Sermon by Bro. Dale Banwart, Congerville, IL Judges 16: 15-31 and II Corinthians 4:16-18, 5

The account of Samson is a very familiar account that we learned as children in Sunday School, many of us. But there are some real gems, some real teachings that we can gather from it. If we would go back to the beginning of this chapter, we read that Samson went to Gaza and he saw there an harlot and went in unto her. Then it was told the Gazites, and they tried to capture him. But it says that he took the doors of the gate of the city and the two posts and carried them to the top of a hill (Judges 16:1-3). It is a very impressive thing to young children. Probably especially to the young boys. They think about the strength and the size of those city gates.

Then we read how he loved this woman, Delilah. It says the lords of the Philistines came unto her and said, entice him. See where his great strength lieth. (v.4,5) So she proceeded to carry out their instruction.

It really struck me, as we read this account. In verse sixteen we read the word 'vexed'. It says, "...his soul was vexed unto death;" I don't know how many different times the word vexed is in the Bible. But I believe it speaks of Lot. When it talks of Sodom and Gomorrah, it says that Lot's soul was vexed, because he lived in the city there and there was much unrighteousness. There was much sin and iniquity and it says, he vexed his righteous soul from day to day. (II Peter 2:7,8)

So what does the word 'vexed' mean and how does that apply to us? We need to be careful, don't we, whether we are converted or unconverted, that we would not place our self in a position where our soul would be vexed. It goes back to being careful what we do. We always hear that we should be careful what we do, where we go, what we listen to. But our soul can become vexed. Troubled. As we think about the word 'vexed' it doesn't paint a picture of peace but rather it paints a picture of the soul being troubled.

Finally Samson wore down, didn't he? They had the account of the ropes. Trying to see quickly if I can tell how many different times she tried to get out of Samson the answer to his strength. Finally she succeeded. I believe the lesson to us is, we need to be careful what environment we place ourselves in. Because we can be strong and we can maybe stand up for what's right. But if we continually place ourselves in an environment where we are tempted, sooner or later, Satan can get the upper hand.

So we have this account here of Samson. We know here in his death he slew many of the Philistines. It says that he judged Israel twenty years. (Judges 16:30,31) He did deliver the Israelites many times from the Philistines. If he hadn't been there, perhaps the Philistines would have robbed and plundered the Israelites that much more. They would have come and made them servants. We know that happened throughout history. But how much better could Samson have been in the Lord's service, how much more could the Lord have used Samson if he hadn't placed himself in this position? How much different could this story be, if Samson had been truly yielded to the Lord?

So we're thankful we have a loving God who forgives us. He is faithful to forgive us of our sins - we read that in the Word - if we confess our sins and we truly humble ourselves. But if we can, by God's grace, overcome, how much more useful we can be in His service.

Here, Samson had to pay a terrible price, didn't he? I don't think it records how many years it was that he ground at the mill. But his two eyes were put out. He no doubt was chained to the grinding mill. I have a picture in my mind. I don't know if it comes from a Bible Story book or what it is, but it is a picture of Samson going around and around in a circle. What were the thoughts that were going through his mind? No doubt they were thoughts of regret and remorse, that he had placed himself in this position. That he had not turned and fled from Delilah.

I think we can even read, if we would go back to chapter fourteen, verse three in Judges, "Then his father and his mother said unto him, Is there never a woman among the daughters of thy brethren, or among all my people, that thou goest to take a wife of the uncircumcised Philistines? And Sam-

In a world that is full of sorrow, heartache, and oppression, it is a great blessing to live in nations that permit a measure of freedom. For example, in the United States, we enjoy the constitutionally-protected right to worship. We enjoy freedom of speech and freedom of assembly. The Declaration of Independence proclaims that we are "endowed by our Creator with certain unalienable Rights... that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Kept in an eternal perspective, these rights are a blessing and provide us with great opportunity to serve God in a mighty way. Viewed from an earthly perspective, they can be deceptive and confusing.

What is Life? What brings Happiness, and how do we define it? What is Liberty? The popular notions of these things often sound attractive. "You only go around once in life ... go for the gusto!" "It's a free country. As long as you aren't hurting someone, do as you please." "Money can't buy happiness, but it sure helps!" The Bible has much to say about these grand concepts - often contrary to the popular perception. While a believer may not succumb to such blatantly false attitudes, it is easy to justify oneself, calling the pursuit of financial security, "prudent," or glorifying an excessive desire to accumulate wealth, "a strong work ethic," etc.

Jesus teaches us that money isn't happiness, and that the anxious pursuit of success is fruitless and an indicator of a lack of faith. Perhaps His instruction to, "Take no thought for your life...' seems extreme. However, if our trust is in Him, we can first seek His Kingdom and trust Him to provide all our needs. "Ye cannot serve God and mammon (greed). Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, ... saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? (For after all these things do the Gentiles (unbelievers) seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.

Our Eternal Goal

Light From The Word

Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself" (Matt. 6:24-34).

Isaiah warns us that life is not about accumulating wealth and riches. "Woe unto them that join house to house, that lay field to field, till there be no place, that they may be placed alone in the midst of the earth!" (Is. 5:8).

Again Jesus reminds us that it is of much more importance to be rich unto God. "But God said unto him, Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee: then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided? So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God" (Luke 12:20-21).

Paul writes that liberty is not to be thought of as freedom to do as we please in this world, but rather as freedom from corruption. "For I reckon that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us ..., Because the creature itself also shall be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God" (Rom. 8:18-21).

Peter teaches us that liberty should not be used as an excuse to mistreat others, or disobey laws. "Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake: whether it be to the king, as supreme; Or unto governors, as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers, and for the praise of them that do well. For so is the will of God, that with well doing ye may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men: As free, and not using your liberty for a cloke of maliciousness, but as the servants of God" (1 Pet. 2:13-16).

