stand the waters up in a heap. Joshua trusted God and went forward in spite of his fears.

It took courage for the priests to step into the flooded waters of the Jordan River. It is very rational to fear walking into a rushing river in flood stage. In spite of their fears, the priests obeyed the word of the Lord and stepped into the water. In much the same way, we may feel justified in maintaining certain fears in our life. Our human experience teaches us caution in many aspects of life, and our concerns may be rational. However, when God speaks, we must go forward in spite of even our most rational fears. This requires faith and courage.

If our fears are irrational, and this prevents us from doing as we should, we must understand that this can lead to decisions and behaviors which are sinful. Irrational fears may be directly related to a lack of faith. "... whatsoever is not of faith is sin" (Rom. 14:23). They may also be related to a lack of understanding of the nature of God and what He expects of us. Unfounded fears are really a result of doubting God, so they must be addressed. God gives us several ways to address doubt. It may be sufficient to confess it and ask God to strengthen our faith, or we may need to seek counsel to better un-

derstand God. It can also be very helpful to understand how our emotions or thinking lead us to doubt.

Courage is the mobilization of our faith. It is the conscious decision to obey God in spite of our fears—even when those fears are reasonable.

For Queen Esther, it was forbidden to enter into the presence of the King. However, her spiritual father, Mordecai, challenged her to understand the position God had placed her in—and to take action in spite of her fears. "Think not with thyself that thou shalt escape in the king's house, more than all the Jews. For if thou altogether holdest thy peace at this time, then shall there enlargement and deliverance arise to the Jews from another place; but thou and thy father's house shall be destroyed: and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this? Then Esther bade them return Mordecai this answer, Go, gather together all the Jews that are present in Shushan, and fast ye for me, and neither eat nor drink three days, night or day: I also and my maidens will fast likewise; and so will I go in unto the king, which is not according to the law: and if I perish, I perish" (Est. 4:13-14).

Esther's response was to first seek God and then ask others to join her in prayer and fasting. Then trusting in God she could say, "If I perish, I perish." This is courage—fulfilling the calling of God without regard to the consequences, even if the consequences mean the risk of our life.

With both Joshua and Esther, there was a call to courage by their mentors. Moses and Mordecai had experienced the faithfulness of God. Their encouragement to Joshua and Esther had credibility. Because they had been courageous themselves, they were able to encourage the following generation to fulfill the will of God. Age and experience often bring a fuller understanding of the faithfulness of God. Have you experienced God's faithfulness in your life? Perhaps you have the ability to motivate others to be strong and of good courage, helping them to lay fear aside and trust in God.

Eastern European Assistance

For several decades the Mission Committee has maintained contact with those of like mind and faith in Eastern Europe. These brethren, known as Nazarenes, represent a special part of the Lord's harvest as He worked through our early church fathers, including Samuel Froehlich, in spreading the Gospel into Eastern Europe.

Today Nazarene brethren exist in Sweden, Germany, France, Austria, Hungary, Slovakia, Croatia, Romania and Ukraine. They as we, often find themselves bewildered by the changes that seem to be without precedent. In order for us to understand the position of the East European Nazarenes, we need to take a brief look at their history. For centuries the church and government were the same, and ruled with an iron hand. After the reformation, Anabaptist groups such as the Nazarenes suffered greatly for their faith. Unspeakable atrocities took place over the years, and this has had a significant impact upon the outlook of these brethren yet today.

This has made our East European brethren what they are. Young families that are the hope for the future have heard the stories of this oppression over and over even though they have not experienced it. However, the memories of these struggles will live in the minds of the elderly until they draw their last breath. Even though we try to sympathize, we cannot really understand. We simply do our best to help.

For seventy years communism held the eastern European countries in its firm grip, and there was little opportunity to practice their faith openly. Although the flame of truth often grew dim, by the grace of God it did not go out. Young people are the hope for the future, and they have special needs which we can help meet so that they can establish stable, productive lives.

Assistance needed

Dozens of churches have been built, Bibles and hymnbooks have been printed, and vehicles purchased to enable these brethren to practice and maintain the true faith of our fathers. Due to continued difficult economic conditions in most of these countries, there are still many hardships among the brethren. Our ongoing assistance for various daily needs, self-help programs and additional church construction projects are all greatly appreciated.

