Lining

Sermon by Bro. Mark Bahr, Detroit, MI Ezekiel 33:1-9 and Acts 22:1-16

Greetings to each one on this beautiful new Sunday morning. There's something that is deep within each of us that we experience whenever we come into church. We have the opportunity to begin a new Sunday morning together, to worship God. We certainly entreat your prayers as we begin our worship today. We will also trust that the Holy Spirit will actually be our teacher. It is a blessing to be here. It is a blessing to greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We have opened to a very profound Scripture; Ezekiel 33. When we read Ezekiel 33, we would encourage you to take time to sit down in the near future. Read Ezekiel 33 and then read Ezekiel 34. We need to look at that Scripture together. It is worthy of additional reading and meditation on the part of all of us. Both give us a beautiful insight into the real heart of God. We see a lot of Father love and care in both Scriptures.

We've opened to the beautiful Book of Acts 22. Undoubtedly a Scripture that will be very familiar to us, as Scripture should be. And yet, as Scripture is, it never is something that is old. It is very much quick and alive.

What a beautiful place to begin and to stop, "...calling on the name of the Lord." Acts 22:16. The Lord knows so perfectly each one of us that is here today. Knows exactly what we walked into church with. Knows exactly what is in front of us. We trust, I believe, that Ezekiel 33 and Acts 22 are particularly intended for us this morning. Let's consider how Saul/Paul was able to begin to call upon the name of the Lord and let's consider, what does it actually mean to you and me to have these nine verses in Ezekiel 33 as a reminder for us?

We see so much of the heart of God. Perhaps, if we consider just for a moment, a very special couple of verses in Hebrews 13, it begins with a very short sentence. It is a chapter that is filled with a fair amount of what we would say is very sobering, important instruction for the believer. And it begins with this little sentence. "Let brotherly love continue." Then the whole chapter goes about giving us very real, practical church structure. Heavenly Father prescribed instruction for how to prosper that love. Verse 17 says, "Obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves: for they watch for your souls..." Think of this verse, if it had just been verse 1 in Ezekiel 33. It makes the words in Ezekiel 33 so uniquely different than what they might be if we just read them cold. "...for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy, and not with grief: for that is unprofitable for you."

So when we think about the watchman, this is Ezekiel the Prophet, inspired of God, giving exhortation. He says, the Word of the Lord came unto him and this is that special instruction. Speak to the children of God and he has been charged to be a watchman. (Ezekiel 33:2). Let's think, initially, you could all describe this and we would all be very close, but when we begin to think of a watchman, do our hearts and thoughts maybe go back to a little Proverb verse? People without a vision perish but happy are they that know and love and walk in the law of the Lord. (Proverbs 29:18) So there is great need for vision. We need to have Biblical vision. People without that vision perish. We would know that to be true in our own lives. But that is God our Father, our Creator, laying out a thought pattern for us to be a part of. So He has a very real need and desire to create vision for us.

Furthermore, He is speaking from a heart of a Father. He loves us. He created us. He understands us. So the little exhortation in Hebrews 13:17 that we read, begins with that first part of the verse that maybe we are all so familiar with and we have a tendency then to forget or to pass by the last half of the verse. The first part says, obey them that have the rule over you and submit yourself. That is the beginning context of Ezekiel 33, isn't it? But then the verse doesn't stop there. It says, for they watch for your souls, as they who must give an

Although the terms "modesty" and "moderation" each appear only once in the New Testament, they represent important principles endorsed by numerous Scriptures, and they should be manifested in many aspects of the life of a child of God. Both of these principles reflect a temperance and reasonableness of heart, which restrains the believer from boldness and indulgence in various aspects of life. Applications of these principles may vary somewhat by different individuals and groups over periods of time. However, faithful adherence to the many relevant Scriptures will shape our lives in the manner which God desires, and will strengthen the unity and peace of our Brotherhood.

Modesty is defined as attitudes and behaviors which reflect a sense of propriety in speech, dress and conduct; as well as decency, chastity and purity. It represents freedom from conceit and vanity. It is the opposite of boldness, arrogance, presumption and sensuality in deportment and appearance.

