Sermon by Bro. Jim Meiss, Phoenix, AZ

II Chronicles 35 and II Thessalonians 2

Greetings in the name of Jesus. If we are able to assemble together in the Lord's house today, we truly are very privileged. We have much to be grateful for. We just sang together that He will lead us by waters still and He will fill our thirsting souls. So may we be filled with that thirst, that desire for the truth of God's Word, trusting that He is able to give us all that we are in need of.

Last Sunday morning we had the privilege of considering King Asa, as we read from the Old Testament. The teaching really struck me, as we talked about a king who served God well for thirty five years. I think somewhere in the reading, the word 'perfect' was used to talk about the things that he did (I Kings 15:14). When we think about it, that's pretty commendable. Thirty five years he was doing the right thing.

Brother Bill, last Sunday, shared that it had been about thirty four years since he'd been baptized. My wife and I are both about at that same point, where it has been about thirty five years since that time when we made that beginning. We think that's really a pretty lengthy period of time. That's really something!

Then King Asa started to rely upon himself. He looked at the treasures that were in God's house. Using his own logic and his own thinking, he devised a plan that was not according to God's will. He turned from the path of serving God with a right heart. (I Kings 15)

It really struck me as a reminder that this great adventure that we are on, of walking with the Lord, this wonderful privilege that we have of relying on His grace and looking forward to being with Him one day in heaven, it's a day to day thing, isn't it? Moment by moment we have to realize that our strength is not of ourselves. It doesn't matter what we've done in the past. But in the midst of this battle day by day, we need to look to our God, rely

upon Him and trust Him for the grace to take the next step, believing that He is able to complete the work that He has begun.

So we consider once again, in II Chronicles 35, an incredible time, an incredible celebration of a beautiful thing that took place. A king that was in tune with God. That had been given proper guidance, as a young man, by Godly men that taught him and showed him the way. They had this Passover and there was nothing else like it!

I had to think, as we read about the singers here, the years went by and God's people were hauled away captive to Babylon. Eventually they were allowed to go back to Jerusalem and rebuild the temple. Nehemiah came and they had the Passover again and the singers were there again. Nehemiah went back to Babylon and he came back to Jerusalem and he just was disgusted with what he found, because once again, the people, even though they had taken part in such an incredible Passover, we read there in Nehemiah that provisions were no longer made for the singers, so they were scattered to the fields to try to provide for themselves (Nehemiah 13:10). They had drifted away from being close to God.

Here we read about Josiah, almost exactly like Asa. He went to battle. He had his own plan. He used his own thinking, his own logic. He thought, well, surely I can do this. His life was taken from him. (II Chronicles 35:20-24)

So we look at all this and we consider it and we say, what does this mean? What hope is there if these godly men made bad choices that led to their downfall? What does it mean for me? I am so grateful today, that I can stand here with the truth of God's Word and tell you that because of the gospel of the good news, because of Jesus Christ, because of the words that were recorded by His disciples, Peter tells us, ye are not

saved by vain things. You were not saved by the tradition of your fa-

Light From The Word



Writings based on God's Word

Spiritual Gifts

Spiritual gifts are given by God to every believer. They strengthen the Body of Christ and assist in carrying out His work here on earth. The Word teaches that we are to be knowledgeable (not ignorant) about spiritual gifts (1 Cor. 12:1). The purpose of this editorial is to help us grow in our knowledge and understanding of God's plan regarding spiritual gifts, so that we can become more useful vessels in the Lord's kingdom.

Key points to be considered regarding this subject include: 1) all members have useful gifts, 2) humility is essential, 3) there are many different gifts and roles and each member is needed, 4) there is to be no comparing, competition or division within the Body, 5) application of gifts has no value without charity and 6) utilization of gifts must be to the glory of God and for the edification of the Church

Every member of the Body is given gifts and is placed in a position where he or she can be useful. "But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal" (1 Cor. 12:7). "But now hath God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him" (1 Cor. 12:18). God has a wonderful plan whereby we can exercise faithful stewardship of His gifts, as those who will someday give an account (Matt. 25:14-30; 1 Cor. 4:2).