These brethren are still not comfortable with their situation. They are wary of governments, the state church, and the mafia. With the changes brought about by the European Union, it has been necessary for the Mission Committee, working jointly with the European Committee to find avenues in which this assistance can continue and still conform to laws not only in our own lands, but in the nations whose people we assist.

The past year or so has brought tightening of the ways we are allowed to work, and we are trying to respond in a way that is both legal and conforms to the goals of helping our suffering brethren. Changes come quickly in the modern world, and often swift response is necessary.

Necessary adjustments

Some years ago the leadership in Eastern Europe requested that an organization independent of the Nazarene church be formed through which we could channel funds. The anxiety of governmental interference in their spiritual affairs has been the driving motive for this request. In response, a nongovernmental organization legally incorporated under Romanian law has been instituted which has been operational for several years. This corporation, known as Asociatia Antiohia (Antioch Association) is an international joint effort of the World Relief Board, Mission Committee, European Committee, Fellowship of Evangelical Baptists in Germany as well as other interested parties. Functioning in accordance with proper accounting procedures, Antioch is audited yearly under Romanian law and files annual tax returns. Great care is exercised to comply with ongoing changes in EU regulations that affect the way business must be conducted.

As time goes by, increasing amounts of our assistance are being run through this channel to conform to both legal and good accounting practices. Efforts are also being made to create an avenue by which we can be more effective in assisting the brethren in Ukraine.

Appreciation for continued support

The Mission Committee, along with the others involved want to assure our brethren that we are using due diligence and trying to do everything possible to assist our needy brethren who have endured so much, while at the same time conforming to law and good accountability. Your prayers and continued generous support for fulfilling the scriptural directive to "do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith" (Gal. 6:10) are greatly appreciated.

Eastern Europe

Although it is now 19 years since the oppressive communist regimes fell in Eastern Europe, our struggling brethren, the Nazareans, continue to face ongoing challenges.

The economic situation is growing steadily worse, not better, with inflation raging, and uncertainties in governments as well as in the daily

lives of everyone.

The European Committee continues to monitor the situation very closely, as three groups have gone into Eastern Europe in the last several months, and constant communication is maintained. Quite clearly, without the faithful and loving support of our American brethren, the elderly in particular would find it hard to have food and heat at the same time.

Several years ago Antioch was able to purchase a number of chain saws, which remain the property of the corporation, but are being used by individual brethren to cut firewood. Needs are great, although the people reduce the temperature in the homes, heating only the area in which they are living, so that they can have enough money to buy food.

Fuel prices are rising rapidly everywhere in the world, and incomes are not keeping pace at all. Old sisters living in the apartments built by the communists cannot cope with rent and utilities, much less have

enough to buy food.

Our joint international effort, through the corporation known as Antioch, has many programs in place to address these needs. Food packages are made up each month with supplies purchased locally. At this time, we have the good fortune

of being able to buy in volume from large stores much like our Sam's club. This has allowed us to keep this program going in spite of rising food costs. This, too, is funded with restricted donations specified for this purpose.

The bicycles purchased last year have had an impact upon their daily lives, becoming more valuable as gasoline and diesel costs go up. Auto fuel is now over \$7.00 a gallon, so travel obviously is reduced only to that which is necessary.

Heating Crisis Exists

Since nearly all Nazareans are poor, they depend upon us for assistance in winter heating. Due to the current situation, there is a shortfall of \$70,000 needed for this purpose. The brethren who have the responsibility for the various countries feel this is a real need, and ask for your support to help our suffering brethren cope with the coming winter.

At this time there are four honey projects functioning, with a processing facility being installed at the Antioch compound. This has capability of processing many tons of honey per year, which is a great help to enable our suffering brethren to become more self-reliant, and less dependent upon outside help. This has always been the stated goal of this endeavor, with future prospects looking good at this time.

Although there is no governmental oppression, the archenemy of our Lord's work never ceases to cause discord wherever possible, and this struggle continues to go on, as it

does everywhere men seek to serve God. Each nation and ethnic group seems to have their own difficulties with all trying to do their best.

Most Nazarean families are large, often with more than ten children, which brings its own problems in trying to keep the family functional. One of the big ways our US brethren can help in this situation is to help purchase school supplies. Research has revealed that costs for each child are about \$50 per school year. Few families have incomes of more than \$500/month, meaning that a family of ten needs one full month's income simply for school supplies.