Modesty in its many expressions is taught in the Word in the context of holy living, and it should be manifested as a result of a new nature in Christ (2 Cor. 5:17). The Apostle Paul used the term "modesty" in addressing the topic of the chaste appearance of godly women. "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array" (1 Tim. 2:9). The old nature is fraught with areas of vulnerability in both men and women which are described in many scriptural teachings. Proverbs 31:30 states: "Favor is deceitful, and beauty is vain: but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised." The "lust of the eyes" is easily enticed by that which is sensual (Prov. 27:20; 1 John 2:16). The new nature is represented by choices of apparel and behavior which reflect decency and purity of heart. It is also manifested by vigilance and self-discipline in maintaining a clean heart and mind by avoiding or quickly turning away from that which is sensual (Job. 31:1; Ps. 101:3). We have been blessed with many sound, biblically-based and reasonable examples of modesty in our Brotherhood, which we should respect and exemplify in

our personal lives-all to the honor of God.

The principle of modesty is also represented by a humble self-awareness. "For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith" (Rom. 12:3). We run great risk of error when we become unduly confident and forward in any endeavor. "The words of wise men are heard in quiet more than the cry of him that ruleth among fools" (Ecc. 9:17). The Apostle John warned the church about a man named Diotrephes, "who loveth to have the preeminence among them" (3 John 9). Such behavior does not reflect modesty, and it creates discord among the brethren, which God hates (Prov. 6:19).

One of the most telling aspects of a man's heart is his speech: "...for of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaketh" (Luke 6:45). If we honestly examine ourselves in the light of God's Word, we get a clearer picture of the condition of our inner man and how this is portrayed to others. Are we motivated by temperance and reasonableness in our hearts to a walk of modesty in speech, conduct and appearance?

Moderation is defined as sweet reasonableness, implying gentleness, forbearance and restraint. It is the opposite of indulgence, wantonness and unseemly behavior.

Moderation in its many applications is also taught in the Word in the context of holy living. The Apostle Paul exhorted the Philippians: "Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand" (Phil. 4:5). This attribute of a child of God should be evident to others and motivated by awareness of the watchful eye and guiding hand of the Lord in our lives. The scribes and Pharisees were well known for carrying certain behaviors beyond moderation to the extreme. Jesus chastised the scribes when He said, "...for a show (you) make long prayers..." (Luke 20:47). The Pharisees sought attention and exclusiveness by "enlarge(ing) the border of their garments" (Matt. 23:5). These individuals demonstrated the hypocrisy of self-righteousness and reliance upon an outward form of holiness, while inwardly they fell prey to pride. They no longer had the humility to receive counsel or to esteem others. The old nature of man is subject to vanity, and our society is caught up in a frenzy of eye-appealing fashion trends which represent a significant departure from moderation. Both Paul and Peter warned against being adorned with "gold, or pearls, or costly array," but rather with "the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit" (1 Tim. 2:9; 1 Pet. 3:3-4).

Jesus told a parable of a foolish rich man who said, "I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink and be merry" (Luke 12:19). James chided those caught up with riches: "Ye have lived in pleasure on the earth, and been wanton..." (Jam.5:5). We may ask ourselves, "How much is enough?" Is our primary influence the Word of God or the excesses of our society? The author of Proverbs asked to be "removed far from vanity." He pleaded "give me neither poverty nor riches...lest I be full, and deny thee, and say, Who is the Lord? Or lest I be poor, and steal and take the name of mu God in vain" (Prov. 30: 8-9). Perhaps it would be wise for us to pray for a "moderate ambition."

Many Scriptures encourage zeal in expressing love for God and others, sharing the Gospel, feeding on the Word, preserving sound doctrine, offering humble deeds of service and producing fruit of the Spirit. It is also noteworthy that the Apostle Paul was deeply disappointed with the behavior of certain zealous brethren when he wrote: "I bear them record, that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge" (Rom. 10:2-4). Thus, both zeal and moderation involve good judgment. Moderation is not simply aiming for something in the middle or being less extreme than someone else. Our behavior should be guided by wise application of scriptural principles and the influence of good counsel and examples from seasoned brethren. The Holy Spirit will help us discern and make sound judgments.

Two of the simplest, most profound teachings on how to live by the principles of modesty and moderation are found in the example of the mind of Christ (Phil. 2:5) and Paul's beautiful description of Christ-like love in action: "Charity...doth not behave itself unseemly... (and it) never faileth" (1 Cor. 13:5, 8).

