Sermon by Bro. Steve Stieglitz, Leo, IN Deuteronomy 14:1-21 and James 1

Once again, we find ourselves in the midst of what is to us, a bit strange or unusual. We find essentially, the jist of this passage is a declaration of what is clean and unclean for the children of Israel to eat. We tend to, when we turn to a passage like this, try to make sense of it. Indeed there are some evidences for us to make sense. By making sense of this, I mean that we turn to this and we look at the categorization of what is clean and unclean and we try to decide if there would be some logical benefit or some logical disadvantage or undesirability in the animals that are divided in such a way. Indeed, I think medical or nutritional science could point to certain aspects of the beasts that are unclean and suggest that there is a good and a logical reason why, perhaps, those should be set aside.

But too much attention paid to that aspect of this passage misses the point that God really is making here. I don't want to take away from the fact that there may be health benefits in following a strict Hebrew diet. That isn't the essence of the passage. The essence of the passage is, as verse one indicates, you are chosen of the Lord. Because you are chosen of the Lord, God says, I am going to distinguish between you and all other people. I want you to constantly and forever remember that you are unique. You are unique by the virtue of the fact that you are my people. I want you to think of yourselves as my people. Someone asks you who you are, I want the first words out of your mouth to be, 'Well, I am of the chosen people of God.' If you want to distinguish further from there, that's fine. But first and foremost, you are mine.

What better way to keep that in the very forefront of someone's mind than to give to God's chosen people a constant choice. A constant filter, a constant awareness that that which you put in your mouth distinguishes you from all other people. 'I can't eat that because I am a child of God. I belong to Him. Therefore I will only eat this.' It is not merely the dietary laws - there's a plethora of distinctions all throughout the Old Testament economy that lays out ways in which the children of God were unique, they separated themselves. There is, of course, a certain sense of that fact that the dietary laws were foremost a distinguishing of the people of God. more so than it was a health issue. Otherwise God wouldn't say, Go ahead and give it to your alien neighbor. Go ahead and sell it to them. Just don't eat it yourself. (Deut. 14:21) It flows against common grace.

Nonetheless, we return to the fact that God was setting up, in this economy, a way of thinking. He was creating a mindset. He was creating a world view. He was creating one in which the children of Israel thought of themselves, in every aspect of their lives, as unique, set apart. 'I belong to the Lord. Therefore, I don't do this.' That actually has some wonderful implications to the New Testament message. That is no surprise. We often say all of the Old Testament built to the climax of the reality of the New Testament. Everything we find in the Old Testament is a shadow of the glories of the reality of the New Testament. Perhaps we'll have a chance to develop that further.

James, a servant of God, writing to twelve tribes. Obviously referring to the Hebrew people which are scattered abroad. (James 1:1) The dispersion is a reference to the Jewish people that were dispersed because of the persecution from the Roman Emperor that made life so difficult in Judea and particularly in Jerusalem, that they fled that persecution and were scattered throughout the Roman world at that time. As the church of God, the fledgling church spread, it spread somewhat in waves. Of course, one of them was the pursuit of Jews, not only in Jerusalem but throughout the Roman Empire. Throughout what we call

Light From The Word

"Our lot is found in pleasant places, A goodly heritage is ours" (ZH # 145).

We are blessed to enjoy a church which has a rich heritage of beliefs and practices based on biblical principles and characterized by a pattern of carefulness and stability in our walk of faith. Our spiritual unity is strengthened greatly by individual brethren having the mind of Christ. "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 2:5).

The mind of Christ reflects many unifying godly principles including: 1) a oneness of emphasis on glorifying God in all aspects of our walk of life: "And the glory which thou gavest me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one" (John 17:22); 2) a common spirit of concern for the salvation of lost souls: "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest..." (Matt. 9:38); 3) recognition that only charity creates a perfect bond of unity in Christ: "And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness" (Col. 3:14); and 4) being joined together against a world of sin: "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world" (1 John 2:15).

Sincere self-examination has been one of the hallmarks of the effort to strengthen biblical unity during these past two years, beginning with the leadership and extending to every brother and sister who is a part of this blessed heritage. Many have acknowledged areas in their lives where the mind of Christ has not been in control. True spiritual unity can only come when there is true obedience to God's Word. Where deficiencies are found we must repent and make amends and implement the necessary changes to align ourselves with the mind of Christ, by His grace. This is the "call to accountability." It does not consist of looking upon the deficiencies of others, but truly examining ourselves in the mirror of God's Word (Jam. 1:23-25).

