Wherefore lift up the hands which hang down, and the feeble knees; And make straight paths for your feet, lest that which is lame be turned out of the way; but let it rather be healed.

Sermon by Bro. Larry Wenninger, Latty, OH Exodus 31:12-18 and St. John 17

If you bear with me just a moment. I couldn't help but contrast the sound of the children in your assembly here this morning, during the singing and during our moment of prayer. That is not a reprimand, don't take it that way. But I wonder sometimes if we get so used to things in life, we maybe fail to appreciate some of the blessings that we enjoy. My wife and I assembled a week ago with one of our churches where the entire congregation, including those of us visiting, numbered nine people. Joyce and I were the youngest ones there. So it is obvious there was not the sound of small children.

I had to think, as I just reflected upon that as we were singing this morning, I can go back very, very easily in my mind when I was the age of some of the youngest that are seated here in our benches this morning. Sitting with my Dad on the east side of our Latty congregation, we would usually go up about a third of the way. It is not that we have assigned seats. But that is just where we always ended up. I can still, in my mind, see brothers who stood in this spot, long gone to their reward. I can still hear the hymns being sung, some of which we sang together just a few minutes ago. Even though our lives have changed in so many ways, the way we communicate, the way we travel, our occupations, in many ways would not resemble that era hardly at all, yet we are singing the same hymns. We are reading from the same precious book. We are serving the same heavenly Father. Our prayers are ascending to that Being who will never change. He is eternal. Yesterday, today and forever. No change. I don't know what that does for you loved ones. But to me it is greatly encouraging. So again, let's appreciate our heritage.

Again, I don't want to be out of place, but it just comes to me. Someone made a comment recently, 'I really get tired of hearing someone refer or use the phrase, our precious faith. What they are really doing is glorifying the church and not God'. I don't agree with that statement. Again, maybe this is not the place to start that discussion and we won't. But when vou hear that phrase, to me it is everything rolled into one. If we are a true New Testament church - and I believe we are - then what the Word has to say; the whole marvelous plan of salvation, the shed blood of Jesus Christ on the cross. our call to repentance and conversion and living a godly life as we serve Him, based on the teachings of not only the Old Testament but the Apostles, is all one package. It is precious and it is our faith. So as we gather together today to worship God, again, dear ones, we just plead for your prayers.

Exodus 31 has words that are pretty direct and pretty harsh. I believe dear ones, as we read this together, which gives us insight into the mind of the Being we call our Heavenly Father. We would also have to take this Scripture, along with some of the passages that the Lord Jesus Christ Himself taught. When the Pharisees were making an issue of some of His behavior on the Sabbath day, He said, if you have one of your animals fall into a ditch, you are going to assist them even though it is the Sabbath day (St. Matthew 12:11).

So I think there are times we have to, should we say, use some common sense. Take the Word in its entirety. There would be those that would say, this is part of the old law. We are no longer there. Yet, this is the mind of God. So as we come into God's house today, as we look into His Word, what is the feeling of our heart? If I don't have it wrong, one of

Light From The Word

November 2009

Two important parts of a Christian's spiritual life are worshipping together with other believers, called corporate worship, and taking the time for personal devotions. You may or may not use the word "devotions," but by the phrase "personal devotions" we mean reading God's Word, meditating (thinking through what we have read), and spending time in prayer alone with God. The act of devotions is a form of communion with a very personal God. As the Holy Spirit guides and moves us, God speaks to us through His Word, and we speak to Him in prayer.

What is your reason for having devotions? The purpose is not to puff up spiritually, it is not "because I have to," and it is not "because I want to look good." It must be done out of a pure heart's desire to know and to love our God more fully, to humbly desire to learn from Him, to seek to become more like Him and to worship and adore Him.

One of the first encouragements converts may receive is to start and maintain devotions, that is, to read the Bible and to pray every day. This time is important for the growth of a Christian. Converts may struggle with finding the right way to accomplish this. Even mature believers may find it difficult at times to maintain a consistent time of devotions every day. Without understanding the importance of this quiet time (Ps. 46:10), it may end up being low on our priority list, and the cares and desires of this world may crowd out the time that should be spent communing with God.

Devotions is a time during which we can be reshaped and further molded into the likeness of our Lord. Through regular communion with God, our hearts are kept tender and soft. Quality devotional times will have a positive impact on our spiritual walk. However, it is not always easy to maintain consistency, or be in the right frame of mind for devotions. The quality of our personal devotional time can significantly shape the rest of our day. This requires much self-discipline, but the rewards are great. When we start and end our day communing with our Creator, as Moses spent time on Mt. Sinai with God (Ex. 34:30), it will impact

our everyday lives in many ways. Our joy and peace will become richer, and our priorities will be more clearly defined and established (Prov. 4:26-27).