Humility is a prerequisite for grace, without which no good thing can be accomplished. "... God resisteth the proud and giveth grace to the humble" (1 Pet. 5:5). Humility helps us remember that our gifts come from God and any results are for His glory. True humility does not allow us to elevate ourselves (1 Cor. 12:3) or put ourselves down (Psa. 139:14). A false humility can cause us to draw back and fail to use the gifts which have been given to us. Failing to use our talents and gifts is not humility but irresponsibility. We should not say, "I cannot..., for I am a child" (Jer. 1:6) as Jeremiah did when he was called to serve. God does not call the "qualified." He first desires a willing mind (2 Cor. 8:12), and then He qualifies those He calls through Spirit-endowed gifts and grace.

Our motive for service should never be to seek glory for ourselves as the Pharisees who sounded a trumpet when they gave alms (Matt. 6:2). Sometimes there is criticism of the fact that we give honest, factual reports of the useful contributions made when God-given gifts are applied in the many outreach activities of our church (World Relief, Missions, Home for the Handicapped and Gateway Woods websites, Silver Lining articles and informational presentations, etc.). If the motive were to elevate self or glorify man, this would be in error. Rather, the purpose is to glorify God, to provide information regarding opportunities and to encourage others to offer themselves for humble deeds of service, which is in accord with God's Word. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16). "And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works" (Heb. 10:24).

The Holy Spirit bestows a wide diversity of gifts and roles in order for the Body to be complete and fulfill all of its functions. These functions are also known as the four-pillar mission of the church. We are often reminded of the importance of giving balanced emphasis to each of these pillars (sharing the Gospel with the lost, nurturing the believer, preserving sound doctrine and serving others). No individual is gifted equally in all of these areas; thus all members are needed and must work together in harmony in order for all of the various functions to be carried out effectively. "And the eye cannot say unto the hand, I have no need of thee: nor again the head to the feet, I have no need of you" (1 Cor. 12:21). Our diversities of gifts, personalities and backgrounds can be directed by God for the furtherance of His work on earth, if we submit to Him, live obedient lives and sincerely love and esteem one another (Eph. 4:16). These diversities are not intended to be used for selfish purposes or to justify independent interpretations and applications of the Word (2 Pet. 1:20).

We are warned many times in God's Word that there is to be no comparing, competition or division within the Body of

Christ. We are in error when we give more or less esteem to another member based on our own judgments or preferences. God is the Master who is over all. The Apostle Paul asked, "Who art thou that judgest another man's servant? To his own master he standeth or falleth, Yea, he shall be holden up: for God is able to make him stand" (Rom. 14:4). James further condemned this error by stating "But if ye have respect to persons, ye commit sin, and are convinced of the law as transgressors" (Jam. 2:9). God is the one who brings us together with our diversity and tempers us so that we can contribute to, rather than detract from the functions of the Body. "...God hath tempered the body together, having given more abundant honour to that part which lacked" (1 Cor. 12:24). Being "tempered" involves a moderating, intentional process by which one is made suitable to contribute to a larger purpose. We sometimes become so "wise in (our) own conceits" (Rom. 12:16), that we resist the "tempering" of our God to allow us to be cooperative and useful in the Body. Such behavior is divisive, and Paul writes: "... there should be no schism in the body" (1 Cor. 12:25).

Following Paul's concluding exhortation in 1 Corinthians 12 to diligently seek spiritual gifts, he points us to the most important condition for useful service: "... and yet shew I unto you a more excellent way" (1 Cor. 12:31). The more excellent way is charity (Christ-like love). Without charity as our motivation for service, it will be of no profit or eternal value (1 Cor. 13:1-3). Love for Christ is what constrains us to labor together in harmony within the Church (1 Cor. 3:9; 2 Cor. 5:14).

Finally, we must always keep in mind the ultimate goal of glorifying God in all of our endeavors: "... whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31). We must remember that Christ is the Head of the Body, and everything must focus upon Him. We are also taught: "Let all things be done unto edifying" (1 Cor. 14:26). When we all work together and strive to obey the whole counsel of God, our church will thrive and its mission will be fulfilled.

Apostolic Christian Prison Ministry

Current involvement

As the Holy Spirit moves within our brethren, approximately twenty five of our churches have become involved in prison ministry to various degrees. These ministries involve city, county, state and federal jails and penitentiaries reaching both male and female inmates.

The ministries include individual counseling, worship services including sermons and song worship, pen pal correspondence, Bible distribution, Bible Study programs and distribution of a wide variety of items for the inmate's personal use and for their families.

Brokenness offers opportunity

The LORD is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and saveth such as be of a contrite spirit.

