

Sermon by Bro. Jesse Bedolla, Detroit, MI

Jeremiah 15:19-21 and I Timothy 4

Greetings to each of you on this Sunday morning. How thankful we are for an opportunity to come to church. How thankful we are for the beautiful sunshine today. For the warmth. How thankful we are for God's love. His nearness to us. His care for us. His thoughts towards us, that they are for good and to our benefit.

The Old Testament prophet, one who's considered to be one of the major prophets, one who is also referred to as 'The Weeping Prophet', Jeremiah faced a lot of challenges in his life. As we think about God's promise to Jeremiah, we can think about God's promises to you and I yet today.

Wonderful words of life that God shared with Jeremiah. We know he had such a need to feel God's presence, to feel His closeness. He had such great needs. He could have been lost in the depths of despair, but he always returned to his God and looked up to the one that could save him and provide for him. So too, do we have that opportunity today.

I Timothy 4 is a wonderful epistle by the Apostle Paul to one whom he loved dearly. He referred to him as his own son in the faith. Timothy is, as I recall, the one that was asked to be the elder at the church at Ephesus, if I am not mistaken. The Apostle Paul was inspired by God to talk to Timothy a lot about his age. To not despise his youth but to be sure in the calling wherein God had called him.

So again, the Apostle Paul, inspired of God, had wonderful words of life for Timothy, did he not? He has wonderful words of life for you and I as we read and consider that exhortation. We think, how does that apply in my life today? What is God saying to me today when He had those wonderful words for Timothy? How is He speaking to me? How is He working in my heart? It is something for each of us to personally think about as we go through these Scriptures today.

Let's go back to the Old Testament where we read a portion in Jeremiah. If we were to read all of Jeremiah chapter 15, we would start to get a feel for where we are at, where we are picking up in this particular book. Again, Jeremiah had a lot to say about the future. But he also had a lot to say about his present circumstances, the state of the children of Israel after having been taken over by an enemy force. There's a lot that transpires throughout all these chapters.

But Jeremiah did not have it easy. None of us would look at the life of Jere-

miah and say, 'Oh, well, he had it easy. He had the word of God put in his mouth. He had that opportunity to have that close communion with God. Whenever he got direction from God it was very clear. He didn't have to question what God was trying to do. He got very clear and very specific direction'. But we see along with all that, he also faced a lot of challenges. There were those that wanted to take his life when he stood before kings and told them the truth after there were others that were preaching unto them smooth things. 'Oh, you won't have any problems, you won't succumb to your enemies. Nothing will be bad.' Jeremiah said, 'That's not the way it is. There will be judgment. For these sins, there will be consequences'. People didn't want to hear that. That wasn't a popular message then. It's not a popular message today. But it is God's Word. It is truth. He tells us these things because He loves us.

So we see here in Jeremiah chapter 15, Jeremiah is going into a part of self pity, where he is talking about, why are you casting all this judgment on *me* and I am trying to do all these things for these people and do what you've asked me to do. There is a little bit of self pity that comes in with some of Jeremiah's feelings as he is conversing with God here.

Self pity is something that each of us is susceptible to. Each of us can find a time or point in our life or some sort of circumstance that we find ourself in that we start to look and say, 'Why? It's not fair. Why me? Why am I being asked to do this? Why am I being asked to go to this place? Why don't I have this? This is really what I wanted. Why is it not this way?' When we begin that why, why, why type mentality, we take our self down a road where God doesn't want us to be. There really is no blessing in taking our self mentally down that path. Because God will always have a perfect answer for us. He will always have a perfect answer and a reason. Even though we can't see it, even though we can't understand it.

That's why God asks you and I to have faith day by day. That's why the Apostle Paul, inspired of God, said, we need to walk by faith and not by sight. Because when we walk by sight and just look at our circumstances, what we can see and what we understand, we can begin to think about these things differently. We can start to think in a way that tends toward self pity. But when we walk by faith, that means at the forefront of all that is an over arching trust in God, to say,

'Okay, I see it is this way, but I trust God. I see it is that way. I am a little disappointed this didn't happen but I trust God.' When we have that type of mentality, then we aren't as susceptible to feel the self pity.

Progress Toward Biblical Unity

"Every kingdom divided against itself is brought to desolation; and every city or house divided against itself shall not stand..." (Matthew 12:25). Jesus understood the danger of God's people not being united. To truly be united we must know the Father and put on the mind of Christ. To do this we must know His Word.

In 2006 the Elder Body resolved to address with humility, brotherly love and commitment the needed efforts to address harmful differences and to increase trust and biblical unity within our Brotherhood. This will require long term commitment and diligent effort to reverse the inroads that Satan has made. Isaiah said many centuries ago, "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as white as wool" (Is. 1:18).

The purposes of this editorial are to highlight the goals we have adopted to strengthen biblical unity, to report progress in steps taken to fulfill them and to emphasize the need for perseverance and diligence in this effort.

Elder Body concerns and plans to address them were presented at the 2007 General Conference, asking for prayerful support to work toward resolution of harmful differences. At the 2008 Elder/Minister meeting a special plea was made to all ministers to give prayerful support and commitment to the effort to achieve godly unity in our Apostolic Christian Brotherhood. Via the 2008 General Conference and Memorandum we are entreating the entire Brotherhood to prayerfully walk with us and to be instruments of truth and peace in this work of faith.

The first goal of the biblical unity effort is a commitment to conduct a candid examination of the spiritual health of the church. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock..." (Acts 20:28). This began as a thorough self-examination by each elder. Church surveys, personal interviews, and other means are being used to help each elder examine his heart concerning his stewardship. Obtaining the counsel of our congregations to see how we could better serve our flocks (Ezek. 34) is a very humbling and beneficial experience. This self-examination

process is an ongoing effort.

