Sermon by Bro. Dan Koch, Tremont, IL

Psalm 22 and St. John 19

We would like to greet each one of you and we certainly welcome everyone. We have our home congregation in good attendance and visitors. We welcome you all.

When we come to Good Friday services, there are so many places in God's Word where we can turn. So many places in the Scriptures where we read of Christ and His coming. In the Old Testament, beginning at Genesis and all the way through to Revelations, we read of Christ. Loved ones, I had a Scripture in mind to read, but I have opened up to the Book of Psalms and I am going to remain with that book. Let's turn to Psalm 22. It is a foretaste of what Christ was feeling. As we read this, let's think, we all know the Good Friday story fairly well. Let's think how closely this aligns. We think of the Psalmist of old. David is in the heading here in this Bible. It says, 'This is a Psalm of David'. Think how these words were revealed to him and how God spoke to him and of his Lord and his Savior's suffering.

The hymnal has fallen open to #171 in the Zion's Harp, 'The Cross'. Jesus had His cross and this cross in this hymn speaks somewhat of our cross, loved ones. As we sing it, let's have prayerful hearts and think of our Lord and Savior and what He did for us and what we perhaps can do for Him in a small way.

Chapter 19 in St. John is right after Peter's denial and Jesus' trial before Pilate. This is the end of His trial. We think about the souls that were involved in Jesus' death. We think of Pilate and we think of the Jews and the leaders of the Jews. We think of how they all conspired and worked together. They all did their part and they brought about the death of the Son of God, the very Son of God.

It is easy for us to look upon them and maybe look down upon them a little bit, loved ones. We think of Pi-

late. We might think he was a weak man and he gave in too easily. It was political. He was worried about what Caesar would think. He was worried about his own life, power and prestige, his own position. The Jewish people, we could look down upon them. But loved ones, it was you and I just as much as them that drove Him to that cross. He went there for our sins even though we were not yet born. But He looked down through time.

We could turn back one chapter or two to Christ's intercessory prayer in chapter 17. He says, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word;" v.20. That's us. That's you and I. He prayed for us, loved ones, each and every one of us. He did this because He loved us and because of our sins that He knew we were going to commit.

"Then Pilate therefore took Jesus, and scourged him." St. John 19:1. We've read and we've heard how that scourging was not just a light thing. That was a severe beating, where they would take the man's shirt off and take those leather thongs. Sometimes they would tie bits of sharp pieces of bone or whatever it might be and they would use those and whip a person until the blood flowed.

They put that crown upon His head, that crown of thorns. "And the soldiers platted a crown of thorns, and put it on his head, and they put on him a purple robe," v.2 and made fun of Him. They smote Him with their hands (v.3). In the other gospels, we can read that they blindfolded Him and said, prophesy, Lord. Who is it that smote thee? And they spit upon Him. (St. Matthew 26:67,68) Many things that they did to Him and He endured all this.

These things were prophesied of old. We can read in Isaiah where it was prophesied that He would be

Guarding The Heart

Writings based on God's Word

"Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life" (Prov. 4:23). Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matt. 6:21). The Apostle Paul exhorted Timothy: "...keep thyself pure" (1 Tim. 5:22). How well we guard our hearts will affect every aspect of our lives, including our faithfulness to God and our example to others.

Unfortunately we are afflicted with a universal heart condition which will lead to our eternal destruction unless the remedies in God's Word are applied. Long ago God lamented that "the imagination of man's heart is evil from his youth" (Gen. 8:21). Jesus said, "For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts..." and countless other sins (Mark 7:21). James asked this sobering question of believers: "From whence come wars and fightings among you? Come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members?" (Jam. 4:1).

The purpose of this article is to address the serious challenge faced by every believer in guarding his heart from evil.

Jesus gave mankind a message of hope in His Sermon on the Mount when he said: "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God" (Matt. 5:8). The only way that man's heart can become pure in the sight of God is through rebirth, by faith in Jesus Christ and repentance. (John 3:3; Acts 20:21) This purity comes forth from a sanctified heart—one set apart for and belonging to God; cleansed from sin by ongoing faith in the shed blood of Christ, the Holy Spirit and God's Word. (Acts 26:18; Heb. 13:12; Rom. 15:16; John 17:17)

We can learn much from the many examples in the Bible of individuals who either did or did not guard their hearts from evil influences by utilizing the many resources offered by our Heavenly Father.

Eve looked past all of the beautiful provisions God had given to her and Adam in the Garden of Eden and gave in to the pride in her heart and the desires of her eyes, reaching out and taking the forbidden fruit (Gen. 3:1-6). When we drop our guard, we also may wander carelessly toward temptation, making "provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts thereof" (Rom. 13:14). In contrast, Dan-

iel established a powerful safeguard when he "...purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself..." (Dan. 1:8). He made a firm choice with deep conviction in his heart, and then he was able to draw fully upon God's help as the temptations grew in severity. As believers, we are offered a wonderful promise with regard to the nature and severity of the temptations we may encounter throughout life. "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ve are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that we may be able to bear it" (1 Cor. 10:13). This verse should be memorized as a part of our armor against the Devil (Eph. 6:11). However, just like Eve. Daniel and others, it is our choice as to whether we take the "wav

Perhaps one of our greatest dangers is to think that we are not vulnerable to yielding to certain temptations. The verse immediately preceding God's promise regarding temptation issues a sober warning: "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall" (1 Cor. 10:12). The Apostle Paul saw the need to take strong measures to keep his flesh under subjection, so that his witness and ministry would not be destroyed: as he put it, "...lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway" (1 Cor. 9:27).