The opportunities to show the love of God and our Savior are abundant. Many lost souls are at a low point in their lives. They are discouraged, humbled, bewildered, and searching for answers. This broken state of mind makes some of them receptive to the call of God. As we know, God works through believers.

For the scripture saith, whosoever believeth on him shall not be ashamed. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him.

For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent?

As it is written, how beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!

Berean Prison Ministry

The most extensive ministry within our Brethren is the Berean Prison Ministry. It became a Government approved tax deductible ministry in the year 2000. Two thousand Bibles are sent out per month to inmates in 45 of our States. This distribution is computerized to insure an inmate receives only one Bible.

In addition to worship services and counseling, the Berean ministry has an extensive Bible study program mailed to inmates. Lessons are sent back to Christian volunteers who grade the lessons. About 100,000 lessons are currently being graded per year. The Berean programs extend internationally to Russia,

Romania, Mexico, Africa, Jamaica, Haiti, and Grenada.

Can God use you?

We encourage anyone who is moved by the call of God to visit those in prison to contact any of the brothers and sisters who have been blessed so much by serving God in this way. The need is so great.

When you personally hear an inmate's plea for help and witness them weeping in despair, it can be heart wrenching and somewhat overwhelming. We are reminded of the Savior's words in Luke 10:2...

The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth laborers into his harvest.

However, the joy and peace that is evident in the lives of inmates who have found the Lord makes all the efforts and emotional involvement so worthwhile.

May God continue to bless our Brotherhood's involvement in prison ministry to the saving of souls and the spiritual growth of all the believers, both inmates and volunteers, who participate in this work ordained by God.

Oakville Flood Relief

n Saturday, June 14th 2008, after a valiant sandbagging effort by locals and volunteers from Connecticut to Kansas, the Iowa River breeched the levee at Oakville Iowa. Flood waters rushed into the town and surrounding bottom covering approximately 17,000 acres of farmland, homes and businesses to a depth of between three and twenty feet depending on the location. In all, nearly four hundred homes were flooded. Thankfully, there had been sufficient time for the removal of most of the grain, livestock and household furnishings prior to the levee breech.

Not the result of a lack of man's efforts or concern, but by the divine will of an Almighty Creator, the lives of those affected have been changed forever. For some, moving to another location was their best option. For others, the monumental task of mudding out and rebuilding stood before them. In the Oakville Church family, nearly half of the congregation had suffered loss to some degree.

One of the many blessings associated with our brotherhood is the love and compassion we share for one another. As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. GAL 6:10

The overwhelming response of the brotherhood, through prayers, financial gifts and volunteer labors has been a great source of encouragement and support to those who have suffered such great loss and trial of faith. World Relief has been active in the organization of volunteers to assist in the clean-up and rebuilding process and in assessing the financial losses of brethren and

friends. To date, approximately \$865,000 in financial assistance has been dispersed through the generous gifts of the brotherhood. The homes of nine families within the brotherhood have been renovated and a new state of "normalcy" is beginning to take shape.

Winter Work Project 2009

The Winter Work Project in Oakville is now focused on the needs of the community. There are many more homes where help is needed in the rebuilding process. Needy families may not have the skills or financial means to accomplish the work of restoring their homes alone. According to government statistics, the median household income in the town of Oakville is just over \$29,000 per year. Most, if not all, did not have flood insurance. Payments from FEMA were received by homeowners based on the assessed value of their home prior to the flood. The maximum FEMA payment was \$28,800 with many receiving considerably less

For a family who had been living from paycheck to paycheck, the additional expenses related to restoring their homes are simply beyond their means. But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? I JOHN 3:17

God's word is very clear in giving us direction in our responsibility toward those in need. We, who have been most richly blessed in so many ways, are called to be faithful stewards of that which God has so abundantly showered upon us. We are challenged to open up our hearts and give to those in need. We have

opportunity to give both financially and of our time in volunteer labor. Through the use of volunteer labor, a substantial reduction in cost will be realized, making it possible for many to restore their homes. Please pray that God will move the hearts of many to be willing workers in this, His work, and that the eyes of those in need may see Him as their loving, compassionate provider.

Opportunity to serve

World Relief has organized an ongoing work project in Oakville and is seeking volunteer laborers to help in rebuilding flood damaged homes within the community. During the winter months, work will be concentrated inside homes that are enclosed and heated. There is need of both skilled and unskilled workers: carpenters, electricians, plumbers, HVAC, drywall installers and finishers, general laborers, painters, wood refinishers, clean-up and cooks assistants.

