

Sermon by Bro. Jeff Bahler, Wolcott, IN

Genesis 41:1-49 & St. Matthew 8:1-27

It is always a joy when we can gather in God's house and look forward to what He would have for us on a Sunday morning. This morning I took some time to read and meditate a little on God's Word. I staved at a place different from ours. We have livestock but not cattle. As the cattle were outside, I could hear they were bellowing. It encouraged me, as I thought about that. What were those animals after? Why were they bellowing? They wanted to be fed. They were making a plea to their owner to be fed.

It is the same for us today. We were encouraged as we saw your heads bowed in prayer. You made a silent petition that the Lord would speak to each heart and that we also could be fed from God's Word. We covet your prayers. We need those so that His will can be accomplished in each one of our lives and we can be more focused.

The story of Joseph in Genesis 41 is an interesting account. Probably none of us that have not read this at one time. Especially when we were in Sunday School. But as we read about Joseph and Pharaoh and the things that happened thousands of years ago, there are many lessons to be learned from this account. It is amazing how we can see God's hand at work. I am sure He is the same nowadays. Depending on if the world stands and if things were written down, the people would look back and see things that are happening now. Sometimes we wonder about things. I am sure that Joseph did too.

It has been a long time since I actually read through this. Well, I guess it hasn't been that long because I do read through the Bible in a year. I have one of those daily's that does that. But it is al-

ways amazing to me when I read about Joseph. If we think, sometimes, that life gets tough for us and our trials and temptations and struggles are more than we can handle, we can always look around and there is usually someone that is worse. Or if we go back into the Bible, which is the best thing for us to do, we think about the way that Joseph acted and reacted to the way he was treated, it surely is an example for us.

We dove into this kind of right in the middle. I really appreciate the book of Genesis because it is told in story form. I think if you read the whole account of Jacob's sons, Joseph was ill treated by his brothers. He was a favorite of his father (Genesis 37:3). His father loved him and showed special kindness, which we can learn from that too. If we have children, we should try to not show favor because it causes animosity with other siblings or even others that we would associate with.

But Joseph was a favorite of his father. He treated him kindly and it caused problems with his brothers and they wanted to kill him (Genesis 37:4,18). They threw him in a pit for nothing that he did (Genesis 37:23,24). He was taken away to Egypt. In Egypt, he was a slave in Potiphar's house and it didn't dampen his character (Genesis 39:1). He still believed in an almighty God. He did the best. He did the best with what he had to work with.

He was thrown in prison for something that he did not even do. He was accused by Potiphar's wife of things that didn't even happen. (Genesis 39:7-20) So there he was, twice where he was ill treated for things that didn't happen. He shouldn't have got blamed for. Those things can happen to us to-

Principles, Doctrine, Traditions And Rules

A lawyer tempting Jesus asked Him a question, saying, "Master, which is the great commandment in the law? Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind...And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thy self. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets" (Matt. 22:35-40). Jesus later elaborated on these principles with a "new commandment...That ye love one another; as I have loved you..." (John 13:34).

The Lord's Prayer contains less than 70 words. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address is 286 words. The Declaration of Independence is 1322 words. The Constitution was adopted for six very clear, short reasons which can be recited in a matter of a few seconds. Recent legislation (rules) was passed for health care reform that had over 2400 pages and for reform of the banking system that had over 2300 pages, and yet there is much lack of clarity in the meaning and application of these documents. Solomon said "And further by these my son, be admonished: of making many books there is no end; and much study is a weariness of the flesh" (Ecc. 12:12). Jesus condemned "wordy" prayers when he said "...for they think they shall be heard for their much speaking" (Matt. 6:7).

We live in a society that seems to have lost sight of the fundamental principles that form the basis for what is right and what is wrong. There is a trend to replace principles with rules (laws). When rules do not accomplish their purpose, they are supplemented with more rules and with more detail. On the surface this seems to be the thing to do, because it is relatively easy, and it seems that it should enhance compliance. It is correct that simple rules are easy to understand. However, circumstances and patterns of thinking change so rapidly that we cannot possibly adjust the rules fast enough to keep up with all of the rapid advances in technology and many other new developments which impact our daily lives. Often we struggle to know what to do as new challenges and opportunities come our way.

The rapidly changing ideas and attitudes in society are often used to justify behavior that only a few years ago would have been unthinkable. Young people are facing decisions that most of us would never have imagined. Many people are confused. Isaiah and Jeremiah have well described these conditions. "Woe unto them that call good evil, and evil good" (Is. 5:20). "Were they ashamed when they committed abomination? nay, they were not at all ashamed, neither could they blush" (Jer. 6:15). Why is it seemingly so difficult today for many to make good decisions about what is right or wrong?

