The Silver Lining

Sermon by Bro. Don Steidl, Akron, OH II Samuel 15 and Acts 8

We read here of a time in King David's life that was probably one of the saddest situations he had to deal with. We know that David, from his youth up, as he grew up as a shepherd boy, this is just so far removed, the situations that he was taken into from the time he spent watching the sheep in the fields. But I think those times he spent there prepared him for the things he had to go through.

I think as he watched those sheep, probably at night and during the day, there many times wasn't a whole lot to do. He looked around and he thought about the things that he saw. He thought about the Word of God. He thought about the Lord. Those things began to grow within his heart. He began to grow in faith, even as a young man.

We can see that as God worked with him later, as his faith grew, he had such a great faith. We remember the time that he went down and Goliath was challenging his people. David couldn't understand that. We know that he was such a great man of faith. Yet there were times that, as he was trying to be faithful to God, Saul was trying to kill him because the Spirit of God had departed from Saul because Saul had sinned and disobeved God.

So we can see that David's life did have a lot of sorrow in it. Yet he could say as the Psalmist, the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down by green pastures. He leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul. (Psalm 23:1-3) That is the thing we need to remember, even as children of God. Even though God is our shepherd and He goes with us, there are times when we do get into great tribulation. Sorrow that we maybe never even thought that we would have. Even as David probably never dreamt that his own son would turn against him in this way.

Yet we can read here, even as David had the faith to say, take that ark back into the city. If God is going to deal well with me, God will return it (II Samuel 15:25). If not, he was going to accept that at the hand of God. We think of the time that David must have learned, even the time when the ark was captured by the Philistines and it was brought back again, the Israelites tried to take that ark with them. They thought that it would help them in the battle. But they had displeased God. They had sinned. So they had that upon them, that they were going to be defeated. I believe it was even the time that Eli's sons were killed. God had told him that that was going to happen. And the ark was taken. They thought the ark was something that was going to prevent them from falling into the hands of the Philistines. We can see that, because sin was within them and God needed to deal with that, it didn't do them any good to take the ark with them. We can see that when it was with the Philistines, the plagues that came upon them. They had returned it in a special way. (I Samuel 4-6)

Other times, when David went to move the ark. They didn't do it the way they were supposed to do it. They used beasts to do it and it was supposed to be carried by men. When one of the men went to steady it, one of the oxen had stumbled, he was destroyed. (II Samuel 6:2-7) So David knew that even though the ark would be back in Jerusalem, if God was with him, he didn't have to fear. He could realize and know that surely goodness and mercy would follow him all the days of his life. He would dwell in the house of the Lord forever (Psalm 23:6), even though now during this time he had struggles.

In our walk of faith, there will be times that we are going to have struggles, but it says, He restoreth my soul (Psalm 23:3). There's times that we go through storms. We can look ahead and know that the Lord is going to be with us. He is going to prove Himself, even if we would read farther on here, God was with David. Even though it caused great sorrow to David, we know that Absalom was defeated (II Samuel 18:14,15) and David was restored again (II Samuel 20:3). But even more than being restored to the place of King, I think he was again restored to having peace with God. Knowing God was with him.

As we think of that Psalm that David had wrote about the Lord being his shepherd, I don't know a lot about sheep, but I think that when sheep lie down in a pasture, it means that they

Light From The Word

Practicing Biblical Brotherly Admonition

"Be ye holy, for I am holy" (1 Pet. 1:16). In these words, God imparts his fundamental purpose for us. We are created in God's image and commissioned to continue His work in the world to glorify Him (Gen. 1:26-28). The Word also exposes our failure to fulfill this purpose. "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone," said Christ to those who condemned the adulterous woman (John. 8:7). No man qualifies (Rom. 3:23). Since that fateful day when Adam and Eve chose their own will over God's, we are all born sinners in a fallen world, and have all likewise sinned (Is. 53:6).

We can be thankful that God has mercifully provided a way of redemption. He came to earth to "bear witness unto the truth" (John. 18:37) so man could repent of his sin. When He overturned the moneychangers' tables (Matt. 21:12-13), when He charged that the chief priests were further from God than harlots (Matt. 21:31) and when He rebuked Peter, saying, "Get thee behind me, Satan" (Matt. 16:23): in each case, He was pointing people to the truth (Matt. 16:23).

Although the truth is humbling, we must honestly pursue it for the sake of our eternal souls (Prov. 4:13; Heb. 12:11). We don't want to justify ourselves; we want to see ourselves in the mirror of God's Word, trusting Him to admonish us when we stray (2 Cor. 13:5). His Word is "quick and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword...a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Heb. 4:12). It cuts to the core of our hearts, exposing our transgression before our Maker.

Biblical admonition may be painful, but it is good. Paul writes that all Scripture "is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (2 Tim. 3:16). Doctrine confronts us with the reality of our condition, reproof convicts us of sin and prompts repentance, correction restores us to the proper path, and instruction guides us along that path. We must seek biblical admonishment in all honesty and humility.