Volunteer accommodations are provided at the Oakville church. Dormitory style sleeping rooms with twin size mattresses and pillows are provided. Each volunteer should bring their own sleeping bag. Shower facilities are located in the church basement. Three meals are served each day Monday thru Friday. Saturday meals are breakfast and noon dinner. No meals are served on Sunday.

Gateway Woods, like many other areas, recently experienced the Ice

Storm of '08. Picture the scene: it's below zero outside. The power has been out for some time now, and Gateway homes are running on generators. That means a few lights, one working outlet, and heating for the center of the home, but not the sleeping quarters. Still, we were quite thankful, imagining what it must be like for those without generators. Houseparents and other Gateway Staff, both on and off duty, worked well into that cold night in December to best meet the needs of others and themselves.

For our family, the hour was late when we were finally crawling into bed, our children bundled under several blankets, the residents of Pine House snuggled into their beds. It didn't seem long and the gentle buzz of the generator that had lulled us to sleep was the very object that awakened us...by its silence. For a brief moment, all grew quiet and cold. Until the alarm went off...and didn't stop. With frantic efforts to silence the alarm, my husband and I, along with the full-time Houseparents who were supposed to be off duty, searched for ways to end the shrill beeping. The owner's manual? A phone number to call? Finally, Bro. Shane found the back-up battery and ripped it out of its casing. Silence. Ahh...blissful silence. Exhausted and very cold, but relieved to be free of the spine-tingling, hair-raising alarm, we put on more layers and crawled back into bed. The battery powered digital clock/ thermo-meter read 3 something a.m. and negative something outside.

As I lay in bed, trying to fall asleep, and thinking of the teenagers sleeping soundly in the wings of Pine House, I could not help but be thankful. They are quiet; they are sleeping, just as our own children are sleeping. And soon, by the grace of God, it will be morning. But before it was morning, before we even drifted into sleep,

the power came on. Not the generator. The power.

Praise God that He is the true source of power. Anything else we may try to lean upon for strength may work for a while, but ultimately, it's only just a generator, a shabby replacement for the true and awesome power of Almighty God, whose mercies are new every morning, and whose compassions, unlike electricity, never, ever fail. Great is Thy faithfulness.

Biblical Financial Stewardship, Part II

Many of us have been adversely affected by the economic upheaval that has recently impacted our nation and the world. We have watched helplessly as our savings, retirement accounts, and other assets have been greatly devalued. In an attempt to discern the causes of our present financial uncertainty and learn how to react to them, people are looking to financial counselors and economic experts. But God's Word not only identifies the root causes of financial distress, it also clearly reveals the remedy.

The Bible has many warnings about putting our trust in money and earthly possessions. The Apostle Paul wrote to Timothy that he should "charge them that are rich in this world, that they . . . [not] trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy." (1 Timothy 6:17)

Jesus told his disciples, "Children, how hard is it for them that trust in riches to enter into the kingdom of God!" (Mark 10:24). And before telling the parable of the rich landowner who made foolish decisions with regard to his possessions, Jesus said, "Take heed, and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." (Luke 12:15)

Debt

One huge contributor to financial troubles is debt, which a dictionary defines as "money that a person is obligated to pay to another." This includes borrowed money, bank loans, credit card balances, home mortgages, and past due bills.

Contrary to what some may think, the Bible does not forbid debt, but it does reveal what is harmful about debt. The author of Proverbs wrote, "The rich ruleth over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender." (Proverbs 22:7) The person who enters into a debt becomes a "servant" to the lender. In a sense, the debtor surrenders his freedom until the repayment has been completed. He is not free to decide where to spend the portion of his income that must go to retire the debt. And the

greater the debt, the more confined is the debtor's servitude. Paul warned the Corinthians, "Ye are bought with a price; be not ye the servants of men." (1 Corinthians 7:23)

We are told that a staggering amount of debt is tied up in credit card accounts. Part of the problem is simply deception - using a credit card is spending money we don't have. Just one glance at a statement with an overdue balance will reveal the exorbitant price that credit card companies charge for that practice.