Goal two is to clarify our calling as elders to feed and lead the church (Jer. 23:4; 1 Pet. 5:1-3). We are seeking to focus on biblical principles of leadership, to hold each other accountable to fulfill our responsibilities and to better support and nurture new elders. We are required as stewards to be accountable to God, to each other and to the brethren, and it is our sincere desire that we may be found faithful (1 Cor. 4:1-2).

Our third major goal is to nurture unified elder/minister understanding and commitment to preach and teach the whole counsel of God (John 8:31-32; 2 Tim. 2:15). Our ministers have been encouraged to eliminate personal agendas from their sermons so we do not quench the Spirit in bringing sound and complete biblical truth to our flocks. By focusing our preaching and teaching on the entire Word, our messages will support the four pillars of our church mission. "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee (1 Tim. 4:16).

We are also seeking to inspire and teach growing faith and sanctification within the Brotherhood (Heb. 6:9), which is goal four. Each elder is concerned about the encroachment of the world into the lives of believers. We must all focus sincere efforts toward living a sanctified life and resisting the impact of unwholesome worldly influences, by the grace of God. (Tit. 2:11-15). True spiritual unity comes with obedience to God's Word. We are thankful that progress is being made in working toward a kinder, more reasonable and loving spirit as we work through our differences.

Changes in the culture in America are also having a powerful impact on our church. A booklet has been prepared which summarizes some special efforts we have made which has helped us grasp the significance of some of these changes. We must retain our core doctrine regardless of the changes in culture. "As we treasure these assets and grapple with cultural context, we have no intention of altering our doctrine or core beliefs to accommodate culture. Indeed, evidence suggests that the culture needs these core values like never before!" (Culture Change, p.10).

The Elder Body has clarified our church position on Bible Studies to encourage sound spiritual growth. "The Apostolic

Christian Church supports Bible Studies which are structured in accord with biblical principles, for the purpose of increased understanding and application of God's Word, the edification of participants and the church, and are to the glory of God."

Goal five is to teach effective communication and delegation. Improved delegation of responsibilities within our church will result in better use of gifts and talents as well as more effective fulfillment of the church mission. (Acts 6:3). A greater effort is being made to encourage assistance with, and participation in, national world relief and mission projects and to identify local opportunities to provide loving deeds of kindness.

The sixth goal is to utilize elder forums to increase trust and open communication within the Elder Body. We have had three series of meetings in which we randomly chose different groups of elders for participation in each session. We are thankful to report that this smaller group approach has fostered greater interaction, a more open expression of our individual thinking, and a clearer understanding of our strengths and weaknesses.

We believe that progress has been made in the overall biblical unity effort, and we are committed to building on this foundation with diligence and persistence. The work to decrease harmful differences and increase unity based upon the Word of God will not be quickly or easily completed. The task cannot be accomplished by the elders working alone, and it must include our ministers and the entire Brotherhood. This begins with setting an example which reflects the life and love of Christ in all aspects of our lives.

We should willingly demonstrate cooperation and brotherly love as we serve our great God together. Satan has caused disruption and discord among God's people for many generations. Only by a humble attitude of submission to God and His Word, and by trusting in His grace to help us serve Him faithfully will we succeed. The core values of our Brotherhood are precious. We must not let them slip through compromise of the truth, by carelessness, or because of fear. We must live by faith and hope. Jesus said, "...upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" (Matt. 16:18).

An editorial committee of elder brothers is preparing articles for this section of the Silver Lining to address some of the special needs of our times.

Support was given at the Phoenix Conference to proceed with development of this tract which has been revised for final review and approval. The goal is to make this available to the brotherhood through Apostolic Christian Publications.

The tract could be shared with new believers and with the unconverted both within and without our faith as we have opportunity. It could also be placed in the many Bibles that our brotherhood distributes each year. The tract may be a useful starting piece for those with a heart for mission work. There are perhaps many other applications.

Magdalena Mexico Church Dedication

The Lord has truly blessed the efforts of Casa Vida E Esperanza (CVE) in Magdalena, Mexico. The English translation of CVE is House

of Life and Hope. The orphanage is a haven for children without parents that can care for them. This work was only a vision in 2004 when a group of Brothers visited the potential site. Through the prayers, financial support and labors of love from so many brethren and friends of the Apostolic Christian Church, the campus has taken shape.

The Mission Committee and World Relief have worked closely together in this project and the Board of Directors includes representatives from both, as well as other faithful brethren with a heart for Mexico. God has called many of our brethren to short and long term mission service in Mexico. At the time of this writing CVE has 31 children in its care.

A local church gathering was begun for the staff, children, friends and relatives of the children and the local community. The Lord has blessed the local church with two ministers that can share the gospel in Spanish. With the generous support of many brethren, volunteers and work teams, a church building is nearing completion. A dedication service will be held the evening of Saturday, March 28 in English and Sunday March 29th in Spanish. All are invited.

Reports

The Outreach Committee consists of several subcommittees to assist in the process of selection, preparation, sending, nurturing, and supporting those called for service in both Missions and World Relief. Representatives of both the Mission Committee and World Relief, as well as many faithful brothers with interest and experience in mission work, are represented on the Outreach Committee. There is

increasing awareness of the need for World Relief and Mission to work closely together as the Lord leads us to fulfill the four pillars of the church mission. While the primary charge to World Relief is to reduce humanitarian suffering, such efforts are always expended in the name of the Lord and with the prayer that the Lord will bless our efforts to save the soul.

Similarly the primary charge of the Mission Committee is to spread the gospel message of salvation, but to be effective, the physical needs of those involved must be addressed. Together the brethren on the Outreach Committee are working on guidelines and procedures for outreach that will allow structure and order to this work. They will appreciate your prayers in this effort.

The Servant Fund provides modest support for brethren sent by Mission or World Relief on long term assignments. Hearts have been moved and brethren continue to be sent as the Lord opens the way. Opportunities for those not sent include sharing the resources God has given by contributing to the Servant Fund, which currently has annual expenses of approximately \$520,000.