Job stated that he had made a covenant with his eyes—which was really a vow to guard his heart and mind. (Job 31:1) Likewise, we should resolve to resist every form of evil influence which we might face. This includes sensual images and other inappropriate materials on the Internet and other media, the attraction to excess offered by the appeals of marketing, unhealthy relationships with work associates, friends or brethren, addiction to pleasure and fashion, as well as warping our minds and wasting our time with unwholesome and unedifying entertainments. The biblically-based exhortations and warnings of our church leaders as well as the guidance provided by many of our traditions provide powerful deterrents, which we, like Daniel, can by God's grace utilize to resist temptation in all its forms. We will face the consequences of whether or not we heed this

good counsel. Proverbs 1:30-31 declares the results of ignoring counsel and despising reproof: "...they shall eat of the fruit of their own way, and be filled with their own devices."

The consequences of sin are indeed bitter fruit. Sin brings the burden of guilt and takes away our peace and joy; it often causes others to suffer and it always grieves the heart of Jesus. Ongoing sin that is not dealt with biblically will lead to hardening of the heart, with great risk of a return to "living in sin" and the possibility of renouncing one's faith and subsequent loss of salvation (Heb. 10:26-29).

The Word of God is the best weapon for guarding our hearts. "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee." (Ps. 119:11) We are fortified with the assurance that "the Lord knoweth how to deliver the godly out of temptation..." (2 Pet. 2:9). Jesus gave us wise instruction when He exhorted, "Pray that ye enter not into temptation" (Luke 22:40). This very thought brings a sense of caution with regard to which influences, associations and environments we willfully allow ourselves to encounter.

By God's grace, and in light of the sacrifice of our loving Saviour (1 Cor. 6:20), let us shield our hearts against harmful influences with the timeless truths of His Word. Let us humbly examine our hearts daily for any impurities. Let us be especially watchful in those areas of known weakness, where we, like Eve, can be easily attracted to forbidden fruit. Having a sound, mature fellow believer to whom we are fully accountable is also a powerful deterrent to yielding to temptation.

Finally, let us never forget that all sin begins with a thought (the imaginations of the heart). Thankfully, the powers of Heaven are at our disposal in this war: "Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ" (2 Cor. 10:5). In guarding our precious hearts, may we all reaffirm this beautiful commitment of the Psalmist of old: "I have inclined mine heart to perform thy statutes always, even unto the end" (Ps. 119:12).

Small Church Support Committee

Over half of our churches have less than 65 members and most of these churches consider themselves "small" and have a great desire to grow. Did you know that of the 96 current Apostolic Christian Churches 24 of them require assistance from the brotherhood to function on a weekly basis (primarily ministry support)?

Many brethren in small churches are fulfilling multiple roles in the church to keep weekly services going. They pray for others to come alongside them. In addition, brethren in small churches have a desire to provide their children, singles and families with more frequent fellowship opportunities. Given the above needs, we are seeking your prayers and active service with smaller churches.

Opportunities to help

The purpose of this article is to help motivate brethren to support small churches by visiting, praying for, moving to, or providing assistance in a variety of other ways. The need for additional fellowship can perhaps best be met by brethren visiting those in small churches, or relocating if the Spirit leads.

Brethren can pray that the needs of brethren in small churches are met, the gospel message furthered and their role in assisting in these efforts would be clarified and activated.

As the brotherhood further engages in the many opportunities within small churches, congregations can become self-sufficient in reaching out to the lost in their area and the giving individuals will reap the blessing of serving. Each of us are

encouraged to examine ourselves and see what God's message is to us, individually, regarding this work. (IICor 8:4, Acts 20:35)

Recent efforts to assist small churches

In August 2004 the Mission Committee created the Small Church Study Committee to study the unique needs of small churches and recommend steps by which our brotherhood can nurture and be of assistance. A biblical study of churches supporting other churches and brotherhood responsibilities was completed. Elder, church, and individual surveys generated 450 responses for analysis in early 2005. The broad response provided insights into many opportunities within our small congregations.

A first year plan was developed and presented to a gathering at the Goodfield Conference in 2006. Two recommendations for small churches included engaging in formal outreach programs and encouraging increased local activities and fellowship opportunities. Recommendations for large churches to assist small churches included formalizing church adoption programs, the sending of Spirit-led brothers/ sisters to smaller U.S. churches and raising awareness of the needs of small congregations. By invitation, the SCSC traveled to various congregations to help them with understanding and implementing efforts locally.

More recently, names of Apostolic Christian friends living near small congregations were gathered and distributed to small churches, a centralized minister rotation was developed to balance the load and facilitate the needs of both small

and large congregation's requests, and opportunity coordinators were established in each small church to facilitate the posting of available jobs on the Mission Committee website, www.acmission.org/small-church-job-opportunities.

Current efforts of the Small Church Support Committee

As the purpose of the committee shifted from the studying of the small church needs, to supporting their needs, the group was renamed the Small Church Support Committee. Current forms of support include: church adoption pairings are being facilitated, additional communication to the brotherhood of the needs of small congregations, and development of a series of Bible studies regarding the Biblical model of establishing churches as well as the role of both individuals and congregations in the Word.