A simple but very practical test will determine if you are using credit or if credit is using you. If you can avoid finance charges by paying off the entire statement balance when you receive it. your credit card spending is under control. If not, seriously consider cutting up your cards and living more within your means. Most of the occurrences of the word "content" in the New Testament are in reference to possessions. Paul wrote to Timothy, "But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. And having food and raiment let us be therewith content." (1 Timothy 6:6-8)

Forsaking Counsel

Another major contributor to financial troubles is failure to get advice. For someone who habitually buys what he "wants" instead of what he "needs," this is a recipe for disaster. God's Word says, "The way of a fool is right in his own eyes: but he that hearkeneth unto counsel is wise." (Proverbs 12:15)

Here are three of the most powerful sources of counsel when making financial decisions:

1. The Counsel of Scripture.

Written by the inspiration of God, the Bible transcends time and cultural changes. Its principles are as valid and applicable today as the day they were recorded. Its purpose has been to communicate God's plan, purpose, and direction for all generations. "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword . . . and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart." (Hebrews 4:12) In seeking counsel for a particular financial decision, our first thought should be, What does God's Word say? If we find a direct answer, we need search no further. If there is no specific advice, then we should move on to the second source – godly people.

2. The Counsel of godly people.

God has wisely invested a wide variety of gifts and talents in His children. The Body of Christ is to function in a similar manner as a human body, where the members help, advise, chasten, encourage, support, and pray for one another. For those who are married, the first source of advice is our spouse. Subordinate to that, but still important from a biblical perspective, is the advice of parents. Then there are a host of specialists to whom we can turn, who have an expertise in the area of our financial decision. We read in Proverbs, "Without counsel purposes are disappointed: but in the multitude of counsellors they are established." (Proverbs 15:22)

3. The Counsel of the Lord.

One of the most important sources of wise counsel is the Lord. Isaiah wrote that "his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor." (Isaiah 9:6) Psalms frequently refer to God as a coun-

"I [the LORD] will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye.' (32:8)

"Thou [the LORD] shalt guide me with thy counsel." (73:24)

"I will bless the LORD, who hath given me counsel." (16:7)

God's counsel is received through prayer, meditation on His Word, and listening for the Spirit's voice. Whenever we are faced with a major decision, we need to find a quiet place where we can spend uninterrupted time praying, reading Scripture, and seeking the Lord's counsel. And be patient, since sometimes that involves waiting for His direc-

A final word of advice, to both those who seek counsel, and those who offer counsel: Continually ask the Lord for wisdom. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally . . . and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering." (James 1:5-6)

thers. But you have been saved by the precious blood of Jesus Christ, as a lamb without blemish and without spot. (I Peter 1:18,19)

These sacrifices were made. Much blood was shed in this chapter that we read. But you and I can claim the blood of Jesus. We can claim His promises and the truth of God's Word. We don't have to rely upon our own strength and our own might. We don't have to disguise ourselves. We don't have to come up with a plan. Praise God, He has a plan! He is able to deliver us from this battle and bring us to a good end. That is what we rest upon. That's why we trust Him more.

Was reminded this week how incredibly grateful we need to be for the truth of God's Word. I was speaking to someone that I work with who has the unfortunate situation of having a family member who is involved in a very serious drug addiction. This man, Mark, is at a point now, where it is starting to hit him that he has destroyed his life. He's at that point where he wants to ask for help but it is still hard for him to do. Many of us have had experiences in that situation, where it just tears your heart out to have a family member that you want to help. You are in that situation where really the only help that you can give them, is to make sure that you do nothing that enables them to continue in that lifestyle. That's not a great situation for a family member to be in.

We talked about Mark's behavior and the fact that he says things, and because of the history and because of the way that the person behaves, you know that you have to question what they say. As a family member, you want to give them the benefit of the doubt and you want to believe that they are saying the truth. Then you have those experiences where, obviously, what they said was not true. That's tough.

All of us deal with truth in our lives. How grateful we are that this

living Word, that is so freely available to us, is the truth of God. It wasn't just some idle writings but it was given by the Spirit of God through prophecy and it is true. We can hold on to that and we can be grounded in that. As we go through those storms of life, by God's grace, our anchor can hold.

So the first question we can ask ourselves (after reading II Thessalonians 2), have I been called of God? Have I been called of God? "Whereunto he called you by our gospel..." II Thessalonians 2:14. It humbles me to stand before you and say that God has given you the gospel of His calling this day through His servant. But I believe that because I read it in God's Word and it is plain before us. If there's any question today, have I been called by God, the gospel message goes forth. You have been called by our gospel. We read it together.