Our Lord Jesus Christ, though the Son of God, still found it necessary to spend much time in communion with the Father when He walked on this earth. Often He would spend long evenings alone with God (Mark 6:46; Luke 6:12). While we cannot usually get away to mountains like Jesus did, we should try to find a place that is guiet and with few interruptions and distractions (Matt. 6:6). We should endeavor to find time every morning and evening to talk with God (Josh. 1:8). "But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night" (Ps. 1:2), "...to shew forth thy lovingkindness in the morning and thy faithfulness every night" (Ps. 92:2).

While it does sometimes suffice to randomly open a portion of Scripture for reading and meditation, there is also benefit in taking a whole book in the Bible or a topic and carefully reading and studying it over a period of time. There are guides available for reading through the whole Bible in one year, but care must be taken that such an endeavor does not simply constrain us toward reaching the goal of having read the whole Bible, but rather it should serve as an assistant in disciplined reading of the whole counsel of God. Generally time spent in the New Testament should exceed the time spent in the Old Testament.

As we read the Scriptures, God's Spirit will speak to our hearts, teach us His principles, correct our faults, show us how to live a life of holiness (2 Tim. 3:16) and strengthen our faith (Rom. 10:17). When Bible reading is properly done, it should have a reflective side to it that is called meditation. This is carefully taking what we have read, thinking through the meaning of each verse and biblical principle, and honestly considering how we can apply it to our lives. The more quality time we give the Holy Spirit, the more He will teach us the deep truths of the Word. Jesus said, "...the Spirit...will guide you into all truth" (John 16:13). When the Spirit convicts us of areas of deficiency or sin, we should pray for the grace to respond with appropriate confession, repentance, and



correction—restoring our peace with God and man.

Our prayers in devotional time should reflect our response to what the Spirit has taught us. In addition, we are commanded to pray for the saints and the ministers of God's Word (1 Thes. 5:25; 2 Thes. 3:1) and to pray for each other (Jam. 5:16). Paul stated several times that he remembered the churches in his daily prayers (Rom. 1:9; Eph. 1:16; 1 Thes. 1:2; Philem. 4; Phil. 1:4). We are told to include thanksgiving (Col. 4:2; 1 Tim. 2:1) and prayers of petition for our leaders (1 Tim. 2:2). There can be benefit in maintaining a list of items to pray for every day. Prayer is two-way communion with God, and as we are sensitive to His Spirit, He will continue to guide our thoughts as we pray. Do not let your prayers become a ritual, but may they always be fresh and personal in expressing your heart's petition and praise to a loving and gracious God.

A hymn that aptly describes our time of devotions and what it should mean to us is found in Tabernacle Hymns #130

"In The Garden"

"I come to the garden alone While the dew is still on the roses And the voice I hear falling on my ear The Son of God discloses.

He speaks, and the sound of His voice, Is so sweet the birds hush their singing, And the melody that He gave to me Within my heart is ringing.

And He walks with me, and He talks with me.

And He tells me I am His own; And the joy we share as we tarry there, None other has ever known."

Let us delight daily in our devotions so that we can be as trees planted by the living water of God (Ps. 1:3). "*Thy testimonies also are my delight and my counsellors*" (Ps. 119:24). Make this a priority, and consistently spend ample quiet time with God. He will richly bless you.

Serving our Brethren in Eastern Europe

In the late 1980's, when communism was still in force, the Mission Committee helped the congregation in Budapest, Hungary build a new church. Since that time there have been numerous opportunities to serve our Nazarene brethren throughout Eastern Europe.

During communist times they were forced to assemble in secret, the depth of oppression varying from nation to nation. In Ukraine the only time our brethren were allowed to have public worship services was at the time of a funeral. Therefore, people came from near and far and stood for hours in the cemetery, regardless of weather, just to hear the word of God.

During those difficult years the flame of faith sometimes grew dim, but it did not go out, by the grace of God. At this time it seems to be flourishing, although the same problems and struggles with our adversary exist there as everywhere on earth.

Nearly all the Hungarian congregations are now worshiping in new or remodeled facilities, by God's grace and the support of many brethren.

At this time the greatest need for church buildings is in Ukraine, which also has the most children and the greatest hope for future growth. However, there is still considerable difficulty in coping with inflation, government regulations, and all sorts of other challenging circumstances.

Four churches have asked for help to build new or improve old facilities. Needs in this troubled land are now approaching \$1,000,000 for this purpose. The Mission Committee has drafted and sent a letter that is being read to our American churches to try to gain financial support to help these dear souls have a place to worship God.

Teams of brethren regularly visit Eastern Europe in our quest to do due diligence to God and our American brethren. This year is no exception.

