

Sermon by Bro. Greg Rassi, Chicago, IL

I Samuel Chapter 1:1-18, Romans Chapter 3

We are hard pressed to understand the trouble that existed back in that time. The trouble between people who thought they were entitled to salvation and people who, for as long as they could remember, had been excluded from any hope. Then Jesus came. And we, our whole life, have heard it preached that Jesus is for everyone! It doesn't matter whether you are a Jew or a Gentile. Most of us are Gentiles. God's Word establishes that Jesus came for us,

We have a tough time understanding the earthquake, we might say, that took place for the Jews. They read God's Word, and maybe they do today also. They read God's Word in a different way. They read a story about a people that God chose. He took care of them. He provided for them. We can go through all of the accounts. They are precious accounts about believers. Account of those who trusted in God, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, and Joseph. And, we can keep going. And so, they considered themselves a chosen people. They were very careful to keep their lineage very very straight. Who their ancestors were, how they were related and who married who. In their mind that's how you received part of the promise of God.

When we look at this chapter today we say, what is this chapter for? Why is it here? That was settled a long time ago by Jesus. The answer is, to some extent, in our human nature. God looked at His people, and now I'm talking about His creation, the ones that He had created. The ones He had given the power to choose. The power to follow and be obedient to Him, or the power to choose and be disobedient. And that was far beyond those who were of the chosen people of the Jews.

He looked at us and said, what's is going to take? What is it going to take for this people, this creation, to become My people? What is it going to take to put My Word into their hearts? What is it going to take for

this people to be Mine, that I can be their God? When I think back to the whole story of the Bible, I think that is what God has wanted from the very beginning. He has wanted a people that would focus on Him and remain His.

One of the precious things about Mother's Day is families come back together. Some people who are here today have come a long way to be together as a family. That is a precious thing. It is a very Biblical thing, actually. But the point is that they have come together as a family.

Sometimes people get themselves into a position that they think the thing they need to do is to separate themselves. They think they need go their own way as far as they can. They think they can escape certain, I guess in government we would call it inalienable truths, but in Scripture, dear ones, we would simply call it the Truth. You can't escape the Truth, dear ones, those of you who have heard the Word and those of you who have read the Bible. This morning brother Bob said people who try to be an atheist or maybe they are an atheist, I think are the words he used. To me that is a really difficult thing isn't it? That people decide there is no God, that they were not created? I don't think there is one person in this entire assembly that thinks that in their hearts. Instead. we are convinced that, yes, we do have a wonderful God, a Creator, a Father. He wants us to be a part of His family and He never wants to lose sight of us. He never wants us to go our own way. Isn't it a precious thing as He finds ways to draw us to Him. We have examples through the Scriptures. We have the example of Hannah being pressed by the adversary praying/pouring out her heart, making vows. Did you notice that she made some vows?

What is a vow? It is a promise. The Bible says that if you make a vow you should keep your vow. God says that is right. God does that be-

Unspotted From The World

Writings based on God's Word

The Scriptures clearly teach that we are to walk in purity of heart, keeping ourselves unspotted from the world (Jam. 1:27; 1 Pet. 1:22). Unspotted can be defined as clean, pure, undefiled, holy, and free from guile or worldliness.

We often make a great deal of effort to keep our material possessions unspotted. We can purchase "spot remover" for carpet, clothing, glass, and numerous other items. Although there is nothing wrong with reasonable efforts at sanitation, we must be careful that it does not become a preoccupation or an attempt to impress others. Material spots are temporary and often not very important.

If our eye glasses or our car windshield have spots on them, it might impair our vision and put us in physical danger. That could be serious enough, but it is still only temporary. In our spiritual life, keeping ourselves unspotted from the world has eternal consequences and requires a total surrender of self to God. Even a small spot of "self" can grow into pride and have serious ramifications; for we know that "...God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble" (Jam. 4:6). If we think that we are able of our own strength to do everything necessary to keep ourselves pure, no doubt we will fail. "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall" (1 Cor.10:12).

Many Scripture passages encourage us to be unspotted from the world. David wrote of the importance of purity when he asked "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? ... He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart..." (Psa. 24:3-4). He also recognized that man could not be pure by his own power: "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting (Psa. 139:23-24).

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said: "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God" (Matt. 5:8). Paul wrote to Timothy, "Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned" (1 Tim. 1:5).

How can we keep ourselves pure and

unspotted from the world? In His intercessory prayer, Jesus pleaded on our behalf: "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth" (John 17:17). Being unspotted from the world really must start with reliance upon the Word of God, which we must approach with a humble heart of sincere self-examination. It is largely a matter of attitude. Are we willing to humbly obey what God asks of us? Are we truly desirous to be free from the contaminations of the world and make the necessary sacrifices to keep ourselves pure? Do we recognize how desperately we need God's grace to work toward these goals?