The prophet Isaiah asks why we would settle for the deceptive false happiness of the world, thinking that somehow we can buy it. Years before Jesus came, Isaiah prophesied of the true bread from heaven, and the satisfaction that serving Jesus brings. "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread, and your labour for that which satisfieth not? Incline your ear, and come unto me: hear, and your soul shall Writings based on God's Word

live; and I will make an everlasting covenant with you, even the sure mercies of David" (Is. 55:1-3).

Are your thoughts, your time, your heart consumed with the pursuit of "happiness" on this earth? Have you convinced yourself that providing luxuries for your family is more important than serving Jesus? Have you confused "wants" with "needs?" Have you permitted the philosophy of this world to convince you that political activism is necessary to preserve liberty? Have you allowed your heart to become troubled by the events of our time and drawn into the rhetoric and bashing of governmental authorities flooding the media? Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you, Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27).

Is your heart in the counterfeit freedoms and temporary happiness of this life ... or do you live as a pilgrim with no roots on this earth? Do you feel like a foreigner in your own country? "These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off, and were persuaded of them, and embraced them, and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth. For they that say such things declare plainly that they seek a country...they desire a better country, that is, an heavenly: wherefore God is not ashamed to be called their God: for he hath prepared for them a city" (Heb. 11:13-16).

Let's follow Jesus out of the camp of the popular culture, avoiding the political turmoil that only brings hope for this life, rejecting the pursuit of riches which mires us in many deceitful and foolish lusts, bearing His reproach - as we share joyfully the living hope and real treasures that we have within us because of His shed blood. "Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate. Let us go forth therefore unto him without the camp, bearing his reproach. For here have we no continuing city, but we seek one to come" (Heb. 13:12-14).

The Navajo Nation

Within the borders of our own country, there exists a nation of Native Americans known as the Navajo. Numbering close to three hundred thousand, approximately sixty percent of this population lives within the geographical boundaries of their nation. The geographical heart of this nation is centered in the "four corners" area of the Southwest where the states of Colorado, Utah. New Mexico and Arizona meet. The land area is slightly larger than the state of West Virginia. Although rich in the natural beauty of the high desert, this area is void of valuable natural resources such as coal, oil or copper. Even water is a difficult natural resource to obtain.

A people in need of prayer

The Navajo nation is a people in despair. Few jobs are available on the reservation and unemployment runs close to sixty percent. Living conditions are poor with many homes having no running water or electricity – some with dirt floors. An average Navajo family lives on a meal of tortillas and potatoes – three times a day. Sixty-seven percent of the population earns less than \$3,000.00 a year. Alcohol and drug abuse are common, leading to other family problems.

Traditional Navajo religion does not recognize a supreme being. There are multiple gods and all people, plants, animals, mountains, rivers and wind are relatives. The practices of Medicine Men are used for healing. In some Native American religions, Peyote, a hallucinogen similar to LSD is used in their rituals as a way to achieve more intimate communication with their gods. It is apparent that Satan has a full offering of false religions, but praise be to God, there are some who have heard the true Gospel message and embrace the teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ. There are believers who love the Lord, love His Word and seek to live a life dedicated to serving Him and those in need around them.

Providing material aid

For more than twenty-five years, World Relief has been providing material aid to the Navajo. Beginning in 1982, Bro. Nick Knobloch made contact with an ordained Baptist minister by the name of Austin Toledo. A Navajo, Mr. Toledo was serving the poor of his community while presenting the Gospel message. Annual shipments of corn, food and clothing where made in time for distribution during the Christmas season. Individual packages were delivered to needy families. Each package included a scripture message pointing souls to the true Provider.

Through the years, material aid shipments have continued. Frequency of shipments has increased to three or four times a year. In addition to basic food and clothing, shipments now include Navajo Language Bibles, school and health kits, blankets and other needed items. In 2000, a 42'x82' warehouse building was built by World Relief on the grounds of what is now called Trinity Bible Church.

In 2007 World Relief provided funds to purchase thirty woodburning stoves to be used for heating and cooking. In addition to the stove, each recipient also received a cord of firewood and a load of coal. Stoves were installed by volunteers from the local church who took advantage of the opportunity to present the Gospel message.

Showing Christ's love

Today, Mr. Toledo is well beyond the "three score and ten years" and the work of helping the poor and spreading the Gospel has passed on to the next generation. Mr. Toledo's daughter, Fran, and her husband, Bobby George, now have responsibility in the mission begun by her father. They have set up an organization very similar to World Relief, called Trinity Family Services.

Working under the direction of their church, Trinity Family Services is the organization through which they offer humanitarian aid. Every act of aid is an opportunity to present the love of Jesus Christ and the Gospel message of salvation through Him. By showing love and compassion to those in need, Christ's love is reflected and hearts are moved to inquire. Through this avenue, souls are lead to the source of true hope, not only for this life, but for eternity.

In July of 2009, a group of brothers on the USA Committee of World Relief spent a day with Mr. & Mrs. Toledo, Bobby and Fran George and members of their board of directors. It was a blessed day, feeling the presence of God's Spirit, as they shared with us events of the past and their vision for the future. Their faith in God and their loving concern for the physical and spiritual needs of those around them provided great inspiration.

They must not talk during the service. The oldest likes to draw something pertinent to the lesson he had in Sunday School. The second boy is more of a doodler and creates beautiful designs. After he nearly completed his last page, he saw that he had made a bottle. He finished the bottle details and explained that the bottle contained water for the people in Haiti. Lastly, the youngest child came for his hugs and showed her his poodle (stuffed of course). Yes, we are a small group and we also are blessed when we take the time to encourage one another.