We must strengthen our resolve to abide in Christ's love and allow Him to have control of all aspects of our life (John 15:8-12). Because love is the supreme characteristic of a believer, we must nurture Christ-like love for all of our brethren. "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one an-

other" (John 13:34). We are to walk a sanctified life grounded in faith and grace, which is committed to honesty, mutual respect, submission to authority, modesty in appearance, a forgiving spirit, forbearance and all other biblical virtues. It renounces emulation, sedition, implacableness, talebearing, covetousness, pride, lust (including competition) and all other vices. When we have the pure mind of Christ, there is no compromising of these biblical truths.

We are committed to continuing to address the many threats to biblical unity and to seek the guidance of the Spirit in helping each other promote the mind of Christ throughout our Brotherhood. Some of the evident fruits of this effort include: increased accountability on the part of the elders, greater understanding and forbearance of each other, a deepening of relationships enabling more effective cooperation in addressing issues and a much more open communication in elder forum and conference discussions allowing the Word to be the focal point for decisions.

Whenever a major effort toward improvement is undertaken it is understandable that there will be gentle skepticism on the part of some brethren. A submissive spirit, along with recognition of evidence of good fruits allows this to be overcome with time. We are deeply grateful that there have been reports of this encouraging process occurring in the hearts of many brothers and sisters across the land.

A misguided prejudgment of such efforts leads to a closing of the mind and a resistance to acknowledgment of good fruits as well as potential for God's blessing. There are many warnings in the Scriptures against giving personal opinions a place of undue authority in our minds. One of the most direct of these is in Romans 12:16: "Be not wise in your own conceits." David acknowledged his need for humility in recognizing that there were things he did not fully understand and thus should not prejudge. "Lord, my heart is not haughty, nor mine eyes lofty: neither do I exercise myself in great matters, or in things too high for me" (Psa. 131:1).

The mind of Christ is reflected in a meek spirit. Jesus said of himself, "I am meek and lowly in heart" (Matt. 11:29). Meekness can be defined as wisdom, strength Writings based on God's Word

and self-assurance kept under control vs. bold or harsh judgment and confrontation. "Who is a wise man and endued with knowledge among you? Let him shew out of a good conversation his works with meekness of wisdom" (Jam. 3:13).

Lack of respect and callous disregard for authority are serious violations of God's Word and do not reflect the mind of Christ. When Jesus was tested by the Pharisees on this principle he answered their crafty question by saying, "Render therefore unto Caeser the things which are Caesar's; and unto God the things that are God's" (Matt. 22:21). When the church leadership after much prayer and seeking of the guidance of the Holy Spirit calls upon the Brotherhood to give their support and cooperation to a biblically sound effort, it is not to be taken lightly. This "call to accountability" was again put forth as a clear sounding trumpet at the recent Princeville Conference. It was a call to engagement—to join the ranks and be prayerful and supportive of the ongoing efforts to encourage all of us to put on the mind of Christ, put self aside and become diligent laborers in the vinevard of the Lord. We must have faith that the many important issues which are of concern will be addressed in due time and according to God's plan as outlined in the Word, not by our own timetable or preference.

Every brother and sister can make a difference, beginning now. This requires humbling ourselves and taking to heart the consistent exhortations which are being communicated through individual elder presentations to their respective churches, conference teachings, approved Elder Body documents and articles such as this. We should not delay doing what is right, as the Word teaches us to "number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom" (Psa. 90:12). We can also each make a difference by the words we speak to one another regarding the strengthening of our blessed heritage: "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord, and that thought upon his name" (Mal. 3:16).

Apostolic Christian Publications

A postolic Christian Publications (ACP) originated from a request at the 1961 general conference to make available Apostolic Christian developed Sunday school materials. In 1962 a committee of Elders was appointed to search out feasibility of this request. Brethren invested considerable time and effort in developing the new Sunday school materials over the next few years.

Out of this effort the idea and need for an Apostolic Christian Publications non-profit organization began. The first meeting of the newly established Apostolic Publications was held in 1968. A new building was built in December of 1989 northwest of the Eureka church.