Rural Gospel Medical Mission of India

The Rural Gospel and Medical Mission of India (RGMMI) was founded in 1938 by Mr. B.B. Bhagwat, who had been raised in a Hindu family but was convicted by God's word and became a converted believer in the saving power of the shed blood of Jesus Christ. Since his death in 1980, the work of his mission has been under the direction of the Apostolic Christian Church.

Mr. Bhagwat spent many hours laboring in the rural areas of India spreading the gospel and establishing pockets of believers. Today that work is still carried on by faithful Indian RGMMI evangelists who are men of God devoted in their calling to share God's word.

A day in the life of a servant of God In India

To help us understand their role in the mission, we might review a typical day in the life of an RGMMI servant of God. He arises around 5:00 AM spends time in prayer with God, praying for the work of the mission, as well as for the church members and others in the various villages he serves. He is very devoted in reading God's word and spends time memorizing scriptures to share as he proclaims the good news of Jesus Christ.

If he has a family, he will help the children get ready for school and then have a simple breakfast of hot tea and chapattis (wheat bread). After dropping off the children at a local school, he will take his motorcycle and travel to the furthest village in his particular area. This could be 20 miles away. In some cases believers may be in the fields doing hand labor but will stop for a break. In numerous instances, the evangelist will share a scripture of encouragement, short meditation and a prayer. He might do this for three such families that would be in a particular workplace.

Of course the evangelist will be traveling through areas of many non believers. He will make contact with some and invite them to a village worship service that he will be conducting in a private dwelling. There are numerous elderly that he will visit. Before returning home for lunch, he will stop and purchase some vegetables and other provisions. The noon lunch with his wife will consist of rice and lentil stew served with pickled mango and lime slices sprinkled with chili pepper.

The early part of the afternoon is spent preparing for a village Bible gathering where he will visit in the near future. Another duty of the evangelist is to have ongoing counseling with converts before bringing their testimonies at one of the RGMMI congregations.

Later he will again take his motorcycle, visit another village, and have devotions in the home of believers returning from the fields. Several families may meet and a worship service will be conducted.

Upon returning home in the evening, he will assist children with studies and homework. Dinner is served around 8:30 PM and consists of millet bread with lentil stew and a side dish of fried fish powdered with salt and chili powder.

The missionary and his wife will conduct adult literacy classes on some evenings. Many church members are illiterate and have a desire to read and write. Some non-Christians will join in these sessions and are slowly introduced to our Lord Jesus Christ.

Other nights are spent in a village with believers, conducting a short worship service singing bhajans (Indian style group singing of hymns) and closing with a prayer. The day closes around 10:30 PM with family devotions and a closing prayer before seeking a much needed rest, praying that the seed has again been sown and the Lord will add the increase.


Overall work of the mission

The RGMMI mission consists of several churches, many village prayer halls, two boarding homes, vocational training schools, an English Medium school, a small hospital and numerous medical clinics. The boarding homes are located on two RGMMI campuses and are for young boys who are orphans, from broken families or children of rural families living near RGMMI prayers halls that do not have access to schools. The Privilege of Serving in Bastrop

In our human weakness, we are not able to understand why God allows a natural disaster to afflict the lives of those caught in its path. The Wilderness Ridge Fire that destroyed the homes and businesses of rural Bastrop County, Texas was no exception. A downed power line, the result of a falling branch, sparked the dry grass and pine needles into a raging fury of destruction. Strong winds sent the flames racing through the ravines and over the hilltops of the heavily wooded community consuming nearly everything in its path. Helpless residents were forced to flee with little more than the "shirt on their back." It took several days of intense fire-fighting to bring the fire under control leaving a charred path of loss and despair. Many of the victims had no insurance to help them rebuild.

With hearts of compassion, local brethren saw this disaster as an opportunity to show God's love in extending a helping hand to these struggling families. Though few in number, they offered themselves in service, helping in any way they could to alleviate the suffering. It soon became apparent that this effort was beyond the capacity of the small Austin church, and a request was brought to the USA Committee of World Relief to consider making this project a national effort.