A number of Romanian churches have been sent funds for repairs this year, and a new one is presently under construction in the village of Caransebes. It has been several years since this request first came to our attention, and today, after much research and planning, the work is underway.



Brethren recently visited Caransebes and were satisfied that at last it appears this rural congregation will have a place of comfortable worship. The old building simply became so dilapidated that it was beyond repair, and we decided this was the best option.

In Serbia, a remnant of the former Yugoslavian republic, there are hundreds of churches. Over the years, by the grace of God, we have helped build many church buildings. As this is being written, two elders from the Mission Committee and their wives are in this country to evaluate ongoing situations. Each year we try to make these trips in order that we can do the best to serve both God and man.

Churches have also been built in Croatia and Slovakia, where the membership is small, but nonetheless they are our brethren, and we wish to continue to assist them in their spiritual needs. In addition to churches, we also provide vehicles for the use of the leadership of the congregations as they travel to serve needs of their members.

Over the years, dozens of autos have been financed for this purpose, the costs shared equally by the Mission and World Relief Committees. We are thankful that a new model has appeared on the scene, a car built in Romania by the French firm Renault, who bought an old car factory in that country.

These amazing little vehicles cost around \$9,000 for a five passenger and \$14,000 for a seven passenger, and seem to suit the needs very well. Teams that were there this year were able to see and ride in these cars, and were quite satisfied.

Without the blessings of God and the tireless support of our faithful brethren none of this would be possible. Looking back over the years, our American and European brethren who serve to do this work express appreciation, first of all to almighty God, and then to all of our supporters for this wonderful assistance. "Remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labour of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God and our Father." I THESS 1:3

May God continue to lead and guide these endeavors, that our brethren can continue to receive spiritual blessings.

We would like to take you along with us, so He could bless you too.

Working Together

1. To learn which and where products are needed: Contact Tom/ Kathy Schifferer 847-695-7510 tomandkathy@schifferer.com

2. Order labels from Bro. Stan Virkler 219-261-3200 or email at information@acwr.org

3. On the label, write the name of the kit, country, the Distribution Center it is to go to, number of kits in each box, what each kit contains (indicate "No China" for Mexico), a list of each item, the name of your church, and the date made. 4. It is helpful if they are packed in boxes of the same size with the label on them.

5. After labeling, you may send kits, comforters, and clothing to your closest distribution center, as they will forward them to their correct destination.

6. Along with each shipment to a distribution center, send a cover letter stating the total products you are sending. If you have items for different countries, each country could be on an individual sheet and all your sheets stapled together, so they can send it along as it goes to its final destination.

7. When you send your projects to a distribution center, please send a copy of the total shipment to Tom/ Kathy Schifferer (for the ongoing tally of where the kits are).

Many times there are questions about what kits are being made, for whom, what supplies are in them, and what distribution center they are being sent to. Often too many of one kind of kit was made and not enough of another. Sometimes the supplies varied and were sent to the distribution center unlabeled.

As a result, the brethren working at the distribution center would have to look in the boxes, determine which kits were inside, for who, and try to put extras in to fit a specific country's needs. Sometimes this is still happening, but it is getting much better. In 2009, we are making 30,000 kits and many comforters. For the most part, by labeling them correctly, there is no guesswork. With the packing list for the shipment, the packing night is much easier. Many thanks for the extra help.

We try to keep current with those working one on one with the various countries to find out if there are any changes, needs, or something new. Keep us informed especially if the contact person has changed, you have any questions, or if you want to do the same project every year.

Destinations

Mexico work teams especially enjoy giving kits in the Reynosa, Juarez, Magdalena areas, and further in the interior. Medical and dental teams read Bible stories and give the children their own coloring kit and Bible story book. It is a joy to see the hunger for the Word as they receive their own Bible.

In Haiti, kits go to the Childcare Department which manages the funds and needs of the students who are being sponsored to attend the church schools. Kits go to MEBSH in LesCayes, Haiti, hospitals and medical clinics at the Dumay Life Line Orphanage, King's Hospital, the orphanage at Port-au-Prince and with small teams that go to rural areas to set up mobile clinics. The children use everything in their kits or give them to a sibling. When emptied, even the bags are used.

În the Dominion Republic, the school kits are distributed by the Bethel Misson, and through the Good Samaritan Foundation General Hospital in LaRomona, which sends medical teams to rural areas.

This summer we had the privilege of hosting a sister from Hungary for five weeks. Helena Sos had learned about the home and it's services by visiting our website at www.achh .org. She is from the church in Hodmezovashrheley, Hungary. Helena was completing her degree in Special Education at a University in Hungary, and has an interest in individuals with disabilities. She wondered if it would be possible to have a volunteer internship at our home. After coordinating some details, it became possible for her to do this.