Over the years the offerings of the bookstore have grown to more than 150 items available for purchase including, Bibles, songbooks, SS material, dictionaries, concordances, VBS material and supporting materials such as the *Statement of Faith*, *Church Welcome* booklet, etc.

ACP has a board of directors consisting of 16 Brothers and 2 counseling Elders with 10 year terms.

Mission

It is the mission of Apostolic Christian Publications to promote spiritual growth and religious training by developing, publishing and disseminating Christian materials, relating to the needs, purposes and functions of the Apostolic Christian Church of America.

Website

In 2006 a website was developed to make items more accessible to those in other states as well as worldwide.

Orders can be completed online, by phone, or by mail. Some items are available without charge (except for shipping) and can be downloaded or shipped via UPS.

Spanish Material



Aid to Indonesia

On December 26, 2004, an earthquake registering a magnitude of 9.2 occurred in Indonesia. This created a tsunami that raced to shore at speeds of over 200 miles per hour and grew to a height of nearly 100 feet. Within minutes, everything in its wake was devastated, leaving 230,000 people dead and 1.7 million people displaced from their homes. The world was shocked and numbed as it was the worst natural disaster known to the modern world.

Over the ensuing months, hundreds of earthquakes occurred here. On March 28th, an earthquake near Nias and Tello Islands registered at a magnitude of 8.7. Although considered an aftershock, it ranks as the 7th largest earthquake since 1900.

There was a massive outpouring of humanitarian aid from around the globe. The brethren and friends of the Apostolic Christian Church gave generously to the World Relief Disaster Fund. World Relief appropriated funds to provide immediate relief with food and temporary shelter but also worked to provide long term relief through economic development and improvements in the medical infrastructure. Funds were used to help build and equip a hospital on Tello Island.

This area of Indonesia is considered the poorest with 75% of the families surviving on less than \$100 each month. Nearly 6 out of every 100 children will die before their 5th birthday and out of every 300 babies born, one woman will die in the process of the delivery. These are mortality rates not seen in the United States since the 1920's. Prior to the hospital on Tello Island, seeking medical help meant traveling for hours by boat.

The World Health Organization recommends that this island community of 26,000 should be served by at least 6 physicians, however there are only two Indonesian physicians there to do the work. Throughout Indonesia, the number of physicians available to care for the people is severely inadequate.

In April, World Relief sent a medical-dental team consisting of 2 physicians, 2 nurses and 1 dental hygienist to Tello Island to help supplement the medical care being provided as well as to assess ongoing needs.

Tello Island is the most populous island of this archipelago of 101 islands of which 45 are inhabited. Here, our medical-dental team grew in number to 17 which included an additional 2 physicians and 2 nurses as well as a dentist, pharmacist, interpreters and support staff. Most of the team members and all of our supplies were shuttled from the boat to the beach by canoes. The villagers were already sitting patiently, eagerly awaiting what for many of them was their first medical exam.

Our team examined approximately 125 patients on that first island. We provided medications for illnesses when the appropriate therapy was available and encouraged ongoing follow up at the Tello hospital.

On the morning that we were scheduled to leave the first island our team awoke to a torrential downpour which would delay our departure for hours. Unknown to us, other events were unfolding on this island. A woman had gone into labor, however the labor was not progressing. The medical team recognized the gravity of the situation and called for a medication to be brought from Tello Island. After the medication was administered, the expectant mother's contractions increased and she delivered a healthy baby boy. It is certainly possible that without the rainstorm the medical team would have already been on its way to the next island leaving the mother and infant to become another statistic to support the severe lack of medical care in this area of the world.

We developed a strong Christian love for our Indonesian team members. They find comfort in the Psalms and the encouraging words of Jesus Christ, our Lord. They love to sing.

We toured the hospital recently built with World Relief funds. World Relief also provided some new laboratory equipment that would be invaluable to the physicians in diagnosing illnesses in the patients they encountered and we were able to train the local physicians in the use of this new equipment.

In summary, it was obvious that the medical personnel on Tello Island have been wonderful stewards with the money so many people have graciously given by the grace of God and that they do all things for the glory and honor of our Lord. Our assistance helps them promote, in a sustainable way, physical, emotional, economic and spiritual well being. World Relief is planning to support an ongoing mobile medical clinic to these Islands. An Indonesian physician and nurse will travel via boat four days a week to provide medical care. They will also use the Tello Hospital for follow-up care. It is our prayer that we can make a difference in the medical outcomes for these people.