We can be encouraged with these words from Micah 6:8.

"He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good, and what doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?"

MEXICO, IXTLAN Matt Gerber

"And they made a calf in those days, and offered sacrifice unto the idol, and rejoiced in the works of their own hands."

Acts 7:41

Stephen had the rapt attention of his Jewish audience. There was nothing they loved more than to hear the highlights of the history of Abraham, Moses, and other great men. They were zealous for Moses, for the law, and for the place they considered supremely sacred— the temple. They had falsely accused Stephen of speaking "blasphemous words against this holy place, and against the law" (Acts 6:13), and of saying that Jesus of Nazareth would destroy the temple and change the customs that Moses delivered to them. Stephen's face shone like an angel as he gave his defense. He began to recount the events of God's workings with the Jews, and at first everything seemed to be going smoothly. The angry crowd began to calm down as they listened. It appeared that Stephen might get off the hook after all. How could the Jews resist such a beautiful summary of their history? Maybe they had been wrong about Stephen. He wasn't saying anything "blasphemous". Stephen finished talking about Moses and came to David, who desired to build a house for God...then Solomon, his son, who built it.

If Stephen had stopped there, he might have gotten off with his life. He would have done little more than give an interesting history lesson, with a few important notes. But he hadn't finished his sermon. All of this was building up to his main point—the main point that would get him killed. Stephen paused, then quoted the prophet Isaiah: "Howbeit the most High dwelleth not in temples made with hands; as saith the prophet, Heaven is my throne, and earth is my footstool: what house will ye build me? saith the Lord: or what is the place of my rest? Hath not my hand made all these things?" (Acts 7:48-50, emphasis added).

Now Stephen got a reaction out of the hearers! He had just told them that God didn't need their temple. He didn't need the great works of their hands. His hand had made all these things. The Jews in Stephen's day were no different than the Jews in Moses' day, which made the golden calf and rejoiced in the works of their own hands rather than in the work of God's hands. They were worshiping their own religion; their own works had become their god; they had turned the temple into an idolatrous center of man-made religion and self-righteousness. They were proud of their history; their traditions; their good works and achievements. But they had forgotten that they were sinners and only God's works are good.

Stephen minced no words for the self-righteous Jews: "Ye stiffnecked and uncircumcised in heart and ears, ye do always resist the Holy Ghost: as your fathers did, so do ye! Which of the prophets have not your fathers persecuted? And they have slain them which showed before of the coming of the Just One; of whom ye have been now the betrayers and murderers: Who have received the law by the disposition of angels, and have not kept it." Stephen's words exposed their hypocrisy and sin. Outwardly they were circumcised, Jews, followers of Moses, keepers of the law; but inwardly they were unconverted rebels, persecutors of God's prophets, murderers of Jesus, the Just One, and breakers of God's law. This was more than they could take! When they heard these things, they were cut to the heart, and they gnashed on him with their teeth" (Acts 7:51-55). They put their hands over their ears, dragged Stephen out of the city, and stoned him.

We can learn many things from this account of Stephen. But there's a principle here that is universally true—in all ages, among all people groups, for each human being-not just for the Jews in Stephen's day. In Acts 17, Paul was talking to a totally different audience of Greek philosophers. But he said something strikingly similar to what Stephen said to the Jews: "God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that he is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands; neither is worshipped with men's hands, as though he needed any thing, seeing he giveth to all life, and breath, and all things... (Acts 17:24-25, emphasis added).

Whether it's zealous Jews in Jerusalem, superstitious Greeks in Athens, or Americans, or Mexicans, unconverted sinners all have something in common. Everybody wants to believe that the works of their own hands are good. Everybody "rejoices in the works of their own hands". People want to believe that they're ok, that their religion is enough for them, that they do a pretty good job of keeping the law. They get angry and resistive when someone tells them that they are sinners; that without Christ their works are as filthy rags before God; that being religious can't save anybody; that as sinners they have broken every command of God's law. Human beings don't naturally rejoice in God's work for us; they rejoice in their works for God!

The Gospel will mean nothing to sinners until they realize by the Holy Spirit's illumination that all men by nature are wretched sinners, rebels at heart, and the works of our own hands can never make us righteous before God. It's then that the Gospel becomes "good news" to them! They can repent of their own works and rejoice in Christ's work for us on the cross. As we interact with people and share the Gospel in the U.S. and Mexico, we will encounter resistance to this truth, just like Stephen did. But may we pray that God would give us boldness this year as we share the gospel at home and abroad; that He'd open the eyes and hearts of those we talk to, that they would see their sin, repent and be converted to Christ. We thank God and you for supporting the gospel-sharing efforts in Ixtlan and Mexico this past year 2009 through prayer, donations, and many other practical ways.

Winter Work Project for 2010

Haiti Earthquake Relief

God Already Knew

As one of the first Apostolic Christian brothers traveled to Haiti with a supply of Bibles in 1963, God already knew about the catastrophic event that would take place in 2010.

He also knew the special relationship that would develop between many of our brethren and the Haitian people during the years that followed, enabling us to love and assist them in their present suffering and need.

Immediate and long term response

World Relief brethren serving in Haiti will be a central focus in bringing help to the Haitian people. World Relief also has long standing relationships with numerous Haitian ministries that have people and ministries impacted by the earthquake, so we will want to support their relief efforts. A third area of bringing help will be through an established system of sending medical and construction work teams to Haiti.

We are planning the following strategy

Evaluate – A team of brothers from the WR Board and Caribbean Committee will travel to Haiti as soon as possible to work with our brethren to evaluate the needs and develop a plan for relief.

Partner – Meet with leaders of Haitian organizations we work with to develop partnering plans for relief efforts.