Although we can never be spotless by our own efforts, we are promised that God will provide. Jesus told the rich young ruler: "If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come and follow me" (Matt. 19:21). Further, we are promised that whatever we sacrifice for the Kingdom we shall "...receive manifold more in this present time, and in the world to come life everlasting' (Luke 18:30). Few, if any, of us have been asked to give everything as the rich young man was, but if we are of a humble, submissive attitude, God will provide grace so that we can be a "living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is (our) reasonable service" (Rom. 12:1).

We must remember the condition of the Laodicean Church: "Because thou sayest I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked:..." (Rev. 3:17). We cannot hide our condition. Jesus said to all seven of the churches in Asia. "I know thy works..." (Rev. 2 and 3). God also knows us better than we know ourselves, and we can be thankful that He gave those churches the opportunity to re-"As many as I love. I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent" (Rev. 3:19). Without God's love, grace, mercy and forgiveness, we would never be kept unspotted from the world.

The help (grace) we receive is a gift God freely gives to His children. We must be willing to do our little part, but we all recognize that we receive more from the Lord than we deserve. David, while in great dis-

tress and feeling forsaken of God, said: "But I am a worm and no man: a reproach of men, and despised of the people" (Psa. 22:6).

Good intentions are vital, but to sav and not do is of little value. Jesus told of the man who had two sons. He asked them to go to work in his vineyard. The first said he would not go but later changed his mind and went. The second son said "...I go sir: and went not" (Matt. 21:30). The second son appeared to be of a ready mind, but he did not do his father's will. Are we "Ready to go, ready to stay, ready my place to fill; Ready for service, lowly or great, Ready to do His will" ("Ready", Hymns of Zion, #124)?

To be unspotted from the world, we must have the mind of Christ and exemplify His character (1 Cor. 2:16). Additional Scripture passages that remind us of the importance of focusing our minds on Christ include: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matt. 6:21); "...be of one mind ..." (2 Cor. 13:11); "... in singleness of heart, as unto Christ...doing the will of God..." (Eph. 6:5-6).

Through a life-long process of sanctification, and only by God's grace and mercy, will we ultimately be found blameless before Him. We must acknowledge and correct our errors along life's way, and through His advocacy and cleansing we are made worthy (Eph. 5:26-27; 1 John 1:7-10; 2:1-2). "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thes. 5:23).

God knows our hearts. May we be able to say like David: "Judge me, O Lord; for I have walked in mine integrity...examine me, O Lord, and prove me..." (Psa. 26:1-2).

Pure motives are well reflected in the Zion's Harp hymn, "Pure and Holy Love", #72, v.9.

"Love of Jesus, love of brethren, Heal our souls from every smart! Grant to us Thy purest motives And a pure, unspotted heart."

New Church in Caransebes, Romania

Ithough not among the very first churches in Romania, the congregation at Caransebes dates from the late 19th century. This congregation was always made up of people of little means, yet they were able to build a church before 1900, and when Communism overtook the country following WWI, they had a building of their own to worship in. As were all Romanian churches except one, it was taken from them. Many churches were destroyed or otherwise rendered useless during those difficult days, but the building at Caransebes did survive. Some others did also.

During the 70 years of Communism believers endured suffering beyond the comprehension of our American minds. They gathered in small groups and isolated places, most of the time without children in fear that these young people might inadvertently tell someone else, and the believers would be arrested. At one time the authorities did allow the Nazareans to ordain five new elders. However, police stood by and when the services were complete, they arrested all the elders except one old brother who was left alone to shepherd the entire nation.

Funerals allowed them a time to preach the word, but baptisms and weddings were held in deep secrecy. A faithful brother who still lives and serves the Caransebes congregation held many secret services in places where it would draw no attention, often at the risk of his own freedom.

When Communism fell in 1989, by God's grace this small group was able to buy back their church which was in poor condition. Several years ago they asked the American brethren to help them build a new church, which has been completed on the original site. The old building was not salvageable, and was demolished to allow for the new structure. It took a couple of years for design, permits, and construction, but today the small group rejoices to have a simple yet to them very beautiful place to worship.



The building was dedicated on October 10, with services being attended by representatives of the Mission and European Committees. The brethren are grateful beyond any expression of words, thanking God first of all, and then all of our loyal and faithful donors who make this possible in Eastern Europe.

Church building ongoing

In Hungary nearly all congregations worship in new or remodeled facilities. At this time construction is underway for a new building in Dimka, Ukraine, with plans to help purchase or upgrade facilities for other congregations in that land.

There are only a couple of churches in Slovakia and three in Croatia, all of which have received substantial support from American brethren.

Perhaps the greatest number of Nazareans found themselves in the

land once called Yugoslavia, and now is termed Serbia. At one time there were 30,000 members in that land, with over 300 elders. Wars and Communism took a dismal toll of these members, many of whom were imprisoned or even killed for their faith. Today one can still meet brethren from each of these lands and hear stories of misery and suffering that we cannot imagine.

Many fled their homelands, but there is still an active remnant throughout Eastern Europe, and the purpose of our two committees is to provide, not only places for them to worship, but also to attempt to give them a chance to make their living and remain in their own countries and culture.