25 Ways to Provoke Anger in Children

Anger is a unique emotion and is one of the most referenced emotions in the Bible. It can motivate to appropriate actions and causes (Mark 3:5) or diminish our effectiveness as a believer (Prov. 14:29). The Lord God expressed His wrath many times over people that chose idolatry and hardened their hearts towards His commands. Vine's Dictionary provides this insight: anger is a natural impulse, desire, or disposition, and is seen as the strongest of all passions. There is little doubt as to why the New Testament instructs believers multiple times to "put off and put away" the destructive side of this emotion (Eph. 4:31, Col. 3:8).

As parents striving to raise our children in the fear and admonition of the Lord, we are provided many opportunities to teach, model, and instruct our children in this principle. One of our goals is to help our children grow from self-centered and emotionally driven to a Christ-like example that incorporates a biblical thought and reasoning process. How sad the first set of parents, Adam and Eve, must have been when their own flesh and blood could not manage this emotion (Gen. 4:5-8). In one day they lost two children: one to death, the other to exile.

Solomon reminds us that there is nothing new "under the sun" (Eccl. 1:14), and therefore parents need to be proactive in the everyday task of helping their children learn the wisdom of how to experience the emotion (be ve angry), and yet make good choices (sin not). The context of this set of 3 articles will encourage parents to examine themselves first in how they can avoid "provoking their children to anger" (Col. 3:21). The author, Lou Priolo, outlines in his book on this topic, "The Heart of Anger", 25 ways that parents can unknowingly create anger and frustration in their children. The examples we should try to avoid are as follows:

1. The Lack of Marital Harmony:

Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh. (Gen. 2:24)

It is easy to understand why this is

the first one mentioned. A painfully accurate overview is evident by the statement: "perhaps the greatest provocation of anger in children is parents who do not live with each other in the harmony that the Scriptures prescribe".1 As Gen. 2:24 lays the foundation, a husband and wife who do not develop the "one flesh" intimacy as intended by God's will, over time, have various other problems develop. Additional correlations between lack of marital harmony and angry children are seen in the effect that bitterness has on the human spirit. As children observe the resentment that results from their parents' lack of harmony, they can be more susceptible to acquiring those bitter thoughts, motives, attitudes, and actions that have been modeled to them.

2. Establishing and Maintaining a Child-Centered Home:

The rod and reproof give wisdom, but a child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame. (Prov. 29:15)

If parents do not know how to set up a Christ-Centered Home (which is defined as: each member understanding his/her biblical role in the family and is committed to place Christ above self), then the home is likely to be Child-Centered. It is a foundational principle that the husband and wife work at being closer to each other than to the child. If that does not occur, the child may view himself as equal and will tend to become angry when his desires do not get placed on equal status as the needs and desires of the parent. Parents must be cautious that their focus on rearing their children in the love and fear of God does not become a higher priority than their commitment to each other in the marriage relationship.

3. Modeling Sinful Anger:

Make no friendship with an angry man; and with a furious man thou shalt not go: Lest thou learn his ways, and get a snare to thy soul. (Prov. 22:24-25)

When parents model sinful anger, the child may accidently be taught that the only way to solve problems is to win. There are many "teachable moments" to be had with our children in helping them observe how sinfully expressed anger by others can bring many negative consequences. <u>4. Habitually Disciplining While An-</u> gry:

O Lord, rebuke me not in thy wrath: neither chasten me in thy hot displeasure. (Ps. 38:1)

When a parent is angry, it is easy to over-discipline. That anger may be perceived as a personal attack and the discipline seen as vindictive (revengeful) instead of corrective. Stress from work, finances, marital and family struggles can all add to the parent's frustration that is then passed on to the child.

5. Scolding:

Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers. (Eph. 4:29)

By definition, scolding is to rebuke someone angrily. This is often done by using harsh language when complaining or finding fault. While scolding may make the speaker feel better, it does very little to biblically "train or instruct".