Helena began her five week volunteer Case Manager internship at ACHH on July 2. We weren't sure how to offer experiences to Helena that would give her full exposure to the range of challenged people we serve. We decided that Helena could "track" a resident from Timber Ridge, one person from Oakwood Estate, and another from our Idlewood house. That way she could get involved in the lives of a resident from our large facility, someone from a 16 person home, and someone who lives in a house in the community with just four others. Helena would follow each person where they live, work and recreate in the community. She would have the opportunity to attend church in Morton and Washington with our residents. Helena also had specific assignments which would teach her the system of service providing for our residents.

Five weeks went by very quickly. She brought to us a unique way of expressing God's love to all those with whom she came in contact. All who met her expressed what a blessing it had been for our residents and staff to have her here. She left us with the following thank you note:

the last hymns we sang this morning, it says, Oh, how joyful is the hour When we, Lord, draw nigh to Thee (Thou Hast Words of Life. Zion's Harp #203). Is that our motivation this morning? Is that why we're here? Or do we sometimes fall into the trap, well, it is Sunday morning and we need to go to the house of God because that is expected of us? Patterns of behavior, dear ones, and even to use the word 'habit', can be good for us. But I think we also each need to ask ourselves the question, are we really here, can we really identify with the words that this hymn writer penned? Oh, how joyful is the hour When we, Lord, draw nigh to Thee. And the words of life and power From Thy holy lips receive. May we not in vain assemble 'Round Thy word, O Lord, today: Into our hearts meek and humble Write the Word of Life, we pray! These words were probably written some centuries ago. I don't personally remember the history behind hymn 203, but that same thought is just as fresh as the beauty of this new morning. Is that the feeling in our heart? I think that is how we can measure ourselves against the last few verses of Exodus 31. Is it our desire to truly set this day apart as holy, as worshipping God?

We all have situations in life that demand our attention. We probably all have plans of one type or another, not only for the hours that remain in this day, but for tomorrow. That's just life. But can we, as we gather about His Word, just put all of that aside and lean upon Him, asking for His blessing, for His understanding and for His Word? That is why we brothers who stand here plead for your prayers. We have nothing to offer. I have no idea what kind of a week you loved ones faced. Some of you undoubtedly had a wonderful week. Others perhaps, had a tremendous struggle. Some of the rest of us are somewhere in the middle. Yet the God that we serve, who we have served for generations, who has provided for us the heritage that is ours, wants to bless us.

We'd probably do well, dear ones, to just end the service right now and ask each of you to just quietly reflect upon the words we just read together in St. John 17. Christ's intercessory prayer. Not only for His contemporaries at that time. But I am sure, if we were following at all, you could not miss the references to those of us gathered here in this place in this very morning. I find that so encouraging.

We could pick up a lot of pieces of literature and read accounts of history and words that were spoken. It would all pertain to the time in which it was spoken or written. That is pretty much the end of the story. I hope we can sense within our beings the difference when even the Lord Jesus Christ refers to the Word as having light and having truth and being a part of that which is eternal. This praver, especially where the Lord Jesus Christ is praying for those which shall believe on Him through the word of the men that He was addressing, is that prayer that reaches down through all of the centuries that have passed and touches those of us gathered here this morning (St. John 17:20). Do we sense that? Can we feel that? Is it alive within us?

I think that is the difference. Because all of us can go back to a point in time, prior to our awakening, prior to our conversion. Use the terminology that you are most comfortable with. We just didn't have a spiritual understanding. I recall well, my father telling about being a young man and standing out in the parking lot of the Latty church at noon when it was still in the little town of Latty. So you know that goes back a few years, because our present building is the same age that I am. He said, here was a young man who was standing in a group of young fellows. We have all been there. You can identify with the situation. They were discussing the fact that one of their peers had just in the previous week began his repentance. The young man that was doing the speaking said, 'Yeah, they say he has seen the light. What in the world is meant by that phrase? I sure have not seen any light'.

I think every one of us can go back to a time in our journey when we could identify concretely with that statement. What do they mean by 'sensing the presence of the Spirit' and 'feeling the call of God'? Understanding that there is more to life than meets the eye.

There is more than just the physical attributes by which we identify one another. That is all part of us. That is who we are. When we hear a name uttered, we get a mental picture of someone. We see what their frame is like and what their hair color is and so on and so forth. They have physical characteristics by which we identify one another. That is just part of life.

But when it comes to what we sense within our beings, loved ones, the part of us that the Lord makes reference to here that will live eternally, how are we doing in that dimension? Can we truly feel the prayer of the Lord Jesus Christ here uttered early in the first century A.D., where He says, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." v.20.21. I think that is a challenge to every one of us brothers and sisters as we journey from day to day.