Over 20 years many churches have been repaired or rebuilt, with ongoing work as funding permits. Through your generosity we have been able to purchase dozens of good vehicles to transport brethren to worship services. Few are capable of owning a car, so some years ago we had a successful project that furnished hundreds of bicycles being used today by many families.

Opportunities exist for young families and we continue to try to assist them with our many programs. Much work is carried on through Antioch Association, based in Romania but serving all nations. Your vital support is needed and appreciated. You may contribute through your local church Mission Committee representative, marking the donation for Eastern Europe.

Meat canning history

uring WWII, the Mennonites developed the idea of a portable canner. They learned of those who were suffering from the war and sent them home canned produce in glass jars. Not surprisingly, many jars were broken in shipping. In 1945, a business in Virginia, built a portable canner for tin cans. Shortly after this, another portable canner was built in Hesston, Kansas by Mennonites there. After several years, the Mennonites in Hesston turned their canner over to MCC (Mennonite Central Committee), who own and operate the mobile canner in use today.

MCC's portable canner is mounted on a custom designed semi-trailer. Their annual canning schedule runs from October to April of the following year, travelling to 36 different communities to can the meat. The men (typically 4) who travel with the canner usually fill a position for two years. In October the canning crew arrives with two new men. who train "on the job." The "Canner men" operate the equipment and stay two to ten days at one location, depending on the amount of meat at that stop. The canner has a 25HP steam boiler, six cookers, two cooling tanks, two cooking kettles and a sealer for putting lids on the cans.

Canning meat at the Ohio Distribution Center

The brethren in the Rittman area have been involved with the canning stop in Kidron, Ohio since 1946. When considering our own distribution center, one of our brothers asked MCC if they would be willing to bring the canning trailer to our building, and they agreed. The portable canner usually comes to our stop twice in a year, once in the fall and again the following spring. In the past we have canned beef, pork and turkey; most recently we've canned turkey. In four days, 34,000 to 40,000 pounds of meat is processed. National World Relief, along with local donations and many volunteers have supported this project.

A typical canning day 6:00 AM - 10:00 PM

After a prayer at 6:00 AM, volunteers get turkey thighs out of a refrigerated truck. The turkey is run through a meat grinder and put in a large cooking kettle (500# capacity). Salt is added to the meat, and two volunteers stir the meat until it reaches 50 degrees F. Once the meat is heated, it is ready to put in 28-ounce cans.

Ten volunteers fill and weigh the cans on the canning line. The lid is put on the can and stacked in a basket that holds 140 cans. The basket of filled cans is placed in one of the six cookers on the canning trailer. The meat is cooked approximately two hours with steam produced by the boiler. After cooking is complete, the basket of cans is placed in a cooling tank with a flowing water bath for twenty minutes or until the temperature of the can is 90 degrees F.

Anyone in the meat area or handling meat must be wearing a white coat. The USDA inspector comes one or two times a day. Their job is to assure the meat is processed in a sterile way (bacteria free).

After the cans have cooled, they are taken into the building. Volunteers wash, dry and put labels on the cans. Thirty to forty volunteers help with the canning project at a time. It is an opportunity for fellowship with one another.

Once the cans have been labeled, they are inspected and ran through the printer with the following put on each can: date canned, expiration date, establishment number and batch number. Then the cans are placed in boxes and put on pallets for shipment.

A can of meat is taken out of every batch and put in an incubator heated to 95 degrees F for ten days. This test is to ensure there are no bacteria in the canned meat.

Usually between batches, there is a lull in the meat canning process. This time is optimized by packing soup in another part of the building. There are manual lines set up for the people to walk through and fill soup bags at all times during meat canning. If there are enough people on the soup lines, we use an automated conveyor system. This takes fifteen to twenty people.

"For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat..." Matt 25:35

Meat has been to sent to Honduras, Nicaragua, Haiti, Colombia, Bulgaria, Swaziland, Sri Lanka, along with work teams and for disasters within the USA. While it warms the heart to do good for others, part of the reward is the rich fellowship that takes place when the work is being done.

Thankfulness is on everyone's mind this time of year. Some are thankful for equipment that allows them to do more or be more efficient. Some are thankful for a paycheck. Some are thankful for family and friends that come to visit. Some are thankful for the grace extended when they did not feel deserving. These thoughts could come from one of you reading this article or from the mind of a resident living at Apostolic Christian Home for the Handicapped.

Through the prayer, acts and donations of many, the residents and staff are able to routinely witness Christ's love within these homes. What often is not as easily seen is that this love spills into the lives of others around them as well. Imagine a single drop of rain into a still lake. From such a tiny drop the ripples magnify and stretch far into the lake—much wider than the original drop.

From the beginning, this place has been "rooted and built up in Him." Its presence has worked in the hearts of many to provide for more than a place for adults with disabilities to live. Its reach has become far-entering into the lives of staff, families, and community members. This year there are 148 residents but there have been many that have been in and out over the years. Along with them, their family and friends were also impacted. We have roughly 300 staff members but countless have come and gone over the years and from time to time each of them have taken bits of The Word and love of God home to their family and friends. We work with about 80 outside providers at this time but there have been many others and that number does not include the physicians, government workers, community business members and others encountered in a professional and Godly way.