Conclusion:

Parents, or those that provide for the care and education of children, are indeed blessed with the heritage of the Lord (Ps. 127:3). Helping children learn how to discern and appropriately respond to anger is vital for healthy children, families and churches. An unresolved hurt and wounded spirit progresses down a path of destruction: from hurt to bitterness, then anger, then stubbornness and finally rebellion². While this article does not address specific skills for children to use in learning how to manage anger and frustration, it does provide an outline for strengthening parent's awareness of possible trigger points in children. Some children's personalities and temperaments are going to require additional help from mom and dad in learning these skills. Those efforts for children needing to learn the balance and control of emotions and actions are going to be well-pleasing to God. Two more future Silver Lining articles will look at the remaining 20 ways.

the dispersion.

Even Paul, who was an Apostle to the Gentiles, nevertheless, when he entered a city throughout Rome, would typically enter the Jewish synagogue of that city and would use that as a base. Often that Jewish synagogue was not only filled with Jews of the dispersion but also proselytes or Gentile people that were God-fearing. So, often his connections then to the Gentile world was actually through that Jewish synagogue.

Nonetheless, the point here is that James is not particularly writing to a specific person. He is writing a general epistle. In fact, the book has gained the title of 'The General Epistle'. I am not exactly sure how many epistles have that title 'General Epistle'. But we can see from who he is writing to, that this is essentially to everyone. The significance of that might be that if the concerns or the issues addressed in this letter had a broad application in that day, we might be left with the assumption that the points made here today and the things we consider, probably have a broad application to every generation and to every locality. I think we will find that to be the case.

James jumps right in by saying, "My brethren, count it all joy when ve fall into divers temptations:" (James 1:2). We'll find that the major theme of this chapter one in James is dealing with the believer's attitude or reaction to or relationship to trials in life. Count it pure joy when you face multiple trials. We are so used to hearing that, I think, those of us who have been brought up in the faith, that it just sounds so Sunday-ish, right? It sounds so Bible-ish that it probably doesn't have the impact that it ought to have with us. But that is a pretty radical statement.

What would have to be true of someone, to take particular joy, to consider it pure joy, to run into various constant and unending trials in life? Isn't really our whole effort in life pointed toward avoiding difficulties? I smile at this because I spend a great deal of my time at work trying to learn the best strategies for managing projects. Of all the body of information and writing that is on that topic, the whole thrust of it is, learn how to anticipate trouble and plan your way around it. Learn to respond quickly to difficulties and to lesson or mitigate the difficulties of the problems that arise from that. So the whole idea there is, the excellent project manager is the one who has anticipated the most difficulties, has planned around them, has taken the brunt of the problems away from it by his prior planning and those that remain, he quickly responds to and eliminates.

That whole mindset suggests that trials are bad. Difficulties are bad. You don't want delays. You don't want unsuspecting difficulties. James here is suggesting something very different from that. He is suggesting it ought to be a source of joy.

What kind of a view of the world would find joy in difficulties? Remember, we started in Deuteronomy with a passage that was suggesting that men of God ought to think of themselves differently. They have to think of themselves as completely unique from the rest of the world. In what way can we think of ourselves in such a radically unique way, that finding joy is something more than just what we talk about on Sunday morning? What kind of a life finds pleasure in difficulties?

Well, he gives us a hint of that, in verse 3, "Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience." I think that endurance probably would be more consistent with the vocabulary of our current vernacular. The trying of your faith builds endurance in life. So, the kind of person that would find pleasure in trials is the kind of person that elevates or thinks highly of notions of first, living by faith and secondly, enduring in that faith.

Now let's step back a moment and let's think about what it means to live by faith. The common notion today of living by faith is that you kind of just meander through life with this strong sense of hoping and wishing and desiring a good outcome. So you are this perennial optimist. You just constantly think good is going to come from it all. You just keep quoting Romans 8:28. Romans 8:28 is indeed there and is indeed real and I am not trying to make fun of it. But faith goes far beyond a haphazard, happy-go-lucky, it's all going to turn out good. People who subscribe to that can kind of get disillusioned when too many difficulties come stacked up in a row. Suddenly you begin to think, well I didn't bargain for all of this.

But what really is Biblical faith? The writer of the Hebrews suggests that it is that absolute certainty that what God has said will come to pass is going to come to pass. So whatever God has said, we can take to the bank.

So James is saying here, being absolutely convinced that what God has said is going to come to pass is so valuable, that anything that comes along in life that affords you the privilege of reminding yourself that God's in charge and what He has said will come to pass is going to come to pass and anchoring yourself into that, is of great value. Now we might call it unfortunate, but a reality of it is that those thoughts aren't typically engendered when everything is going smooth. Those thoughts are more easily cultivated in the midst of difficulties.