Sometimes, God admonishes us

through the words of godly men, and we should welcome being exhorted and warned by someone who loves us enough to do this in a biblical manner (1 Thes. 5:14). Christ has given us the example of the shepherd who loses a sheep. "Doth he not leave the ninety and nine and goeth into the mountains and seeketh that which is gone astray? And if so be that he find it, verily I say unto you, he rejoiceth more of that sheep than of the ninety and nine which went not astray" (Matt. 18:12-13). This is the heart of the Father - to restore that which was lost. He employs us His children in this work, so we should thank God for each other.

In addition to humbly receiving biblical admonition, we must be faithful when God calls us to convey it to others. When we observe what we believe is sin, trespass or fault (all three are used interchangeably in the Word) in a brother, we must first prayerfully examine ourselves for any "beam" that might be in our eye (Matt. 7:1-5). Only after this is removed should we proceed further. Christ explains the rest of our responsibility in this process in Matt. 18:15-20. We are to talk to our brother about the matter "alone" lest we fall into the sin of gossip ourselves. This ensures that we act in God's interest, not self interest, with the purpose of restoring one to truth - to "gain our brother." We are to warn him lovingly, not shame him (1 Cor. 4:14). Our desire should be to restore him "in the spirit of meekness" (Gal. 6:1), for it is not our authority, but the authority of God's Word that enables us to do this (Rom. 15:14), and only by His grace.

We should also be guided by a sense of humility and a realization that what we have perceived may in fact be different from the reality of what has occurred. We should approach our brother with a spirit that seeks to gain understanding and acknowledges our limited perspective.

Christ⁷s instruction also implies that our admonition should not be anonymous. We are to "go" to our brother, not hide behind a veil of secrecy. God has always dealt with sin directly, and proper brotherly admonition is done at His direction and with the authority of His Word. If we are unwilling to identify ourselves, we should (a) re-examine our scriptural responsibility and motives in the matter and/or (b) ask God to direct someone else in this work and let the matter rest. Previous discussion of anonymous admonition in a Light from the Word article (1998) describes this as being clearly in conflict with the Word.

If our brother does not hear us, we are to return to him with two or three witnesses – *not* the whole church. To involve more than a few is inappropriate at this stage, as it may lead to gossip and further stain the church with sin. It is the purity of the church that we are seeking to restore by confronting the sin of a brother.

If the trespasser still refuses to acknowledge his sin, then – and *only* then – should we take the matter before the church. We are not to take it to the world. God has charged the church with this work, and it is only His Word that will convict, correct, and instruct. The world cannot redeem such a man, so if he rebuffs a loving church functioning under the authority of God-ordained leadership, he has nowhere else to go. He is to be unto us "as a heathen man" (Matt. 18:17).

This may seem harsh, but it is what Christ has instructed us to do. He gave himself for the church "that he might present it to himself a glorious church...that it should be holy and without blemish" (Eph. 5:27). If a brother refuses to submit to Him when confronted with His Word, he commits the same error as the Original Sin of choosing his own will over God's, thus separating himself from the holiness of God and from the fellowship of God's people.

Although the church does not judge his eternal destination, when it restores a man to fellowship, it parallels his restoration in heaven (Matt. 18:18). When the church rejects an unrepentant sinner, it parallels his rejection in heaven. Christ directs us to pray that His "will be done on earth, as it is in heaven" (Matt. 6:10).

What a solemn responsibility for God's people both in giving and receiving biblical admonition. Let us continually humble ourselves before Him and our brethren as we strive to obey His will and conform to His image of holiness.

RGMMI - A Light in the Darkness of India

A n unexpected stop by an Indian missionary at the home of an Apostolic Christian minister in Rittman, Ohio in the 1960's opened the door for our church to be involved in the Rural Gospel and Medical Missions of India. Mr. B.B. Bhagwat had founded the mission in 1938 and could see that his involvement would be coming to a close in the future. He was looking for a church group that would be committed to carry on the mission work he had established.

After visiting a number of other Apostolic Christian Churches, a formal request was made to the Elder Body to have brothers go to India in the 1970's and review the work of RGMMI. Several trips were made and after a number of discussions by the Elder Body, a seven member board was appointed in 1980 to manage the assets of the Bhagwats after their death and provide spiritual counseling and guidance to the staff that operated the various components of the mission.

A comprehensive ministry

Today the mission consists of several churches, many village prayerhalls (places of worship), two boarding homes, vocational training schools, an elementary school, a small hospital and numerous medical clinics. The boarding homes are located on two RGMMI campuses and are for young boys who are orphans, from broken families, or children of rural families living near RGMMI prayer halls that do not have access to schools.

RGMMI also sponsors over 50 girls at an orphanage in the city of Monmad, located about 50 miles

from the mission headquarters at Nashik, India.

English school

The English Medium School at Khardi, completed with help from the U.S. churches three years ago, is beginning another term. Over 125 students are enrolled in the first six grades. Many of them are Hindu children from the area and their parents appreciate the opportunity to have their children learn English which will make them more qualified for employment upon graduation. The youngest boys of the RGMMI boarding home at Khardi also attend this school.