God has been present and known in this place from the day its doors were opened. People have come and gone. The agency has experienced its share of problems, hard times, and trials. However, everyone genuinely notices that life and work in this place is different and for that we are "abounding therein with thanksgiving." We thank our Lord for His presence in this place.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Tim Sauder

I have been reading a book to my kids recently. However, I have found that it is just as relevant to me as it is to my teens. In the book, Do Hard Things, the young authors lay out challenges of high expectations to their peers that can apply to all of us in the body of Christ. We are talking about good, hard things, not foolish recklessness.

In order to accomplish great

things or simply just survive, we may need to step out of our comfort zone. Often for great rewards one must take great risks. We may courageously choose to do that OR we may be forced to walk to the end of the diving board and jump because we have no other choice. We are called to "walk by faith, not by sight." (II Corinthians 5:7)

This reminds me of a poster I saw years ago with a big ship anchored near shore that said, "Ships are safe in the harbor, but that's not what great ships are built for." Perhaps another parallel is that it is better to have tried and failed than to have never tried at all. Effort, even failed effort builds muscle. "For a just man falleth seven times, and riseth up...." (Proverbs 24:16)

How does he do it? He is strong only in the Lord. Ephesians 6:10 says, "be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might." The Bible is full of common, ordinary people who trusted God to do extraordinary things when they walked in faithful obedience even in the face of failure, persecution and death. These are heroes like Abraham, Moses, Peter and Paul who in II Timothy 1:7 said, "For God hath not given us a spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind."

Do we believe that? What really holds us back? Let's be honest, it is often fear. And "fears are usually just well-concealed lies." So what are we afraid of? Is it not pride that makes us fear inadequacy, discomfort, failure or humiliation? Is our fear revealing, not only our humanness, but also that we don't fully trust God to come through?

Our Board of Directors and the

Management Team at Gateway Woods are facing some confusing, challenging, and occasionally fearful times. The above scriptures serve as reminders and encouragement as we sort through new regulatory pressures from the State of Indiana. There are some very real threats to our ministry, especially as we continue to be committed to God's design of the Christian family model in our campus group homes that has been so effective over the years.

A recent special Board Meeting and an upcoming November retreat are pivotal as our leaders take action to appeal to the government and, at the same time, make plans for how we will go forward so that we can continue to do good things for lost and wounded children and families. We need your prayers for courage, clarity, wisdom, and faith to trust the unknown future to our known God.

News:

We welcomed new Alternate House Parents, Bro. Keith and Sis. Alisa Beyer (Washington, IL), along with their five children to Gateway Woods. We are thankful they listened and obeyed the Lord's call and look forward to serving with them. Please pray for them as they continue to learn the responsibilities of being House Parents.

Gateway Woods welcomed three new residents to campus this past month. Please pray with us as these three children become accustomed to their new homes in the Maple, Pine and Oak Houses. It can be difficult for new residents as they experience a very different living situation than that which they have experienced at home.

- The Gateway Woods Adoption program has added Honduras and the Democratic Republic of Congo to the list of countries from which our adoptive parents have received children. Adoptions from Ukraine and Ethiopia are currently in process.

- We celebrated Tim Sauder's 25th year as an employee of Gateway Woods this past week! We are so thankful for his years of service and commitment to this ministry.
- Our staff has had the opportunity to share about our various services with a number of congregations in recent months including Rockville, Champaign, Bloomington, Junction, Elgin and Columbus. We thank our Lord for the fellowship, interest and support of our loyal churches that are so critical to our staffing, funding and operation as we minister to these needy families.

cause He wants us to get into the habit of keeping our word. Why does He want us to do that? Because, the time will come for each one of us. from the youngest child here to the older person here, when He will come to us and He will want us to vow and promise to be faithful and true to Him forever. He wants us to know what that means. It is not an idle promise like I'll meet you at 11:00 at K-Mart. That is not the same type of a vow or promise. But, we need to keep those too. We need to keep our word. It becomes a tremendous promise.

Think about Abraham. Abraham was so confident in his God that when God told him to do something that made no sense whatsoever, to go and sacrifice his only son, he took him up to the mountain. He took the wood and the fire. And Isaac asked, is there something missing here? Abraham even raised the knife. The important thing about that is to recognize that God wants us to make promises to Him. He wants us to trust Him with our life, with our greatest hopes. It is so far beyond what the Jews were really expecting.

The Jews were expecting their God to erase the Romans and to give them a nation. They were expecting Him to give them political authority, to bless them. That is all they wanted. That is all they wanted in their lives. That's a tragedy! Some people have the thought of that is what it is being a believer, that God is going to draw a hedge around them. That He is going to help and to protect. If we stop there we have shut ourselves off from such a wonderful salvation. Instead. God wants us to know the fullness of His promises, the fullness of His expectations of us. How can we appreciate His Grace if we haven't tried to follow the law and realized how fruitless we are?