James is saying, our life of faith is so entirely valuable, in fact it is so much more valuable than any other attribute in life, that we ought to be delighted by those things that may cause all kinds of difficulties and may make a mess of your life, but nonetheless, draw you closer to God's promises, to His declaration.

If a life of abject poverty, in a

sense, James is saying, nonetheless wins for you a kind of confidence in God that makes you just forever beholden to Him, so be it. James is saying, in essence, choose that over a good life - good being defined by ease and comfort and smoothness.

These are the kinds of thoughts that you are not going to hear espoused by a New York Times bestseller. These are not ideas you are going to find in the newspaper. This isn't the kind of conversation that is going to spring up around the drinking fountain at work. In fact, these kinds of ideas I only know of coming from Scripture. Because God wants a peculiar people. He wants people that are uniquely and specifically dedicated to one way of thinking, to one thought, to one aspiration, to one goal. That's to glorify Him and to exalt His name. To make Him the God of the universe and to exalt Him and praise Him as that.

So James says, because we know inherently that trials bring us back to those kinds of thoughts, count it joy! Every time you have a trial, what happens? We know what happens. We go scrambling back to God. 'Oh, God, sovereign Lord, save me. Help me through this difficulty.' I am not making fun of that. That is a good thing to happen. We certainly shouldn't begin to try to solve our problems on our own. But let's acknowledge that that scrambling back to God, if it becomes a habit, if it becomes a way of life, if we have sufficient difficulty in our life to drive us to what we know we should be doing to begin with. James says, eventually it builds a pattern. It builds a pattern of endurance or patience, as King James translates it. A pattern where we begin, not to anticipate and long for smooth sailing, but we begin to anticipate and long for life to be lived out before God, moment by moment.

So eventually we get to the point, whether it's smooth or whether it's rough, whether we are happy at the moment or whether we are in the pit of despair, God still is huge in our thoughts. He still is the one that we long for and we love the notion that whatever is before us is an opportunity. Whatever is before us is one more opportunity to see God as the Eternal One. The Omnipotent One. The Creator of all. The source of righteousness. The source of meaning and purpose in life. The source of all joy.

"But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire..." or complete, without lack of anything. (James 1:4) Now, that verse only makes sense if we take it in the context of what James is talking about here. We are not talking about having the stuff of this world in such abundance that we can't possibly want yet another thing. But a life that is just so thoroughly satisfied with his God, with his maker, with his source of joy, is complete, is perfect and wants nothing.

Now James is anticipating what might be the immediate response to that. I just don't have the wherewithal to think like that. I must not just have God's perspective. Well, "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God..." v. 5. Don't forget now, this God that we are asking this of is the God who gives liberally. Gives lavishly. Gives indiscriminately. Prodigiously. Can't find any more words to just describe the sense that God is desirous to give. Well, Jesus said. I came that you might have life and you might have abundantly that life filled with satisfaction (St. John 10:10). Satisfaction in Him with the reward of knowing Him. If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally. And doesn't upbraid. Doesn't chastise you. Doesn't say, 'why are you back here asking again? You asked yesterday, isn't that enough?' Doesn't chide. But He gives to all men liberally.

"...and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man

think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord." v.5-7. This has been a stumbling block to many people and it causes us to pull back. That's exactly not what James wants. James here, is not creating a status of Christian prayer warriors that we sometimes make this passage out to be. That there are certain people that just have this surreal kind of confidence where they just step in before the presence of God and boy, they ask and it happens. That's so deeply entrenched that I think we need to probably spend a minute just thinking about that. Because it probably takes us following those thoughts to a silly conclusion to make us realize how that can't possibly what James is speaking of here.

God is God, right? Is there any argument there? By that, I mean that He knows everything. You and I are something considerably less than that, right? You and I see things through our experience base and through our limited understanding and we just don't understand it all, do we?

Now, how should prayer work? God is in heaven, who sees all things and hears all things, knows all things and has all power to do whatever He wills and we are on this earth. We see something and we have a notion of what we want so we turn to God and we say. 'God, this is what I want.' How should it be? Should God unequivocally, immediately, say, 'yes sir' and do it? Do you want a God like that? Do you want a God that's tethered to your desires? Obligated to your opinion? If we have that kind of a God, He's a pretty small God, isn't He? Maybe He's huge, but He's just been constricted down to - well, the best that can come out of it is our limited understanding of what's good.