A group of brothers from the committee were sent to Bastrop to evaluate the need and search out possibilities for a winter work project in Bastrop. As a result, three families emerged as possible candidates to receive World Relief assistance with the rebuilding of their homes. Preparations went forward in faith that other fire victims would be identified as the work began.

Plans were formulated for the housing and feeding of up to forty volunteers each week. Existing buildings on the site of the Austin church were prepared as dormitories. Water, electricity and sewer hookups were installed to facilitate a small RV park. A few minor modifications and additions to the church kitchen made it suitable to accomplish the necessary meal preparations. A plea for volunteers was sent out and God moved many hearts to come and serve in this effort.

Expanding the scope

On January 4th, 2010 work began on building three new homes, one two bedroom and two three bedroom modest homes. Work progressed rapidly and it soon became apparent that without finding more fire victims to help, the project could not last for the intended three month period.

Numerous needy families had been identified who were not victims of the fire but for various other reasons, health issues, financial struggles or old age, were in desperate need of help to repair or remodel their homes. Since the funding of this project was designated as "disaster," these hardship cases did not meet the criteria established by World Relief and approval was requested to expand the work to include these non-disaster cases. Unanimous support was given by the National Board to expand the scope of work to include these hardship cases and the work continued.

More blessed to give...

The opportunity to work inside homes occupied by their owners was a great blessing. With regular contact between resident and volunteers, there was an opportunity to share God's love with people hurting from debilitating circumstances. Close personal ties were formed and hearts were touched by the love of Christ being shown in deed and truth. One of the residents, a bedridden quadriplegic, asked a Brother to pray with him before leaving the house at the end of the work week. God's love had truly softened his heart! This change was reflected in his countenance.

Each volunteer, as well as those who supported through prayer and financial contributions, is promised the blessings of God. *Give and it* shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again. Luke 6:38

What is next?

We can never know where the Lord would have us to be used in His service in the future. It is our desire to follow wherever He leads us as we seek to be His servants in this work. At this time, the USA Committee is considering a project in the Nashville area where flooding has driven many families from their homes. Most of the clean-up work is completed, but there will be opportunities to aid in rebuilding of homes damaged in the flood. There is no definite plan yet but a decision will be made in the near future. Please pray for the Lord's direction in this matter.

Right Sizing Project Completed As of Monday, July 19, the last resident moved from Timber Ridge to the Detroit CILA. This was our last move in the right sizing project. We had been waiting for an award letter from the Department of Human Services and it finally arrived. Each of the five new homes has their funding in place and each of the 24 new people in CILAs has their funding in place. The process took about two years. A total of 44 people moved. Twenty people moved from Oakwood and Linden to group homes (CILAs). Twenty moved from Timber Ridge to Oakwood and Linden. Four moved from Timber Ridge to CILAs. In addition 11 people were admitted to Timber Ridge and two to Oakwood and Linden as a part of the right sizing.

First we must recognize that God has been very good to us during this process. We were spared any major harm and most of the adjustments went very well. There are some who still need to adjust. Next we want to thank the many who gave monetarily towards this project. It has been a faith building process to pray to the Lord for provision and have so many respond through the prompting of the Holy Spirit. What a great God we have!

There is probably not a person in the agency that has not contributed to the success of this project. Nurses and aides learned to care for new people and train others to care for those who were moving; program people have transferred programs and written new ones to reflect new settings. Maintenance has done multiple moves of resident belongings, and supervisors have worked out new staff schedules and hired new people. Also office and support staff have secured funding and changed bookkeeping, dietary has adjusted to new needs while other support staff are adjusting to new work schedules based on different numbers of residents.

Our residents and families (including those who did not move) have all adjusted to new settings, new people, gain and loss of friendships, etc. Each staff member gave their best to make this process of change as smooth and effective as possible. We praise the Father of Lights for His grace and provision.

account. They want to give that account with joy and peace, knowing it is well for all of us together. That is truly the spirit of Ezekiel 33 and 34.

It is not to warn in the context of catching you or me in doing something wrong. Warn is fundamentally a beautiful word that carries with it the need to speak the truth in love, be candid, speak truth in love. And do that in a way that brings us along, that nurtures us. That informs us and equips us to understand the problem and have the vision of the Word on how to address the problem.