Let's be honest. Drive to Chicago sometime and ask yourself if you are going to obey every law on the way to Chicago. The answer is probably not very many people will. You are going to speed. You are going to do some-

thing. We are like that, dear ones. For me, it seems like I can't follow the law for fifteen minutes with my will, with my power. That is why God gave the children of Israel the law. To help them understand that they couldn't do it by their own strength. It wasn't a matter of how many sheep they killed. It wasn't a matter of making the sacrifices every day. It is not a matter today of going to church every Sunday or every Wednesday night and clicking them off and putting a check mark there and that is going to do it. That is not why we come is it? No, it isn't! We come because we want God via His Holy Spirit to come and speak to us and help us to know Him, to think about His plan for this world.

You see the beautiful vistas that open in this world whether it is a picture of the sea or a picture of the mountains or of the skies, a sunset. Last night He had everyone wondering if they should cover their flowers. Sorry, they are not really your flowers. They are His. He decides their lifespan. He designs the beauty and color that they have. Think of a God that creates every child individually with special attributes. We know these things are the Truth because we have seen them. We have experienced them. Everyone is special in the eyes of God.

We go much farther as the family of the Gentiles. Maybe we shouldn't say the family of the Gentiles, that is kind of saying the Gentiles are in and the Jews are out. That is not true at all. We all long to be part of the family of God, don't we? We want our God to help us to understand what it means to call Him Father and to call Jesus our Savior. Do we think we emphasize it too much? They answer is no, we don't! We can't emphasize it too much because that is where life is lived! That is where forgiveness, peace, satisfaction, contentment and understanding happens. If we don't have that we don't have a purpose in this life! We don't know where we are going to go tomorrow, today or this afternoon.

Our God is not going to let any one

of us without a purpose. He is going to have something special for us to do. We may not know what it is. I have a feeling that Moses was wandering around in the desert when he was eighty years old and tending sheep and he didn't have any idea that he was going to be sent back to Egypt. All of a sudden God called his attention. He watched a bush burn and not be consumed. There is a good physics question for you. But then, God spoke to Him and said, take off your shoes, you are on holy ground. I have things for you to do, is what He said to Moses.

Let's start this chapter now, with that background. "What advantage then hath the Jew? Or what profit is there of circumcision?" (v1) What did they say? They said, "Much every way: chiefly, because that unto them are committed the oracles of God." (v2) Chiefly because at least the Jews had been exposed to God. They had the writings and the prophets. They had the account of what God did. What an advantage! What an advantage for a child today! What an advantage for a family today! That they have the Word of God in their house, that they have Bible story books in their house. What an advantage that they teach their children the stories, that the children know the stories of David. They know the stories of Sampson and all those that go along with learning what God does to lead and help His people.

"For what if some did not believe? Shall their unbelief make the faith of God without effect?" (v3) Now we run into a problem. We don't want to exclude anyone from the blessings of God. And dear ones, neither does our Savior! And neither does our God! If there is one thing that is abundantly clear in God's Word it is that there is a place for all. He is not going to turn one away! But, we have to believe that He is our God. We have to want to come unto Him. He won't force us.

Think of the stories you have heard across the years. Think of the prodigal sons and the prodigal

daughters. Think of those who have gone on their own way. Think of those who have returned. Millions and millions of family stories of fathers and mothers and children. God is there for each one. I know that people would say there are some places that God just isn't. But you know, somehow I don't believe that in my heart. I don't believe that God gives up on people and I don't believe you do either. There are places where there are tremendous advantages. I would tend to say that everyone that is here has had that tremendous advantage.

Brother Bob said this morning the grandmothers, the mothers and the great-grandmothers with faith and trust in their families handing down to their families a legacy of faith that some things are more important in this life than others. One of them is faith. Another is going to church, learning who the Father is. Knowing what is right and what is wrong. Those are legacies that are handed down. But, they ultimately came from God.

Do we grow discouraged because somebody doesn't believe? It's easy to grow discouraged. What mother is there that hasn't told her children to pick up the toys and it seems like day after day goes by and the toys are just always there. It is easy to spill the box. It just goes on and on. I know that is a poor example, dear ones. But it is also the example of what happens as we souls live upon this earth and try to draw closer to our God. We have toys all over the place and we are not doing a very good job of picking them up and putting them aside. We don't always do a good job of putting away childish things and taking hold of those things that are true and right. But dear ones, our God is our God. He loves us. He wants to comfort us. He wants to draw us.

The time comes when we grow up. We grow up spiritually too. There comes a time when there is an age of accountability when a soul know the difference between right and wrong and when God says it is time to fol-

low Me. Let's not forget those truths. Let's not be discouraged when sometimes we see souls that run the other way. Almost all of us, at one time or other, have run the other way because we were afraid. We were afraid of our God. But He says don't be afraid! Jesus said, suffer the little children to come unto me. What a beautiful vision, the Savior of the world calling those little children to come unto Him. Rebuking His disciples who said there wasn't time for this. Jesus said, I have time! He still has time today!