Currently ministry rotation support is the most active way small churches are supported by the brotherhood. The SCSC is exploring other ways the brotherhood can provide additional support of small churches both in fellowship and in service. "And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works. Hebrews 10:24-25

We are open to ideas encouraging the bond of love and Christian unity of our fellowship and assisting smaller congregations to promote the gospel in their communities. It is our desire that our small churches could enjoy the growth that our churches experienced a number of years ago. Opportunities to Serve in the Caribbean

Over a period of nearly 60 years, World Relief, the humanitarian outreach arm of the Apostolic Christian Church, has felt led by the Holy Spirit to to provide aid in the Caribbean. Starting with crates of material aid heading for Jamaica and a DC-9 airplane full of cows lifting off toward Haiti, the projects have and continue to expand in scope and breadth as we respond to the needs of the people and our ability to help. As the projects grow, so do the opportunities. Please join us in prayer that God will supply laborers in these fields.

Opportunities in Jamaica

The World Relief Caribbean Committee (WRCC) is involved in two projects currently employing 6 full time brothers and sisters in Jamaica, in addition to sending several volunteer work teams per year. Project #1 is to support the Caribbean Christian Center for the Deaf as they minister to the Jamaican deaf population. Project #2 involves shipping sea containers of needed humanitarian supplies and distribution within the country.

Part of the original plan is to develop independent programs in Jamaica under the direction of WRCC. These opportunities are becoming available and the brethren serving in Jamaica, alongside the brothers in the U.S., ask you to support them in prayer as they actively seek Gods direction. We anticipate the work in Jamaica to grow as God continues to open doors and provide direction. To support the brethren serving Ja-

The WRCC is looking for a couple to serve full time in Les Cayes Haiti as an operations facilitator for the material aid, well drilling, trade schools, construction, and medical care programs.

- Good communication, organizational and problem solving skills.
- Moderate to advanced shop and mechanical skills.
- Ability to adapt schedules and plans to unexpected changes.
- Spiritually grounded, able to manage personal devotion, family, and work time.

Specifically, the operations facilitator is asked to provide: accounting and distribution of monetary and material aid, equipment maintenance and inventory accountability, regular reporting from the field to the appropriate committees, leadership and coordination of work teams activities and mentor short term volunteers.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Diane Wieland-Gerber

As a case manager for the Home-Based Services department at Gateway Woods, our goal is to give hope and healing to children and their families who live in the community. Specifically with my job, I try to accomplish this in the client's home environments. We talk about our work with clients as "sowing seeds". Sometimes we can see positive signs and improvements shortly after we start, and then again, sometimes we don't see much progress.

There is a lot of dialogue that goes on between God and myself. I find myself praying before getting to the home, while walking up to the door, once inside and sometimes for a long time afterwards. One never knows what is behind the door. I usually look for a hard chair—one with no padding, that way I can usually see what's on the surface and not be too afraid to sit down. You would be amazed at what a dark colored sofa holds in store.

If the smell is too bad the first time I go to a home, I will take each member of the family I am working with separately out to the nearest fast food restaurant for a Coke. In the summer we go to the park or sit outside on the steps. You have no idea what a blessing that can be. One lady said, "Well, you can come but you have to stay on the porch." I could smell the cats from the outside and thanked the Lord I could sit on the porch!

A lot of times the clients, who may be under a court order, aren't too thrilled to have us come. But I find that once our allotted treatment period is up, we have developed a friendship and often they state they will miss our times together.

Usually, I see clients once or twice per week. Currently I meet with a client named Alicia and her mom and dad four times a week. Alicia is almost thirteen and can barely read a primary book. Sometimes we go to the library; sometimes we go to a church kitchen where we bake premade cookies. There I can teach her the fundamentals of hand washing, washing dishes and putting them away. She puts frosting on the cookies and decorates them.

Some days we go to the park or to the McDonald's gym. If too many smaller children are there, she will hide behind a pole. Her home is small—the floor is down to the bare floorboards and the walls are mudded wallboard. One day I realized they do not have a kitchen table and chairs. There are two beds in the living room, one full size and one twin along with a computer, flat screen TV and a 2-seater chair. Her Dad sleeps in the laundry room on a hospital bed.

I am sometimes overwhelmed by their situation and then God gives me insight—a glimpse of what might be going on or how I can somehow help this family. Some families change and some make very little progress that we can see. Little Seeds. Meanwhile, I feel so incredibly blessed that God has favored me with parents who cared—who loved me—who taught me a work ethic—who took me to church and loved me with Jesus' love. I have a wonderful supportive family and realize that "Counting My Blessings" is a very humbling experience.

Most who are reading this have probably heard of the very strong earthquake and following huge tsunami that hit northeast Japan on March 11th. The earthquake was centered off the coast of Miyagi prefecture, about 200 miles northeast of Tokyo. Even in Tokyo, the strength of the quake was the strongest that most people living at this time remember experiencing. The tsunami that followed was so huge, it devastated towns and farmland more than anyone has ever seen before. It is feared that 20,000 or more lives were lost.

Thousands of survivors are without homes and are living in shelters, like

school gyms. Aftershocks still continue two weeks later. On top of all this, in the neighboring prefecture of Fukushima, just south of Miyagi, a nuclear reactor plant along the coast was badly damaged. Even though many seawalls were built around it for protection, they were nothing against the raging power of the tsunami waters. It is still a daily battle to fight off the leaking of radiation, and thousands have been evacuated around the plant, adding to those who are living in shelters.