Medical

The medical arm of RGMMI will be greatly enhanced with the services of Dr. Ashwin Parkhe who has completed his medical studies this summer. He is the oldest son of the director of our mission, Dr. Surendra Parkhe. Amit Parkhe, the youngest son, will be coming to the United States in August to participate in an advanced medical program at the University of Illinois in Springfield. He also plans to return to work in the RGMMI mission in two years.

Group home for orphans

In July, the first occupants of the new RGMMI/Loving Shepherd Ministries Group home for orphans near the church in Balhana will arrive. The building was completed late last year but due to political unrest in the area, the admission of candidates was delayed. The recent elections in India have diminished the boldness of militant Hindus in their actions against Christians. Many prayers were lifted up to the Lord in the last year for areas in India where Christians were persecuted or were under threats from these groups. Five children have been selected to be the first individuals that will receive the benefits of living in a home filled with the love of God.

The USA Board of Directors senses the need for ongoing visits to India to provide counseling and guidance to the administrative and spiritual staff of RGMMI. A visit to India is being planned this fall. Not only will there be a tour of the various facilities, but time will be spent interacting with the Pastors and Evangelists by addressing a number of spiritual topics followed by in depth discussions.

Many prayers have been offered for Damayanti Parkhe, the wife of our mission director. She was called to her eternal reward on June 25th after an extensive battle with cancer. She served as director of the Mission's vocational and educational programs. The family is very appreciative of the many prayers of believers who have prayed for her and will continue to intercede for her family.

To learn more

Brochures have been developed about the work of RGMMI. A new DVD illustrates the history of India, the current economical and political climate of India and the work of RGMMI. Brochures and DVD's are available from the national World Relief office in Remington, IN (www.acworldrelief.org).

The USA Board appreciates the many prayers and support for the work of RGMMI. To date there has been no clear direction for our brethren to assist onsite in this mission on a long term basis. We wait upon the Lord for His guidance as we serve these dear ones in India.

Restoring Oakville... A Labor of Love

For nearly an entire year volunteers have been traveling to Oakville, Iowa to aid in the work of rebuilding a community destroyed by the flood of June 14, 2008. The breech of the Iowa River levee just west of Oakville resulted in flooding of more than 400 homes and the loss of nearly 17,000 acres of crops. In addition, hog confinement buildings, grain bins and implement sheds all suffered from the beating waves generated by the winds over "Lake Oakville."

Thankfully, advance warning had resulted in the removal of most household items, farm machinery, livestock and grain before the flood waters came. But the result was water to a depth between four and twenty feet throughout the affected area. What remained were basements filled with water and mud. Homes were saturated to the first floor or above, depending on the location. Some homes were accessible only by boat for a period of five to six weeks. In addition, the lives of more than four hundred families were turned upside down. How thankful we are that we can trust in the One who holds the whole world in His hands.

As the water slowly receded, the task of removing all of the soaked carpet, padding, drywall and insulation was the first step in the long road to restoring a home. Walls were stripped to the studs for the purpose of drying out. Pumping water from flooded basements and removing mud and debris followed. During the clean-up phase, volunteer help was offered to anyone whose house was accessible. Huge piles site next to every dwelling. As time passed and the teams of volunteers responded to the need for help, the efforts began to shift from clean-up to rebuilding. Initially, rebuilding efforts were focused on the homes of the church family. By the end of December, most of these homes were at or near completion. Many hog buildings had also been restored and new pigs were being

introduced into these buildings. In January, the rebuilding efforts turned to residents of the community outside of the church family. Work continued through the cold winter months as volunteers braved the elements to come to Oakville and lend a helping hand. As much as possible, work projects were scheduled inside of heated houses. The Winter Work Project continued through the winter and ended the last week of May.

Brotherly love in action

The out-pouring of love and support from the brotherhood is beyond expression. Only those who experienced this devastating loss can know the feeling of despair and helplessness that it brought. To look out across the water and see only the rooftop of your home and to know that all you had invested in hopes of a bountiful harvest is lost. It brings to mind Job who also suffered great loss and yet retained his faith in God, his provider. In Oakville, the Provider worked through the hearts and hands of His people to restore what was lost in the flood.

Through the generous support of compassionate hearts, more than 1.5 million dollars of financial aide has been shared with the victims of this flood. Over a period of nearly

eleven months, volunteers have given their time and talents in helping restore the homes and lives of those who had lost so much. More than forty-two thousand hours of volunteer labor have been recorded in this project. Approximately fifty homes have benefited from the help of volunteers in restoring them to like new condition. Grateful families are moving forward in life with a new appreciation for the help of a "Good Samaritan".

On the evening of May 23rd, Oakville community families whose homes had been a part of the rebuilding project were invited to church for dinner and a short dedication service. Bro. Kent Heimer, counseling elder for the USA Committee encouraged each family to be a praying family, looking to God above in all of their needs. Bibles with family names imprinted on the cover were presented to each homeowner. Children's bible story books were also given to families with young children.

With tear-filled eyes, many expressed their deep appreciation for the love that had been shown to them. "We could never have done it without your help," they said. It is our prayer they will recognize the Lord Jesus living in the hearts of those who came to help and give Him the praise.