"For what if some did not believe? Shall their unbelief make the faith of God without effect? God forbid: yea, let God be true, but every man a liar; as it is written, That thou mightest be justified in thy sayings, and mightest overcome when thou are judged." (v. 3,4) The thoughts that come to mind are how much we like to decide things on our own. How much we want to have control. Yet one of the prerequisites of a close relationship with God is surrendering and knowing that He knows better what we need than we know ourselves. It is true, isn't it? We can make a terrible mess of things. God can fix those things. God can help us. We need that in our heart. We need that in our mind. We need to believe it every day when we begin. We need to pray unto our God for wisdom. We need to pray that His Word would go forth. That He would be glorified. That the most important thing that would show today on me is that I have faith. Not whether I can accomplish my earthly job. Not whether I can look like I have things in control, which by the way I usually don't.

But what is most important? That I have faith. My God wants me to have faith. He wants it to show to those who are around about me. It is such an obvious answer when we talk about mothers. Mothers, when you run around and try to make everything perfect for your children, it is probably an endless circle. You probably can't get there. But what can you do? You can show your chil-

dren that you have faith! You can show your children that there is nothing more important than God. You can show your children that there is a difference between the stories that talk about Jesus and the stories that talk about Bob the Builder.

Sometimes we laugh. But, I think people today are losing track of what is most important, what is true, what is real. I believe that was a little bit of the message this morning. Some things are real. The love of a mother is real! Let's treasure it and let's be thankful for it!

We didn't do justice at all to this chapter. But, more important than doing justice to a chapter, dear ones, is recognizing that God has a place for each soul, for each one. He wants the closeness of our communion. He wants our minds. He wants us to think about the wonderful things He has done. Brother Bob said this morning he was talking about the magnificent creation that takes place inside a womb where in nine months a few cells become a living creature, a soul. I had to think man does many things with technology and maybe we get a little discouraged sometimes because of all the technology that is around. But the truth is that all of that technology doesn't really compare to the kinds of things that God does. If you don't think so, remind yourself what happened when the earth shook in Haiti. or when the tsunami came ashore. The technology of this world, as good as it is and as much energy as man puts into it, can't do it.

Let's take the oil well that is spilling into the Gulf. God made the oil. God put the pressure in the reservoir. Does man via his technology know how to deal with it? Let's not be discouraged by the technology that is around about us. Let's make sure that our attention and our faith and our confidence is in the principles of the Word that our God has given us. May He encourage us to be a part of His family which is open to Jews and to Gentiles because Jesus Christ died on the cross for all of us.



Needs of Adopted/Foster Children Article Three of Three: Needs of Adopted Children

This article will explain some of the elements and components of foster care. This article will not dig deeply into specific areas or needs of foster children. Instead, it will provide an overview of how the church body can exercise true religion (James 1:27) in supporting and loving those involved in the foster care process.

The word "foster" is certainly a beautiful word filled with many biblical applications. It means: to promote the growth or development of (a child), to bring up (a child), to cherish (a plan, hope, etc.) in one's mind. We are indeed thankful that many families have felt the call to minister to the needs of children in a very unique way by opening up their homes to fostering opportunities.

In America, there are 463,000 children in foster care; 24% were placed in a relative's home. 46% of those children were in foster care for less than a year. 52% of the children left the foster care system to be reunited with their families. (2008 information per childwelfare.gov)

The church family can be helpful to those involved in this service of care in a number of ways, three of which will be expressed in this article: 1) Display a proper blend of sensitivity and empathy, 2) Display the love of Christ, and 3) Display the power of prayer.

Display a proper blend of sensitivity and empathy.

We might recall a time in our life when our family needed to move, change schools, or find another home to live in. Whether the event was positive in nature or rooted in sadness, the act of changing homes can be very impactful. As created beings, we tend to gravitate towards routine, normalcy, consistent habits, and expectations. The Bible is filled with examples of the struggles that the Children of Israel encountered during their times of being exiled and carried away to other lands. Jeremiah records the picture of a mother weeping for her children

because they were not home, but in exile (Jer. 31:15).

Children enter the foster care system because something is wrong in their home and the level of adequate care for them is missing. No matter how we see a "foster child" act, we always need to extend the mental grace of empathy and remember that this child has had some very tough experiences in their young life. Just because they have moved into a Christian home doesn't automatically bring healing from these experiences. We know that just because someone goes to church on Sunday, it doesn't automatically bring sanctified behavior on Monday. Healing will take time and purposeful action from "foster parents" that is rooted in love. There are many additional elements of attachment (trust, security, safety, etc.) that are woven into the behaviors of foster children. Those elements, while common in all children and families, are especially magnified in the heart and mind of those in foster

God's brilliant design of the connection between infant and mom/dad is hard to describe. Most parents are very thankful for that connection, because biological parents have their struggles also. Even in the worst possible dysfunctional and abusive situation possible, most kids WANT to be home with their family. It is wise to remember that and display the appropriate sensitivity to children in these situations. A common, well-intentioned mistake of someone trying to be encouraging usually includes phrases and words said to the child about "how thankful they should be for being in a better place/home right now". Yes, that is true, but that comment is not sensitive to the child's desire and longing to be in their own home. We can encourage foster children by letting them know how thankful we are for the chance to get to know them.