Last year Antioch purchased school supplies by the pallet, cutting costs a lot, and this seemed to be a big help. It seems good to repeat and expand this program for this year. Therefore, the European Committee has approved the purchase of these supplies, with hopes of receiving enough restricted funds to finance this effort, not only in Romania, but all across Eastern Europe where these needs exist. Numerous Sunday Schools participated in supporting "Project Bicycle," which was highly successful, so it is hoped this will also be given consideration for this effort, which is called "Heft Project." Heft in the German language means "notebook" thus the reason for that name. This is a family-to-family project that hopefully will bring support from our Brotherhood.

We have purchased three homes in Morton where smaller groups of residents will be able to be served in more home like places. The first group of four men plan to move to a house on Brentwood Street next week. These men are excited for the opportunity to live in this home, and establish their residence there. We thank the Lord that we sense His hand in these developments, and believe that He has our lives in His hands.

We are also thankful that at our larger facility, Timber Ridge, our redecorating project is close to completion. Countless volunteer hours have been spent wallpapering the halls at Timber

Ridge. This new look as well as other redecorating has really changed our Home, too. The residents, staff and families wish to thank God for making this possible.

It is good to stop at this Thanks giving time and consider how the Lord has been involved in our lives here at ACHH. We are amazed at His continued love and involvement here.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Brian Knudstrup

As I write this, we are experiencing our first bit of real winter weather here at Gateway. The snow melted quickly away this morning, but it was a gentle reminder that the season of Christ's birth is here. For many of the children that we serve, this may be the first Christmas they celebrate with true peace in their hearts and a real understanding for why Jesus came down to Earth.

Before Jesus was born, Zacharias said of Him,

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel: for he hath visited and redeemed his people, and hath raised up an horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David; as he spake by the mouth of his holy prophets, which have been since the world began: That we should be saved from our enemies, and from the hand of all that hate us; to perform the mercy promised to our fathers, and to remember his holy covenant; the oath which he sware to our father Abraham, that he would grant unto us, that we being delivered out of the hand of our enemies might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him, all the days of our life."

This Christmas season as you think about ways you can give, consider focusing on building up the relationships with those around you, specifically the children in your life and the children we serve. Pray that their hearts would both desire AND be filled with the peace that God offers.

As news is scarce this month, perhaps you will indulge me to share some early history of the Fort Scott and Lamar, Missouri, churches. The railroad connects these two towns and also runs through the small town of Iantha. Iantha has been our home for the past 35 years. We live a mile from the old Frisco tracks, now known as the Santa Fe-Burlington Northern, just close enough to enjoy the train whistles. Sometimes at night, I try to determine which way the train is moving by it's whistle.

The steeple bells in Iantha's two churches have long ceased calling people to worship on Sunday mornings. You might wonder what is the connection? At one time, Lamar and Fort Scott had passenger train service. It was possible to board the morning train at Lamar or Iantha and attend the morning services at Fort Scott and return again in the evening. A departed Sister once told me the young male friends would take the morning train to Fort Scott to visit the young female friends before returning the same evening. Many of these friends repented and a few of them got married.

My parents were married in Fort Scott. Mother was from Lamar, but was working in Fort Scott at the time. Many of the early settlers in the church moved here by train from the East and North. Boston, Missouri, was on the Missouri Pacific rail line, but was near where some of the people settled. Little is known about the early members at Fort Scott except what is found in 'Footsteps to Zion'. Some came from Weiner, Arkansas, as well as the Indian Territory in Oklahoma. Those railroads were built by team and slips and involved thousands of backbreaking manhours of labor in the early 1870's. Now hundreds of cars of coal glide over these ribbon rails, but over the same graded roadbeds that were carved out so many years ago.



Biblical Financial Stewardship

No one can deny that we are living in a time of great financial uncertainty. Even the wisest of experts are struggling to bring calmness to the troubled waters of recent financial upheaval. Many people are deeply concerned because of the possibility of losing things they value - savings, retirement plans, jobs, possessions, and even homes.

But although we live with a degree of uncertainty, this does not have to be a time of insecurity. The difference is whether we will apply the principles of financial stewardship that are clearly spelled out in God's Holy Word. Those who wrote the words of Scripture were hardly financial counselors, and vet the biblical concepts of how to handle our money and possessions will provide much-needed security in an uncertain world.