Our departed shepherd Brother Loren Stoller used to often present SILVER LINING

to us, he said, 'Dear ones, as you go about your business from day to day, what is the feeling of the people around you? Brothers, if you are walking into a business establishment to transact something, what is the feeling of the man behind the counter as he sees you open the door to his establishment? Is it a feeling of joy? Does he say, well, there is so and so? He is just a pleasure with which to do business. Or does he cringe a little bit, saying, here comes this fellow who will try to take me down to the last possible dime and really drive a hard bargain?' He would go on and ask the question, 'What type of an example are we presenting?' I think that is exactly what was part of the Lord Jesus Christ's prayer that we just read.

"Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word, that they all may be one, as Thou, Father, art in me and I in Thee, that they also may be one in us." Are we still there, loved ones? I think it is one of the questions that we have to ask and that only we can answer as we read a passage of Scripture such as this.

Referring to our earlier reading in Exodus, God was very, very clear. Don't work on the Sabbath day. Your life might even be required of you. Keep it holy. Dedicate it unto me. (Exodus 31:13-17) Is that our focus as we gather this morning?

Where the Lord Jesus began this prayer, "...Father, the hour is come..." St. John 17:1, we could continue to read in the next two chapters which go into graphic detail of the story of the trial, the crucifixion, our Lord and Savior being falsely accused, taking upon *Him* the sins that were those of each and every one of us, bearing them on the cross, that we might have in our hearts this understanding of peace.

But as He says, "...Father, the

hour is come; glorify thy Son, that thy Son also may glorify thee: As thou hast given him power over all flesh, that he should give eternal life to as many as thou hast given him. And this is life eternal..." This is a textbook, dear ones. It is providing for us clear insight into the mind of God. "...that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent." v.1-3. So again, dear ones, how are we doing today? Do we identify with this?

Back to the earlier comments about appreciating our heritage, I am not here to elevate Apostolic Christians. That is not my point. But I believe if all of us can sense within our beings that we are still standing upon this Word, which is the pattern, which is truth, if we can understand what He is saying, even in verse five, "And now, O Father, glorify thou me with thine own self with the glory which I had with thee before the world was," there is an expanding of the picture. It is eternal. It is a view in which our human minds can go only part way. We cannot understand time without end. We cannot wrap our minds around something that had no beginning and will have no ending. Everything else with which we deal in life has a beginning.

We view the birth of our children. Our grandchildren. We see them grow so quickly. So *quickly* those years pass. Everything in our world is finite, has a beginning and has an ending. I think it is so hard often for us to just put ourselves into this spiritual realm. Yet, I believe the Lord with words like we just read together this morning, is certainly attempting to assist us, when He says, and now oh, Father, glorify thou me with thine own self with the glory which I had with thee before the world was.

We could turn back to the earlier chapters of Genesis and read that story of Creation and know that the Lord Jesus Christ was there with His Father as all things had their beginning. The command to 'Let there be light' and there was light (Genesis 1:3). Men of renown, of high education and many degrees will pass that off as rubbish today. Yet, if we can just accept in simple faith that this Word is eternal truth, then I believe we are following part of the object of the prayer that the Lord Jesus Christ prayed in these verses we have read. Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word. That they all may be one. I realize that we have read that a number of times. We cannot, loved ones though, escape that whole concept. Are we a part of His plan? Not only in name but in thought and in motive and devotion to the very depth of our being.

"While I was with them in the world..." He is praying here about His disciples, "...I kept them in thy name: those that thou gavest me I have kept, and none of them is lost, but the son of perdition; that the scripture might be fulfilled." St. John 17:12. Here again is a powerful lesson for all of us, I believe, in our dealings with one another. The Scripture makes abundantly clear that the Lord Jesus Christ knew before He selected Judas to be one of that inner circle, what the future held. That is part of being God. That goes beyond our concept, our ability to understand. But the night that the Lord Jesus Christ, before He selected His twelve, the Word is clear that He spent the entire night in prayer (St. Luke 6:1213). I have often had to wonder, was a lot of those hours not devoted to the fact that here He is selecting Judas and He knew Judas would betray Him to the high priest and his associates?

How do we deal with others who maybe, from time to time, would purposefully step on our toes? It is

so easy to react as humans react. To take things into our own hand. To seek vengeance. To get revenge. Yet again, if we are followers of the Lord Jesus Christ, as He is telling us in this prayer to God, I pray "...for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou, Father, *art* in me..." v.20,21.