No, we don't want a God like that. We want a God that knows better than we do. We want God to respond, not according to our silly view of the world, but we want God

to respond according to His pure goodness and His love for us and His perfect understanding.

James is not setting up a criteria here where we go to God with a certain bold confidence that whatever we suggest at the moment comes to pass. Remember again, let him ask in faith. What is faith again? What did we say that was? It's knowing what God had said will come to pass is going to come to pass. So that if God has declared something to be good and right, we ought to pray. If what God has declared is going to come to pass, then when we pray for it to come to pass, we ought to be certain it is going to come to pass. That is what faith is.

If God says something is going to come to pass, like He's just declared, anyone that lacks wisdom, if he asks, God will give. Because God gives liberally and doesn't chastise or upbraid. (James 1:5) That has been declared. That has been revealed. Now, if you lack wisdom, God has said He will give it if you ask. So you ought to ask and you ought to be certain that He will respond and give.

You see the difference? If God has declared it to be so, if God has declared it to be good, then we dare not ask. And when we ask, we dare not fail to be absolutely certain that He will deliver.

But of course, if God has not declared it, if it's merely a desire on our part, that's a very different subject. That is not what James is addressing here. God is not what some people have referred to as a vending machine. You put in your prayer, you get out your merchandise.

But if we see it in its truth, then it becomes a beautiful thing, doesn't it? Because now we see that God is a good God. We see that God is dependable. He's faithful. If God has declared it, He will deliver. That's reassuring, is it not? Don't you want to live in that kind of a kingdom? In a kingdom where God says it and we can take it to the bank? He has merely commanded us to ask for it and He will give.

"For let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord. A double minded man is unstable in all his ways." v.7,8. Let's not be of those that shrink back. Let's not be of those that will hear the Word of God and one moment rejoice and the next moment hold it in reserve - I am not so sure. That, unfortunately becomes the plight of those who began to read this passage as if God is the cosmic giver of all things that we ask for. Because eventually, we are going to run into an unanswered prayer, aren't we, or what appears to be an unanswered prayer, a no. If we don't understand what God is asking of us here, our faith may be shaken if it is in the wrong thing.

"Let the brother of low degree rejoice in that he is exalted: But the rich, in that he is made low: because as the flower of the grass he shall pass away." v.9,10. Again, you see the beauty of this? We, as earth bound folks often fall into the trap of allowing ourselves to fit into the categories that the world around us has created. We don't live in the caste system of India, but we do live in the caste system, right? We all know who we are welcome to associate with and who we are not. We all know the certain social-economic levels where we fit and where we don't. We all that have experienced a public education, know the cool crowd and then the other crowd that is not quite as cool. The athletic types and those that didn't quite make that grade. The scholastic type.

Jesus is saying, isn't it delightful? In fact, all of us as believers ought to rejoice in the fact that those dissipate in the kingdom of God. All those stratifications dissipate. They mean nothing! The rich man looks at himself and says, what is this? I mean, in a few short years it is gone! I am not taking it with me. I face eternity just like everyone else. We say the ground is level at the foot of the cross. Oh what a beautiful thing!

Let a man of low degree rejoice in the fact that this is nothing. This is insignificant. In a few short years I am going to be experiencing the joys of heaven right along next side of those people that right now look like in life they have it made.

Once again, life in the kingdom of God, it doesn't work unless we completely adjust the way we think. If we don't reject the world's system, the thought patterns of this world, it doesn't work. It falls flat. In fact, Christianity, when all of those worldly things are hung on to, it becomes actually kind of ugly. Christianity with the stratification of socio-economic status, actually becomes an ugly thing. Christianity, segmented by the beautiful and the not so beautiful is an ugly thing.

What drives you? Where is your passion? What excites you? Is it getting one more thing? Is it appearing a certain way in the eyes of those around you? Is it a constant clawing and scrambling to be just a little bit higher than those you associate with in some measure? Let's reject that. Let's together, as a body of believers, encourage one another to throw all that aside. Let's see the ugliness of that. Let's see the beauty. Let's see the beauty in God exalted as God and us as His subjects. Loyal. Loyal because He, as the good God, is the only one deserving of our loyalty. Of our adoration. But so worthy of our lovalty and our adoration that that loyalty and that adoration ought to be so tenacious, so cemented, so firm that nothing, nothing shakes it. Let's be children of the kingdom.