Humanitarian Aid – Assemble relief materials in the distribution centers to send humanitarian aid when the way opens up.

Support – Continue to support international relief organizations that we have supported in the past, in their relief efforts.

Opportunity to Give – The fund is open within the World Relief Disaster Program to receive donations from those who wish to contribute to relief efforts in Haiti.

What is being done

son said unto his father, Get her for me; for she pleaseth me well." So he had been warned by his parents, by those that loved him. Don't take a wife from these uncircumcised Philistines. They don't serve our God. Take a wife from among your brethren. But Samson thought he knew better, didn't he?

So often in our youth, we think we know better. We don't take the advice or the instruction or the encouragement, whether it be from our parents, or our Elder Brother, as we think of in the faith. But there are those that give us advice. Sometimes we think we know better. We don't see that their advice is needed. But we always should remember, what is their intent? Why did Samson's parents give this advice? It was because they had Samson's welfare in mind. It was because they loved Samson. They cared about his soul and his service to his God.

So the Lord is faithful to prick our hearts. When we are unconverted, He calls us. Even when we are children of His, He will guide us and lead us. But it is up to us that we would listen. That we would not become reliant on our own knowledge, our own strength. But rather that we would remember that our strength and our courage comes from God.

From time to time, we all make mistakes, don't we? We fail and then what do we do? We have the teaching here in God's Word. Here is Samson. He remembered. He no doubt went through a period of regret. Maybe a repentance, we could say. But here he cried out. "And Samson called unto the Lord, and said, O Lord God, remember me. I prav thee, and strengthen me, I pray thee, only this once, O God, that I may be at once avenged of the Philistines for my two eyes." Judges 16:28. So he cried out to God and if we cry out to God even in our day and time. He will help us. He will strengthen us. He will be faithful to provide for us. So even if we have made some poor choices in life - maybe we have a few regrets - we are thankful we have a loving God who will once again provide for us, if we but humble ourselves.

These last couple verses here in II Corinthians 5 reminded us of the price that Christ paid there upon Calvary's cross. That it was Christ who knew no sin, but He became sin (v.21). He took upon Himself the weight of the sins of all mankind, there upon the cross of Calvary that we could be forgiven of our sins. That we could go free. And the question comes, how are we doing as ambassadors for Him?

We read this word 'ambassadors' here and we all know that in this day and time an ambassador often travels to another country and they represent the country they came from. Truly, if we have become new as we read here, then we should represent our Heavenly Father. We should represent that Heavenly Kingdom as we walk here below. So how are we doing as ambassadors for Him?

Samson was a judge. In a way, we could say he was an ambassador. He was an ambassador for God in the day and time which he lived. It was God who called him to be a judge. There are times that he was successful in conquering the Philistine people. Then there are times that he failed. So it is with us, isn't it? There are times that we're successful and there are times we fail. When are we successful and when do we fail? We know that we are successful when we're humble and we have God's help and His grace. When we fail, so oftentimes it's when we rely upon our own strength. But, I believe what's most important is that if we're going to be in Christ, then we have to be a new creature.

It says, "...old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." (II Corinthians 5:17) We speak of it so often with our converts. It's so important that as the convert would come in humble repentance, that they die off to self. That that old self is crucified. That it's put to death. So often in a proving the convert is asked, how must someone be before they're buried? And the answer is always obvious, they must be dead. But, it's so important because if we still have some of those old desires, if we still have some of those old habits, we're hanging on to part of our flesh.

It isn't just when we repent. We know that as life goes on, that we can again pick up those old habits. We can again pick up a part of the world and try to carry it with us. God's a jealous God, we read that in the Word. (Deuteronomy 6:15) He wants our whole heart. He wants our whole life. He wants all of our desires. He wants our motives to be pure, that we would serve Him.

But what does Satan come to us with? It's many temptations, isn't it. It comes in all sorts of different forms. For us brothers, we can put great effort into our jobs and we can become a workaholic. We can put too much emphasis on that. Then there's the sports and the entertainment of this world. We can take up part of that so that our minds really can become distracted from God and His Word. There's the lust of the flesh. We have to guard ourselves that that doesn't creep into our minds and into our walk of life. And for the sisters, there's different temptations that come.

But Satan just wants to get the door of our heart cracked open. Because he knows, if that door can be cracked open just a little bit that eventually he can open it wide and then in can come even the flood of the world. We think of the recent floods in the Midwest here. Many of you, I'm sure, have probably went to the levy there and you laid the sandbags. I'll never forget, after the flood down in Taylor a number of years ago, that I saw a video of when that levy broke. It only took a small breach in that levy and it wasn't long before there was thousands of millions of gallons of water flowing through. So it is that Satan knows that if he can tear down that wall that can keep us pure, keep us humble and keep us close to our God, it will happen to us.

We sing a hymn, Near to the Heart of God. "There is a place of quiet rest, Near to the heart of God." (Hymns of Zion #175) But Satan wants to tear that down, doesn't he? He wants us to not have the Fruit of the Spirit abounding in our life. To not have the many strengths and helps that we find. We even think of our precious Faith. We think of our heritage. We think of the doctrine that we have that's based upon a literal interpretation of the Word. We think about our traditions which help us to carry out that doctrine. There's many things that we have found good throughout the generations of time. And, all those things help us and keep us pure. They help us not only to become a new creature, but to continue to walk in God's service.