As a project of the USA Committee of World Relief, it is our prayer that this effort has been a blessing to all who participated in the opportunity to serve. We are thankful for all the support that has been given to this project. May all praise, honor and glory be to our God – the only true Provider.

On a sweltering Sunday with hundred degree heat and humidity, a crowd of all ages packed around a swimming pool in Barra Vieja, Guerrero, Mexico... but nobody jumped in. All eyes were glued upon four adults who stepped down into the water to make a profession of faith and a covenant of faithfulness to their Savior. It must have been a strange sight to people accustomed only to infant baptisms. These four individuals were the first Apostolic Christian converts baptized in Barra Vieja.

Barra Vieja is about 12 hours by bus from Ixtlan. The gospel began to

be shared here some years ago when several converted sisters starting going back to their home town of Barra Vieja to teach VBS for the children and talk with their family members about Christ. Seeds were planted in hearts, and eventually four people repented of their sins and were converted-Bro. Bartolo Ramirez Rosario and his wife, Sis. Kike (Virginia) Angelito Villalba, Sis. Maria de la Cruz Villanueva Ojeda, and Sis. Maria de la Paz Salinas Manzanares. are fed and they don't fear. So David had that time, he knew that time would be within his life. Even as he struggled here, even in this life, there are valleys. Hills that we have to go up and valleys we go through sometimes. But the Lord is with us and when we have struggles, the Lord is going to be with us. We can feel Him. Even though we pass through the valley of the shadow of death, the Lord is with us (Psalm 23:4). And none of us have suffered the grief, the rejection and the sorrow - even probably not that David did here - and how much less our Lord.

The Lord came down here and He came to those who should have received Him. He came to the Jews who should have known that He was the Messiah. Yet, they rejected Him. They called Him deceiver. They mocked Him. They blasphemed Him. Yet He was willing to shed His blood and die for them. We know that the end of our faith is the salvation of our souls. We can dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

When we think back upon the Jews that felt threatened by our Lord Jesus Christ when He was here, because of His teachings and because they thought they were going to lose the power that they had, we can see that when they crucified the Lord, they didn't stop what had begun with our Lord. We see that it only grew. We remember how they banded together and how they thought they would kill the Lord and then when He arose, they decided that they would hire soldiers to say that His body was stolen. They tried to stop the spreading of the Word of God. But we can see that it was such a powerful thing that it continued to grow and continued to spread.

Even as we read now, the spreading of it was by the Holy Spirit that worked. Remember even when our Lord was here, as He walked in the flesh, He would teach multitudes. Sometimes thousands of people would be gathered together to hear Him. Even as we were reminded recently, that would have been a miracle in itself, that one man standing there, maybe if he was out in the water somewhere, speaking to thousands of people, that they could hear Him and understand what He spoke. With the noise of the crowd and the spreading out, we know that was a miracle that the Lord was able to do that.

But He was very limited, even then, in the Word that He was able to speak. We know that He sent forth His disciples that time and other times He sent others before Him to prepare the places He was going to go. We know that when they went into a city, He said their peace was to be on that city. (St. Matthew 10:5-13) He went throughout the places of Judea and even down to Samaria at times. Yet we know it was very limited because the Lord was spreading His Word, just Himself in the flesh.

When the time came that He was going to leave, He told His disciples He was going to leave them. He was going to go to the Father. They should rejoice in that He was going to do that. He said that He was not going to leave them comfortless but He was going to send a comforter. He said it was necessary that He go, that the comforter could come. (St. John 16:7)

We know that we have the Holy Spirit with us at all times. Even when the disciples were in the flesh, we know that they could go to the Lord and speak to Him. But He was limited by the flesh and He wasn't with them the same way He is with us with the Holy Spirit now. So we know that was one way. But the Lord had another way. To send a comforter, the Holy Spirit into men's hearts, that the Word of God, the Gospel could go forth. We can see how it worked in the men of old, the apostles.

Remember how it came that they had been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and He had told them, when He had seen them the last time, go to Jerusalem and wait for the promise of the Father (Acts 1:4). We know they went there. Remember how the day of Pentecost, the Spirit came upon them and they spoke in tongues (Acts 2:1-11). Then the Word of God began to spread and multiply in such a great way. It spread out in a way the Lord was not able to do when He was limited by the flesh. Even though He could speak to multitudes.

Then we can see here how the Lord continued to work through the Holy Spirit to spread His Word. How Philip was so instrumental in spreading the Word of God. Even as we see here, the Jews had killed Stephen here, many were scattered throughout except for the apostles. They buried Stephen and they made great lamentation over him, because he was such a faithful brother in the Lord. (Acts 8:1,2) We know, even us now, as we have those that would part out of this world, we know that there is sorrow. We sorrow but not as the world does. We sorrow because there is within us, when one would leave this world, even as Stephen here of old, when he left, it was not that they didn't have a hope for eternal life or they did not believe that they would see him again or did not believe in the resurrection. But there was just such a close bond of faith that that separation, even for a short time, felt painful to them. They sorrowed for that. But they had that hope, even as we have that hope when those who we love do pass out of this world.