Some general examples of this loss of focus may give us insight into the problem. Many families have seemingly lost sight of the need for fathers to set a godly example and lead with the love of Christ. Many schools seem to have lost sight of the fundamental principle that the adults are to be in charge, and those in charge must set examples that help students learn to respect authority and high moral standards. Too many elected officials seemingly ignore the concepts of right and wrong, frequently making selfish, often unethical, decisions.

If our society really embraced the fundamental principles of the Bible, people would have more success in correctly discerning new situations, rather than simply making a new or longer list of rules.

Principles are defined as fundamental truths which are timeless and universal. They produce predictable results when we live by them; they are in effect whether we like them or not; they are in effect whether we understand them or not; they are external to us, and once understood, they become self evident and enable us to discern and function in many different situations. Principles are from God. The Word commands us as believers to learn and teach spiritual principles (the oracles of God) and not remain as babes who are poorly equipped to discern good from evil (Heb. 5:12-14).

Doctrine is essentially what is taught. The doctrines of the New Testament are the truths taught by Jesus and the Apostles. The principles of the doctrine of Christ are summarized in several Scriptures (Matt. 22:37-39; John 13:34-35; Heb. 6:1-2). There are also many false doctrines (Rev.2:14). We are instructed to speak

"the things which become sound doctrine" (Tit. 2:1). It is essential that our doctrine be "the doctrine of Christ" (2 John 9) and that we are not "tossed to and fro...by every wind of doctrine" (Eph.4:14) which comes across our path.

Traditions are those practices and customs that are handed down from one generation to another. They are the application of what we learn and know, and may be good or bad. The application of sound biblically-based principles in our lives through good traditions and practices is important in demonstrating our faith in God as lights in the world and as the salt of the earth (Matt. 5:13-16).

Rules are specific directions for how things are to be done. They are generally guidelines or directives designed to control specific behavior. Rules change as society changes; they are quite narrow in scope, and the results are often unpredictable. Many of them are needed in attempting to guide our behavior if we do not live by sound principles.

Rules in and of themselves are neither good nor bad. We need some rules to serve as examples that help give clarity and meaning to principles and doctrine. The younger we are, the more rules we need. As we mature, and begin to understand the principles behind what is right and wrong, we should be able to evaluate new challenges and make wise discernment, rather than to rely upon additional rules for each new situation. When we are converted, we are given grace and the guidance of the Holy Spirit to help us discern, based on a continual growth in understanding of the principles of the doctrine of Christ (John 8:31; 2 Pet. 3:18).

Focusing on principles rather than the specifics of rules will not lead to a broader way, if we follow closely the principles of the Bible, starting with the basic commandments that Jesus emphasized (Matt. 22:37-39; John 13:34-35). If we also remember that Jesus said if we love Him we will keep His commandments (John 14:15), we will find that there is no room for the world in our lives. As our love for the Lord and His Word grows, may we humbly and willingly apply biblically-based principles, doctrine, and traditions in all aspects of our lives.

Our purpose

The mission or purpose of the Apostolic Christian Mission Committee is to present to the lost the Gospel message of salvation based on faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ and a true repentance and conversion. This is to be done in harmony with the nurturing and instructing of the believers in the truths of God's Word and the preserving of sound doctrine by "earnestly contending for the faith," and serving others in humility and love.

The focus of this article is to provide an overview of ways the Mission Committee can help to share and support the Word.

Establishing and aiding new and existing churches

When born-again souls are set free from sin through faith in Jesus Christ, it is essential that they be nourished in faith and doctrine. God has provided the church as the mechanism to edify and nurture spiritual growth and sanctification. One of the primary goals of the Mission Committee is to establish and support viable Apostolic Christian congregations built on the love of Jesus Christ.

Love of Christ: Let the love of Christ be the prime motivation for all mission endeavors and the inspiration for loving and respectful relationships among all who serve. "This is my commandment, that ye love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12); "....in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves" (Phil. 2:3).

Church: Establish and support viable Apostolic Christian Churches as the nucleus of our mission work.

"...the church of the living God (is the) pillar and ground of the truth" (1 Tim. 3:15); "...ye also are builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit." (Eph. 2:19-22) This occurs in concert with the four pillars of the established mission of our church.

This can only be accomplished through obedience to the guiding of the Holy Spirit whereby faithful mature brethren allow themselves to be used in a nurturing role, sometimes on a short-term basis, but other times by being willing to be uprooted by the Lord and sent to a new location far from home. It requires faithful willing brethren to nurture and support these churches with sound teaching built on truth.

Biblical Truth: Teach and practice the whole counsel of God under the direction of the Holy Spirit. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable..." (2 Tim. 3:16-17); "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you..." (Matt. 28:20)

Repentance and Sanctification: Teach that salvation is by grace through faith in Jesus Christ (Eph. 2: 8-10), calling mankind to a Holy Spirit led repentance, born again experience (Matt. 3:6; Acts 3:19) and walk of sanctification. (Tit. 2:11-14)

Sending brethren on specific assignments

As the Lord identifies needs, He prepares brethren with willing hearts to be sent by the church to provide nurturing and oversight to developing young congregations. Sometimes this may be in a long-term ministering role. Other assignments may be service in a short-term role, service on a construction or medical work

team, or just to provide fellowship and encouragement to the local believers.