As we walk here below, do we think enough about heaven? I know for myself I don't. You know these first verses

we read here, it says, "For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet the inward man is renewed day by day." (II Corinthians 4:16) It's a day by day process, isn't it? That we have to be renewed in Spirit. It says, though our outward man perish. There's some here who maybe have afflictions of the body and they can truly say that the outward man is perishing. But, the inward man can be renewed day by day by God's Word, by His Spirit. It says, "For our light affliction, which is but for a moment,..." (II Corinthians 4:17) I don't know about vou but when we're physically sick, we'll say we have the flu or we have a migraine headache, or we have a sore throat, whatever it may be. When we feel lousy, time goes really slow, doesn't it? We can feel sorry for ourselves, we can be kind of grumpy or irritable from time to time. But really, isn't it a light affliction?

If we think of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, whenever we're tempted to grumble or to murmur, it's probably a good thing to do, isn't it? To think of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the affliction He endured. How He was mocked and beaten, spit upon, rejected of men. Then our affliction seems light, doesn't it? When we put it in the light of what Christ did and how He suffered for us.

It says, which is but for a moment. If we think about our life, it's really a moment, it's really a vapor. We remember back to the time when we were in school. If I understand right, there's graduation soon here in your community. When we're in high school, it seems like time goes really slow and we can't wait till we finally graduate. And then, it may be that we can't wait until we go to college or we get married or whatever it may be. But the older we get, the faster time seems to go. I think that if we would ask any of the older brothers and sisters here, if we would ask those that are sixties, seventies, eighties, ninety years old, we would ask them if this life seems long and I think almost without exception they would say that they can't believe how fast time has gone. So really, it's but a moment when we compare it to all eternity. We have to remember that this light affliction which is but for a moment, even if it would last all of our lifetime, is still but for a moment.

It says, "...worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory..." (II Corinthians 4:17) That's what life's all about, isn't it? It's about those things which are eternal. We're reminded here that the things which are seen are temporal. What's the definition of temporal? It's something that's going to pass away. "...but the things which are not seen are eternal." (II Corinthians 4:18) So often we spend so much time in our life focusing on those things which we can see. Those things which are temporal. That's not all a bad thing. You know, we've had some beautiful weather. And if you would've driven around town here in Tremont or any of the local municipalities or towns in the past weekend you probably would have seen a lot of people working in their yard. They're mowing the yard or planting flowers, whatever it may be. And, we are thankful for God's beauty. On all these things that we can spend so much time and emphasis on, they're not really eternal are they? The things that are eternal are our souls.

But also, what's really most important to our Lord and Savior? What was He concerned about here as He walked below? We don't read that Christ even had a home. We don't read that He ever amassed much in terms of earthly goods. But He was concerned about the souls of men. He was concerned about their welfare. And so, it's our relationships one with another. It's the compassion we should have for one another. It's taking time to say a kind word. It's the fellowship that we enjoy one with another. Those are the things which are important.

We're thankful even for holidays in our country. It seems like it takes a Thanksgiving or a Memorial Day when we really slow down enough in life to take time to go home and visit our parents, visit our grandparents, travel to see friends, whatever it would be. Sometimes if it wouldn't be for a holiday, those things wouldn't happen. But in our spiritual walk of life it takes an effort doesn't it? We need to take time to make those things happen. To not only go about our earthly toils and cares, providing for our families, taking care of our homes, whatever it may be. But we need to take time to teach and instruct our children.

We read that, "Pure religion and un-

defiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world." (James 1: 27) So yes, we need to stay away from the evil and the sin of this world so that we can fully have God's grace. We spoke about that earlier. But then, God desires that we would be fruitful in His vineyard, that we can someday make it to heaven.

What a beautiful verse this is, verse one in chapter five, "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." I think of your sister Evelyn here. Her earthly house here is dissolved, is it not? There's that beautiful building of God. That place in the heavens. It says, "For in this we groan, earnestly desiring to be clothed upon with our house which is from heaven:". (II Corinthians 5:2)

When there are those that come to the end of life's journey and especially if they know the end is near, they're laying there in the hospital, or they're in the nursing home, or maybe they're in their own home. But when they know that time is near, so often it gets to the point here where they groan. Because they earnestly desire to go to that better place, that better land. When we're young we can't always quite comprehend that. Because we have children, we have loved ones, we have certain things we want to do in this life, and we're not really ready to go home. But, when it comes down to the end of life, that's when we really stop and think about what's important.

I've often thought, we go and we visit someone in the nursing home, and there may be someone who's life really didn't go so well for them. Perhaps they failed in their business, or they never had much of this earth's goods. As man would look upon them, they wouldn't think that they were really very successful. But, what's important? What's important is their faith in God. What's important is that they have found peace with their Maker and their Creator. And then, sometimes to contrast that, there are those who maybe were very successful in their earthly occupation. Maybe amassed millions of dollars in this life. But as

they lay there in the nursing home, all that really doesn't make too much difference anymore. What's really important to them at that point? It's that their children come and see them.

It's so sad, sometimes we visit those who perhaps have one or two children. One's off on the east coast, one lives several states away. They don't get to see them very often. So, let us remember to count our blessings. Whether they be few or whether they be many.

Even if God hasn't blessed us with any children, perhaps if our parents are all gone, we feel very lonely in this life. Yet, I hope that each one gathered here, at least, can feel the love and the support of one another. That we have one another, and there are those that care, there are those that love us. We can all look forward to this time in heaven if we've repented of our sins, if we've become converted, if we've become this new creature as we spoke about. Aren't we thankful that we have God's Spirit, that we have the Comforter?

We read about that in verse five here. It says, "Now he that hath wrought us for the selfsame thing is God, who also hath given unto us the earnest of the Spirit." We think of earnest, sometimes we hear of earnest money if there's a real estate transaction. It's a down payment, isn't it? So really, as we walk in this life, we can have God's Holy Spirit. We can even have a down payment, if you will, or a foretaste of that beautiful heavenly home.