We can see how Philip was led by the Spirit and went down to Samaria (Acts 8:5). The Spirit led him in different ways. Even as we read here of two men who heard the preaching of the gospel of the Word. Both of them made a choice that they wanted to avail themselves of this salvation. It seems possibly this first one, this Simon, maybe didn't have the right motivation in the beginning. He was one that the people looked up to formerly. They thought he was of God. Yet, even as we read the Word, we can gather that he was not. So he decided he was going to join himself unto this power, which he was very wise to do. That he would turn from that and seek this. But it seemed possibly that maybe he didn't dig the foundation of faith as deep as he should have. (Acts 8:9-13)

So we can see when we want to turn from the things of the world and become the Lord's, how important it is that we dig down deep. To examine our thoughts and examine the Word of God. Let the Lord lead us. Also the brothers that God would lead, whether it would be our Elder Brother or possibly our parents, those that would be spiritual within the church.

We can see how that happened in the life of the eunuch. The eunuch was an Ethiopian. He apparently came from a long distance. We can see how God looks down and must see each sincere and upright heart that wants to know His will. He was apparently reading the books of the Old Testament. He was reading in Isaiah where it tells of the time of our Lord Jesus Christ. He was of a humble heart and he wanted to know, what do these things mean? (Acts 8:27-31)

As we think about it, he could see these Jewish people and he was looking into their faith, the faith that they had. Yet, they were controlled by the Roman Empire. But he knew that there was something special about these people. There was something special about their God. I think throughout history, the children of Israel, even though at times they suffered persecution and men tried to destroy them, yet God has kept them as His nation. We can see it is a witness of God's faithfulness, unto His promises unto Abraham. Even unto us, that we can be confident that what He promises us, He will be with us.

As this Ethiopian could see that there was something special and seeking to find what the truth was, he must have been one that, even as he read Isaiah, he pondered, who was he speaking about? I believe that he also probably had read the Word. He diligently had a law work within his life, even as each one of us in our walk of faith, as we want to repent and be converted, we know that the law comes and we feel convicted of the law. We see where we have failed. Many of us try on our own to change by the law, by doing it ourselves. We find that we can't do that. The Ethiopian was probably at that point within his life. He had read the law and he was going on reading the prophets, trying to glean, what was this special God and His people? Trying to understand it.

We can see the change that came in his life when Philip got up and he spoke to him. He was a very humble man and Philip asked him, do you understand what you are reading? He said, no, how can I except someone explain it to me? (Acts 8:30,31) I think that is the attitude that we need to take. Not only in repentance, but farther on within our walk of faith. We know that there are different times that we look into the Word of God that we don't always have the answers. But we need to look to God. We need to pray. We need to think upon the Word and look to those whom God has given the responsibility as under shepherds, that understanding might be given to them. Or those that have walked the path of faith and have shown their faithfulness for many years. We can often go to them and ask them things that we don't understand. Some things maybe God wants to wonder about, to ponder. He doesn't give us to know all things of eternity. All things even within our very own lives, how they are going to work out. We can have that confidence and know that He is with us.

We can see how this happens to this Simon. Apparently somewhere in his repentance and conversion he didn't dig deep enough. Maybe he didn't put out all the pride that was in there, that he wanted that later on when he saw that the Holy Ghost was given by the laying on of hands. He wanted that power also. (Acts 8:18) So maybe it was not completely out or maybe it was something that came back within his life.

We know as we would repent, we put things out of our lives. We know that most of us struggle against pride and different lusts. We are given the victory over those so they don't control us. We know that Satan is going to come back again and he is going to try to tempt us in those ways. But apparently we need to be more steadfast than this man was here. We know he was warned that he better repent and pray perhaps it could be forgiven him, the very thought that he had (Acts 8:22). We need to guard against our thoughts, even as the thought might begin to come to us. That we don't let thoughts that deal with pride or lust begin to grow within our hearts to think about them. If we let them grow, sooner or later they will bring forth fruit.

I remember years ago, as a young man, it was explained to me that if any of those thoughts would come to us, whether they would be pride or lust or whatever, it is like a bird. We can't stop a bird from flying over our head. We can stop him from building a nest on it. So when those thoughts might come, if they be things that we have put out of our life and Satan might try to bring them back again, we don't have to dwell upon it. We can go to the Word of God in prayer. We can go to those, as we spoke, not only when we are repenting, but after we are walking a walk of faith. If we have some struggles, we can go to those that are strong in the faith that we look up to. That have walked many years with the Lord. We can ask them for their experience and their help. For their prayer. We know that the Lord does hear and He does answer that prayer.

So we can see how it was able to be explained to this eunuch here, that it was the Lord Jesus Christ and what He had done for him. It is just like it was in our life, after we have been repenting for a while, maybe struggling and making restitutions and confession, then all of a sudden it just seems to come together, that we are given a light. Then there is no more condemnation but that we believe that the Lord Jesus Christ died for us and we have that peace with God. We can say, even as he, "...what doth hinder me to be baptized?" Acts 8:36. First has to come that cleansing of the heart. The law has to work there. Then when that faith and that belief comes in the Lord Jesus Christ, then we are ready to go ahead and be baptized with the water and with the Spirit, to become children of God. To go, even as this eunuch did and I often think, what great faith he had! It says, "...he went on his way rejoicing." Acts 8:39. Philip went the other way but he had the faith and knew it was God working in his life that had brought him that far. Philip was part of it. God used Philip. But it was God's Holy Spirit that directed him within his life. I think that even as he knew that he was going to go back to Ethiopia for his responsibilities, he knew God was going to be with him. He could go rejoicing.