Here are three of the most important concepts in the Bible that teach us how God wants us to relate to money and possessions.

1. Stewardship vs. Ownership.

One of the most important and oft-repeated biblical concepts is that we are stewards and not owners of our possessions. The word "steward" is defined as "a person who manages or administers another's property or financial affairs." God is the true owner of everything we have, and He entrusts them to us as stewards with the expectation that we will use them wisely, invest them to gain interest, and not consider them as objects of worship or trust.

1 Chronicles 29:12 " Thine, O LORD, is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and the victory, and the majesty: for all that is in the heaven and in the earth is thine; thine is the kingdom, O LORD, and thou art exalted as head above all".

God's expectation of us as stewards is spelled out in several places, most notably in the parable of the unfaithful steward in Luke 16.

Luke 16:1-2 "And he said also unto his disciples, There was a certain rich man, which had a steward; and the same was accused unto him that he had

wasted his goods. (2) And he called him, and said unto him, How is it that I hear this of thee? give an account of thy stewardship; for thou mayest be no longer steward.

Jesus concludes this parable by saying that faithfulness is the attribute by which stewards will be judged.

Luke 16:10-11 " He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much: and he that is unjust in the least is unjust also in much. If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteousness mammon, who will commit to your trust the true riches?"

And the Apostle Paul reminds us in his letter to the Corinthians,

1 Corinthians 4:2 "It is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

2. Fellowship with God.

Another important concept in stewardship is the fact that how we handle money influences our fellowship with the Lord. Jesus equates this with the quality of our spiritual life. If we handle our money properly according to the principles of Scripture, we grow closer to Christ. However, if we are unfaithful with it, our fellowship with Him will suffer. This is clearly illustrated in the parable of the talents, where the master recognizes and rewards the faithfulness of his servant:

Matthew 25:21 "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord."

In contrast to that, notice the master's judgment on the servant who hid his talent in the earth and simply surrendered it without any increase:

Matthew 25:26-30 "His lord answered and said unto him. Thou wicked and slothful servant . . . Thou oughtest therefore to have put my money to the exchangers, and then at my coming I should have received mine own with usury [interest] . . . And cast ye the unprofitable servant into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

As we handle money God's way, we have an opportunity to enter into the joy of a more intimate relationship with our Lord.

3. Only One Master.

A third important concept is that there is great danger in letting our possessions compete with the Lord for first place in our lives. Money is a primary competitor with Christ for the lordship of our lives. Jesus tells us we must choose to serve only one of these two masters.

Matthew 6:24 "No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other, or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon [money]."

It is impossible for us to serve money - even in a small way - and still serve the Lord.

Security

Many of us who grew up in the church remember singing the song about the foolish man who built his house on the sand, and the wise man who built his house on the rock. When we grew older, we learned that this song tells the story that Jesus told as recorded in Matthew 7. But do we remember that Jesus prefaced his parable with these words:

Matthew 7:24 "Therefore whosoever heareth these sayings of mine, and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man . .

When we study and learn the principles of financial stewardship as taught in God's Word, we have the opportunity to build our financial house on the solid rock of Scriptural principles. When the storms of financial upheaval descend upon us, the house that is built on the rock will stand secure.

that we too were once in bondage. That we were bound by the sin of our fathers. We were bound by our own sin. We were bound by the flesh with which we were clothed. We desperately needed deliverance. We cried out unto the Father in the day of our conviction and He responded to us in a wonderful way. That the blood of Jesus Christ was placed upon the door posts of our heart. Through faith in that blood, we could believe that we could have deliverance. We could find the power of His grace and His truth to be delivered from the sin that once bound us. Then we are to remember. like the children of Israel of old, that we have been delivered. We are to remember that we do not have time to dally about the business of coming out from among the land and the people of our bondage.

We are to remember the burden that was upon our shoulder. We are to remember the task master, the one that bound us and held us in sin. We are to remember that to cause us to remember that we do not ever, ever want to go back to our former lives. As the children of Israel were instructed in their generations, to hold this feast and to remember it.

He speaks to the children of Israel. how He had redeemed them and how He brought them. "There shall no strange god be in thee; neither shalt thou worship any strange god. I am the Lord thy God, which brought thee out of the land of Egypt: open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it." Psalm 81:9,10. What a promise and a blessing was given unto them! That if they would have no other strange god before Him, they merely needed to keep themselves for their Lord and they could open their mouths and He would fill them with the good things of the land of promise.