Our thoughts have often gone to the Haitian people who went through devastation, loss, and fear just like this a little over a year ago. Our human minds cannot comprehend it all, but one thing is common to all of us—we want to help our fellow man. Prayers, supplies, financial donations, workers etc have all poured in from around the world on behalf of the Japanese people and we thank God. Our greatest prayer, and we ask you to pray with us, is that the Lord would open the eyes and hearts of these precious people, from those in government leadership to those whose homes have been washed away, to understand and know Him as their Creator God and loving Savior Jesus Christ. He is there to give them HOPE and SECURITY and LOVE. With God's help, Bro. Andrew Klaus was able to get up to the devastated area less than a week after the quake, and met a man who was trying to live on the second story of his washed out home. (It was his mother's home, and she was one of the blessed ones who didn't lose her whole home, plus escaped to higher ground.) When Andrew asked if he needed anything like food or water, his reply was "I just need LOVE." Pray for the many churches who will be reaching out with the LOVE of Jesus in the months and years to come as people deal with the astounding amount of clean up and rebuilding and especially the deep emotional aspect of it all. Thank you for your love and support!

Japan Earthquake 2011

The 2011 Tohoku earthquake and tsunami was caused by a 9.0-magnitude undersea megathrust earthquake off the coast of Japan that occurred at 3:46 pm on Friday, March 11, 2011. The epicenter was approximately 45 miles east of the Oshika Peninsula of Tohoku, with the hypocenter at an underwater depth of approximately 19.9 miles.

The earthquake triggered extremely destructive tsunami waves of up to 124 ft that struck Japan minutes after the quake, in some cases traveling up to 6 miles inland, with smaller waves reaching many other countries after several hours.

The Japanese National Police Agency has officially confirmed 12,259 deaths, 2,858 injured, and 15,315 people missing across eighteen prefectures, as well as over 125,000 buildings damaged or destroyed. There are more than 160,000 living in evacuation shelters. These numbers are expected to increase as several cities and towns have not been included yet.

The earthquake and tsunami caused extensive and severe structural damage in Japan. Around 4.4 million households in northeastern Japan were left without electricity and 1.5 million without water. At least three nuclear reactors suffered serious damage. Residents within a 12 mile radius of the Fukushima I Nuclear Power Plant and a 6 mile radius of the Fukushima II Nuclear Power Plant were evacuated.

Estimates of the Tohoku earthquake's magnitude make it the most powerful known earthquake to have hit Japan, and one of the five most powerful earthquakes in the world overall since modern record-keeping began in 1900. Japanese Prime Minister Naoto Kan said, "In the 65 years after the end of World War II, this is the toughest and the most difficult crisis for Japan." The earthquake moved Honshu 7.9 ft east and shifted the

Earth on its axis by almost 3.9 in. Japan's government said the cost of the earthquake and tsunami that devastated the northeast could reach \$309 billion, making it the world's most expensive natural disaster on record. - From Wikipedia Article

World Relief Response

Shortly after the earthquake, World Relief contacted the Christian relief organizations that we have found to be most effective in responding to disasters. We reviewed relief plans from two of the organizations, and each was approved for a grant of \$30,000.

These grants have been used to provide essential items such as temporary shelter, food, hygiene supplies, medicine and first aid for those in need, as well as satellite phones, computers and other essential equipment for those providing assistance.

We have also been working with our brethren from the churches in Japan, who have been making several trips to Northern Japan and taking disaster supplies which are more readily available in Tokyo. World Relief is providing funds to assist our brethren in Japan with their disaster relief efforts, as well as assisting Christian aid organizations they have been working with. World Relief will look for opportunities for our brethren to assist with rehabilitation and development efforts in the weeks and months to come

Those who wish to make contributions to the relief effort and the anticipated need for reconstruction assistance can do so by sending donations to the World Relief Disaster fund designated for Japan Relief. Donations can also be made through your local World Relief representative or online through the World Relief website.

The Sunday following the earthquake our brethren in Tokyo were reading from Psalm 46, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed, and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea; Though the waters thereof roar and be troubled, though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof." Please pray that many in Japan will come to believe this Truth.

spit upon. These things would happen to Him. (Isaiah 53:5) And He knew it, loved ones. He knew it was coming! He prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane so hard, Father, if it could be Thy will, that this cup could pass from me. But then He ended with those words which should be part of our words, loved ones. Nevertheless, not my will but Thine be done. (St. Matthew 26:39) Those need to be first and foremost in our thoughts. When we pray, when we bring our supplication to our Father and we pray in His name, in Jesus' name, Amen, we want to pray in a way that we are submissive to Him. That we are submitting our will to His. Because that is what Jesus did. That is praying in His name.

"Then came Jesus forth, wearing the crown of thorns, and the purple robe..." St. John 19:5. There is no doubt there was blood coming down His head already. He had been scourged. There is no doubt He was bleeding on His back. He had this purple robe upon Him. "...And Pilate saith unto them, Behold the man!" v.5. Look at Him! And the people cried out, saying, crucify him, crucify him! And Pilate saith unto them, Take ye him, and crucify him, for I find no fault in Him. (v.6).

"The Jews answered him, We have a law, and by our law he ought to die, because he made himself the Son of God." v.7. I believe if we look back in that old law, we see that there was a sin called blasphemy. That's what the Jewish people accused Him of before Pilate. They accused Him of blasphemy, saving, He made Himself the Son of God. The penalty for blasphemy, I believe, would have been stoning at that time, back in the old law. (Leviticus 24:16) But they did not want Him to be stoned. They wanted Him to be crucified. I am not certain why. I don't know if any of us really know why. We know it was fulfilled.