We sing in one of our Zion's Harp hymns, dear ones, that the Word is a mirror (*Obedience to the Word* #142). I speak only to myself. As I read these words and you are viewing, as you would, a reflection in a mirror, what are we seeing? Are we aligning? Do we have some work to do? Do we sense that His grace is still present? Do we appreciate the fact that again, as part of our heritage, we are here to assist one another?

It just comes to my mind, I don't want to be out of place, but my wife and I recently spent some time in the Smoky Mountains. If you have ever been there, there was a settlement called Cades Cove. A beautiful area. Mountains surrounding it but relatively flat. A very fertile land. Families lived there and prospered until the government of the United States decided to make their homeland into a national park. After some time they had to leave.

But we walked into a church building in that little area. Of course, long since the days that it was used for worship services. But a Park Ranger conducted a short program. It wasn't a worship service. But we really enjoyed it. It began with a playing of the hymn, Precious Memories. Then he talked about what this church was like. What it did for the community. He said, 'You know people, there are many historians which believe in the early days of our nation, small congregations like this had a far greater influence on the community than did any other thing.' He

said, 'The belief of this group of people was first of all, that the Word of God was truth. That any new thing that was to come along, whether they would adapt that or not, they got on their knees first of all. They'd see if it would align with the Word of God. Then they asked themselves the question; would this edify?' That is the word the man used. It is not a word we hear a lot in society today. In other words, would it build us up and draw us closer to the truth? He said. It was on that frame work that decisions were made as to how they went forward'. He said, 'They lived by what the Bible had to say'.

Down in front of the pulpit area was a little bench. He said, 'That is called a mourning bench'. I had heard the term before. If I had been asked to define what that was, I couldn't have done it. He said, 'The purpose of that was if one of the members of the congregation was involved in some type of activity that was not a blessing to the rest or against the Word of God, they had to come in front of the congregation, make a public apology, confess their sin, audibly, openly to everyone. Then for the next period of weeks, had to occupy that spot, facing the congregation as the worship services would continue. If the infraction was severe enough, they were also shunned for a time'. He said, 'Now in today's world, that may not mean much. You just go on about your business, deal with other people. Here there were no other people. Their neighbors in this valley in which they lived, they were surrounded, they had to deal with one another. They traded things. They used the barter system. So if someone was being shunned, the economic side of their life was also greatly affected. Conversely, everyone pulled together, had a common goal. They walked the pathway they were expected to walk to the praise and honor and glory of God'.

Again, I hope I am not out of place in reciting that. But I had to reflect back to God's Word. To the interpretation of our brotherhood. While some details would certainly be different in our lives today, and we probably are grateful for that, yet the concept, dear ones, comes right back to this prayer which the Lord Jesus Christ uttered in this chapter we've read together this morning. Where He utters these words, and let's read them once again. I know we've repeated them several times. But part of the prayer of the Son of God for you and I gathered here this morning is, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." v.20,21.

Let's appreciate, dear ones, what He has given us through the shed blood of His Son. Through the heritage that is ours. Through a faith and understanding that has allowed so many of us to approach His throne of grace on our knees humbly, pleading for forgiveness. Asking for strength and understanding, which He has so faithfully shared. Might that in itself encourage us, as we continue to walk, to continue to keep the Sabbath day holy. To count precious the opportunities that are ours from time to time. To enter the house of worship as we have done this morning and to once again, hear that prayer of our Lord and Savior echo down through the centuries. As He said in the last verse of the chapter that precedes this, "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." St. John 16:33.





Grief/Loss - Part 2

Grief/Loss, Part 1 was written for those who are grieving and was printed in the September, 2009, Silver Lining. Part 2 is focused on how to help grieving people soon after their loss. We want to follow the example of Jesus as he shared compassion. Mark 1:41: "And Jesus, moved with compassion, put forth his hand...." Jesus moved toward the people—reaching out to them. Matthew 20:34: "So Jesus had compassion on them, and touched....." Jesus physically touched them. Luke 7:13: "And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her, and said . . ." Jesus spoke to her.

Follow Jesus' example in your first encounter... Go to the family. Reach out and touch them-shake hands, touch their shoulder, or give them a hug-if it is appropriate. Speak in love. If you can't find the right words such as, "I know how special he/she was to you," or "I wish I could take the hurt away," you may simply say, "I'm sorry." Another way of saying, "I'm sorry," is, "You have my sympathy." Avoid clichés such as: "Everything happens for a reason," "It was meant to be," or "God would never give you more than you could handle." Clichés tend to minimize the loss. What may seem comforting to you may be very hurtful to the grieving person. If you are unaware of what to say, simply say, "I don't know what to say." Honesty can be more comforting than words with less meaning. Sometimes there is just nothing to say. Just be quiet, be with them, and hold their hands. If you do say something insensitive, acknowledge it and apologize. These comments can cause hurt and future resentment. Instead, be a source of comfort by listening, sharing a memory, and laughing or crying together.