World Relief Responds to Disasters

With the recent cyclone in Myanmar and the earthquake in China there has been interest in knowing how World Relief responds to disasters throughout the world. World Relief has a disaster fund made up of contributions from the Apostolic Christian brotherhood designated to provide aid after a disaster.

If a disaster occurs in the United States, Mexico, Caribbean, Eastern Europe or India the World Relief Committee responsible for that area organizes our relief response and requests funding from the disaster fund. When disasters happen outside of those areas, the International Grants Committee works with disaster relief organizations to provide aid to those who are suffering. These Christian relief groups usually team with local Christian churches in the disaster area to assure your donations are used most effectively.

Over the last year the International Grants Committee has coordinated World Relief's response to several disasters. The resources for this work come from the Disaster Fund and in some instances are supplemented from non-designated donations.


Indonesia

One of the opportunities presented by the Indonesian earthquake was the construction of a hospital in the Telo Islands of Indonesia. Using World Relief donations, the work at that hospital is now expanding to provide a mobile medical clinic (by boat) for the nearby islands. The incidence of tuberculosis is very high

among the population. With regular checkups and medicine, the illness can be effectively treated. World Relief also funded the purchase of a portable medical laboratory. This amazing, solar powered kit allows the doctors to perform lab tests in remote areas where there is no electricity.

Kenya

The African country of Kenya has been involved in civil conflict causing many deaths and displacement of well over 100,000 persons. World Relief provided funds for assisting these unfortunate souls.

Sudan and Uganda

Hundreds of thousands of persons fleeing persecution in Sudan and Uganda are now living in refugee camps. In 2007 and again in 2008, World Relief provided funds to provide, food, water and medical assistance to those living in these disaster areas.

Ethiopia

Ethiopia is a country where there is often draught resulting in famine, or flooding causing extensive damage. World Relief has responded in both situations. In 2008 extensive flooding washed out a bridge caus-

ing serious problems for villagers. The only way across the river is to use boats as a ferry. Many cannot afford to pay for the boat ride and several persons have lost their lives attempting to wade across the river. A request was received for assistance to build a new bridge and funds were forwarded from the disaster fund.

Honduras

In Honduras, Hurricane Mitch constituted an unprecedented catastrophe due to the devastation. Thousands of dwellings were destroyed leaving thousands of families homeless. The hurricane caused the deaths of over 500 people and more than 12,000 were injured. World Relief sent financial support for medical teams assisting in the recovery from this tragic storm.

Myanmar

Myanmar, formerly called Burma, experienced a major cyclone in May of 2008. There was an estimated death toll of 130,000 and nearly 2½ million persons were affected. Some were killed by flying trees and some from exposure to the cold. Others died when the buildings where they had gathered for shelter collapsed. The government initially refused assistance. However, working through one of our relief organizations World Relief was able to provide assistance.

Just last week, after a series of weeks when he was homebound, his mother told me that he's up and walking and yesterday he brought her to work. I felt moved to tell him about the source of Help he could go to when his life seemed too complicated to bear. I'm

25 Ways to Provoke Anger in Children, Part II

This Silver Lining article addresses some ways that parents can unintentionally provoke their children to anger. This is part two of a four part series.

Parents have the calling (Prov. 22:6) to be proactive in training their children in the wisdom of how to experience the emotion (be ye angry), and yet make good choices (sin not). The context of this article will encourage parents to examine themselves first in how they can avoid "provoking their children to anger" (Col. 3:21). The author, Lou Priolo, outlines in his book on this topic, "The Heart of Anger¹", 25 ways that parents can unknowingly create anger and frustration in their children.

The first article included the following 5 ways of provoking anger;

1. The Lack of Marital Harmony, 2. Establishing and Maintaining a Child-Centered Home, 3. Modeling Sinful Anger, 4. Habitually Disciplining While Angry, and 5. Scolding. The remainder of this article will look at examples 6-12 as behaviors parents should try to avoid.

6. Being Inconsistent with Discipline:

When I therefore was thus minded, did I use lightness? Or the things that I purpose, do I purpose according to the flesh, that with me there should be yea yea, and nay nay? (2 Cor. 1:17)

There are two common types of inconsistent discipline. One type is utilizing different parental standards of discipline. In other words, dad believes a certain behavior is wrong and mom sees nothing wrong with it or vice versa. The second is in how parents are daily inconsistent on what punishable behavior is, and/or how severe the punishment will be. Both types can bring undue frustration to children.

7. Having Double Standards:

A double minded man is unstable in all his ways. (Jam 1:8)

A parent who uses the Bible to teach and instruct their child in righteousness, but is not willing to practice that same standard in their own life, is fitting the definition of a hypocrite. A hypocritical home will often provoke a child. "Do as I say and not as I do" may work temporarily in an employer/employee relationship, but it has no application for a believing parent.

8. Being Legalistic:

This people draweth nigh unto me with

their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men. (Matt. 15:8-9)

In detailing this section, the book states that God has given each set of Christian parents the responsibility to develop from Scripture a biblically based economy or 'law of the house' for their children to abide by. This collection of house expectations or rules contains two basic sections: God's Law (biblically directed rules like the 10 commandments) and Parent's Law (biblically derived rules like bedtime, chores, food choices, etc.)² The particular type of legalism that can provoke anger is when parents present their Law as unchangeable and can never be appealed. As children mature and establish trust and respect, there should be an opportunity for them to exercise appropriate expanding of that responsibility and trust. A rigid, one size rule, that must fit all the kids all the time, may lead to unnecessary provoking.

9: Not Admitting You're Wrong and Not Asking for Forgiveness:

Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift. (Matt. 5:23-24)

As a result of human nature, parents will make mistakes. However, the failure to acknowledge these mistakes committed against children often discourages the children from practicing open and appropriate communication. When children perceive such insensitivity (and maybe even pride) in the parents, they may wrongly conclude that it's no use trying to talk to them about what happened. It's easy to learn that a wrong decision needs no apology if you're in the position of power.