Preparation: Prepare brethren who are called of the Lord and sent by the Church to share the Gospel message of salvation. "...be ready always to give an answer to every man..." (1 Pet. 3:15); "...sanctified and meet for the master's use and prepared unto every good work." (2 Tim. 2:21)

Providing spiritual oversight Biblical Accountability: Provide mission environments that enable effective support and oversight, fulfilling our accountability to God for the welfare of those being sent and those being served. "...for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account..." (Heb. 13:17); "Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof..." (1 Pet. 5:1-2)

Doctrinal Integrity: Avoid ecumenical intermingling (2 Pet. 2:1-2) and other forms of spiritual deception (Rev. 2:14) in our efforts to preserve sound doctrine. "Holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught..." (Tit. 1:9)

Your part

All believers are called to share the Gospel in some way. "For which I am an ambassador in bonds: that therein I may speak boldly, as I ought to speak." (Ephesians 6:20).

That may be as a loving mother serving in the home, sharing the love of God with her children. It may be in the neighborhood, the workplace or it may be that God is preparing you for service in a country with a different language and culture. The Mission Committee appreciates your interest and support.



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

International Grants

The International Grants Committee, working with Christian relief organizations, coordinates projects in areas of the world not represented by the other World Relief committees. Over the last three years disaster aid has been provided to eight countries. We have also given funding assistance for humanitarian aid projects in ten countries.

Disaster Aid

Working with International Christian Relief organizations enables World Relief to respond within a very short time to disasters around the world.

Zimbabwe 2009 - An outbreak of Cholera affected thousands and World Relief provided funding to ship a cargo container of medical supplies. Philippines 2009 - A tropical storm caused severe damage. Funding was provided to send two cargo containers of disaster supplies worth over \$800,000. **Honduras 2009** – An earthquake caused at least 7 fatalities, 40 injuries and more than 130 collapsed or damaged buildings across northern Honduras. Funding was provided to send disaster supplies to the survivors. Indonesia 2010 - An earthquake caused many deaths and displaced thousands. Funding was sent to ship a cargo container of disaster supplies and to enable the medical team from the Medical Clinic in Telos, (Indonesia), to travel to the affected area. Chile 2010 - An earthquake ripped apart buildings and bridges across Chile, and more than 300 people were killed. A container of beans, emergency mattresses, blankets,

and food boxes was sent. Haiti 2010 – Initial disaster aid for the earthquake-devastated country was sent with the assistance of two of these relief organizations. Pakistan 2010 – In October an earthquake hit Northeastern Pakistan causing much damage. A grant was provided to send disaster supplies to the survivors of the earthquake.

Humanitarian Aid

Africa

Ethiopia – We have been supporting the feeding of school children for many years. The first children in this program have now graduated and have returned to the community as responsible adults. In Ethiopia, World Relief has also funded the construction of two bridges and provided sewing equipment for a girls home. At one location, a cattle breeding program has been started with the goal of increasing the milk output of the local cows. A cow was purchased in support of this program. Kenya – World Relief assisted with two projects: Construction of a school and assistance to an orphanage. Uganda – Help was provided toward the purchase of a farm for a children's home.

Central and South America

Brazil - A program has been started in Brazil to train women in skills to enable them to better support their families. Funding was sent to assist with the purchase of sewing and cooking equipment. This location also has a day care center for the children and resources were sent to purchase tables and chairs. Haiti – Funding was provided to assist with the expenses of converting a warehouse into a school.

Nicaragua - Approximately 150 families are supported by scavenging in the city dump for material to recycle. Their primitive homes needed better roofing materials, and the workers needed protective clothing for working in the dump. World Relief sent funding to assist with the purchase of building materials and the protective clothing.

Asia

Cambodia – A grant was given to enable the drilling of two water wells. Indonesia – Funding is provided on a continuing basis to support the Mobile Medical Clinic in the Telos Islands. The staff of the hospital provides care for over 30,000 persons in villages scattered over many islands. In addition to medical care, they are also giving training on community health and disease prevention.

Europe

Romania – White canes have been provided for students at a school for the blind. Also in Romania, World Relief provided assistance with the construction of a home for teenage orphans and for the development of a summer camp for children. Ukraine – Here also, a grant was provided to assist with the construction and furnishing of a home for teenage orphans.

Our focus is on improving the lives of families in distress around the world. Many of our projects are directed toward children... the hope of their families and communities. It is our prayer that the Lord will continue to bless these projects and that these children will become adults with a desire to serve the Lord through Jesus Christ.