We can have this confidence that we read of here. It says, "Therefore we are always confident, knowing that, whilst we are at home in the body, we are absent from the Lord: (For we walk by faith, not by sight:)" II Corinthians 5:6-7 It's interesting. It doesn't just say we walk by faith. It says, not by sight. It's so easy in life to have faith when we can see what the future holds. It's so often easy to have faith when we can see how the Lord is going to provide for us. But is that really faith when we can see? True faith is when we're blinded. To truly have faith is when we're blind.

Think of Samson there. He was blinded in a physical sense, was he not? He had no idea exactly what that building looked like, did he? He asked the young lad there to place his hands on the pillars. He had to have faith. I shouldn't say he didn't know what that building looked like, perhaps he'd seen that building before he lost his eyesight. I don't know. But, he had to have faith that by God's strength, he could bring that building down. It's a blind faith isn't it?

It seems like the older we get and the more experience we have in life, and we're thankful for that experience because along with that experience can come faith that the Lord's going to provide. If God brings us through the valleys of life and we're able, by God's grace, to climb out of those valleys and make it up the next mountain that we face, and we can look back on those times, that can be strengthening to our faith. But also sometimes as we gain experience in life, we maybe lose a little bit of that blind faith we might say.

I haven't had the opportunity of having a child married by faith, but sometimes young brothers and sisters, when they ask for a wife or they give back an answer to a proposal, it takes a tremendous amount of faith, doesn't it? Sometimes the parents almost have a harder time with that, those of us that are parents, than the young people. And why is that? I think it's because of our experience. As we get older in life and we're married, we know the struggles that can come.

Sometimes the struggle is with our spouse. Or maybe not in our own family, maybe we're blest with a wonderful marriage. But we see the struggles in other families. We know that there can be children born with physical afflictions. There can be those that suffer in a great way. And, it's hard for us sometimes, isn't it, to really let go of our children, commit them to God and to His keeping. Wouldn't we all be well served to have a little bit more of this blind faith? Not knowing where we're going. Not knowing what the path ahead brings us. But just trusting in God.

Now as we continue on in this chapter we read here in verse nine, a very sobering verse. "Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of him." This morning, Brother Tom, as he finished up, spoke of the word 'action'. And here we read the word 'labor'. We're thankful that on Sunday we can rest from our earthly labors.

When we come to worship God, it's

an active thing, isn't it? It takes effort. We need to labor. Whether it's the hymns we sing, it's our minds as we think about the Word that we would read, as we fellowship one with another. We should really be active. We should put effort into it. Sometimes we like to just stand in the corner. But God moves us, doesn't He? We look across the hall and we maybe see someone who we know is going through a rough time. We see someone whose loved one's in the hospital, whatever it may be. It takes an effort to walk across and ask them how they're doing, to wish them well, whatever it would be. Also, it even takes effort to be alert.

We can remember back to the time many of us were unconverted. We sat there in the back of church and many times we simply slept through the whole service. It can happen to those of us who are converted also. Our minds can be off on what happened last week. what's going to happen tomorrow, what we're going to do this afternoon. We have to focus, don't we, if we really want to receive a true blessing out of God's Word? We're going to be blest according to how much effort we put into it. We get out of life about as much as we put into it. I think that same concept applies as we come to God's house.

It says, "Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of him. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." v. 9,10. There's coming a judgment day. We read that all the things that we do, they're recorded there in heaven. We read in Revelations, to him that overcometh shall be granted that crown of life. (Revelations 2:10) We know that we're saved by grace through faith. It's not of ourselves lest we should boast. (Ephesians 2:8) It's by the shed blood of Jesus Christ. But then, as we have this new heart, this new creature, God calls us to a holiness. He calls us to serve Him. He desires that the fruit of His Holy Spirit would come forth from our life. So we have to labor, we have to take inventory from time to time, don't we? To see if this love, the joy, the peace, the longsuffering, the gentleness, the goodness, is it in our life? Or perhaps is there some of those works of the flesh creeping in? Do we find ourselves angry? Do we find ourselves jealous? Do we find ourselves grumbling? Not thankful?

That we may be accepted from Christ. It's our human nature, isn't it, that we would want to please one another, that we always want people to think good of us. That's not all a bad thing because if we have God's Spirit, if we're truly a child of God, then people would naturally be drawn unto those who are kind, those that are loving, those that are generous. All those good attributes. But, what's most important? What's the most important is that we can be accepted of Christ.

We read this word 'accepted'. So often we hear that in nominal Christianity today. That we need to accept Christ. But here we're reminded that it's important that Christ accepts us. That's what's truly important. Are we ready to meet Him? Or, do we have a little bit of fear within our heart, that maybe we need to go and make this right or make that right, or we really ought to clean up our act a little bit, we might say.


I think about our homes if we have company, sometimes someone would drop by unexpected, what would they find? I don't want to make light of it or embarrass any of the sisters with this,

but there's times that the home is a mess, perhaps. Probably a good part of that is because some of us brothers don't do our part to help them in that matter. But what would the Lord find if he came to our spiritual house? If He came and made an inspection? If we're going to put our house up for sale what do we do? We make sure the lawn is mowed, we make sure the bushes are trimmed. If we're going to have an open house or show people, we have it all just right. But what about our spiritual walk of life? From time to time we need to do a little bit of house cleaning. We need to do some maintenance. And the Lord will help us. And, it will be worth it all. We sing a hymn, "It will be worth it all when we see Jesus." (Melodies of Praise #59) So let us take courage that as God moves us, that we labor on, that we may be accepted of Him.