Display the love of Christ.

Jesus was very generous in helping us understand the "why" and "who" of love:

By this shall all men know that ye are

my disciples if ye have LOVE one to another (Jn 13:35). When ye have done it unto one of the LEAST of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me (Matt. 25:40).

A beautiful part of our church family heritage is the expression of love and care that is displayed among the brethren. James 2 is a powerful example of showing the fruit of caring for all, regardless of one's position or current situation. Parents can make an effort to remind their children who share the same Sunday School class with a foster child to go the extra step in reaching out to the new church friend. Saying "good to see you today" and "so glad you are here" go a long way in breaking down walls of uneasiness for someone who is new. When the new child can be invited to sit at their lunch table, or for afternoon service, or maybe over to ride bikes on a Sunday afternoon; these can be some of the purest displays of Christ's love to one in need. The church family in general can be blessed and strengthened when we go out of our way to greet the foster children. How kind it is to also provide a word of encouragement to the foster parents, who may (or may not) have had a pretty trying week. What a testimony of Christ's love when those children return to their original homes and talk about how they loved church because everyone was so nice to them.

Display the power of prayer.

The church family can have the joy (Phil. 1:4) and fervency (James 5:16) in prayer for the child and the family. Foster care responsibilities encompass the additional needs of scheduling with: case workers, court hearings, meetings with biological family, etc. At any moment- any of those scenarios can be very anxious for all involved and the need for them to be blanketed in prayer is immense. What a blessing when members of the congregation take the time to ask foster parents of specific things to pray for.

For those with this type of need, the church family can be a great strength and resource through its display of sensitivity, empathy, love and prayer. May God continue to bless all those involved with this ministry.



The congregation at Elgin, Iowa, is one of our older American congregations (in the Apostolic Christian church). Located in rural northeastern Iowa, it has 44 members and 24 Sunday School students. The 2010 minister's book lists 109 as an average attendance. Yet, it is significant in our early history due to congregants gathering there, having traveled from Sardis, Ohio, down the Ohio River, and up the Mississippi, and settling in the Elgin area.

Fairly detailed information about the early immigrants from Switzerland exists. This is due to the work of a Mr. Gary Butikofer of central Wisconsin, who has a family linkage to the Elgin, Iowa, area, and has provided the Remembering column with many helpful details. Several families are listed, and in subsequent issues the data will be continued.

This is the first in a series of articles based on the Butikofer research.

Elgin, Iowa

I849 Michael Gerber, Sr. (1787-1858) and his wife, Mary (Bertchi) Gerber, and their children — Jacob. Barbara, Elizabeth, Michael, Jr., Peter, Magdalena, and Annie - came from Switzerland in about 1840 and to the Elgin vicinity probably in 1849. At least, it is known for certain that Michael Gerber bought a farm in Clayton County, Iowa, on September 23, 1850. In 1855, Michael, Sr. became a minister in the Apostolic Christian Church. Michael and Mary Gerber, Sr., are buried in the Apostolic Christian Cemetery near Elgin, and so are their children — Elizabeth Baumgartner, Peter Gerber, Magdalena Frieden, and Annie Bohanan.

I851 Jacob Lehman, Sr. (1804-1883) and his first wife, Elizabeth

Baumann, came from Sardis, Ohio, to Elgin, Iowa, probably in 1852 with their five children — Anna Elizabeth, John, Joseph, Mary, and Jacob. The entire family had come from Switzerland to Sardis, Ohio, in 1848. After his first wife died, Jacob married Katharine Braker (1839-1909). He was a deacon in the Elgin Apostolic Christian Church and is buried in that cemetery. His second wife remarried to Jacob Ruegg (1816-1904). Jacob Lehman, Sr. was a brother to John Lehman, Sr. (1806-1893).

Jacob Ruegg (1816-1904) and his first wife, Mary (Guldinger) Ruegg, came from Sardis, Ohio, to Elgin in 1851 with their daughter, Mary. Jacob had come from Switzerland to Sardis, Ohio, in 1848. Jacob became a minister before 1866. After his first wife died, he married Mrs. Jacob Lehman in 1890. He and his wives are buried in the church cemetery near Elgin.

Benedict Frieden (1827-1893) and his first wife, Anna (Baumgartner) Frieden (1829-1870), and their son Fred came to Elgin from Sardis, Ohio, in 1851. Benedict and his wife had originated in Switzerland and arrived in Sardis in 1848. They were married there in 1849. After his first wife died, Benedict Frieden married Mrs. Ben Baumgartner (1835-1886), his sister-in-law. When she died, he married Anna Braker (1835-1923). Benedict and all three of his wives and a number of his children are all buried in the church cemetery.