I find that people often tend to glamorize or over-spiritualize my job. While I appreciate the admiration from others, comments that make me seem like a saint to work with children in the foster care system usually just make me feel inadequate for the

task at hand. It's been said to me that it takes a "special" person for working day in and day out with troubled children. Honestly, I don't feel special. I get lost in the grind; the paperwork, checking home visits off my list for the month, enduring the frustrating two-hour wait for a five minute court hearing or trying not to yell at the teenager who has once again stolen from the only family that has shown him love. More often than not, it just feels like a job. Sure, the emotional heaviness and cruel situations children come from can wear on me after awhile, but at the same time God seems to have gifted me with the ability to let things go and emotionally release work situations when I need to.

When I reflect on the above statement, two things come to mind. The first is that when we are weak, He can be strong for us, which Paul talks about in 2 Corinthians 12. In fact. throughout both letters to the Corinthians you will find the common thread of our weakness and Christ's strength. It's good for me to be reminded that, of myself, I am not adequate to be involved in such sensitive life situations, but only by grace and strength from the Spirit can I do my job and somehow serve God and other people. I've come to realize that in any aspect of life, admitting how weak I am is the best way to open it up for God to take His rightful place over my humanness.

The second thing that comes to mind is how God makes us all so uniquely different so that we can serve in ways others cannot. He equips us perfectly so work that looks daunting to some comes easily to others. It's hard to fathom how God can know us each so well that He is able place us in situations that, by His grace, we can handle. I'm so encouraged to know that, in areas where I am not capable of serving, God has

gifted someone else for that purpose. So whether you are saving lives in a hospital, caring for troubled children, or doing people's taxes, God gifted you specifically to glorify Him in that area. Coming from a relationship-driven social worker, I'm very thankful for people who can do my taxes and prescribe my antibiotics. And, of course, our gifted prayer warriors will always be the sustaining factor here at Gateway Woods, both in the Foster Care Department and campus-wide!

day. At least for me, sometimes if that happens, my first reaction would be to lash out and tell my side of the story. Maybe Joseph did and he just wasn't listened to.

Even when he was in prison he became head over the other prisoners. My thought, as we have gone into prisons before, we look in America, our jails and prisons sometimes are almost better than what some of the people have that live law abiding lives. But in those times, I can't imagine that it could have been very pleasant to be in prison.

But while he was in prison, God spoke to his heart again. There was the baker and the butler that had dreams. God gave him the wisdom to interpret those dreams. (Genesis 40:8-19) One of the things he said, speaking expressly to the butler, was, when he got out, that he would remember him (Genesis 40:14). If I am not mistaken, it went two years. That is a long time to still be in prison. To not even be remembered for a good deed that he did.

As we think about that, God's hand was in all of this. He is nowadays, too. Working behind the scenes and making things go the way that He wants them to. As I was reading this and thinking about it, these actions and the things that took place here, it took several years for this to take place. As we read there, when he finally did become the ruler, the second in power, he was thirty years old (Genesis 41:46). It doesn't seem very old to me now. At one time I would have thought it was. But if I am not mistaken, he spent roughly ten to twelve years in imprisonment or being ill treated. In today's technically advanced society - that is what we like to call it I guess, I don't know exactly what heaven is going to be like but I am sure that it is well beyond anything that we can imagine here but we want things now, don't we? We might have to, but we wouldn't want to have to wait like Joseph did to receive the blessings that he did.

Then if we would go on and read the rest of the account, Joseph would have had good reason to take it out on his brothers, wouldn't he? It was because of them that he went through these many years of struggles and trials. He got through all that. Then came the time when they fell down on their knees before him (Genesis 42:6) and he forgave them (Genesis 45:1-8). Makes me think, you and I and especially me, we are not any better than those brothers. We deserved the worse. Our Savior forgave us! If we come to Him with a humble and repentant heart and ask for forgiveness, even though we don't deserve it, He is willing to give it. He gave His life so that we could have this hope.

Another point here that I found interesting, when the time came that the butler finally did remember him and he got Joseph out of the prison, it says that he hastily brought him out. When Pharaoh told him, you have the ability to do this, who did he give the credit to? He said, it is not me. It is God that will give you this peace, that will tell you what you need to know. (Genesis 41:16) We need to realize that too. In our struggles, in our temptations, whatever they are, if we will earnestly in prayer come before the throne of God, ask Him to guide us and direct us, maybe it won't take ten or twelve years as it did for Joseph. But He will answer our prayer and He will guide us and direct us. But we do need to humbly come before Him with a contrite heart and spirit.

The Gospels are a great source of comfort, as we read through them, and we read about the life of our Savior and the example that He set. In St. Matthew here, it says

that when He was come down from the mountain, great multitudes followed Him (v.1). My first thought was, why was it most of the time Jesus went up in the mountain? It was to pray. To seek guidance and direction. Even sometimes I wonder about that. Jesus was here. He was part of the Trinity, the Son. But yet while He was here, He had a physical body like you and I. He had physical cares. He again set the example for us, even as we talked about in the Old Testament, that when He needed direction. He went to the Father and sought direction.