That is the same way with us. At times we may go through some struggles, as we said, even as David of old saw some very heart breaking struggles. We can go rejoicing, knowing that God is with us. He that has begun the work within us will continue it. Because it is His good will to give unto us the kingdom.

Introduction and awareness of the needs in Haiti

In the early 1960's. Brother Henry Beer visited a mission outpost in Jeremy, Haiti, through an acquaintance, Robert Rocourt, from Wenona Lake, Indiana. At about the same time, Brother John Wagler and his wife, Sister Ann, went to Haiti and worked at the Albert Schweitzer Hospital as gardeners and ran an orchard. Through the connections established by both groups, others began supporting Albert Schweitzer and Grace Children's Hospital with material aid. In 1969 Brothers George Bruellman and Herman Norr became involved in organizing shipments of animals, grain, clothes and some medical supplies through other organizations, like Heifer Project, CARE (Cooperative American Relief Everywhere) and Mennonite Central Committee.

Word spread about the aid being supplied through the Heifer Project, CARE, and the Mennonite Central Committee; and a growing number of brethren from our churches began to support these organizations. These individual charitable activities generated further discussion within the church leadership and raised awareness relative to the malnutrition, poverty, and starvation in Haiti.

The World Relief Committee Formed

At the Brotherhood Conference in Bluffton, Indiana, in October, 1963, the World Relief Committee was formed. Initially their task was to study the feasibility of the church becoming more involved in direct help to the poor and needy. The World Relief Committee decided at that time to give financial support to existing organizations such as the Heifer Project and CARE, rather than to provide direct support. The recommendation to support these groups was approved at the Brotherhood Conference in Tremont in 1964.

History of Apostolic Christian Missions in Haiti

First Shipment to Albert Schweitzer Hospital

Two brothers from Francesville and two brothers from Bluffton accompanied the first shipment of cattle which was sent through the Heifer Project to Albert Schweitzer Memorial Hospital in Haiti on February 18, 1965. This shipment consisted of eight purebred Holstein heifers and one registered Holstein bull.

Contributions Sought for World Relief

Contributions were solicited from the national church membership, and World Relief disbursed \$360,000 from 1964 to 1970; and from 1971 to 1976, the amount grew to \$1,033,070. Further details of the World Relief activities and organizations that were supported financially can be found in the book, Marching to Zion, pages 481-491.

Medical Assistance Begins

Medical assistance had its early beginning at the Albert Schweitzer Hospital in Northern Haiti at Deschapelles, in 1969. Financial support for the purchase of medications and other material aid and supplies was given. Annual visits were made to assess the need and determine the best way to help as well as to give encouragement. Mutual relationships were established between Dr. and Mrs. Mellon, who were the founders of the hospital. Similar support and material aid was also given to Grace Children's Hospital in Port-au-Prince.

Palm Grove Mission

Brothers became acquainted with the Palm Grove Mission projects in Haiti in 1982, and were impressed with their work. A visit to Puit Sales revealed the need for a lunch program for students. Some years later it was learned that theft of grain, intended to feed the poor, was common; and Palm Grove Mission needed safe storage for grain. Thus, a grain bin was sent to secure storage. Later, water projects were funded, school roofs were put on, school desks were provided, and support was given for student education.

Work Team Projects Begin

Work team projects began in 1982 when a number of other brothers within the Apostolic Christian Church became aware of the extent of poverty in Haiti and had the opportunity to join a work team through World Team mission to help on construction projects in Southern Haiti. According to records that were kept in 1983, approximately 17 volunteers labored on various projects supporting the poor in Haiti. More than 2,000 volunteers participated in World Relief work supporting the poor between 1983 and 2000.

The Apostolic Christian Church Provides Help for MEBSH

In 1986-87 two brothers learned of an organization called MEBSH. (Missionary Evangelical Baptist of Southern Haiti) and went to Haiti to become more acquainted with their work and to learn how the Apostolic Christian Church could help. In 1988, five brothers traveled to Haiti and met with leaders of MEBSH. MEBSH was already involved in reaching out to the poor both spiritually and with physical resources, specifically building schools and sponsoring student education. However, they had identified great financial and material needs that they were unable to supply. The Apostolic Christian Church realized that they could supplement the work by providing material aid, financial support, and volunteers to help put roofs on schools and build school desks. Bob Stewart was the initial missionary with World Team who coordinated the work for volunteers on construction projects with MEBSH. In 1998, Ron and Linnea Shick took over the MEBSH construction department when Bob Stewart retired.