Called to what? "...to the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ." v.14. All of us today, who hear the Word, have been given all that we need so that we can obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. Do we have the desire? Are we ready to receive it? So that's really the next part of it, isn't it?

Receiving. What did we read here together? Verse ten says, speaking of those who will perish, "...because they received not the love of the truth, that they might be saved." So the call has gone forth. Now we ask ourselves, am I ready to receive it? Will I receive the truth that God sent?

Jesus Christ, in the high priestly prayer, St. John 17, talks about the fact that He fulfilled God's plan. He carried out what God asked Him to do. He said, I have given unto them the words which Thou gavest me. Jesus Christ was sent from God with these words. Why? Because God had to communicate to you and I. He had to bring the words so that you and I could know the truth that we talked about. The truth is given. Jesus said, I have given them the

words which Thou gavest me and they have *received* them and have known surely that I came out from Thee. They have believed that Thou did send me.

There's the gospel message. Sinner, today, are you ready to receive the words? If you receive the words of Jesus, you will be able to know surely that Jesus came out from God and believe that God sent Jesus to the earth for you. It's really that simple. It's really that plain. Receive the Word. Believe. That is the salvation that Jesus Christ brought to this earth. That is why the Apostle Paul gave his life to spread the gospel, the good news, to as many as would receive it. Because it is the will of our heavenly Father, the God of earth and heaven, that all men might be saved.

It is also the truth of God's Word that some will receive not. They received not the love of the truth that they might be saved. In other words, if we will just receive the love of the truth, then we can be saved. Unfortunately there is another part of that that says, if we are not willing to enter in at the strait gate, then we will follow the broad path that leads to destruction. (St. Matthew 7:13,14) Jesus Christ Himself gave us those words. Enter in at the strait gate, so that we can know the full salvation. So we either are saved or we're not saved. It is that simple. I am so thankful for the simplicity of the gospel, that the truth goes forth. If we receive Him, we can be saved and we can walk with Him.

These scriptures that we read together, talk about extremely serious things. They talk about the deep mysteries of God. They talk about the fact that there is great deception in the world. There is more great deception that will come. We are to be comforted by these words and we are to consider the fact that we don't have to be troubled. We don't have to be deceived. That day shall not come except there come a falling away first and that man of sin be revealed. (II Thessalonians 2:2,3)

What time are we living in? Jesus Christ warned His disciples. He said, watch and pray. Watch and pray and be ready for that time when the Lord will come again. (St. Luke 21:36) We believe that that warning is just as true for us today. That it is more urgent for us today and that the times are more serious for us, that we need to consider the time that we live in. We need to consider that deception is in the world.

So we look at the Old Testament teachings. We think about the fact that God's Word tells us those things are given to us for examples. So we look at King Asa and we look at King Josiah. We look at the singers who were told to be at the gate and keep on singing. Eventually they abandoned their post.

We are warned here that deception will be in the world. We say, well, how is it then that I won't be deceived? "Therefore, brethren, stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word, or our epistle. Now our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace, Comfort your hearts, and stablish you in every good word and work." II Thessalonians 2:15-17. God Himself is the God of hope. In the midst of our toughest times. He will give us hope and comfort us and establish His work in us. Aren't we grateful that sometimes, He chooses to do that through one of our brothers and sisters? Aren't we grateful for those times that we can be encouraged, we can receive the hope that we need, just by friendship. Just by someone being there at a time when we really needed some hope. God will give us what we need. He will comfort our hearts. He wants to use us. May we be willing. May we have that desire. May we never cease to pray that our love might grow in every way. May we never cease to pray.

God wants us to come and ask Him for help. We read the Psalms of King David. Sometimes he simply says, help God. Help God! God wants us to cry out to Him. God is the rock. We know that He shall not be moved. May we be comforted and established, believing that God's timing is perfect and he that now letteth will let (v.7). It's okay. When times are difficult, He will be there.

I've been thinking this week, about the time in my life when Satan was especially cruel. He doesn't have to play by the rules. He doesn't care how he chooses to come at us. My wife and I are looking forward to celebrating our 25th wedding anniversary and we believe that God brought us together. We have that faith and that confidence. There was a time when it was revealed to us that one of our children had a genetic disease. The only way for a child to have that genetic disease is if both parents carry the cystic fibrosis gene. We didn't know much about cystic fibrosis. We had a lot to learn. We were getting a lot of facts and learning a lot of things fast. There was that moment when Satan came and said, obviously it wasn't God's will for the two of you to get married, because this wouldn't have happened.