"And, behold, there came a leper and worshipped him, saying, Lord, if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean. And Jesus put forth his hand, and touched him, saying, I will; be thou clean..." v.2,3. In two of the accounts that we read here, the people that were needing to be cleansed had the faith, didn't they? They had the faith to believe that Jesus could do it. Because he said, Lord if thou wilt, thou can make me clean. He believed! 'You can do it if you want to. I believe that you can do it.' Jesus took advantage of that and made him clean. The second part of that He says, "...See thou tell no man; but go thy way, shew thyself to the priest, and offer the gift that Moses commanded, for a testimony unto them." v.4. As we think about that, there are several other instances when Jesus told them not to tell any man. Some of that is because the crowds would throng Him and He would barely even have enough room to move about and go about spreading the Gospel message. But, as I read that, I thought, how hard it would have been for that cleansed man not to go about spreading the good news that he had been cleansed. How happy he would have been. I am not exactly sure what He meant other than that Jesus wanted him to do what he needed to do before

he did that. It says, shew thyself to the priest and offer the gift that Moses commanded. So, go do that first. Go do what the law has said you are supposed to do if you are a cleansed leper, for a testimony. That was the testimony that he was supposed to give. Then they could see that he was clean.

As I think about that even, what kind of a testimony are we giving day in and day out? We think of a testimony in our faith, when we bring our testimony to the church, we share what God has done for us. Everyone that is listening is really encouraged to hear that because we want to know. We want to know what God has done in the life of that believer. It's always amazing to us. Each of us would have a different testimony. Each of us peculiar in its own way. It is always amazing how God has worked in different people's lives and He does it in different ways. But this is what this man was supposed to do. Go to the priest and offer the gift and that would be his testimony. I am sure that after he did that, he also spread the word that Jesus Christ had healed him. That would have been something that would have been very hard to hold back.

"And when Jesus was entered into Capernaum, there came unto him a centurion, beseeching him, And saying, Lord, my servant lieth at home sick of the palsy, grievously tormented. And Jesus saith unto him, I will come and heal him." v.5-7. It says he was a centurion so he was not an Israelite. He was with the Roman government that was in control. We know that Jesus came to the lost house of Israel. But He also had compassion on anyone that believed on Him. I find it interesting that this centurion believed. Obviously he had, in some way, shape or form heard about Jesus and knew what was going on. But Jesus said, I will come and heal him.

But, "The centurion answered and said, Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only. and my servant shall be healed. For I am a man under authority, having soldiers under me: and I say to this man, Go, and he goeth; and to another, Come, and he cometh; and to my servant, Do this, and he doeth it." v.8,9. He knew how to organize. He was a leader. He had people under him and he was used to giving orders. He was going to, at this time, take orders from the Master. He knew the Lord could do it. He didn't know how He would do it but he knew the Lord could do it.

It says, "When Jesus heard it, he marveled..." v.10. There weren't very many times that Jesus marveled with what the humans did. Jesus said unto them that followed him, "...Verily I say unto you, I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel." v.10.

Then He goes on to tell them a little what heaven is going to be like. "And I say unto you, That many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, in the kingdom of heaven." v.11. How many times have we heard that. Abraham, Isaac and Jacob? Patriarchs of old. Basically who all the descendants of Israel came from. As we read that, we are confidant in our minds that Abraham, Isaac and Jacob are going to be in the kingdom of heaven. Doesn't that make you and I want to be there too? It says there will be those from the east and the west to sit down with Abraham. So it is not just going to be the Israelites. Here He was talking about this Roman centurion that was not part of the Israelite country or the lineage. But he had faith and that is what it took. That is what we need, each one of us. We need that faith. That believing without seeing. One day we won't need faith, will we? Because we will be able to see it.

"But the children of the kingdom shall be cast out into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." v.12. You and I both know that there is going to be two destinations. There is no inbetween. In this world we are living in, sometimes the white and black get mixed together and become a gray. Sometimes we don't know exactly what decisions we should be making. But this we are for sure of. There is a heaven and a hell.

In another place it tells us about the glories of heaven. Eye hath not seen neither ear heard or even been comprehended in man's mind what heaven is going to be like for the glories thereof (I Corinthians 2:9). Yet Jesus was willing to leave that and come here for thirty three years, walk the dusty paths of Galilee. We read about the things that Joseph put up with for ten or twelve years, however many it was. Jesus did it intensely for three years. But you and I don't have an idea how intense that was and the power that He had. We are limited in the powers and capacities we have. But Jesus had the power, anytime anybody would have been critical of Him or things didn't go His way, the way He would have liked it to. He could have destroyed them. Called down legions of angels.