10. Constantly Finding Fault:

Also against his (Elihu) three friends was his wrath kindled, because they had found no answer, and yet had condemned Job. (Job 32:3)

Elihu was frustrated for the condemning statements without accurately pinpointing what had been done wrong. This area is not about diminishing the parent's responsibility to point out sinful behavior and character deficiencies in the child. It is rather the continuously critical, condemning and judgmental attitude that can be mistaken as providing "reproof". For a child that grows up in that environ-

ment, he can often begin to believe that his parents are never (or rarely) pleased with him.

11. Parents Reversing God-Given Roles:

For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. (Eph. 5:23)

Consequences that tend to promote frustration are unavoidable when God's order in the home is violated. Wives can become embittered over husbands not managing their homes biblically as the head and leadership role requires. Husbands can grow in frustration as their wives either undermine the parenting efforts or over-compensate for their own lack of parenting initiative and participation. Children are often left confused and uncertain about parent's behavior and without needed modeling for future generations.

12. Not Listening to Your Child's Opinion or Taking His or Her "Side of the Story" Seriously:

He that answereth a matter before he heareth it, it is folly and shame unto him. (Prov. 18:13)

Children can be difficult to fill with truth unless they are emptied of their self and those issues that worry and concern them. A parent doesn't always need to agree with their child's reasoning, conclusions and opinions, but should focus on how to lead them to the truth. That path to truth is strengthened when parents take the time to understand their child's perspective. To gain that perspective, parents need to engage in conversations with their children by display the skill of listening to comprehend and not just to respond.

Conclusion:

Since our children are the heritage of the Lord (Ps. 127:3), it is vital that they learn how to discern and appropriately respond to anger. While this article does not address specific skills for children to use in learning how to manage anger and frustration, it does provide an outline for strengthening parent's awareness of possible trigger points in children. Some children's personalities and temperaments are going to require additional help from mom and dad in learning these skills. Those efforts on behalf of children needing to learn the balance of emotions and actions are going to be well pleasing to God.

Or to feel like somehow we have become a victim of some sort of circumstance. We can replace that with a trust in God. With a confidence in Him. To ask Him, 'Okay, Lord. This isn't exactly the way I thought it was going to be'. That's the way it was for Jeremiah. It wasn't exactly the way he thought it was going to be. 'But I can trust the Lord, that He will take care of me. That He will provide for me.' That's the attitude that He wants you and I to have. So if we would have read earlier verses, that's the type of thing we would have seen.

But we did read together from verse 19. "Therefore thus saith the Lord, If thou return, then will I bring thee again, and thou shalt stand before me: and if thou take forth the precious from the vile, thou shalt be as my mouth: let them return unto thee; but return not thou unto them." So we can see here where God is conversing with Jeremiah and He is asking him to have this type of separation from these people, the children of Israel, that had fallen so many times into idolatry. They had fallen so many times into what the Bible described as 'everyone doing that which was right in his own eyes' (Judges 17:6). Leaving the precepts that God had set out before them. Leaving the words of truth and life that He had given to them. Leaving all those things that the prophets had spoken to them. Leaving all those teachings of Moses that he gave to them for their own good. Leaving and forsaking all those things and utterly forsaking their God. He is saying, 'Come out. Come out from them. Come out from that circumstance. Come out from that mud, that mire.' We can think of the word picture.

We can read the same message in the New Testament, where God is telling us to come out from among them. To be separate. To be a peculiar people, zealous of good works. Peculiar doesn't mean strange or odd or weird or something like that. He wants us to be set apart for Him. To not be ashamed of the gospel of Jesus Christ, as we read in Romans chapter 1. To even be glad that Jesus Christ is our Lord and Savior. He is asking Jeremiah to come out from this type of thing. He uses the words, 'separating the precious from the vile'.

"And I will make thee unto this people a fenced brasen wall: and they shall fight against thee..." Jeremiah 15:20. He's saying, 'Jeremiah, I can pull you out from among them and make you', as He says, 'this fenced brasen wall. But understand this. They are still going to fight against

you. I can take you out. You can be this fenced brasen wall. But they are still going to fight against you.' We read similar words in the New Testament, do we not? When the Bible tells us, don't be surprised if they don't like you, if they hate you. If you are despised for my name's sake, Jesus Christ is saying that, if you are despised of others, don't be surprised. Because you name the name of Jesus Christ, don't be surprised when that happens. When you don't run to that same excess of riot with them as you may have before, don't be surprised when they don't care for you anymore. (I Peter 4) Because it wasn't really you that they cared about, but whatever you *did*, whatever you did together.

So Jeremiah is being told of God, they shall fight against thee, "...but they shall not prevail against thee..." Jeremiah 15:20. Therein is the underlying message of hope and of strength. Each one of us can think of challenges we have in our own personal relationships. We can think of different people whose personalities we don't quite blend with. We can think of people who may even have some animosity toward us for one reason or another. We can all think of those types of things. We see here, this promise, that they shall not prevail against thee.

I think this is really getting at a matter of faith. Because Jeremiah believed in the one true God versus those that didn't believe in the true God. They believed in false gods. Believed in gods they could go out and construct themselves. Believed in a god they could pour in a mold and have this thing come out and it would be a lump of gold and that would be their god. Or handcraft something with wood and set it inside and say, 'I can see this! I can believe in this. This is my god. This is what I will serve.' That type of mentality versus the one that could not see the God who delivered them, the God who brought them out of Egypt and brought them into the promised land. They couldn't see Him with their own hand but they could see His great works all around. Yet they forgot.

So we have a similar promise in the New Testament, where the Apostle John tells us that, "...greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world." I John 4:4. Jesus Christ said, we can overcome also because He overcame all things. When we have that personal and close and loving and meaningful relationship with Jesus Christ, we can be overcomers just as He was.