"For we commend not ourselves again unto you, but give you occasion to glory on our behalf, that ye may have somewhat to *answer* them which glory in appearance, and not in heart." II Corinthians 5:12. Christ sees each one of our hearts. He knows what our thoughts are. He knows what our motives are. We can fool one another from time to time and we can put on a good act, we might say. We can maybe do a lot of good in this life. We can be a good neighbor. But if we don't truly have the love of God, if we don't truly have His Spirit, if we have not become a new creature, then we won't be accepted of Him.

So lets each one examine our hearts, and I speak to myself first, that we would ask ourselves the question, have we become a new creature? Have we totally denied our self as we read this morning? Have we taken up our cross to follow Him? If not, lets do a little bit of house cleaning, some spiritual housecleaning. That we can be prepared to meet Him whether He would call us individually or whether He would come again in the clouds.

We're reminded of an athlete today. How they have to exercise daily and they have to eat a nutritious diet and all sorts of things so that they can win the race. And we read the Apostle Paul numerous times in the New Testament. He talks about this spiritual race that we're running. When we are spiritually fit, that's when we can truly be ambassadors for Christ. That's when we can be the salt of the earth that we're called to be. May the Lord grant us grace to that end.



Grief/Loss, Part 4

Grief/Loss, Part 1 was written for those who are grieving and was printed in the September, 2009, Silver Lining. Parts 2 and 3 focused on how to help grieving people and were printed in the November and December issues. This article is focused on how to help children grieve. Jesus wants us to minister to those who are in need. Matthew 25:40 "...Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren (my children), ye have done it unto me."

Children, like adults, experience grief in many different ways, and each has his or her own pace of recovery. There are things you can do to help a child through the grief process, which are important to do, as children often don't understand their feelings and may need your help, guidance, and support to cope. Psalm 56:8 "... put thou my tears into thy bottle: are they not in thy book?"

Studies point out that there are four adjustments that are essential for a grieving child to experience:

- Reality accepting the reality of the loss,
- 2. Pain experiencing the pain or emotional aspects of the loss,
- 3. Change adjusting to an environment in which the deceased is missing,
- New Normal relocating the deceased person within one's life with memories and putting energy into new relationships.

It has been discovered that prior to age 3, babies may sense an absence among those in their immediate world and miss a familiar person who is gone, but they are unlikely to understand the difference between a temporary absence and death. A preschool child may talk about death but may still expect the person to come back. Before age 5, most children do not realize that all people, including themselves, will die. By ages 9 or 10, however, most children have developed an understanding of death as final, irreversible, and inescapable. Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven. A time to be born, and a time to die ... "

How can parents help? Caring parents can help children through the Reality amd

Pain adjustments by being open, honest, and loving, and by responding to questions in a way that shows you care. It may help to touch children and look them in the eye as you talk. Take them in your arms and show them the compassion of Jesus. When answering a child's questions about death, adults should keep in mind the following:

1. Tell a child only what he is capable of understanding. There is no need to be evasive, but modify explanations to what the child can comprehend.

2. What is said is important, but the manner in which it is said has even greater significance. Be aware of voice tone. Try to answer the questions patiently in a matter-of-fact way. Remember that what is communicated without words can be just as meaningful to a child as what is actually said.

3. It is not unusual for a child to ask the same question again and again. Repeating questions and getting answers helps the child understand and adjust to the loss of someone loved.

Parents should avoid trying to suppress the child's tears or expressions of grief. It is hurtful to the grieving process to dismiss your child's feelings or disapprove of them. Instead, help them put their feelings into words. One author stated that a child's grief begins when he or she begins to express or demonstrate his/her feelings. Jeremiah 9:1 "Oh that my head were waters, and mine eyes a fountain of tears, that I might weep day and night..."

Like adults, children's first reaction to the loss is usually shock. Feelings of anger, fear and guilt usually follow. Parents may need to redirect children's aggressive angry behavior to acceptable physical behavior-such as running, doing jumping jacks, shaping play dough, sweeping with a broom, or something to keep their bodies moving. In trying to get to the source of anger outbursts, ask open-ended questions such as: "It looks like something is really bothering you. I'm wondering if you are frustrated about something or feeling hurt or perhaps afraid. Could you tell me about it?" It is easier for some children and teens to express feelings in art work and tell you about the pictures. When they talk, really listen. Listen to the point that you feel you can understand what your child is feeling.

Psalm 46:1-2 "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore will not we fear..."

Common fears which grieving children have include the fear of not being cared for or of not having enough information to understand what is happening, the fear that the child is to blame, or the fear that another special person may die.

The Change adjustment is learning to adapt with the loved one gone. This is the time to keep routine schedules in place as much as possible. Have your children keep on doing their chores and activities even though they do not feel like doing them because they are sad. Talk about the changes in your family. There may be someone different cooking meals or driving the children to school. There may be one less person sitting at the dinner table. Help them realize that a family is still a family even if someone in the family dies. Life will never be the same again without the loved one who died, but life can still feel safe and normal again. Psalm 23:4 "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."

The New Normal adjustment is having friends and feeling happy again, but also remembering the special things they did with the loved one. Help your child keep these memories by talking openly about them, even though they bring tears. It is also important and necessary to say "goodbye" to the loved one. Some examples are writing a letter, visiting the grave site, or making a memory book. Saying "goodbye" is not forgetting your loved one. He or she will always be a part of your child's life. Finally, your child should be encouraged to play, to enjoy old friends, to make new friends, and to make new memories as "new" becomes normal. Revelation 21:4 "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away."





The following is a continuation of the funeral of Elder Bro. Noah Schrock of the Oakville, Iowa, congregation. His funeral was held on April 8, 1976. This is a description of the funeral, and is not a transcript of the funeral comments. His passing, after many years of leadership along with his spiritual influence across the entire church for many years, was significant and a multitude of brethren attended the funeral. Elder Bro. Leo Moser of the Lester, Iowa, congregation had the main part of the funeral.