If you are a close family member or friend, it may be helpful if you ask to help maintain laundry, basic housecleaning or cooking, or watch children at home. Other routine duties such as returning library books, buying groceries, picking up dry cleaning, transporting to appointments or activities, etc., may also be appreciated. Try to anticipate what your friend may need. Bereaved persons sometimes can't think of what is needed.

Some ideas for helping those going through grief and loss include: sending plants/flowers, giving to a charity in the loved one's name, sending sympathy cards (include money if you know there is a need), writing special remembrances of the loved one, making short phone calls to them (don't worry about being a bother; let your friend tell you if he/she doesn't want to talk right now), and making and bringing dinner (try to use disposable containers, or clearly label containers you want returned, and be responsible for getting your container within a reasonable time).

In the first few weeks after a loss, continue your visits with them. Give your friend permission to grieve in front of you. Don't change the subject or tell them not to cry, and do not act uncomfortable when they do cry. Ask questions, but don't tell them how they should feel. Say sincerely, "Tell me how you are getting along," and be ready to listen. They may have a lot to say and may repeat their story many times. In order to be helpful to their grieving process, you must be willing to listen. Sometimes grieving people can verbalize what they need, so you know what you can do or say to comfort them. You can also add, "I've been thinking of you," or "I've been praying for you." Helpers need to be aware that people who are grieving also need times of NOT talking about grief.

Saying, "Call me if you need anything," or "Let me know how I can help," are generic statements for grieving families. Not all people are willing to ask for help. Instead, offer to take them out for dinner at a specific time that is convenient for them. Or state that you are getting your groceries Thursday morning. "May I have your grocery list to get your groceries at the same time?" Or "I'm putting through a load of laundry, do you have a basket or two that I can take home and do for you?" If the answers are "no," offer these again, or other suggestions, in a week or two.

Avoid giving advice. Everyone is an individual and grieves differently. There are no rules that define how a bereaved person should feel or how soon he/she will return to the routine of daily life. You may want the bereaved person to "get back to normal" in about a month, but depending on the type of loss, that may not be realistic thinking. Accept listening to stories patiently over and over; this is an important part of the grieving process.

After a few weeks, people generally stop coming by. Continue to call and check in with the grieving person or family. Make a call, leave a message, or write a note to let them know you care. Answering machines and e-mail are great ways to keep in touch allowing the bereaved person to respond only when he/she feels up to it. Invite bereaved friends to attend events with you, as you normally would. Let them decide if they don't want to attend.

Il Corinthians 1:3-4: "Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort; Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God." If you experienced death in your immediate family, you now have an opportunity to share your feelings and encouraging words of comfort. Now you may understand a purpose for the trial of grief you went through. Maybe there are several of you who have gone through similar situations. This would be a good time to visit the grieving person together. After listening to his/her words of loss, share your own and offer hope. Gently encourage grieving people to help them realize that they can adjust to a new way of living without their loved ones. Don't just do this one time. Invite the grieving person to do something with you away from his/her home-when he/she is ready. Until then, go for short visits (in small groups or alone) and share special songs, scripture, poems, and stories that may help. Grieving people often attach with others who have gone through grief.

The workplace can be a confusing and difficult place to grieve. The key to maintaining good working relations is to have open communication. Try to help grieving people maintain a normalcy at work. Ask them to lunch, or sincerely ask how they are doing. Employees and employers can try to alleviate feelings of being overwhelmed by either delegating or sharing job responsibilities. Crying, having difficult days, feeling confused, or having trouble concentrating is normal for grieving people. Providing a safe place to express their feelings at work will aid in their healing process.

Pray for the Holy Spirit to guide you as you endeavor to follow Jesus' pattern of demonstrating compassion to the grieving soon after their loss.







This is the concluding portion of a two-part series of an article appearing in an Akron, Ohio, newspaper in the 1920s. It dealt with a newspaper reporter's account of the Apostolic Christian Church in that city, and was written by reporter William Eagan. The concluding section is below:

There is no social activity in connection with the church. The Sunday dinner is its sole secular function. Members seek entertainment in meditation and in visits and conversation with other members.

Technically, the church members do not seek entertainment or pleasure. They are not hedonistic. And their mental reaction to something which pleases them is consolation, rather than entertainment.

In the World War the members of the Apostolic Christian Church declined to carry arms. They said they wouldn't fight against their fellow men, but they would go to the front as ambulance drivers or for other non-combatant service. On the war records of the United States, these people are listed as "conscientious objectors".

But no one ever said they were afraid of war. They wouldn't carry guns, to be sure, but they would and did endanger their lives caring for the wounded who had been shot by enemy guns.