They shall not prevail against thee. Why? Because Jeremiah was so strong? No. Because "...I *am* with thee to save

thee and to deliver thee, saith the Lord." Jeremiah 15:20. That's the same promise that our God has for us yet today. That He will never leave us nor forsake us. Sometimes we feel alone, do we not? Sometimes we're confused and we don't really understand. But God said, I will never leave thee nor forsake thee (Hebrews 13:5). He is always with us. He's the Alpha, the Omega. The author and the finisher of our faith. He is our God.

It says, "And I will deliver thee out of the hand of the wicked..." Jeremiah 15:21. We read a lot about that in Scripture also. God knows how to deliver the godly out of temptation. He knows how to deliver His children out of these challenges and out of these problems. We can think about a similar theme that ran throughout the Old Testament, when God always had a remnant. He always had those that were set apart for Him. Even, Elijah said, 'I am the only one left! There is no one else.' (I Kings 19:14). He felt like he was the last person on earth serving God, the last person on earth that loved the Lord. He felt like he was all alone. What did God say to him? That there was seven thousand men that had not bowed the knee to Baal. (I Kings 19:18) There was always this promise in God's Word, that there would always be a remnant. That there would always be those who loved and served the Lord.

We have to think about that and know that that is still true today. That there will be those that love and serve the Lord. If we start to feel alone in a chaotic world, let's think about, there are always others that we can find who love and serve the Lord. We need to draw on those relationships. We need to draw strength from those relationships. We need to draw comfort from those relationships. We need to be a comfort to others and understand when others have times of need; when they are feeling weak, when they are feeling doubtful, when they are feeling unsure about tomorrow. We need to likewise be a comfort to other people. We need each other. It is very simple. It's very simple. God did not create us to operate in isolation. God did not create us to operate alone. He gave us each other and He put us together in a body.

So let's turn now to I Timothy chapter 4. Here the Apostle Paul is talking about those teachers of false doctrine. It is no different than what Jeremiah had to deal with. It's no different. There were those that were very much false prophets. Those that wanted to say what people wanted to hear, rather than what the Word of God really had to say. It's no different. Here the Apostle Paul was dealing

with the same thing so many years ago, then at that time, to Timothy and the early church. He could turn around and say the exact same thing to us today. There will never be a lack of those who want to teach false doctrine. There will never be a lack of those who take the Word of truth and set it aside and create their own standard of righteousness or their own standard of truth. We see it every day. We see it all the time.

That's why we always have to be grounded, settled on the Word. We have to be feeding our mind with the Word of God, the standard that does not change. That perfect mirror. The Word of God that speaks to us, that chastises us, that corrects us, that encourages us, that comforts us. We need to have a focus on God's Word. Because people's opinions will change. People's perceptions of what is acceptable will change over time. God does not change. The same yesterday, today and always is how our God is described (Hebrews 13:8). But people and opinions and perceptions will change.

Here, we see this false doctrine. "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils," I Timothy 4:1. None of us, none of us like to see that, do we? When we can see what could be described as 'some shall depart from the faith', some leaving and forsaking God, none of us like to see that. It's not pleasant. None of us like to see one who had shown an outward love toward God and a close communion with God just to say, 'I can't trust Him anymore. I don't really believe Him anymore. I don't even believe *in* Him anymore.' Each of us can think of examples where something like that has happened. It's not a pleasant thought for any of us. But God's Word's telling us that those things will come to pass. Jesus Christ asked the question, when He returns, shall He find faith on earth? (St. Luke 18:8) You and I want to walk through this life with faith and do our part so if Jesus Christ returns tomorrow, the answer to that question would be an overwhelming 'Yes, you will find faith on this earth'.

But it talks about these in these latter times, that they will be "Speaking lies in hypocrisy; having their conscience seared with a hot iron;" I Timothy 4:2. How is our conscience doing today? When it speaks to us, do we listen? Or is our first inclination to say, 'No, no, no, no, no'? When something within us says we are taking a path that is just not right, when we have an uneasy feeling, when we are making a decision that is not well aligned with Scriptural truth, with doctrinal in-

tegrity, with Biblical truth, do we listen to our self? Do we hear what that voice inside of us says? Or have we been walking a little too close to the fire and got a little bit seared, like this being seared with a hot iron? A little bit seared off. A little bit numb. A little less discernable. Can't really hear what my conscience is saying. I am going to go forward and I am just going to move. I'm just going to react. I have to do something. Impulses take over more than sound judgment. Think about that. God doesn't want our conscience to be seared with a hot iron.

It talks about it a lot in His Word differently when He talks about having that heart of *flesh* versus the heart of stone (Ezekiel 36:26). He talked about and described the children of Israel as a stiff necked people so many times. Not able to turn their head one way or the other. God wants us to have that heart of flesh. He wants us to have a heart that is open to and listening to that still, small voice within us.

Go back and read the Scriptures - I believe it is in I Kings - where it talks about, God was not in the thunder. God was not in the earthquake and all these things that came to pass. At the end of all that, there was a still, small voice. (I Kings 19:11,12) It is that still, small voice that is alive yet today and can reside in you and me, that we need to listen to. That still, small voice. God's Holy Spirit.

"Forbidding to marry, and *commanding* to abstain from meats, which God hath created to be received with thanksgiving of them which believe and know the truth." I Timothy 4:3. This is something that they had to deal with in the early church. Last night I had opportunity to read that wonderful chapter in Acts 15, that first letter from the elders, when they came together for to consider the matters that were before them in the early church. They thought, okay. People are trying to say all these different things. We have this tremendous amount of liberty under Christ. We've just come out of the law. We are trying to reconcile the two. We are trying to understand what's right and what's not. There are all these people saying that people have to be circumcised to be saved and continue in the Jewish law to be saved, to believe in Christ and to be a Christian. Then the elders considered it and they came back and they had three specific points that they had told them about.