There are many promises that are given in the New Testament. We do not look for the land flowing with milk and honey in the earthly sense. But we look forward to a well of water which will quench our thirst, that we may never thirst again, if we resort to the Word of God. We look forward to the bread of life that is contained in the Word of God. Breaking the bread.

that is the body of our Lord Jesus Christ. We look for the abundance in the spiritual life here upon the earth. We look for eternal life to come.

"But my people would not hearken to my voice; and Israel would none of me. So I gave them up unto their own hearts' lust: and they walked in their own counsels. Oh that my people had hearkened unto me, and Israel had walked in my ways!" Psalm 81:11-13. We do live in the day of grace, it is true. But we yet have the opportunity, both redeemed and unredeemed, to reject the Lord our God and to put other things before Him. If we choose life, we have His promises that He would subdue our enemies and have His hand turned against our adversaries. (Psalm 81:14) If we choose to put other things before Him, we have the promise that He will leave us to the lusts of our heart.

He speaks of how He would have liked to "...have fed them also with the finest of the wheat: and with honev out of the rock should I have satisfied thee." Psalm 81:16. We are so blessed that we have the opportunity to come to that very rock that He speaks of. That He could feed us with honey out of the rock and we can be spiritually fed and encouraged upon the pathway of life. If we find our salvation in the Lord and we walk close to Him, we will not see our self as in a desert place but we will see our self as a people very well provided for, with abundance of water.

He spoke to them, how He proved them in the waters of Meribah (Psalm 81:7). They came, they were thirsty and they found a well of contaminated water and began to complain. It displeased the Lord. But He provided that through instruction of trees being cut down and dropped into that well that the water was purified. So it is, if we find the Word of God that which is bitter unto us, He instructs us that we can be cut down, if we can fall upon the rock Jesus Christ and we can be converted and made anew. That will become a very pure and a very sweet water unto us. One that can sustain us and one that we can desire.

"And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus..." St. Luke 2:1. Don't we just marvel as we think of the unfolding of the wonderful plan of salvation? How a decree went forth from Caesar Augustus. We think of this man Caesar. We think of his standing and stature among the nations of the world at that time. We see an empire that was vast, often wicked. But God could still use it to bring about His ends. So when we read in Paul where all power is ordained of God and He can use them according to His will and pleasure, we fully realize that the time and the era that we are living in, God well controls the powers that be (Romans 13:1). He will bring about His good and perfect will, in spite of our misgivings about the nations of the earth this day. So could He back then.

We think of the chaffing of the children of Israel as they resisted the rule of the Roman government. Yet, through this way, God brought order and peace and tranquility to a large part of the world. Through this decree that they chaffed under and the taxing that they had to come and bring, that there was a way that God's prophecies could be fulfilled that Jesus could be born in Bethlehem.

We think of the humble submission of Joseph and Mary, as they submitted unto this decree, decreed by perhaps a wicked government that was despised by their people and resisted, how they humbly came to the place where they were to be taxed. Joseph was of the lineage of David. How they submitted unto this thing. We must believe that it was just a tremendous inconvenience for them. We think of Mary being great with child. We think of foot travel. We think of the rocky Judean countryside.

We don't know what their financial status was but when they came to that place, they couldn't purchase a place for them. But they had to reside in a place that perhaps was fit for the beasts. But all this came to pass. We don't read of them grumbling or complaining, but they submitted to this. How wonderful it was that they could bring forth the Son of God. That they could be instrumental in this plan of salvation, humble and lowly as they were.

"And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn." St. Luke 2:6-7. It's a touching story, as we think about the coming of our Lord. We think especially of children, when we think of this account. How tender and how wonderful this was and how this account can be related so lovingly to the children. How the children perceive this and they think, in their childhood, of the Creator of heaven and earth, the Lord Jesus as a child that came upon the earth in a manner like them. Was subject unto all things that we as adults and we as the children, were subject unto. Isn't this truly love, that He who created the heavens and the earth. He who breathed the breath of life into us, was willing to come down and to redeem us by becoming as one of us? By being subjected to things that many of us have not been subjected to.