We can read back in the Book of Numbers (21:8,9), how the brazen serpent was lifted up and how Jesus prophesied and said, the serpent was lifted up in the wilderness. Even so must the Son of man be lifted up. (St. John 3:14) So He knew He would be lifted up. He would hang upon a tree. He knew that would happen. It was prophesied of old that it would happen. So he knew that.

I don't know if the Jewish people just had so much hate or sin is just so terrible or that is the way He would bleed more - His atoning blood? But they wanted Him crucified. They didn't want Him to be stoned. They wanted Him to be crucified. They kept saying, crucify Him, crucify Him. That was the Roman method. They turned Him over to the Romans to carry this out.

Stephen was stoned (Acts 7:59). The woman caught in adultery, they were just itching to stone her. But they didn't. (St. John 8:3-11) But the Lord and Savior, they wanted Him crucified. They wanted His blood to flow. His blood needed to flow. They did not yet know it.

"When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he was the more afraid; And went again into the judgment hall, and saith unto Jesus, Whence art thou? But Jesus gave him no answer." St. John 19:8,9. We can read back in the Book of Isaiah 42, how quiet and meek and mild Jesus was. He was a quiet man. He was not one to kindle a strife and bring about harsh words or anything like that. His voice was not heard in the street (Isaiah 42:2). He was quieter.

"Then saith Pilate unto him, Speakest thou not unto me? knowest thou not that I have power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee? Jesus answered, Thou couldest have no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above: therefore he that delivered me unto thee hath the

greater sin. And from thenceforth Pilate sought to release him: but the Jews cried out..." St. John 19:10-12. Loved ones, those Jews were not alone but our sins were crying out as well to our Lord and our Savior. He heard our cry there as well, loved ones all. He felt our sins there upon that cruel cross. When He laid there upon that tree and it was laying on the ground and they were driving in the nails, they were doing that.

It says very simply here, "Then delivered he him therefore unto them to be crucified. And they took Jesus, and led him away. And he bearing his cross went forth into a place called the place of a skull, which is called in the Hebrew Golgotha: Where they crucified him..." v.16-18. That is just one phrase, loved ones. They crucified Him. But loved ones, that hurt! It was painful! It hurt terribly when they drove those big, old nails into His hands and into His feet. Then set that cross up and put it in the hole and propped it up or however exactly they did these things - we don't know for sure - but it hurt! He bled and He died. He did that because He loved us so much. What a wonderful Lord and Savior we have. What a wonderful, wonderful Savior!

The roots of all this, when we think of Jesus' blood that flowed there, when the soldiers came to brake the legs of the first and the second thief, then they came to Jesus, He was dead already. So they didn't brake His legs. (v.32,33) But they took a spear and they pierced His side. Forthwith came there out blood and water. (v.34) "And he that saw it bare record, and his record is true: and he knoweth that he saith true, that ye might believe." v.35.

So blood and water flowed, loved ones. We can look back there in the old law and we can read in Leviticus and see that blood is the life of the flesh. God has said I have given it to you for an atonement for your

sins. For it is the blood that maketh an atonement for sin. (Leviticus 17:11)

We read in the Book of Hebrews how there is no remission without the shedding of blood. (Hebrews 9:22) Loved ones, it took this shedding of blood. God has deemed it so. Jesus had to be. He was a better sacrifice than that of bulls and goats.

Back in the Old Testament time. they were speaking of the bulls and goats and the cleansing and purifying they did back then. But loved ones, our Lord and our Savior died once. We can read so much about that there and it would do us all good to read through that Book of Hebrews in chapters 8, 9 and 10 and read about the better sacrifice. It was prophesied by Jeremiah of old. Behold there would be a new covenant. There would be a better covenant. I will write my word within your hearts. Not on tables of stone but in the fleshly tables of your hearts. All shall know me and all shall love me. (Jeremiah 31:31-34) Loved ones, that is true. By the Spirit of God, He writes His Word within our hearts and we have that Spirit within.

Another reason why Jesus had to die was so that the Spirit could come. He wrote that also and explained that to the disciples in the upper room. He said, it is expedient for you that I go away, that I can send a Comforter to you. (St. John 16:7) So that Comforter could come after His death, a full measure of the Spirit. Loved ones, that applies also to us as well. After death, after conversion, after we die off to the old man, the full measure of the Spirit can come to us. There is a parallel there. There is a like manner for us, that we also have to do that.

When this happened and Jesus' blood was shed, and forthwith came there out blood and water, the people wondered about it later on. They even mocked. Remember in the day of Pentecost? The people

mocked the disciples, saying, these men are full of new wine (Acts 2:13). They were speaking with tongues and there were cloven tongues of fire upon their head, signifying in a visible manner, the coming of the Holy Spirit (v.3,4). We don't see that now but the people did back then, to make no doubt in the people's minds that what Jesus said was true. That He would send His comforter and it would happen and it had a purpose, a very real purpose for them. The people mocked.

We read in the second chapter of Acts how Peter responded. "This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we all are witnesses. Therefore being by the right hand of God exalted, and having received of the Father the promise of the Holy Ghost, He hath shed forth this, which ye now see and hear." Acts 2:32,33. He was speaking there of the sending of the Holy Spirit. "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ." Acts 2:36. They knew who Christ was. They knew He was a Messiah. They knew it was prophesied in the Book of Daniel, that the Messiah would come (Daniel 9:25).