But what was it about that time, about this time that the Apostle Paul was writing about, that we struggle with, that we grapple with this tremendous amount of grace that God has given each and every

one of us? That we want to place on this other conditions for salvation. That somehow in our own way, we can have some small part in our salvation. What is it about human nature? If you go back and read Galatians 2, the Apostle Paul's wonderful exhortation to them about not frustrating the grace of God, being crucified with Christ and living with Him, then all of a sudden he goes into chapter 3 and he says, 'Oh, you foolish Galatians, who hath bewitched you? You knew all this. Now what? These Judaizers are coming in and they are trying to give you all these conditions for salvation.' What is it about human nature?

So they are saying here, in this particular case, 'Oh, you can't marry. You have to abstain from meats.' The Apostle Paul is saying, 'You are missing the point altogether.' God calls us to a sanctified life. There is absolutely no doubt about that. God calls us to a sanctified life. To be set apart for Him. There's absolutely no doubt about that. Romans chapter 6 handles the issue. "...Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid..." v.1,2. God wants us to live a sanctified life for Him. God does *not* want us to bring in the Pharisaic approach to salvation. To put conditions upon our salvation. To put conditions upon our relationship with Jesus Christ in such a way that it is man made. Remember the strong words that God had for those who took their own ways of doing things and set that above the direction that God had given them. He had very strong words for the Pharisees for that approach.

"For every creature of God is good, and nothing to be refused, if it be received with thanksgiving: For it is sanctified by the word of God and prayer." I Timothy 4:4,5. It is a good reminder for us that we don't simply pray before we eat just because that is what we do. There is a reason for it. There is a purpose for it. God has asked us to give thanks for the food that He has provided for us. It is sanctified. Remember and go back to Acts chapter 10. Where Peter had seen the vision of the big sheet dropped down. It had all the creatures and four footed things and the beasts and all these other things. Peter said, 'Whoa, I've never eaten of any of those things, Lord. Nothing common or unclean has come into my mouth.' God showed him. I think He did it three times. Basically, He was telling him, 'What God has cleansed, call that not common or unclean.' He was now saying, 'Okay, we had this Jewish dietary law and that is not going to be applicable any longer.' And He

was also saying the way of salvation is being opened up to the Gentiles.

But we take that and we think about that, God is asking us, saying, 'Okay, every creature of God is good and nothing to be refused if it be received with thanksgiving.' He still wants us to give thanks for that food which He provides. Which God has cleansed. He sanctified it with the Word of God and prayer.

"If thou put the brethren in remembrance of these things, thou shalt be a good minister of Jesus Christ..." I Timothy 4:6. This is the Apostle Paul speaking specifically to Timothy. But he is asking you and I to put others in remembrance of these types of things also. "...nourished up in the words of faith and of good doctrine, whereunto thou hast attained." v. 6. That's the way God wants us to live our life. To live our life by faith. To live our life that demonstrates unequivocally that we trust Him. That we love Him. That we know Him and this good doctrine. Good, sound, Scriptural principles. Taking the whole Word of God. Taking the whole counsel of God and saying, 'How does that apply to my life? How does God want me to live? How does He want me to serve Him?'

"But refuse profane and old wives' fables..." (v. 7) and that's a good reminder for each of us. Some of us more so than others may be susceptible to spreading rumors, to telling stories that get just a little bit better every time we retell them, every time that we hear them. But we really need to stop and think about, where's the blessing in that? What does God's Word say about those types of things? Who has ever been edified or lifted up by someone sharing information that really shouldn't be shared with other people? These old wives' fables, we can only imagine what those were at that particular time. God wants us to replace those things with sound truth. He said to the church in Ephesus, 'Speaking the truth in love.' (Ephesians 4:15) That's how He wants us to communicate. So next time we find ourselves maybe spreading something that we really shouldn't, let's ask ourselves, say, 'Am I speaking the truth in love? Am I saying the same thing that I would say if this person that I am talking about were standing here right now?' Speaking the truth in love.

"...and exercise thyself rather unto godliness." v.7. That's an interesting word that the Apostle Paul was inspired of God to write. Exercise. I think it creates a wonderful word picture. *Exercise* thyself rather unto godliness. God does-

n't ask us to know Him and understand Him and then just sit back and let life happen to us. He wants us to go out and exercise our faith. He wants us to go out and be a laborer in His vineyard. He wants us to be busy doing. He wants us to do the work He's given us. Jesus made that point very clear to His parents when they didn't really understand fully the child that they had. They understood Him to be the Son of God. But when He was twelve years old and they left, they said, 'why don't you understand?' 'I have to be about my Father's business.' (St. Luke 2:49) You and I need to be about our Father's business also.

"For bodily exercise profiteth little: but godliness is profitable unto all things..." I Timothy 4:8. I read that verse and I smile at that first portion because every time I don't go to Lifetime or I don't go get exercise, I say, 'Well, bodily exercise really profits just a little.' We can find that as kind of an excuse for ourselves. God wants us to be good stewards of our bodies also and to have good health.

But what does profit? Godliness is profitable unto *all* things. Godliness is profitable unto all things. If in any circumstance in our life we demonstrate godliness, it's profitable. It's good. There's a benefit. There's value created. In any circumstance. Somebody could be in our face, yelling at us without a cause. If we demonstrate godliness, it's profitable. Somebody could be persecuting us for our faith. If we pray for our enemies and demonstrate godliness, it's profitable unto all things.

"...having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come." v.8. Keeping our eyes on the prize, so to speak. Keeping our focus on heaven. Keeping our thoughts on what really will matter a million years from now. That home in heaven, that mansion, that place where God wants you and I to be, simply by having that long term vision can help our attitude so much. Can help our disposition so much. Can help take out some of the noise of the day to day challenges that we face. But having that long term vision toward home.