Caribbean Committee Formed

The National World Relief Committee,

now the National World Relief Board, asked that the Caribbean Committee be formed in 1988 to assist in identifying priority projects in Haiti and Jamaica to be supported. This committee began to focus on how they could help serve the poor in Haiti and Jamaica.

Medical Assistance Grows

Opportunity to expand support for medical work came through association with MEBSH, when Caribbean Committee members visited and became acquainted with the work going on at Hospital Lumiere in Bonne Fin. Five American missionary physicians and their families were living on the hospital grounds and working in the hospital. The medical and surgical services provided to the people were of very high quality and known throughout Haiti. Financial support and material aid were provided for the hospital at Bonne Fin and for the out-patient clinic at Les Caves, both in Southern Haiti.

Nursing Home Receives Support

World Relief also began to support Asile Dorcas, a nursing home managed by MEBSH, after visiting the home on a trip in 1988. It was a home for elderly people who had no family and had no way to support themselves. Approximately 20 to 30 elderly people were living there under very meager conditions. A great blessing was obtained by groups visiting and singing hymns together with the residents. Singing the old traditional hymns, even though in two separate languages, bridged the communication gap and brought great blessing to all. Asile Dorcas remains a highlight of every team who visits Les Cayes.

Hospital and Clinic in Les Cayes

Due to a variety of factors, since 1998-1999 the provision of health care has shifted from Hospital Lumiere in Bonne Fin to Les Cayes. Now a well-run, very busy outpatient clinic and hospital with 40 beds has developed in Les Cayes. Providing physical support gave much assistance to the clinic and to the hospital. Since 2007, World Relief is also sending medical teams to assist clinic and hospital staff in giving care.

King's Hospital and Orphanage Receive Support

In the mid 1990's support for the medical work was expanded to support King's Hospital in Port-au-Prince, which was founded by Dr. Hubert Morquette and his wife, Dr. Junie Morquette. Dr. Morquette had been the administrator of Hospital Lumiere in Bonne Fin; but as his family grew he moved them to Port-au-Prince. When Dr Morquette was asked how our church could help, he identified many needs; and our World Relief began sending support. After the Morquettes founded King's Hospital, they also developed King's Garden, which is an orphanage that accepts children off the streets and from families too poor to provide for them. A new hospital and children's home is under construction and completion is planned for 2009-2010.

Well-Drilling Program Begins

In April, 1987, a Bluffton brother saw an article in the Well Drillers Journal stating that people in Haiti were praving for someone to help them acquire clean water. He and others sent the first well drilling rig to Haiti and then enlisted help from Brothers in Tremont. Brothers from Francesville were asked to design and provide special hand pumps for the wells. Over the course of time, Haitians were trained to drill the wells. The Apostolic Christian Church helped by giving training and providing equipment and supplies. Fifty-five wells were drilled in 2008. Since the inception of the work, the estimated number of wells drilled amounts to more than 300, bringing fresh water to Haitians, which has been a tremendous benefit for the Haitian people.

Trade Schools Developed

In the ensuing years World Relief work expanded to include the development and support of trade schools, teaching skills such as woodworking, plumbing, electrical, welding, metal work and masonry. The number of volunteers for work projects continued to increase as did the financial support to World Relief. Three trade schools were developed, many wells were drilled, and teams were sent down in support of all these projects.

SEED Ministries

In the years of 1992 - 1994 contacts with Franz and Doris Clotaire made the Caribbean Committee aware of the work of SEED Ministries, which taught agricultural skills to the Haitian people. SEED represents Service, Evangelization, Education, and Development. In the years since 1994, World Relief has sent financial aid and many work teams to assist this worthy project.

All in all the Apostolic Christian brethren have been tremendously blessed with opportunities to serve the poor in Haiti in many wonderful ways. It has proved to be a vivid example of the truth of the teaching in Acts 20:35, I have shewed you all things, how that so labouring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive.

Dealing With Change Part 2

We recently discussed various types of change and how there are some changes over which we have complete control and others that are completely out of our control. It is the latter category which causes us the most stress as we struggle to cope and deal with those changes.

Within the five types of change we mentioned, there are several ways to further categorize them; developmental, transitional, sudden versus gradual, unexpected versus expected, unplanned versus planned, chosen versus un-chosen, emotionally pleasant, and emotionally painful.

Some examples of change are: moving, attending a different school, illness, job change, loss of job, moving to a nursing home, birth of a child, marriage, children leaving home, accident, death, loss of bodily function or ability, graduation, aging, and changes in the lives of others around us. Of course, this list isn't all inclusive but gives an indication how broadly change affects all of us.

We read in God's Word, *Psalm* 46:10 "Be still, and know that I am God: I will be exalted among the heathen, I will be exalted in the earth." It is easy for us to read that and believe it but when we are confronted with life-changing events; it is difficult for us to simply "be still".

It is the uncertainty of life that makes us feel "out of control" and we don't like the feeling of not knowing the outcome of something before we start it. When we feel that way we often want to just take over for God and fix things on our own. Our tolerance for uncertainty is related to the amount of control we feel that we have. Resilient people tend to focus more on the areas over which they have control and implement coping strategies where no immediate solutions exist.