The Funeral Service

It fell on Elder Bro. Leo Moser of the Lester, Iowa, congregation to deliver the funeral message. The fore-reading text consisted of Jeremiah 23:3-4. The choir then sang the beautiful song, "Our Blessed Portion," from the Zion's Harp Hymnal. The second Scripture reading was from the book of Acts, Chapter 20, beginning with verse 24. This is an account of the Apostle Paul's farewell to the Ephesian Elders.

Bro. Moser, while not eulogizing Bro. Schrock, nonetheless referred to the departed one's many God-given gifts and to the endless campaigns he waged over the years on behalf of the church. And although he could engage in long discourses regarding spiritual matters, the deceased's often-expressed sentiment was that he desired to know nothing, "save Jesus Christ and Him crucified."

Bro. Moser alluded to his many years of service in the Lord's vineyard and how the church will miss him, not only the lay brethren, but the Elder Body of the church as well. The mantle of leadership, both of his local Oakville congregation and of his influence on the church as a whole, must now be passed on. Bro. Moser expressed the confidence that this mantle would fall on the shoulders of several younger brethren whom God has raised up for leadership.

Reference was made to the Old Testament practice of posting "watchmen on the wall" to warn the people of coming dangers, and how our Elder brethren today perform such a function in the New Testament churches and, out of love, sound the trumpet when they see the sword coming.

Bro. Noah, as a "watchman", had sounded the warning many times during his lifetime and could testify at the end, as Paul did, "that I am pure from the blood of all men; for I have not shunned to deliver unto you all the counsel of God." He was a true watchman and stood on "guard duty" that his brethren might be alerted to the many dangers of the enemy, and they could thus walk closer to God. He had a ringing idealism as to how a child of God should conduct himself, and as he sought to promote the high standards of God in the church, according to Scriptures, he did so with pure motives.

He went from coast to coast, and to Japan, preaching the glorious gospel of salvation. His life touched multitudes of people. Yet, he remained a humble man – a tiller of the soil – and he sought only to do what was right. Not a 'menpleaser", he was one who sought to please the Lord, whom he deeply loved.

Closing remarks were uttered by Elder Bro. Roy Farney of the Phoenix, Arizona, congregation. In a moving account of his last visit with Bro. Noah, he said the departed brother indicated his willingness to leave this earth. He then requested that Bro. Roy deliver his "farewell greetings" to the western churches he had served for so many years. On doing so, Bro. Farney related how, when it was apparent that the end was nigh at hand, he carried out this wish to his Phoenix, Arizona, congregation, and it caused many tears to flow down the cheeks of the brethren. Bro. Farney surmised that had Bro. Noah known this, he would have said, "Weep not for me, but for yourselves."

During the entire day, it was a fitting tribute to Bro. Noah that there was a tremendous feeling in the air, despite the sadness, of that wonderful kindred spirit of brotherhood which is so associated with the members of the Apostolic Christian Church as they gather in the name of the Lord. The great love that flows from heart to heart, which is so essential to the church and which Bro. Noah loved and promoted so strongly, was very evident during these final rites.

The Light Of Hope

"Christianity Is Practical"

Practical means to be useful and helpful in our daily lives. When we repent and put our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ for forgiveness and salvation, it might be thought by some that this is good so we can go to heaven when we die, but as for living here on earth, it is inconvenient because the way is narrow and you always have to think about whether or not what you plan to do is edifying and to the glory of God. However, I have been thinking that the Christian life as taught in the Bible, a life of dying to self and living for God, is a very practical life and much better than the life apart from God.

The first reason why Christianity is practical is that the life in Christ is less stressful. You do what the Bible says to do and you don't do what the Bible warns against and therefore, you are able to reduce or eliminate all the stress caused when you do whatever you feel like doing and get yourself into some very difficult situations. I Peter 5:7 reads, "Casting all your care upon Him for He careth for you." We do have a place of refuge when accident, illness, or death, strikes.

The second reason is that the life in Christ is more joyful. "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." To have joy in the Lord is much better than to have joy in the interesting and captivating pleasures of this world. Joy in the Lord is more lasting and encouraging.

The number three reason is that the life in Christ saves us money. We don't spend money on things that are harmful to our minds and bodies and we don't spend money on worldly pleasures that might be harmful to our spiritual lives. The life in Christ is a win, win situation. Isaiah 55:2 asks the question, "Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread?" In this case "bread" may mean anything that is good for you.

The fourth reason is that there is more fulfillment in the life in Christ. The Bible teaches us that we are here to bring God glory and that we should help others. This is so much more fulfilling, so much more satisfying, than living for self. Revelation 4:11 reads, "Thou hast created all things, and for thy pleasure they are and were created." Also, we are taught to love our neighbor as ourselves.

The fifth reason is that the child of God is honest and that brings many benefits not realized by those who are dishonest. We read in Luke 8:15 that the seed of the sower which brings forth much fruit is that which falls in "An honest and good heart." This is a teaching for us to be honest if we expect God's Word to bring forth fruit in our lives. The fruit includes the assurance that I didn't cheat anybody nor make claims that are not so.

The sixth reason that Christianity is practical is that we can trust each other in the Lord. What a blessing that is. It saves a lot of checking with the Better Business Bureau or any similar organization which checks on people's honesty. If you are my brother or sister in Christ, your word is as good as mine. We really don't need a contract but it may be useful to avoid any misunderstanding. Paul writes to Philemon in verse 21, "Having confidence in thy obedience I wrote unto thee, knowing that thou wilt also do more than I say." This indicates that Paul had complete trust in his brother, Philemon.

Christianity is not just a theory, it is very practical, useful, and beneficial in this life and makes us ready to live for God forever in a better world, the spiritual world.