"This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, For therefore we both labour and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God..." v.9,10. Again, the Apostle Paul telling Timothy something that Jeremiah very much experienced. Jeremiah could have stood up and said, 'Yes, this is true. Let me tell you!' We both labor and suffer reproach *because* we trust in the living God and for no other reason than trusting in the living God. Suffering reproach, having others de-

spitefully use us. But again, we are encouraged in God's Word to pray for them! To love them. To do good to our enemies. What does Romans 12 tell us? When we do that it is like heaping coals on top of their head. Be not overcome with evil but overcome evil with good. (v.20,21)

"...because we trust in the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, specially of those that believe." I Timothy 4:10. The Savior of *all* men. Jesus Christ died for *all*. Died for everyone. Jesus Christ died for all. That whosoever will may come. Whosoever. Not willing that any should perish but that all men should come to repentance. To know God. To know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. He died for all

He's saying, "These things command and teach." v.11. He's saying, 'Alright, I told you this. Don't just hide this. You need to go out there and share this. You need to live your life in a way that demonstrates this.' He's saying, 'Okay, Timothy.' And he's saying the same thing to you and I. We will show people that we believe this by the way that we love them. By the way that we act towards other people.

"Let no man despise thy youth..." v.12. Again, don't know exactly what Timothy's age was but it was a point that the Apostle Paul made with him. "...but be thou an example of the believers..." v.12. Again, another encouragement to be a good example. To be about doing their Father's business. To be doing what God had called him to do. To use those talents that God had given him. Not to just take them and hide them in the ground and say, 'I don't have the energy. I don't have the desire. I don't have the care or concern to actually go through and do this.' To be exercising thyself rather unto godliness.

Another thing about the exercising. We think about our own bodies. We exercise. We stress muscles so that they grow. It's the same way with our faith. When we exercise our faith unto godliness, it grows.

Be an example unto the believers, how? In word. What we say. What we speak. If we need a good reminder of that, let's go back to James chapter 3 and read about that tongue that's an unruly evil that no one has been able to tame. Let's think about what we say. It matters what we say. Think about our relationships with other people and how much they change just on a few words that we've said, or maybe didn't say.

In conversation. As Scripture uses it here, that's our whole way of life, not just the things that we say. In conversation. What is our manner and conversation of

life? How are we going about life?

In charity. I love that word. I'm glad the Bible uses that word 'charity'. Because we want to take and insert 'love' and put it right there. But it is so much deeper than that. Charity. Love in action. Not just love, the feeling. Charity. Love in action. That's what God asks us to do.

In spirit. Everything that is within us. In faith. Trust, believing. In purity. In purity. A word that the world today is attacking very vigorously. What is purity? What the world says we can do and what is acceptable and what the standards are, are completely different than what we read in God's Word. He wants us to keep our body sanctified, set apart. Look at it as the temple of God, as he encouraged the church in Corinth about the 5th and 6th chapters. He told them, they need to keep their body in purity and not sin against their own body.

"Till I come, give attendance to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine." I Timothy 4:13. He's saying, 'Okay, Timothy, I am going to come visit you. But in the meanwhile, you need to focus on reading God's Word. Focus on all those things as he would continue to write to him and write letters to other churches and they would share these epistles from some other churches. Other churches would come in and read the ones that were written to them. Give attendance to reading. Remember the promise that we see in Romans 10:17. Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God. If we want to increase our faith, we need to read God's Word.

To exhortation. He is saying, 'Take this. Share it with others. Exhort them. Encourage them.' And to doctrine. Sound Scriptural doctrine. Those things that are not compromisable. You can't compromise them. Doctrinal truths.

He is saying now, "Neglect not the gift that is in thee..." I Timothy 4:14. Take those talents and let them shine. Labor in God's vineyards. Take those seeds and see what it brings forth, as we read in those parables, the thirty, the sixty and the hundredfold. (St. Mark 4:20) Neglect not the gift that is in thee. God would say the same thing to you and I. Have we ever spent a lot of time thinking about our spiritual gifts that God has given each and every one of us? Think about your spiritual gift. Ask yourself, am I neglecting the gift that is in me? What am I doing to labor in God's vineyard?

That's not an overwhelming task. Don't be intimidated by that. God is faithful. He'll not ever give us more than we are able to bear. If He ever asks us to do something, He'll provide the way first. He'll give us the time and the talents that we need.

"...which was given thee by prophecy, with the laying on of the hands of the presbytery. Meditate upon these things..." I Timothy 4:14,15. Don't just gloss them over but meditate upon these things. Really think about, Timothy, what I am saying to you. He would say the same thing to us today. Meditate on these things. Don't just come to church and listen and go home and go about whatever. Meditate on these things. I say that to my-

self also. Meditate upon these things. Fill your mind with these things. Because any action that we do was first a thought. Think about that. If our mind is stayed on thee, that beautiful verse in Isaiah chapter 26, God says He will keep our hearts and our minds in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee, because he trusteth in Thee (v.3). Our minds lead us to our actions. He is saying the same thing here to Timothy. Meditate on these things. Give thyself wholly unto them, completely to these things.



REMEMBERING

Our Spiritual Heritage

From time to time, the Remembering column will present short biographies of members of our churches. The following is an account of the life of retired Elder Lester Hartter of Bern, Kansas. It was carried in a newsletter of the Home in Sabetha, Kansas (in the February, 2009 issue).

Biography -

Bro. Lester Hartter, Bern, Kansas

Lester Hartter was born on a farm southeast of Bern, Kansas, on March 4, 1916. Currently he resides at the Apostolic Christian Home in Sabetha, Kansas. He does well healthwise, but has eyesight issues.

Lester was the first child of Ben and Mary Meyer Hartter. Lester's siblings are Virgil Hartter, Eloise Bahr, Marie Grimm (deceased), Erma Nell Priest, LaVonne McGinty, Helen Lobnitz (deceased), and Clyde Hartter.