People react to change in multiple ways according to their perspective. How we make sense of what we're going through is more important than what we're going through in how we cope with it. We read in James 1:2 "My brethren count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations [trials]; knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience." It is difficult to find joy in the sudden loss of a loved one or the discovery of a life-threatening illness. Nevertheless, having an eternal perspective is ultimately the key to acceptance.

Psalm 27:14, "Wait on the LORD: be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart: wait, I say, on the Lord."

Matthew 11:28-30, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Psalm 27:13-14, "I had fainted, unless I had believed to see the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living."

Jeremiah 29:11, "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the LORD, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end."

Isaiah 40:31, "But they that wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint."

Isaiah 49:15-16, "Can a woman forget her sucking child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? Yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee. Behold, I have graven thee upon the palms of my hands; thy walls are continually before me."

So, we can see in these few verses that God does care about us and our wellbeing and that we are never forgotten. Whatever it is that we are going through (good or bad), God would like to help us grow to know and trust in Him more deeply. However, Satan would like to hurt us thereby. It is evident throughout the Scriptures that God's people not only acknowledged their struggles but also clung to their belief that God would see them through.

Many different feelings come over us as we deal with change in our lives and they greatly depend upon what we're going through and the perspective we have. We won't necessarily react to a change the same way someone else does.

Excitement – looking forward with anticipation

Mixed Emotions – feeling two or more emotions at the same time; often ones that appear to be opposites

Sadness – feeling sad; we may sometimes wonder if life will ever be happy or normal again.

Shock – state of confusion; sometimes numbness

Free Floating Emotions – feelings appear "for no reason" – we may feel like crying but not know why

Denial – refusal to deal with the reality of the change

Bargaining – attempts to try to hold on to what is perceived to be lost

Anger – frustration with oneself, others, or God

Depression – feeling down, hopeless **Anxiety** – tension, worry

Fatigue – lack of energy or motivation, burn out

Some practical steps in dealing with change are:

1. Step back and get a godly perspective

2. Take time to be alone with God

3. Share your burdens with others

4. Don't be afraid to ask for help

5. Pray and also ask others to pray with you

6. Acknowledge that a change is occurring and that it will take time for you to adjust.

7. Take care of your physical health

Change is inevitable and the success of our coping mechanism is largely dependent upon our perceptions, our resiliency, and our faith.

I Peter 5:7, "Casting all your care upon him; for he careth for you."



The Light Of Hope

"The Beauty Of Holiness" Retired Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

"Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." These words are written in one of David's psalms as recorded in I Chronicles 16:29, and repeated in Psalms 29:2 and 96:9, the latter possibly having been written by Moses. Both David and Moses were guilty of murder at some time in their lives and they seem to be unlikely candidates to be exhorting others to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. They must have had the assurance of complete forgiveness and cleansing in order to write that. I believe they had that assurance. We must remember that Moses appeared with Christ and Elijah on the mount of transfiguration, an indication of complete forgiveness.

The word "beauty" brings to our minds something visual, something we see with our eyes. Generally speaking, women like to be beautiful and men like to be handsome, attractive to look upon. I Peter 3:4, however, teaches us that adornment or beauty should be, "The hidden man of the heart." The Apostle Peter here purposely uses the word "hidden" to negate the idea that something beautiful is visual. There is a hidden, non visual beauty, too, which I believe applies in the exhortation to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. However, it is not all hidden. The way we dress and adorn ourselves is indicative of what is within us, the condition of the heart.

The word "holiness" certainly challenges us to, by God's grace, live pure and holy lives, but even with our best efforts, we may fall short sometimes. Hebrews 12:10 reads, "That we might be partakers of his holiness." This teaches us that there is another dimension of holiness, that Christ's holiness is shared with us. We are partakers or recipients of His holiness. This aspect of holiness is visual to God but not to man. except by the way we speak, adorn and conduct ourselves. I Timothy 2:9 exhorts women to adorn themselves in modest apparel, and I believe the same holds true for men. It's the apparel, or lack of it, that causes so much trouble and heartache.

The word "worship" indicates that we are in submission. We realize that we are much lower than the One we worship. We must submit ourselves one to another, so long as that submission is not contrary to what is taught in the Bible. James 4:7 tells us of another submission, which is the most important. It reads, "Submit yourselves therefore to God." In order to worship God in



the beauty of holiness we must recommit ourselves to God. We do believe in the living Creator God. The creation, including human beings, did not just happen to fall into place. We do believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son, that He died for us and arose again, and that we are able to live holy lives if we avail ourselves of the grace offered to us.

We should remember that true worship is more than just going to church. We should have a mind to honor and worship God. Romans 1:25 tells of some who, "worshipped and served the creature more than the Creator." In the world as a whole, people want to worship something or somebody they can see. That's why the children of Israel made themselves a golden calf. That's why in Kamakura, Japan, there is a giant statue of Buddha. We are called upon to worship Him whom we cannot see with our eyes. Let us be careful not to begin to worship the creature, the created, more than the Creator. And let us strive to be holy as He is holy.

There are many things we do not know or understand but one thing we do know is holiness is beautiful.