Think about then the responsibility we as a church will give to those who are asked to feed and to lead. In this case, one of those definitions is watchman. The Word so often, we read the words in the epistles and we so often within our faith, speak of elders, shepherds, watchmen, ministers. Then as we open up these words and these responsibilities of nurturing and being watchmen and being our brother's and sister's keeper, it real quickly begins to include us all, doesn't it? Is any one of us exempt from the responsibility of being there for each other? Of being a part of edification and not a stumbling block?

This Word says, when I bring the sword upon the land and there is this watchman...(Ezekiel 33:2). We have been given the responsibility to look forward. That is one of the fundamental definitions of watchman. It requires us to look forward. We would want to do that with a Biblical vision. It is one of the most meaningful things you can pray for, for those who have been given the responsibility to lead the church. That is that they can be given a heart that is humble enough to be surrendered and a Biblical vision of, where do we go? How do we go forward?

"If when he seeth the sword come upon the land, he blow the trumpet, and warn the people;" v.3. How do you react to the word, 'warn'? If someone were to warn you, you can real quickly create scenarios where it is quite easy to receive that warning and examples of where we just almost feel an immediate, inherent resistance to receiving that warning. Why is that? When our hearts are pliable, when we are genuinely humble, when we have a love for the Word, when we have a love for each other, when we feel a beautiful responsibility and opportunity to be part of a church structure that is built on love, that is built on the truth of the Word and we have Jesus Christ as our Shepherd, then why can it be sometimes hard for us to accept warning? What does that say about the battle that is going on inside between the carnal spirit and the Spiritual mind? The carnal spirit and the Spiritual mind.

This Word clarifies very quickly that there is a mutual responsibility here. Just as Hebrews 13:17 says, it is very much a mutual responsibility. It would be required of us to speak the truth in love. Then have a recognition of accountability, loving and caring enough to nurture and try to create accountability. At the same time, acknowledging forthrightly that salvation is of the Lord. There isn't any one of us that have the ability or the authority or the wherewithal, the wisdom to create solutions and answered prayers and answers to so many of the issues and problems and challenges that are going to come up into each of our lives, but God can and does. The Word can and does. So we are servants.

One of the most profound examples that Jesus Christ gave us when He walked this earth; He indeed set the example of being a servant. He who was the Son of God. He had power to forgive. He had power to heal, to raise to life. Yet, He was very intent in His heart to teach what it means to be a servant. It is the second thing you can pray for us in our responsibilities, in this case, as Elder, or as minister. That indeed we can grow in our understanding and application of being a servant.

So to have Spiritual vision, as the watchman is required to have, the watchman looks forward. To have the ability to learn from past experiences. To do that in the context of grace. Do that in the context of faith. So there are those decisions that can be made that are wrong and need to be corrected. Think of our individual lives, the times when we make many right decisions. Then those times when we made a wrong decision. It may be of the nature that it is required of us of the Word that we go back and say, I was wrong. I am sorry. Or maybe it is the many, many private thoughts and decisions that are made that we acknowledge, that that wasn't the right thing to do, it wasn't the right thing to say, it wasn't the right thing to think.

Nonetheless, as watchmen, we are exhorted to have a Biblical vision of what is coming and to then teach and to exhort truth and preparation and readiness. The armor of God to be prepared. We love the Scripture, don't we? We love Ephesians 6. "Put on the whole armour of God...and having done all, to stand." v.11,13. Stand, being prepared for the battle.

So the exhortation is to warn. Then the exhortation is to accept personal responsibility. Because if we hear the warning, we know the Biblical requirement that is upon our soul. We know what is in front of us. We have a personal responsibility to be accountable to that.

Nevertheless, if thou warn the wicked of his way and he turns from it, his soul shall be saved. (Ezekiel 33:5) That goes back to the whole context of, salvation is of the Lord. God empowers. Grace works in our lives. The Holy Spirit works in our lives. All of us. We have the ability to be prepared.

As we think about the little Hebrews verse that we read, we want the end result of Ezekiel 33 to be that as we give an account to God, that it may be done with joy, not with grief and that it may indeed be profitable for all of us. So let's use this opening Scripture and exhortation from Ezekiel 33. Use it as a point in time. Checkpoint. Think about our readiness to receive and to immerse ourselves into the exhortation of the Word. Prayerfully think about our mutual readiness to counsel one with another.