There was a time when one of the cities Jesus was in didn't receive the message. The disciples said, shall we call down fire from heaven? He said, no, I did not come to destroy. I came to save. (St. Luke 9:54-56) That's what He came for. When He comes the second time, then it is to destroy and save those that are going to be counted worthy.

But it tells us here just a little bit about what hell is going to be like. It says, the children of the Sermon continued from page 41

kingdom shall be cast out into outer darkness. I don't know if vou have ever been in a place where it has been total darkness. It is pretty eerie. It has been several years ago now, but we were visiting a cave. It had artificial lighting. Once you get down inside the earth where there is no light from above and they turned out the lights, it gets to the point where you can hold your hand right in front of your face and you can't see it. That is what I think of when I think of outer darkness, where there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

We think, in this life, sometimes we become sorrowful. Loved ones are taken sometimes at a time that we feel like is out of character or wish that they could still be around. Or because we think back of the memories we had and it makes us sorrowful. But the weeping I am thinking about here will be a sorrow for the opportunity that was lost by not surrendering. Especially if we have known for years and years and did not do it. But then the gnashing of teeth. For a long time I thought that was someone biting on you. I thought, that doesn't make sense. Then I actually looked it up. It is the gritting of the teeth. The torment! There are times when we, for a

short period of time, can have some agony. But can you imagine having that for eternity? Time without end? To be in outer darkness, weeping in total agony for eternity when the opportunity is there to live in a place that our minds can't imagine. Eye hath not seen nor ear heard the glories of heaven! It is kind of a no brainer, isn't it? Why wouldn't we make that choice now while we still have the opportunity?

"And Jesus said unto the centurion, Go thy way; and as thou hast believed, so be it done unto thee. And his servant was healed in the selfsame hour." St. Matthew 8:13. Most of the accounts we read this morning were of Jesus healing. It said He healed Peter's mother-in-law (v.15). What I found interesting about that was here she was sick in bed. Couldn't even get up. Then when He healed her, she ministered unto them. That was quite a healing, wasn't it!

"Now when Jesus saw great multitudes about him, he gave commandment to depart unto the other side. And a certain scribe came, and said unto him, Master, I will follow thee whithersoever thou goest. And Jesus saith unto him, The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head." v.18-20. This is the Son

of God who came from heaven. While He lived here on earth. while He was traveling around - I am sure as a child He lived with Mary and Joseph - but when he was about traveling. He didn't have a house. As far as material possessions, sometimes we can get caught up in our material possessions and put too much value on them. They are all going to stay here. What is it we are going to take with us? What is it we are going to take with us? That is what we need to be preparing. We need to be preparing for the home to come, not for the one that is here. "And another of his disciples said

unto him. Lord, suffer me first to go and bury my father. But Jesus said unto him, Follow me; and let the dead bury their dead." v.21,22. That isn't hardly possible, is it? But we understand the thought process. Let the things of this life lay. Because this is where they are going to stay. They are going to burn! Everything here is going to burn with a fervent heat! Why would we want to be a part of that? Wouldn't we want to be a part of that everlasting kingdom that is going to be forever and ever, to be with our Savior who suffered and died and gives us the hope we have today of eternal life?

Teamwork

We cannot begin to completely cover the concept of teamwork in one short article. However, we do want to explore the biblical precepts around teamwork principles. In short, teamwork is the joint action of a group in which each person subordinates his or her individual interests and opinions to the unity and efficiency of the group or team. In other words, the cause of the group is deemed more important than the cause of each individual participant or group member. As long as each person within the group is yielding their personal agenda to the main cause, the team will function well. When that ceases to be true and self-interest begins to dominate, the team will experience dysfunction.

There are literally countless instances where teamwork is necessary to accomplish specific goals. Those instances run the gamut from children on a playground to astronauts in space and everything else in between. Teamwork is also necessary in the body of believers for it to function properly and be a glory to God. The serving and promoting of self are not welcome elements of successful teams and this is certainly no different within the church body.

The Bible is full of examples and exhortations for us to be fully engaged in working together for the betterment of the whole and to the glory of God. We are reminded of some of the functions of a team and why teamwork is more successful in accomplishing certain goals than individual efforts. If one team member falters, another can lift him or her up. If one member of the team is threatened, others can come to the rescue. We are even reminded that more heat is generated by two than one alone.

Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 "Two are better than one; because they have a good reward for their labour. ¹⁰For if they fall, the one will lift up his fellow: but woe to him that is alone when he falleth; for he hath not another to help him up. ¹¹Again, if two lie together, then they have heat: but how can one be warm alone? ¹²And if one prevail against him, two shall withstand him; and a threefold cord is not

quickly broken."

Members of a team can keep each other accountable and help one another to stay focused and on task.

Proverbs 27:17 "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend."

Team members are to help each other toward a common goal and be supportive of the work of others rather than striving to fulfill their own personal objectives.