It also speaks, "...in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." v. 8-10. Dear friends, those of you who have yet to believe to the extent that you are willing to come to this one who was a babe, then was crucified and rose again, if it seems a fearful thing for the revelation of Jesus Christ to come to you, as it was to the shepherds that were keeping watch over their flock by night, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them and they were sore afraid, if this seems like a thing that is beyond you and a fearful thing, many of us that have gone through this can testify that we have had the same experience in our lives. To think of repentance and to think of a life change and to think of submitting unto God and giving over the control of our life unto someone else was a fearful thing.

But as the angels spoke unto them, "...Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." v.10. In like manner, we found that the tidings of God, through repentance, were a wonderful thing for us to experience. We experienced the letting go. We experienced being carried and cradled in the arms of a loving God. We experienced that we could turn from our sin and we could bear sorrow for it. We experienced that when we needed to go back to someone, that the Lord was ever so faithful. As we called upon Him, that He would bear us in His arms, that we could make restitution. It was such a fearful thing to the unredeemed.

The glory of God was revealed to us in many ways. The things that we could not overcome, the things that we struggled at, the things we feared, we were now able to do. The things that once bound us and the things that we were unable to rid ourselves of, there was now power to be released from those things.

So it is not a new thing, that the revealing of the power of salvation unto the children of men is a fearful thing. But all those that will in faith, receive it, can find the Lord to be a faithful God. That His yoke is truly easy and His burden truly light. We have found it so.

He revealed unto these men the coming of the Lord. "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." v. 11-14. Have you ever wondered if this Lord had not come and been willing, what the world would be like today as we know it? True, it is an evil place. It is a place where sin is rampant, much as it was in the times of Sodom and Gomorrah. in the time of the tower of Babel, in the time of Noah. But the wickedness is rampant upon the earth.

But it speaks in Daniel of a time where the kingdoms of this earth would be smashed and broken into bits by one who would come as a stone and strike the nations of the earth upon the feet and break it into bits (Daniel 7:23). That stone would grow and all the earth would become a great mountain. We trust that that was Jesus Christ. He came as a baby but He grew. He grew and filled the whole earth. Though this earth is a wicked place, what would it be like without Jesus Christ?

We have known so many throughout our lives to be so kind to us. We have known the mercy of Jesus through many people. We know that many nations are blest because they have attempted to instate His teachings in their constitutions. As they adhere to them, they were blest. We just wonder what the earth would be like if there hadn't been peace and good will toward men. Surely it would be a horrible place.

The shepherds made haste and they came to "...Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them by the shepherds." St. Luke 2:16-18. I've often wondered about this. I don't think this thing was as quiet as we might perceive. For the wise men came from the east. They talked to Herod and Herod had some awareness of what was going on. These shepherds, once it was revealed unto them, told it abroad. They must have went through the streets of Bethlehem, proclaiming the wondrous things that were done. There must have been some knowledge by a good part of the people that something special was going on. So it was laid on the heart of each one that was there to find out what that was or to simply go on and reject it.

So He comes to the children of men today. In the nation we live in and many other nations, the knowledge of the Savior that has come, abounds. We just wonder how many of us, like the people of Bethlehem, heard the news and were not too stirred or inspired by it and went about our lives

as it was before. We wonder about those who were stirred in heart, to think deeply upon it and ponder, what is this marvelous thing that is come to pass? Why should these shepherds be up and about in the middle of the night, leaving their flocks and proclaiming this message? So we believe that the Lord has freed Himself in revealing His good Word to us. Some of us, not just once but many times. So we'll be accountable for that.

They brought Jesus, after the time of her purification according to the law of Moses were accomplished, they brought Him to Jerusalem to present Him to the Lord in the temple. (v. 22) We think, they brought Jesus to that

holy place. They brought Him to that place where He was to come in later years and cast out those who bought and sold. Where He would come and instruct and the children would praise Him and sing Hosanna. (St. Matthew 21:12-15). They brought Him to that place that would not stand many years after He departed this earth. He prophesied that. (St. Matthew 24:2) But He had respect unto this place in His life and called it a house of prayer (St. Matthew 21:13). He came and fulfilled the law and the prophesies of Moses. He raised up a new temple. In three days His body was resurrected after His crucifixion.