Are we open to counsel? It is perhaps one of the most fundamental indications of the health of our spiritual life; our openness to council. We experience it in our prayer life with God, when we read the Word and the Word speaks to our hearts and it changes us. When we hear services, we worship together. We fellowship together. We have someone that loves us enough to come to us and say, have you thought about this? Have you taken time to think through the decision you just made before you implement it? All of those are mild forms of council. We can blow right by them or it can touch our heart.

Then there is the more serious side of when we have clearly begun a walk that is leading us to heartache. Someone warns us with Biblical vision. having praved that that Biblical vision can be timely and accurate. We again have an opportunity to respond to that council. The Word says, with council, purposes are established. Without council, purposes are disappointed. (Proverbs 15:22) Let's be open to council, let's listen for the warnings and with the warnings, let's know that it is generated from a heart of love. Just as God our Father loves us enough to actually warn us.

So we come to Acts 22. The Apostle Paul, giving his defense, in many ways. His testimony. We come down to him being in a part of his life when things were just plain going wrong. He did not see it. He was earnestly, zealously carrying out that which he felt compelled to carry out. We come to this point when he was on his journey, coming near to Damascus. There shone from heaven a great light.

It is more than interesting that he saw the light and those that were with him saw the light. But only he heard the voice. It would be interesting to study that particular concept and expression here. But one of the thoughts that comes to us as we just think and meditate together, the calling of God in so many ways, is very personal. Think of the number of times, for those we know and love dearly, if we could have given them salvation, we would have. To the point we would have sacrificed much if we could have accomplished that. Yet every one of us comes to a point where we must listen and hear our name and respond personally. It was that way here in Paul's life. He saw the light and he heard the pronouncement, "...Saul, why persecutest thou me?" Acts 22:7.

The question seems reasonable and honest, "...Who art thou, Lord?..." v.8. One of the blessings of being raised in faith is that we can know that, Yes, there is Jesus. I believe Jesus is the Son of God. But it is SILVER LINING

that partial belief definition. It is an acknowledgment in some ways, of God, of Jesus. But to be able to come to a point and say, Who art thou Lord, it is a very appropriate question. Who is Jesus to you and to me this morning? Particularly to the converted, is Jesus indeed Lord and Savior? By definition, does that mean we are willingly and fervently following, so that allows Him to be our Shepherd?

As anyone that would be unconverted, does not yet know Christ as Lord and Savior, has not experienced repentance, conversion, the wonder, the beauty of being born again, the miracle of the Holy Spirit and the grace grounded on a foundation of faith working in our lives, changing us beautifully from the inside out; for any that would yet be in that condition, think about the significance of Saul saying, Who art thou, Lord? At which time the Lord begins to teach, very personally, in a way that we, individually, you or myself at that particular time in our life, we need to know Jesus. He will show us who Jesus is. He will reveal Himself to us. We begin with a humble. surrenderedness that says, teach me Lord. Who art thou, Lord?

And Jesus said, I am Jesus of Nazareth, whom thou persecutest. Verse 9 is what we referred to. "And they that were with me saw indeed the light, and were afraid; but they heard not the voice of him that spake to me." It is still going to be up to you and to me to personally respond to the voice of Jesus.

Verse 12 is so appropriately connected to Ezekiel 33 and 34. "And one Ananias, a devout man according to the law, having a good report of all the Jews which dwelt there, Came unto me, and stood, and said unto me..." So God is already providing, demonstrating, validating the structure of brother/sister accountability. We so often throw a whole lot of things into the word or expression of 'church', rightly so. It is a very precious teaching and structure prescribed quite clearly in the New Testament. And we have these Old Testament examples. too, of the importance of coming into the house of the Lord.

Here, Saul, in his moment of tremendous need, is being welcomed into the nurturing and the care and the discipling and the mentoring of someone who knows more about the Word. Even at that time, if we think about, even as they undoubtedly did here, started building on the prophesy and the foundation that was in the Old Testament. Then to be able to connect that for Saul, studied in the Word, learned at the feet of Gamaliel. So now we see here that Ananias, who was a devout man, was placed into the life of Saul.