3 John 1:5-8 "Beloved, thou doest faithfully whatsoever thou doest to the brethren, and to strangers; ⁶Which have borne witness of thy charity before the church: whom if thou bring forward on their journey after a godly sort, thou shalt do well: ⁷Because that for his name's sake they went forth, taking nothing of the Gentiles. ⁸We therefore ought to receive such, that we might be fellowhelpers to the truth."

The Bible is very clear that each member of the team, namely the church, is endowed with talents and gifts specific to the individual and that the church can function effectively only when each one is encouraged to use those talents to their fullest potential.

Romans 12:4-8 "For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office: "So we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another. "Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to the proportion of faith; "Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering: or he that teacheth, on teaching; "Or he that exhorteth, on exhortation: he that giveth, let him do it with simplicity; he that ruleth, with diligence; he that showeth mercy, with cheerfulness."

The effectiveness of a team is hampered by strife and division within the ranks. Progress towards a common goal is compromised when individual agendas are promoted and team members start taking sides.

Romans 15:5-6 "Now the God of patience and consolation grant you to be likeminded one toward another according to Christ Jesus: ⁶That ye may with one mind and one mouth glorify God, even the

Father of our Lord Jesus Christ."

1 Corinthians 1:10 "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

Sharing duties and commendation are both necessary in effective teams. No individual should have to carry more than his or her share of the load and, likewise, no one person should receive special credit or accolades.

Hebrews 13:16 "But to do good and to communicate [share, distribute] forget not: for with such sacrifices God is well pleased."

1Corinthians 12:36 "And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it; or one member be honoured, all the members rejoice with it."

Perhaps one of the most striking examples of team unity and effectiveness is within the Godhead Itself. The Bible clearly shows us that our God is a triune God with three distinct persons within one Deity; God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, each with distinct functions and attributes but with a common goal and purpose. God is unified in every way, bound together in perfect love where there is no room for disharmony.

John 16:7 "Nevertheless I tell you the truth; It is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you; but if I depart, I will send him unto you."

John 17:20-23 "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; ²¹That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me. ²²And the glory which thou gavest me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one: ²³I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved me."



This begins a series of history comments by Elder Noah Schrock of Oakville, Iowa. Excerpts are taken from a talk given at Phoenix, Arizona, several decades ago. Very likely it was unprepared and given at the instigation of Elder Roy Farney of the Phoenix congregation. This might have been given after a singing, or after a worship service. At any rate, at the time it was given and soon typed up, it was one of the few, if any, accounts of our faith other than the book by Herman Reugger of Switzerland, who wrote Apostolic Christian Church History, Volume I.

Europe

We'll have to go back to the fruitful years of Bro. Samuel Froehlich, who baptized my grandfather. He told me of Bro. Froehlich and what kind of looking man he was, which I cherish, of those memories that my grandparents have conveyed to me. He was a very small man, very frail. He had command of the French language, and of the German language.

He started out in his work, as you know, attending seminary, and was awakened during that time, and found a need of a rebirth which he could not find in the existing (state) church in Switzerland. However, it was never his intention to begin a new movement. He felt he could bring his new-found experience into the current Swiss State Church. But he soon found out that they would not hear him. He then had to labor outside the tabernacle or church.

He went to England and spent some time with the Continental Society of England and evidently could acquire some proficiency in the English language. He asked them for permission to preach his new-found faith along the Rhine River to the people who lived in Switzerland and Germany. So then he was on his own. He was totally cut off from the State Church and their support.

#### **America**

Over in the United States in northern New York there was a group of French people — Mennonites — and they were having difficulty and they were disappointed in the quality of their church and it had become worldly (a social thing). One of the men who was of Froehlich's church was excommunicated in Europe and he came to northern New York because he spoke the French language. He was working as a hired man for some of the Virklers up there, and during some evenings he would hear these old Mennonite people complaining and lamenting of the unfruitfulness of their church.

He told them this: "I know a people in Switzerland and I believe if they would send somebody over here, that that would help you again come into a true faith." So they looked to Froehlich (wrote to him), and he sent Bro. Benedict Weyeneth to this country. He is the grandfather of Mike Weyeneth in Peoria. He came to northern New York and preached to those people and spent some time there, perhaps a year or so, I'm not positive. He established a church at Croghan and ordained Joseph Virkler as Elder. Joseph Virkler was filled with great zeal to convey this new-found faith — this new birth — to the professing believers in the Mennonite church.

So he (Elder Bro. Joseph Virkler) came to Fairbury, Illinois, and there he met up with an old gentleman. We called him Uncle John Zimmerman. I knew this old man in my boyhood days. He didn't preach at that time. He visited people in their homes and made his observations and drew his conclusions as to where there might be an interest (in our faith). So this John Zimmerman was somewhat taken in with this man, Virkler. He said, "Say, I have a brother, Mike, and he lives down along the Mackinaw River which is my old home. Let's go visit Mike."