He raised us up to sit on high and heavenly places. He caused us to speak with a new song, a new tongue. To sing aloud unto God in our strength and to make a joyful noise unto the God of Jacob. He caused us to become the temples of the Holy God. Let us find, dear ones, the strength and the desire and the willingness to keep this temple as God would have us to keep it. To keep it a holy place. To keep it as a place that He would be pleased to be worshipped. To keep out those things that displeased the Lord so much when He came into the temple of old.



The following consists of excerpts from the booklet "For Where Your Treasure Is, There Will Be Your Heart Also." This was put together by the Gridley, Illinois, and Roanoke, Illinois, Young Groups in 1978, and consists of interviews with the more elderly brothers and sisters in those congregations.

"I walked a mile with sorrow, And never a word said she. But, oh, the things I learned from her, When sorrow walked with me."

A favorite Poem of Ed Stoller (husband of Marie Stoller):

"He placed me in a little cage Away from gardens fair; But I must sing the sweetest songs Because He placed me there."

The Light Of Hope

"Repent For, Or Just Repent"

I have something to share with you, something with which I have struggled for some time. In spite of diligently searching the scriptures, I have not been able to find anywhere in the Bible where it is written that we should repent FOR our sins. If any of you can find where this terminology is used in the Bible, please inform me and I shall repent and correct myself in a later article.

In the Old Testament in Jeremiah 18 verse 8, God says, "I will repent of the evil that I thought to do unto them." Here God is saying that He will not punish the people if they turn from their evil ways. In Revelation 2:21in the New Testament we read, "And I gave her space to repent of her fornication, and she repented not." In the Bible, the word "repent" is usually used by itself but when the word is followed by a preposition, the preposition is "of", not "for".

Many of you may think, "What's the difference?" "Why quibble about details?" However, we must be careful not to add to or take away from what the Bible says. Revelation 22:19. None of us want to do that but we may do so unintentionally.

As a young person I thought that someday I must repent for my sins. Therefore I tried to be very careful because I thought that when I repent I will have to suffer terribly for anything I did wrong. This is good so far as preventing wrong doing is concerned, but the problem is that I may have subconsciously thought that my suffering plus Christ's suffering redeems me from my lost condition.

This now becomes a very serious doctrinal question. Christ said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." John 14:6. He didn't say, "You and I are the way, the truth, and the life." When we repent, we suffer remorse for the things we have done which are wrong in God's sight, but we cannot add anything to the atonement Christ made for us. Our remorse is good for us as it helps us to be more willing to follow Christ, that's all. But I think we should all be more than willing to follow Christ with all our heart, soul, and spirit, just in appreciation for what He has done for us. Also, nowhere in the Bible does it say that we should live a wild and rebellious life so we have something to repent for. Sins leave scars, regardless of forgiveness. However, those who have committed great sins may be more appreciative of their salvation than others. In Luke 7:47 Jesus said, "To whom little is forgiven, the same loveth little." However, I wouldn't use that as an excuse for sinning.

During my repentance and conversion to Christ, I went to my Elder and said something like this, "Bro. Schupert, there is something wrong with me. I am much too happy to be in repentance." He replied that the Ethiopian spoken of in Acts 8, when he believed with all his heart, was baptized and went on his way rejoicing. Bro. Schupert's reply has always been a great encouragement to me.

In Matthew 3:2 we read the words of John the Baptist, "Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." In Matthew 4:17 we read, "From

that time Jesus began to preach, and to say, Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." In Acts 3:19 Peter is quoted as saying, "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out." In all cases the terminology "Repent for" is not used. The word "for" indicates that you are doing something about a certain condition. For instance, "I'm going to take some medicine for my cold." The expectation is that the medicine will have a beneficial effect on your cold.

The word "repent" basically means to change course or to turn back, in the case of conversion, to turn back to God and to Christ. Records show that Bro. Froehlich suffered a lot during his repentance, but I'm sure it did not add to the atonement which Christ made for him and for us. I have read that Luther was so concerned about his past sins that the priest taking his confession over and over again told him to stop bothering him with the same things. The records say that one day Luther read, "The just shall live by faith." Romans 1:17. This is said to have wrought a big change in Luther who was steeped in the idea of doing penance, or suffering, for his sins. He then realized that his suffering was not helping any so far as receiving forgiveness is concerned. His business was to have faith, to believe enough to obey, to submit.

Many people wonder about certain things but hesitate to express themselves. If you have something you wonder about, I invite you to write to me about it and we will ponder it together.