Benedict Baumgartner (1825-1870) came to Elgin from Sardis, Ohio, in 1851. He also had come from Switzerland in 1848. His first wife was Elizabeth Gerber and his second wife was her sister, Magdalena Gerber (1835-1886). Benedict Baumgartner and his two wives are probably buried in the church

cemetery.

Nicholas Baumgartner (1814-1886) came to Elgin, Iowa, around 1853. He had come from Switzerland. In 1854, he married Elizabeth Yunker (1821-1897), and they are also buried in the Elgin church cemetery.

Note: It was Bro. Nicholas Baumgartner who once walked with Elder Benedict Weyeneth from Elgin, Iowa, to near Roanoke, Illinois, in the dead of winter. On arrival in central Illinois, their boots were nearly frozen to their feet. They had to be cut off, and this was accomplished without injury.

Benedict Rhinehardt (born about 1815) and his wife, Magdalena Feitz, came from Switzerland, too. They moved to Elgin, Iowa, around 1852. The Benedict Rhinehardts were early members of the church at Elgin. Later, they moved to West Bend, Iowa, where they were among the first members.

1852 Benedict Weyeneth (1819-1887) and his wife, Elizabeth (Blunier) Weyeneth, came from Ohio to Elgin in either late 1851 or in 1852. They had just come from Switzerland in 1851. In 1853, this family moved to Peoria, Illinois.

Note: Benedict Weyeneth was the first American Elder of our faith, and was made an Elder in Europe in order to come to America in 1847 to speak to a group of Mennonites in Lewis County, New York, who were experiencing difficulties. After hearing his message of repentance and baptism by immersion, about half of the those Mennonites came into our church.

The Light Of Hope

"Something for Nothing"

We all like bargains. However, if we can get something for nothing, that's better yet! In Ephesians 2:8 and 9 we read, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God." We are all interested in gifts, something we can get for nothing.

Isaiah 55:1 reads, "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money." This sounds very favorable. You don't need to spend any money to quench your thirst.

In Romans 6:23 we read, "The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." It sounds like even eternal life in heaven is something for nothing. But is it?

Luke 14:27 reads, "And whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple." Verse 28 continues, "For which of you, intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first, and counteth the cost, whether he have sufficient to finish it?"

Didn't the Lord Jesus know that salvation is free, something for nothing? He knew all right, He knew that it doesn't cost any money, that we can't do anything to earn it, and that not anything we do adds to the atonement that He would make for us. On the other side of the coin, He knew that it would cost Him His blood and the suffering of being separated from His Father and forsaken by Him. That's no small price to pay.

It is true that we are saved by grace. It doesn't cost any money and we can't barter for it, that is, we can't exchange any of our possessions for it. Nor are we saved by our obedience. Obedience is the outcome or result of true faith.

James writes in 2:22, "Seeth thou how faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect." In verse 24 James writes, "By works a man is justified." By this last statement, he probably means that by our works or obedience to the Word, our faith is made evident. Faith that doesn't produce works may be similar to the faith that the devils have. "The devils also believe, and tremble."

We conclude that our salvation cost Jesus Christ, the Son of God, a great deal, the bearing of the curse of sin, and the shedding of His own blood.

What does our salvation cost us, His followers? If you are going to die the next minute like the thief on the cross, there is nothing to indicate that it costs you anything. But if you are going to continue to live, the Bible says, "Know ye not.....Ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price." I Corinthians 6:19,20. It sounds to me like salvation, indirectly, costs us ourselves.

Romans 12:1 reads, "That ye present your bodies a living sacrifice." That sounds to me like there isn't anything we can do to warrant salvation, and that there isn't anything we can do to add to Christ's atonement for us, but that if we have true faith unto salvation, we lose ourselves and that we no longer are our own.

Luke 9:24 reads, "Whosoever will lose his life for my sake, the same shall save it." Something for nothing? We are advised by the Lord Jesus to lose our lives in order to save our lives, which I believe means, for salvation.

There is another topic which I believe is related to the topic, "Something for Nothing?" That topic is "Desiring More Self-Denial." Human nature is to

desire self-denial as little as possible. Frankly, inherently, we want to do our own thing. But as children of God, we have been recreated or born again. II Corinthians 5:17 reads, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new."

Now if we are new creatures in Christ, we are the opposite of human nature. We have Christ's nature and that, in my opinion, is to desire more self-denial, at least all the self-denial that makes us more in accordance with the teachings of the New Testament. This idea that we are saved by grace so I can and should live like my human nature desires, doesn't quite match the scriptures, in my opinion. Something for nothing is very appealing to human nature and helps to get new converts but I believe that the problem is, it is not according to the New Testament.

Ephesians 2:10 reminds us, "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works." In my opinion, the good works mentioned above does not mean that we don't smoke, get drunk, steal or lie, which is what we like to think. I believe it is that we do something and that that something is to obey the teachings of the New Testament. I also believe that we should be anxious to do anything which might help us to be more dead to self and more spiritual, even if it is not mentioned in the New Testament.

If you believe I am wrong in my thinking, please inform me and give me the Bible verses which show that I am wrong. Something for Nothing? Not in every sense of the word.