On arriving, Mike Zimmerman said, "I suppose you picked up some tramp and brought him down here." That is the reception this man of God (Bro. Virkler) got in my area. Nevertheless, he lingered around in that area (near Congerville, Illinois).

My grandfather and grandmother were just married. Bro. Virkler went on to visit these old Mennonite cronies — relatives.

He wasn't too active. I don't think he preached, but he did make some contacts in the homes, evidently.

My grandmother told me this herself, so I am speaking with some authority. They were having a wedding supper in their honor, south of what is now Deer Creek, Illinois. Virkler was there, among others. They had a wedding supper and he didn't say much, a quiet man. After the mealtime, they cleared the table and brought out the dominos, a parlor game we are all familiar with

But, no doubt, in Virkler's mind, this was a sort of rising up from the meal and beginning to play, like Israel did, which God did not approve of. Grandfather and Grandmother were in the domino game, at least Grandfather was. One of the players said, "Virkler, come on and join us." He said, "That's not for me." And it was that statement that he made and his reluctance to join this domino game, that kindled the flame in my Grandmother's mind.

I often say, that the first sermon any one of our brethren ever preached was only five words at a domino game, "That's not for me." I don't believe that this Bro. Virkler ever knew that his reluctance to join in that domino game produced what it did. I don't think he ever knew it. Only eternity will some day reveal what he did (know of it).

Anyway, when they went home that night, my Grandmother said to my Grandfather, "I'd like to know what caused him to be reluctant to join in the domino game. He must have something more important. He must have something that has replaced this thing (domino game)." I don't think she ever spoke to him, but she pondered this thing in her heart. She became uneasy, whether she had everything there was to have (spiritually), ...what God wants to give to people. She came to the conclusion there must be something else that she doesn't have. (Note: she repented, and became a member in our church).

## The Light Of Hope

"Love Everybody"

I have said that I love everybody. Do you think it is a good idea to love everybody? Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." John 13:35

It appears to me that the Lord Jesus is telling us that love is to be the trademark by which God's children are to be known. Then surely we should follow the golden rule in dealing with each other. It reads, "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets." Matthew 7:12.

In I Corinthians chapter 13, much is written about charity which is also translated, "love." Verse 2 reads, "And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing." Paul appears to be ranking love or charity above understanding and faith. In a sense, to have faith in Christ and what He has done for us and not to love Him and want to obey Him, is incomprehensible. Maybe we should emphasize love more.

Christ was stern with the Scribes and Pharisees but He loved them enough to die for them. Romans 5:6 tells us, "In due time Christ died for the ungodly." Apart from Christ we are all considered to be ungodly. It is only by Christ's atonement that we are made to be saints.

It is comparatively easy to love those who agree with us Should we love those who do not agree with us about doctrine and life-style? Yes, I believe we must put forth effort to love those even more than those who agree with us so that by our love we may persuade them to think more like we think. To love in that way is against human nature but isn't everything about living in accordance with God's Word against human nature? Human nature says, "Me first," God's Word says, "Me last."

What about the drug addict, the alcoholic, etc.? Are we to love them, too? Surely they are in need of love. It is my understanding that some people are not capable of receiving love. Isn't that a sorry state to be in? Those are the very people who need love so badly. May our great God just somehow fill our hearts with love for everybody, and especially with love for the unlovable. Perhaps we have been lax in having love and sharing love by the way we treat each other.

There is a danger of being deceived, and of being taken advantage of, if we are very loving and associate with evil people. We should not permit them to influence us or to cheat us out of money, but we should endeavor to influence them because we love them.

The argument can be made that we should not love evil people but at least we should feel sorry for them. That is a form of love. Criticism alone doesn't do much good.

I have the feeling that many children and adults have never been told that they are loved. To all them I say, "I love you." If we don't love them, how will they understand or believe that God loves them?

In Deuteronomy 10:19 we read,

"Love ye therefore the stranger: for ye were strangers in the land of Egypt." We are exhorted to love the stranger, someone that we do not know. Stranger is also translated foreigner. In Japan we were required to carry a foreigner's registration card.

In Hebrews 13:2 we read, "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers; for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." This refers to Abraham entertaining two men who turned out to be angels. Maybe a stranger to us is an angel. Let's love everybody and show our love by the way we speak to them. If they are wrong they are more apt to correct their ways if they feel they are loved. Jesus drove the money changers out of the temple and upset their tables but that must have been a situation where a gentle and loving approach would have been to no avail. Maybe some times our love must be very firm against evil but even stern action should be accompanied with love, which I believe it was in the case of what Christ did in cleansing the temple which was to be the house of prayer.

Surely it is good to have a lot of emphasis on love. God's Word does. As a young church leader in Japan I was instructed that love alone is not enough, you have to keep discipline and good order. This is true but love is an important part of keeping discipline and good order. In the church it is love, accompanied by exhortations and admonishments, that is so very important. Our prayer is for more love, more self-discipline, and better order. Let's love everybody.