Satan is a deceiver and he is a liar. He was lying then. In a dark moment, one of you showed up at our front door. I don't recall, but I don't think, dear sister, you had anything in your hands. But you came to offer support and it was powerful and it was awesome. May we be encouraged and may we believe that God is able to bring us through the darkest hour. That He is able to bring us to a good and blessed end.

The incredible light and power of God! Verse eight says, "And then shall that Wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume..." That liar, Satan, the Lord shall consume "...with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming:" God's light is so bright. We sang together about the brightness of the sun in hymn 166 (Morning Hymn, Zion's

Harp) this morning and yet how much more the brightness of the Son of God! Far greater than the brightness of the sun. He shall destroy with the brightness of His coming. The truth of the Word, the brightness of Jesus Christ, shall destroy wicked and evil. His light shall reveal and illuminate all that we need. Let's trust Him more, walking on in joy. Being grateful for the saints that have gone on before that we look forward, believing that we've got more to go to heaven for than we ever had before. Trusting that He will deliver us as we look to Him. May we be comforted, may we be established, may we go forth with a desire to walk in His ways.

Concluding remarks by Elder Brother Jon Kokanovich

I think hymn 121 (Hymns of Zion), Watch and Pray, is such a fitting hymn for this morning. What did Josiah not do? He didn't pray! He had had this wonderful religious experience that he had been an important part of. I suspect he assumed that God was going to be with him because of what he had done in the past. Bad assumption! He didn't ask the Lord for direction.

He also got in some battle he had no business being in. He rejected godly advice from somebody he might not have thought was very godly. You and I wouldn't have thought that King Necho was a godly person. But he didn't consider that and he didn't pray. It cost him his life. I don't know that we need to jump to the assumption that it cost him eternal life. I don't think that's fair. But it cost him his earthly life. We need to really pray and we really need to consider godly advice.

There is this thought today that I think we have all been a part of, that Christ can come at any time. That's partly true, isn't it? Because He can come for you any time. But we read clearly today, as clear as it is in any place in the Bible I know of, that He's not coming until, in my words,

the antichrist is revealed. Now that might not be to everybody. But that's what the Word of God clearly says.

For Apostolics - I hope you are still going to love me after this and I want to say it as kind and loving as I can - what did we read today? What is a common thing that all of us, I think - maybe you haven't but I have - said? 'Well, that's not written in the Bible. That tradition, that custom isn't clearly written in the Bible so I don't have to do it and it must not be very important.' You've heard me say before, Sunday School is not written in the Bible. It doesn't say anywhere in the Bible, 'Thou shalt have Sunday School'. We've all been blessed by Sunday School.

But all of us, from time to time, have some challenge with this tradition or that tradition, that through the years has really been good but from time to time doesn't hit us very well. True? What did Brother Jim read to us this morning? The truth of the matter is we don't know exactly what he was talking about. Well, or that would be an excuse for us that we don't know what he was talking about. True? "Therefore, brethren, stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word, or our epistle." II Thessalonians 2:15. We have lots of good things that have been good for us for a hundred and fifty years. Then, this was written well before a hundred years. Whatever traditions or whatever it was that they had, he wanted them to hang on to. Because he knew it would be good for them. We need to be careful, I think, when we get a little, when I get a little, discouraged about this or that because it doesn't help us fit in in this society or that society.

I think we need to especially be careful about the ones that are *clearly* written. The one I have in mind I think you all know. It *clearly* says, greet one another with a holy kiss. (Rom.16:16, I Cor.16:20, II Cor.13:12, I Thess. 5:26) Four times. It's a challenge for us, isn't it? We worry about what other people think, don't we?

Asa was worried about what he thought and maybe what other people thought. Josiah was a whole lot more worried about what he thought than what God thought, because he didn't take the time to pray. Let's not make the same mistake. We have more to go to heaven for than we had yesterday. And the other choice makes no sense at all. May the Lord bless the Word.





History Book

The printing of the second edition of Marching To Zion was completed at the end of January. All the pages were folded and sent to a bindery. Sekan Printing of Fort Scott. Kansas, informed us it will take up to eight weeks to bind the 10.000 books that have been ordered. The books will then be shipped directly from Fort Scott to each of our local congregations, and to Apostolic Christian Publications, Eureka, Illinois. Several of you have inquired regarding the completion of this work. We are advising you as best we can.