That is where you and I want to be. What a beautiful adjective. What a beautiful description, for the Lord Jesus, in the process of bringing a soul to salvation, and He looks at you or me and to make sure everyone knows why this is working, He says, Ananias, a devout man, according to the law, he has a good report of those who know him well. He walks in integrity. He is grounded on the Word. The Holy Spirit works in his life. And the Lord says, I am sending him to Saul, to disciple him.


He proceeded to explain the God of our fathers. He laid out a vision, a sense of purpose for Saul. Paul fulfilled that purpose. We know. It is beautiful. We go back to II Timothy 4:7. He comes to that closing season of his life. He says, I have fought a good fight. I have kept the faith. I have, by grace, earnestly tried to fulfill that which God called me to do. May that be true for you and me this morning. May we be quickened, made ready to hear and to think deeply about who Jesus Christ is. May we be open and receptive, prayerful that we can receive timely and scripturely correct vision and exhortation and warning. That warning is intended to include instruction towards righteousness.

Then think about the Shepherd side of God, Christ Himself. And the Shepherd side of those who you have asked to feed and lead. For they too must give an account. They too, want to speak the truth in love. And at the end, when true accountability is measured by God Himself, in that end, there may be peace, there may be joy, that it may be well with our soul.



Remote Counseling at ACCFS

This month we will share some information regarding a few new ways that we are delivering services to our church family and friends. As you may know, ACCFS is a ministry of the national church and its scope is to serve all of the local churches across the nation as well as internationally. When the counseling center began operation, one of the purposes was to provide a source of help for mental health or relationship needs for church members, friends, and others regardless of where they lived. This was accomplished primarily through a hotline service where people would call in, describe their concern, and receive some direction in how to best get the needed services. Often times, this meant connecting people to appropriate services in their local geographic area. Over time, ACCFS has provided more and more counseling services at our office in Morton, IL through the brothers and sisters who serve as counselors. In late 2006, the original mental health hotline was converted over to calls taken by the ACCFS receptionist and an answering system for after-hours calls. Although helping over the phone has always been part of what we do, it was not until 2009 that we began a more formal project to offer Remote Counseling services to those who live outside of the central Illinois area.

What is Remote Counseling?

Remote Counseling refers to ACCFS providing counseling services to clients who do not physically travel to the ACCFS office in Morton, IL. It is designed especially for those who live in geographic regions where appropriate counseling services are not available. It can be done via phone or Internetbased video conferencing to connect the client and the counselor for counseling sessions. Counseling is performed in much the same way as if the client was physically coming to the office in Morton. It is important to note that while many situations can be addressed effectively through Remote Counseling, there are some situations for which it is not recommended. Therefore, ACCFS counselors do a screening of each case to ensure that an appropriate type of care is recommended. Counselors consider several criteria, such as the nature of the issue, social support, and emergency considerations to make this decision. Remote Counseling usually starts with a Triage Session.

What is a Triage Session?

A Triage Session is a free, confidential thirty minute phone call with a counselor for the purpose of helping the caller to determine possible options for further assistance. In other words, if you or someone you know is struggling with an issue and would like to talk it over with one of the ACCFS counselors, you may call the ACCFS office (309-263-5536 or 877-370-9988) and set up a half-hour Triage Session for that purpose. Possible outcomes of a Triage Session could include recommendations for a specific book or other resource, a referral to a counselor in your area that has been screened by ACCFS, an appointment at the ACCFS office in Morton, IL, or an offer to do remote counseling with a counselor at ACCFS.

How does Remote Counseling work?

If following the Triage Session, Remote Counseling is the chosen route, the caller will receive an intake packet in the mail that contains forms that are used for new clients when they come to the ACCFS office. He or she will fill out the forms and mail them back to the ACCFS office. The client will then work with the receptionist by phone to schedule sessions with a specific counselor.

There are currently two methods of doing remote counseling. The first method is to engage in counseling sessions via telephone. The client needs to be in a private place to communicate by phone to the counselor who will be in his or her office. The session will start with the counselor calling the phone number supplied by the client. The second method is through video conferencing. The client needs a broadband Internet connection and a webcam for this option. Before the first session, the client will receive instructions on how to go to a private and secured website to start the video session with the counselor. A big advantage of video counseling is that it allows the counselor to see non-verbal communication such as facial expressions and posture. ACCFS has taken steps to ensure that both methods are secure and confidential.