What did they do? It says, "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do?" Acts 2:37. They were reminded of the crucifixion. Maybe some of them had a part in it. Maybe some of them were of that mob that cried out, crucify him. They were convicted. They were pricked of heart. What shall we do? That was a serious question. They really wanted to know.

"Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Acts 2:38. We are yet preaching that today, loved ones all. We read

in Acts 3:19 where Peter had another sermon. He said, "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord," So it takes a repentance, it takes a conversion, it takes a baptism. During that process, there needs to be a death, like as Jesus died, that we need to die, that His blood can truly come and cleanse us of our sins and of our sin nature as well.

We read how, "...forthwith came there out blood and water." St. John 19:34. We read about that blood and water if we turn back to I John 5. We read about the Holy Trinity. "This is he that came by water and blood, even Jesus Christ; not by water only, but by water and blood. And it is the Spirit that beareth witness, because the Spirit is truth. For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father. the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these three are one." v.6,7. That is the Holy Trinity. "And there are three that bear witness in earth, the Spirit, and the water, and the blood: and these three agree in one." v.8. Sometimes we think that means the blood of Christ, the Holy Spirit and the water of baptism. But loved ones, there is a significance in the blood that flowed from Jesus' side. I am sure.

The people that sacrificed in the Old Testament, they would shed the blood of the animals. The animals would die and they would bleed. That blood would be shed forth for an atonement, even as God told Moses, it is the blood that makes the atonement for your sins upon the altar. He told him that very specifically. It is the blood that does it. That blood pays the price for the sins, sins that had been committed by the people. But what did they do? Once a year they would do that. They would have a day of atonement. But then they would come back the next year and they would make another sacrifice. They

Loved ones, what does the Bible say about what we have just read. the crucifixion of Christ and His shed blood, His atoning blood? It says very clearly in the Word, He died once (Romans 6:10). It is given unto men to die but once and then judgment. So He died once. He didn't go to the cross more than once. That blood still flows, loved ones. It is still there. It still beckons unto the souls that will come unto Him in true repentance and want to be saved. Men and women who ask. what shall I do to be saved?, in sincerity and from the depths of their heart, that answer still goes out. We are so thankful for that, that the call can yet go forth and God will be with us one and all.

We think of what Jesus has done for us: His suffering, His shed blood. In Revelation 7 - this chapter fell open this morning at home from verse 9 it says, "After this I beheld,..." This is where Jesus' blood gets us, loved ones. This is really what it is all about. "...and, lo, a great multitude, which no man could number,..." This is John's vision of heaven, this same Apostle that we just read of there in St. John. This is His vision that He saw. "...of all nations, and kindreds and people..." Red and yellow, black and white, the children's hymn says. "...and tongues, stood before the throne, and before the

Lamb..." That's Jesus. "... clothed with white robes, and palms in their hands; And cried with a loud voice, saying, Salvation to our God which sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb. And all the angels stood round about the throne, and about the elders and the four beasts, and fell before the throne on their faces, and worshipped God, Saying, Amen: Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honour, and power, and might, be unto our God for ever and ever. Amen. And one of the elders answered, saying unto me, What are these which are arrayed in white robes? and whence came they?" v. 9-13.

It is not often the Bible uses the word, 'me', where it gets so personal. The Book of Nehemiah says that. It says, I did this, I thought this. I wrote this. He uses the first person. Here John, very specifically and very personal, said unto 'me'. The question goes to each one of us personally, who are these? What are these which are arrayed in white robes and whence came they? "And I said unto him, Sir, thou knowest. And he said to me, These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore are they before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple: and he that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat. For the lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters: and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes." v.14-17.

That is what it is all about. That is where Christ's blood gets us, loved ones. That's where Jesus' desire is. That we can dwell with Him. Where there are souls that have not turned to Him, the invitation goes out.

We read in the Book of Isaiah. a very familiar chapter, one that I was going to turn to first, until we opened to the Book of Psalms. "Who hath believed our report? and to whom is the arm of the Lord revealed?" Isaiah 53:1. It says 'arm', not arms. You might think the Lord would have both His arms open. Loved ones, I thought about that. He is holding His children with the other arm. He is holding us who have come unto Him and He is holding His other arm out for the rest. He wants everyone to come. He wants both arms full. Loved ones, if there are any that have not come, come and see what it is like to have the arm of the Lord about you.



Christ-Centered Self Worth Part 1 of 3

Is it being proud if you feel good about your accomplishments (or when you get compliments)? Does being humble mean that you should put yourself down in front of others? Do giving people compliments (especially children) encourage them to be proud? If you recognize that you have a spiritual gift or talent, are you being proud? If Christians have self-esteem, are they relying on "self" rather than God's spirit? Aren't we trying to get rid of the self? All of the preceding questions relate to the important concept of self-worth. In this issue we begin a three part series with the goal of promoting a Biblically based understanding of self-worth. In this edition, we will examine ways self-worth may be impacted by our view of God. Part two will focus on how our view of others can affect self-worth. Our perception of ourselves, including our understanding of spiritual gifts and serving, will be the focus of part three.

Much of the confusion and controversy surrounding the idea of self-worth or self-esteem comes from distorted secular approaches to the topic. Secular approaches pre-suppose that human beings are basically good at the core. But Jeremiah 17:9 states: "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?" Here are some other assumptions of secular approaches:

- * Self-esteem is something that can be obtained.
- * Uniqueness equals worth
- * Good things that we do define what we have to feel good about.