The Hartter family moved several times when Lester and his siblings were growing up. When he was five years old, the family lived in Bern, Kansas, where his father had a "dray line" with the railroad. This required his father to meet every train stopping in Bern, usually one from the east every morning and one from the west every evening. He would unload all goods for delivery to businesses in town. Lester remembers his dad unloading railcar loads of cement for the lumberyard as one of the goods which came to town.

After a couple of years, the family moved to a farm southeast of Bern. Lester continued to attend school in Bern through the eighth grade. His mother wanted him to attend high school and his father wanted him to farm. They let Lester make the decision. He chose to farm.

At age eighteen, he went to work for

Will Edelman. He was paid the going rate of that time — one dollar a day plus a noon meal. A month later, Lester joined three other men — Dave and Nathan Grimm and Leroy Meyer — and went to Illinois for three months to pick corn for farmers there. Lester remembers picking one hundred bushels a day for 3 cents per bushel. He picked over 3,000 bushels for one farmer that fall.

It was very hard work but this was during the depression-ridden 1930s. It was a great opportunity to earn big money. On returning home, he remembers that most of his Illinois earnings went to pay for family necessities, except for about ten dollars which he was allowed to keep.

Lester farmed again with his dad. He enjoyed doing field work and working with the horses. In 1938, he and his dad purchased a 1937 John Deere Model A tractor together. He spent many hours on that tractor, day after day and year after year, and it is still in good running order yet today.

At age 21, Lester rented some land and began farming on his own. He married Ella Aeschleman on April 6, 1941. In 1946, they bought the farm that belonged to Lester's parents. A dairy had been started on this farm and increased in size during the years Lester and Ella lived there. The couple spent many happy years on this farm and it continued to grow during the years they lived there.

Their children include Nancy (Leonard) Baumgartner (deceased), Stephen (Lois), Lynn (Barbara), and Neil (Evelyn). Steve and Neil stayed on with Lester helping with the farming operation. In 1968, Lester and Ella moved to a farm west of Bern so Steve and Lois could live on the "home place" and be near the dairy operation. The dairy continued to expand over the years and

Lester retired when his boys purchased the farming operation from him.

Eventually Lester and Ella moved to Sabetha, first living in a house, and fifteen years later into an apartment at the Apostolic Christian Retirement village. Lester enjoyed being able to view the pond that he and his son Neil helped build the dam on. Ella spent part of their first year in the apartment with Lester before moving into the adjoining nursing home for additional care. She passed away later that year on November 15.

Lester and Ella made two trips to Switzerland in their retirement years. Once they bought a clock in the Black Forest of Germany and had it shipped to their home address. For several months they did not receive it. Lester thought they would never see it again. Then, six months later, a UPS truck bought a package to their doorstep — and it was the clock!

Lester repented and became converted at age 21. He was baptized on December 11, 1937. He was selected as minister in 1945, and became Elder of the Bern, Kansas, congregation on December 11, 1960. He served in this capacity for many years.

Lester is one of two living members of the original organizers of the Apostolic Christian Nursing Home Project. After fourteen years of living in his apartment, Lester felt it was time to move into the adjoining nursing home. He enjoys it there. "I get excellent care and enjoy the food here" he says. Lester misses his apartment, but likes where he is and says, "it's the best place for me."

The Light Of Hope

“Reverence Toward God”

It is a good thing to examine ourselves. II Corinthians 13:5 reads in part, “Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves.” About being in the faith, I have no doubt about that, but upon examining myself, I have some concern that we may have lost some of our reverence toward God.

Hebrews 12:28 reads in part, “Let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear.” The writer to the Hebrews was inspired to write that grace is required to serve God acceptably. Also, that acceptable service is with reverence and godly fear. The word “reverence” seems to indicate a sense of awe, splendor, and if toward God, a sense of being in the presence of deity.

When God spoke to Moses out of the burning bush which was not consumed, He said, Exodus 3:5, “Put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground.” If Moses had time to think he may have thought, “Wait a minute, God, this ground is just like any other ground. What makes you think it is holy?” However, God knows better than we, as to what is important. He wanted to make certain that Moses had a sense of reverence when speaking with Him, not because God needed that reverence but because we humans need to have

reverence toward God in order to better realize our own position in relation to God.

In the New Testament, the Lord Jesus Christ did not approve of changing money or selling doves inside the temple. He said in Matthew 21:13, “It is written, My house shall be called the house of prayer; but ye have made it a den of thieves.” Those doing business in the temple could have argued, “But the people need doves for their offerings and we are giving them a service by having everything, including the changing of money, very conveniently located.” However, I believe the Lord Jesus Christ was much more interested in reverence than in convenience. This is where we may fail. We may think that convenience is more important than reverence but that is where we lose out on some of the blessing God has for us. What we do in obedience to God is for our own benefit, not for God’s benefit. I do not believe the holy, almighty God, is in need of our feeble efforts. He tells us what to do for our own good, and one thing He tells us to do is to be reverent. If you walked from the foyer of a church building into the worship area, and if, upon entering that assembly, you noticed everything was perfectly quiet, except for some babies crying perhaps, and everyone was prayerful, you

would be impressed and a feeling of worship would come over you. However, if it is noisy in the assembly with much unnecessary talking, you would feel that it is business as usual.

You probably know more about reverence than I do but God knows the most about it and He says, “Put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground.”

During our early days or years in Japan, I was told by one of our Japanese sisters to please not pray in Japanese, but to pray in English so she couldn’t understand it. She explained that my poor Japanese made her feel badly, that it was not polite nor proper language with which to address God, or in other words, my Japanese lacked reverence. The Japanese language is quite strict about showing proper respect. For instance, you should use more polite forms in speaking to someone older or your superior, not to mention the extra polite forms appropriate for addressing God. How would you feel, if after spending two or three years studying and practicing Japanese, with tears, and then being told that you should please not pray in Japanese because your language lacks reverence. It is something you do not soon forget.