Sekan Printing Company is owned by Bros. Lon and Don Banwart, who are the sons of deceased Elder Raymond Banwart. They also published the first edition of *Marching To Zion*.

Statistics

Up-to-date statistics of our church population was completed on the basis of the most recent *Minister's Book* which includes the year 2008. Comparisons were made in two-year periods back to 1994. In 1994, the church had 12,217 members compared to the 2008 total of 12,880. The 2008 total

was 40 members above that in 2006.

41 churches had growth during 1994 to 1998. Some congregations had significant gains, while others had losses.

It is interesting to note that there are 15 congregations with membership over 300. The largest churches with respect to membership are:

Membership totals in these 15 congregations comes to 6,414, or 49.8 percent of the denominational total of 12,880. There are nine churches with membership ranging between 200-300; 15 with membership between 100-200; 14 with membership between 50-100; and 19 with 30-50 members. Three churches had 22 members or less.

In the United States, the Christian faith has a great many denominations. The *Encyclopedia of American Religions* listed 1,200 in 1978 (page vi in the Introduction). A later study by the same author raised the total to 2,630 (in the U. S. and Canada).

The Light Of Hope

"Victory In Death"

When I was in Sunday School, my teacher told us that when we die we sleep until resurrection day, but that since we are sound asleep even thousands of years seem like only a split second, or words to that effect. I wondered about that then and I wonder about that now. I learned later that this teaching is called soul-sleep.

Another person in our church told me that when we die, our souls rest under the altar, based on Revelation 6:9, "I saw under the altar the souls of them that were slain for the word of God." Although most believers are not slain for the word of God, it was assumed that under the altar in heaven is where we will rest, waiting for the resurrection.

When one of our loved ones dies in the Lord, we take great comfort in hearing over the pulpit that our dear one has gone to heaven and is enjoying everlasting bliss. We read in I Corinthians 2:9, "Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God has prepared for them that love him."

We may also hear that we will now accompany our loved one to his or her final resting place and that our next meeting will be at that meeting in the air, based on I Thessalonians 4:16, 17, "The dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord."

The Apostle Paul wrote in Philippians 1:23, "For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better." This sounds as if he expected to be with Christ immediately upon his departure, that is, immediately upon his death.

The Lord Jesus said to the thief on the cross, Luke 23:43, "Today shalt thou be with me in paradise." In this case the Lord Jesus set a time, today. He didn't say, "Someday you will be with me in paradise."

I believe that this matter would be clarified if we remember that there is a difference as to what happens to our bodies at the time of death, and what happens to our souls or spirits. In regard to our bodies, they have fallen asleep at the time of death. I Corinthians 15:6. "After that, he was seen of above five hundred brethren at once; of whom the greater part remain unto this present, but some are fallen asleep." The Apostle Paul was writing about the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ and spoke about the witnesses who had died as having fallen asleep, that is, their bodies were

When the Lord Jesus Christ spoke to the thief on the cross, He was speaking of the soul or spirit, certainly not of His body nor of the thief's body. Three days later when Mary was about to touch Him, He said, "Touch me not; for I am not yet ascended to my Father." John 20:17. His resurrected body had not yet gone to heaven. Evidently, Christ had some work to be taken care of in heaven before his resurrected body could be touched by human hands. It probably had to do with

the application of the atonement in the temple in heaven. John did see a temple in his revelation of heaven. Revelation 11:19, "And the temple of God was opened in heaven, and there was seen in his temple the ark of his testament."

The Apostle Paul in I Corinthians 15:44 writes about our bodies, "It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body." I believe we all understand that our spiritual body is not our spirit or soul. It is a resurrected body similar to Christ's resurrected body. John writes, "We know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him."

The words soul and spirit are sometimes used interchangeably, but there is a difference. The word soul emphasizes the personality while the spirit is defined as the non-physical part of human beings, which includes the soul, in my mind.

Everything considered, Christ gives us the victory in death. If I understand the scriptures correctly, our spirits and souls, if we are in Christ, go directly to be with God and the Lord Jesus Christ, in heaven. As to our bodies, that's a different story. We must wait until the resurrection before we live in our new, spiritual bodies, but we don't have to be living in that body to have full comprehension of our surroundings in heaven. Our victory in Christ is over sin and over death and over Satan. Rejoice!