How much Remote Counseling is done at ACCFS?

Approximately 30% of the counseling sessions at ACCFS are done remotely. Of these sessions, about one third are performed through the video counseling option. Remote Counseling at ACCFS has had a broad geographical reach and has allowed the counselors to serve clients from across nation as well as internationally.

Why is this important?

As a Silver Lining reader, we want you to know that it is our desire that ACCFS services would be accessible to all who would benefit from them. We also want you to know that the local elder is appropriately informed of counseling as much as possible in order to provide for additional follow-up with the client. If you or someone you know is struggling or needing help and not getting the help they need, we encourage you to consider calling and scheduling a free Triage Session at ACCFS. We are committed to the goal from the ACCFS Charter to "...alleviate suffering and to promote Christian maturity so that people can grow in their likeness to Christ, experience a deeper relationship with God and enter into a more effective life of service to others."



She Light Of Hope

"About Angels"

Recently someone asked me the question, "When were angels created? They are not mentioned in the story of creation in Genesis." The Bible doesn't tell us when the angels were created but we assume that they were created before the first day of the Genesis account. The devil deceived Eve and he, the devil, is a fallen angel. Many creations may have taken place before the creation recorded in Genesis. There are many things we do not know.

The word angel first appears in the Bible in Genesis 16:7 where it is recorded that the angel of the Lord appeared to Hagar, Sarah's maid.

In Genesis 20, three men appeared to Abraham and they turned out to be angels, although this was not known to him when he first met them. Neither does the Bible in Genesis identify them as angels but simply as "The Lord." However, Hebrews 13:2 identifies them as angels with this statement, "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers; for thereby some have entertained angels unawares."

Daniel told the king as recorded in Daniel 6:22, "My God has sent his angel, and hath shut the lions' mouths." This indicates that angels not only deliver messages for God but sometimes they provide protection for God-fearing people.

Turning to the New Testament, we all know that the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary to inform her that she would be the mother of Jesus. This is recorded in St. Luke the first chapter, verses 26 and 27. The only other angel spoken of by name in the Bible is Michael. He is spoken of as a great prince in Daniel 12:1 but Jude identifies him as an archangel in Jude, verse 9, where it is written, "Yet Michael the archangel, when contending with the devil he disputed about the body of Moses." We do not know what that dispute was about. In Deuteronomy 34:6 it is simply stated, "And he (God) buried him (Moses) in a valley in the land of Moab." It further states, "But no man knoweth of his sepulchre unto this day."

Cornelius was instructed by an angel whom he saw in a vision, to go meet Peter who would instruct him in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Acts 10:3 reads, "He saw in a vision evidently about the ninth hour of the day an angel of God coming in to him." This indicates that angels are active in the ministry of bringing people to repentance and conversion. They must work in conjunction with the Holy Spirit.

Isaiah 14:12 reads, "How art thou fallen from heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning!" Lucifer is considered to be the original name of the devil, who was an angel before his fall. Verse 13 tells us that he said, "I will exalt my throne above the stars of God." Jesus tells us in Luke 10:18, "I beheld Satan as lightning fall from heaven." I had thought that a third of the angels in heaven sided with Satan when he was cast out of heaven but I can't find it in the Bible. If anyone reading this has any information on that, please share it with me. I wonder about that.

In one of the hymns we sing, there is the statement, "For angels never knew the joy that our salvation brings." I remember that line but I don't know the name of the hymn. If you know, please inform me. Thank you.

It is our understanding that angels are individually created beings and that there is no plan of salvation for them if they sin. Hebrews 2:2 reads, "For if the word spoken by angels was steadfast, and every transgression and disobedience received a just recompense of reward; How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?" I believe this Scripture tries to impress us with how fortunate we are to have the opportunity to repent and be reconciled to God when the angels have no such opportunity.

We know that angels are messengers and that they are protectors. Every night I pray that God will send His angels to encompass my bed and protect us. We need to be constantly protected from evil spirits and this is especially true when we near death. Let's visit those who are seriously ill and near death, and pray for God's angels to hover about them and bear them safely to heaven.

In the parable of the rich man and Lazarus, it is written in Luke 16:22, "And it came to pass, that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom." The angels are very busy and anxious to help us.