Romans 4:4-5 "Now to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt. But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness."

We prefer to use the words "self-worth" rather than self-esteem because it points to the questions that are at the heart of the matter. The first question is: "Who (or what) defines your worth?" The second question is: "What is the value of a soul?" Ultimately, self-worth is meant to be a relational concept that is generated from two sources: being created in God's image and our position in Christ.

Both sources of self-worth start with our understanding of the nature of God. As im-

perfect human beings living in an imperfect world, we are susceptible to forming an imperfect view of God based on our life experiences. 1 Corinthians 13:12 "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known." There can be a disconnect between our head knowledge of God and our heartfelt feelings toward Him. Our "God concept" might include truths like:

- * God created the world in 6 days.
- * Sin separates us from God.
- * He gave us the Bible.
- * Jesus died on the cross.
- * He wants all people to be saved.
- * God is love.

However our "God image", develops over time through:

- * Our relationship with major attachment figures -primarily our Father and Mother
- * Critical incidents and traumatic life experiences
- * Experiences with authority figures that teach us about God.

Many of us are not consciously aware of the distortions of our "God Image." A distorted "God Image" may lead to difficulty trusting God and submitting to God and His Word. It may also lead us to have faulty expectations of God. When all is said and done, most of the time we react to life out of what we feel in our "heart," even though we know differently in our "head." This is why it is very important that we correct any faulty God image distortions in order to bring it in line with the truth of God's Word.

Here are a few of the common distortions of our "God image":

The God of Impossible Expectations – viewing God as never being pleased, always 'raising the bar', and perfectionistically pointing out your failures.

The Emotionally Distant God – viewing God as only truly feeling love toward you when you are happy; and angry/disappointed with you when you are sad, down, or worried.

The Disinterested God – viewing God as if He looks at you with a "why are you bothering me again?" mindset.

The Unreliable God-viewing God as abandoning you when you need him most, often in your darkest hour. That is, when the going gets tough, He leaves you stranded.

The Rug-Pulling God — viewing God as waiting to "pull the rug out" from underneath you when things are going well. That is, just when you think things are going well, He's going to "get" you with something negative (like an illness, tragedy, etc.)

The Abusive God - viewing God as enjoying seeing you in pain and as wanting to rob you of joy. Seeing Him as being vindictive and "playing" with your life as if you are a pawn.

Here are some overly positive distortions of God:

The Cosmic Buddy – viewing God as universally loving without seeing a need to respond to His call to holiness. You see God as loving you with blind acceptance without ANY expectations of how you should submit your life to Him, change your behavior, or deny yourself.

The Vending Machine – viewing God as a vending machine from which you can get what you want, when you want it. If something doesn't turn out the way you wanted, you get angry at God for not responding like you thought He should.

How thankful we can be that it is God's desire that we love Him with all our heart, soul, mind and strength.

Luke 10:27

And he answering said, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind; and thy neighbour as thyself.

Therefore, we can be confident that He will help us in taking steps toward growing in a more healthy and accurate image of God. Here are some steps we would like to suggest:

- 1) Pray to see God more clearly
- Don't force your own meanings onto the Scripture
- 3) Let Scripture be your lens
- 4) Balance grace & truth
- 5) Learn to meditate on Scriptural images of God
- 6) Get perspective from others who seem to have a healthy image of God
- 7) If struggles continue, counseling may be helpful. We have materials available at ACCFS that can help. Referencing the Matters of Faith/Healthy Concept of God section of our website would be a good place to start.

We are continuing with history remarks made at Phoenix, Arizona (long ago) by Elder Bro. Noah Schrock of Oakville, Iowa. Bro. Noah traveled widely as an Elder over many congregations, and was conversant in the history of our church. The first installment ends after his grandmother Schrock had come into a state of repentance. She formerly had been a Mennonite in the Congerville, Illinois area. Bro. Noah now tells about the time when Elder Benedict Weyeneth came back to America.

They (members in our first new church in America) were having quite a turmoil in Croghan (New York). Benedict Weyeneth came back to America from Europe, and the condition of that church was such that he had to excommunicate some members. That was a pretty gloomy outlook to start a new church. He had to bring about an order. Somebody had to be in authority, and somebody had to be responsible. The church began to thrive.

(Editor's Note: In time, the new church began to grow. In the summer of 1881, 139 converts were baptized on 13 consecutive Sundays. A few weeks later, one more was baptized for a total of 140.)

Bro. Weyeneth stayed in the United States and migrated to Illinois. He began to hold meetings. He held meetings on alternate Sundays. One at a place they called Dillon (about four or five miles southeast of Tremont) and the other place was near Metamora.

By that time, my Grandfather and Grandmother Schrock had become converted and were baptized. She told me they had a new baby at that time, so it was a matter of time until he (Bro. Weyeneth) came out again and established the churches in Illinois. From Congerville they had 22 miles to Dillon, and 22 miles to the church near Metamora. Every Sunday morning, and they could hardly wait for the time to come, they drove a big wagon and bedded it down with straw where they laid their baby down — and took off at 4:00 a.m. in the morning, not in Phoenix climate, but in Illinois climate.

They drove these 22 miles and back. The speed of a team of horses is about four miles an hour, so you can figure about how long it took. They were so zealous to go, unless there was serious illness or some other thing. They had to ford the Mackinaw River, there wasn't any bridge and they had only the meagerist of roads.