Apostolic Christians refuse to have anything to do with politics, according to their elders. They never vote and take no voice in governmental affairs. There are other reasons besides brotherly love, though. In the first place, elders say, the interests of the church and the state are widely divergent. Each should let the other alone. Government has to do with worldly things. The church with spiritual things.

"Of course," one elder explained, "We realize that government is necessary. But we believe it can get along without us. To our way of thinking, the church and state cannot mix their interests. History will corroborate what I say.

"But don't get the idea that we are not good citizens. We are. We pay our taxes and abide by the civil law, and we pretty much keep to ourselves. We are not bitter against anything civil. Of course, we believe there is much room for improvement in politics. We believe it is somewhat wicked and corrupt. Not all of it. But some of it. As I said before, though, it is a necessary evil."

The Apostolic Christian Church is ruled from within with steel-banded laws and customs. To become a member of the church a convert must prove to the elders that he is pure of heart. Public confession of guilt is not demanded. But a confession of sin to one of the elders is. The confession, naturally, is held in the utmost confidence.

Speedy ecclesiastical justice is dealt to members of the church who fail to live up to its idealistic principles. They are excommunicated, if necessary. But alternative punishments are resorted to first, provided the sin is not a sacrilegious one, the elder said. The congregation of the Apostolic Christian Church is remarkably large, considering the stringent regulations to which members must subject themselves. It numbers more than 300 persons.

"We would rather have a small flock of devoted parishioners who attend church regularly and adhere to its beliefs, than a large congregation which only comes to services when it wants to," an elder said.

"Converts are always welcome to our church. But they must be sure they wish to be converted to our beliefs and they must be sure that they will live up to them."

Editors note:

As we read this article nearly 90 years after it appeared in an American newspaper, it is necessary to realize the church had been in America for only about 75 years, and their devotion to a life of separation from the world, and nonconformity to worldliness, were vivid ideals lived out in a practical sense. As today, the Bible was held in high esteem and recognized as the final arbiter of truth. They lived their lives in a serious way, and were diligent adherents of true brotherhood.

"Hope and Assurance"

What does the Bible teach about having a hope to go to heaven, or having the assurance of going to heaven? Either way, it is through Jesus Christ, for He is our Redeemer. In Acts 4:12 we read, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."

In Romans 8:24 it is written, "For we are saved by hope." This must mean that we have hope because of our faith in Christ, and that that faith activates the grace of God. In Ephesians 2:8 it says, "For by grace are ye saved through faith."

By definition, hope includes an expectation of what you desire. That makes having hope close to having the assurance of going to heaven, through Christ. But Satan may say that we will never make it because we haven't done something right, or we haven't been good enough, or some other reason. The problem is that we may not know it is from Satan and be greatly disturbed by the thought of possibly not being ready to meet God.

We speak of having a living hope but I can't find it in the Bible. The closest I can come to it is in I Peter 1:3, "Unto a lively hope."

What about "assurance"? In

Acts 17:31 it is written, "He hath given assurance unto all men in that he hath raised him from the dead." In this passage of scripture, the Apostle Paul does not give the assurance of salvation to anyone, only the assurance that Christ is the Son of God, and qualified to be our Saviour.

However, Paul himself, speaks as if he had the assurance of salvation. In II Timothy 4:7-8 he writes, "I have kept the faith: henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness." Paul also wrote in Philippians 1:23, "Having a desire to depart and be with Christ; which is far better." He felt sure of his salvation.

When Paul says that he has kept the faith, does that mean that he never made any mistakes? I don't think so. Philippians 3:11-12 reads, "If by any means I might attain unto the resurrection of the dead. Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect." It is interesting to note that Paul felt that he, himself, was not perfect but that because of his faith in Christ, a crown of righteousness was laid up for him, and that through Christ, he was perfect in God's sight.

We do need to keep the faith. Are we abiding in Christ, the true vine? Do we pray, read the

Bible, and try earnestly to do God's will as we understand it from what is written in His Word? Are we walking in the light? I John 1:7 tells us, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin."

The Apostle Peter in II Peter 1:14 wrote, "Knowing that shortly I must put off this my tabernacle, even as our Lord Jesus Christ hath shewed me." Peter writes as if he had complete assurance of salvation.

The Apostle Paul wrote in Romans 8:38,39, "For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life,shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

It is my hope and prayer that all of us who name the name of Christ can have both the lively hope and the assurance of salvation. I believe that that assurance must be based on the atonement Christ made for us and that we are presently trusting in Christ, abiding in Him, and walking in the light as He is in the light, to the best of our ability. May God give to each humble and trusting soul, the joy of His salvation.