"Armageddon" *Retired Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan*

On August 15, 1945, General Douglas McArthur, aboard the U.S. battle ship, Missouri, in Tokyo Bay, received the unconditional surrender of General Tojo, who was prime minister of Japan during World War II. At that time, General McArthur said to the news reporters present, "Unless men devise a more equitable means of settling their differences, Armageddon is just around the corner."

Earlier that month, I believe it was on August 6, a lone B52 bomber appeared over Japan. Its mission was to drop the A-bomb on a city farther up the coastline from Hiroshima in southern Japan, but that city was clouded over so the bomber continued on to Hiroshima, its second city to be considered in case the first was clouded over. As the plane approached Hiroshima, the air raid sirens went off but upon the consideration that it was only one plane, not a formation of planes, the all-clear was given and people went about their business instead of heading for the air raid shelters. That plane dropped one bomb which exploded in mid-air, melting iron beams enough to cause them to change shape, and at the same time, killing about 100,000 people, plus the thousands of people who suffered and died later from the effects of the radiation. One taxi driver in Hiroshima said that he was a little boy on a school bus just outside the city that morning and the bus driver had the diarrhea and kept the children waiting on the bus while he went to the bathroom. This, the taxi driver told me, saved his life and the lives of the other children and the driver of the hus.

The Japanese government was in a state of shock and was slow in reacting to what had happened so a second atomic bomb was dropped a couple of days later, this time on Nagasaki, a city still farther to the south. Then the emperor had a meeting with the government people and told them and the nation that they must surrender unconditionally. A photograph or painting of this meeting is famous in Japan. They expected to be slaves of America but America helped Japan, to their utter amazement.

General McArthur was referring to the destructive power of the atomic bomb when he said, "Armageddon is just around the corner." He knew about that last battle to be fought between the forces of good and the forces of evil, from Revelation 16:16, "And he gathered them together into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon."

The last part of verse 14 in Revelation reads, "To gather them to the battle of that great day of God Almighty." I do not pretend to understand the details of prophecy but it sounds as if God himself will be visibly involved in that final battle before Christ rules on the earth for a thousand years.

Scripture from Jude may be relevant, verses 14 and 15, "Behold, the Lord cometh with ten thousands of his saints, to execute judgment upon all." McArthur simply warned us that the end may be nearer than we think. His expression, "Just around the corner," means, "You can't see it but it is really very near."

In the midst of all this, our Lord Jesus Christ tells us in Matthew 24:6, "See that ye be not troubled." When I was on a troop ship headed for Japan during the Korean War, this verse was a great comfort to me. I also tried to comfort myself by pretending that I was just going along as an observer. I was assigned to Japan instead of Korea, but there, in the army hospital, returning service men with whom I had trained, told me what had happened to them in Korea. It wasn't pleasant.

So Armageddon, the last great battle, which signals the end of this world as we know it, is just around the corner. What can we do about it? We can surrender to God and rest in Christ, making as sure as we know how that we are walking in the light as He is in the light, in which case the blood of Christ cleanseth us from all sin. I John 1:7. This is no child's play. The stakes are high in the game of life.

Some people may say that they know and understand prophecy in the Bible. This reminds me of what the Greek scholar, Socrates, said about the Greek teachers in the market place where he went to discuss the philosophical questions of the meaning and purpose of life. He said, "The difference between you teachers and me is that you don't know but you think you know. I don't know and I know I don't know." The teachers did not like Socrates' ridicule and had him condemned to death. which was carried out by ordering him to drink hemlock poison, whatever that is. He drank the poison and died but he died admitting that there were many things he really didn't know. He lived before the time of Christ, so I can't say that he believed on the Lord Jesus Christ but it is possible that he believed on the promises concerning the coming of Christ, the Savior. I hope so. I consider Socrates to have been a good example regarding humility. Let's just admit that we don't know, but God knows, and we are glad to leave all those difficult matters in His hands. Armageddon is just around the corner. Be ready and let it go at that. Rejoice in the Lord.