I say this — I have in the memory of my grandparents a very rich heritage that I rejoice in and I treasure. I hope I will find time to write my memoirs someday and leave them for my family because very few people of my own age people have had the privilege to live with a grandmother. She lived in our home. I used to get so tired having her repeat all of these incidents, and I wasn't converted, of course, but I was patient. I did have the capacity, and I thank the Lord, to retain these memories.

Well, there were no special efforts put forth that I ever found (to record the early memories). Our brethren did hold religious meetings. At that time (this might surprise you), there were more meetings held in the English language than there were afterwards. One leader spoke English and several others did too, and most of the early converts were from the Amish and Old Order Mennonite faith, and occasionally a Baptist.

Grandmother told me a few things

and I don't like to repeat all of them about her living in the Mennonite or Amish church. When she was 12 years old, (she was raised by an old aunt), the aunt said, "Now Lena, you are old enough to join church. I am going to get a group together and the preacher is going to come next Sunday and he will assign you some scriptural passages. Then you are to memorize them."

So the next Sunday the preacher came and gave them some passages that they should memorize. In two weeks he came back and if they recited these from memory, they passed the examination and were sprinkled; and lo and behold they put on the Mennonite garb and they were members.

She was satisfied with that until such time as I mentioned that she saw this Bro. Virkler. Then she told me that one of the things she had never conquered was her temper. She confessed to me she had a terrible temper. That got her into trouble. She told me the terrific struggle she had with her temper. She said when she felt it coming on, that is (when she was repenting), when she felt this thing coming on, she started to pray. She said one time when she was becoming angry at something, she stopped right there and prayed, "God, Thou cans't help me so I don't get mad."

She told me all of this when I was just a boy. Here she found a victory that she never knew existed. She found victory over her own self, over impatience, and over many other things. She was a morally good woman.

The Light Of Hope

"What Manner Of Communications Are These"

Retired Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, formerly of Shioda, Japan

One day many years ago when I was working as a clerk-typist in an army office in Yokohama, Japan, one of the office people came into our room and asked, "Does anyone in this room know where it is in the Bible where the words are used, "Manner of communications?" I helped that man find those words in Luke 24:17, and they have been dear to me ever since.

You will notice that the subject of the sentence is "manner" and it is in the singular form, while "of communications," which modifies "manner", is in the plural form. In today's English I would say, "What manner of communications is this?" but I have decided to leave it as it is, with the emphasis on the "communications" and not on the "manner."

The Lord Jesus Christ, the very Son of the eternal God, had arisen from the dead and decided to join Himself to a couple of His disciples who were walking on the road to Emmaus from Jerusalem, a distance of threescore, or 60, furlongs. One furlong is 1/8 of a mile so that would be a distance of 7 ½ miles. Please correct me if I am wrong. It appears that people got considerable exercise in those days.

Jesus asked the two disciples what they were talking about and they proceeded to tell Him all about His trial and crucifixion, as well as His alleged resurrection. Was Jesus pleased with their manner of communications? Not so. In verse 25 He said unto them, "O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken." He admonished them for not

having more faith in the resurrection. They evidently could not believe it and were on their way out of Jerusalem.

In verse 33, after they recognized Jesus, it is written, "And they rose up the same hour, and returned to Jerusalem." What, they walked or ran back to Jerusalem, 7 ½ miles, after dark? They had told Jesus in verse 29, "Abide with us; for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent." They forgot all about the danger of being out on the road at night. Nothing mattered now that they knew Christ had arisen. All of the disciples were transformed and no longer recognized danger. Just let us serve Him and do what He has taught us. Nothing else matters. No theological questions were discussed at that time.

I wonder if Jesus is pleased with our manner of communications. The two disciples on the road to Emmaus were at least speaking of spiritual things and about the Lord Jesus Christ. That seems to be good but evidently that is not good enough to please the Lord. Then how does He want us to communicate with one another about spiritual things?

It seems to me that He wants us to communicate with one another in a manner that shows we don't doubt His power. I would also venture to say that I believe He wants us to have joy in what He has done for us. I believe He wants us to be vibrant with the joy we have because of His atonement and resurrection and what that means for us.

You will remember that Jesus told His disciples in Matthew 28:20,

"Teaching them (all nations) to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." If we believe that Jesus is the author of the Bible, being one with the Holy Spirit, then the commandments written by the Apostles are equally binding. This is our calling and this, I believe, is the manner of conversation with which Jesus is well pleased. Jesus has arisen and He is coming again, soon. What can we do to better serve Him and please Him? Let's get busy immediately and do our best. There is no time to be stewing about how or why God does what He does. We have work to do and we still believe "To obey is better than sacrifice." I Samuel 15:22. I believe God is waiting to see if we are willing to obey, not that all of His commandments are all that important, but I believe He wants us to show what our attitude is in regard to being surrendered and obedient, even if it is walking or running 7 ½ miles at night. I believe that our attitude toward being willing to obey is so very important. If our conversation by-passes such an attitude, I am concerned that our manner of conversation may not be so pleasing to the Lord.

I know that we are not saved by what we do but I believe that if we are interested in pleasing our Savior, Jesus Christ, our attitude, our demeanor, our actions, and our manner of conversations, are very important. Perhaps we can improve, not only in the topics of our conversations, but also in the manner of our conversations. Let's try.
