Sermon by Bro. Dana Indermuhle, Sardis, OH

I Chronicles Chapter 3:1-11 and Galatians 6

I know why this opened here; I had an experience where a brother communicated with me. He said, I just really need to know one thing. Have you been told to stand up there and say certain things and not say others? It just cut right to my heart. I could assure him that I had not. I have not been told what to say here today and what not to say, as a visitor. Do we realize what we have in the inspired Word of God, Loved Ones? That's why our church has stood the test of time, to God be the glory. It's His word to us. Jesus Christ and the foundation of the church, our beloved Faith.

But those of you that know my earthly father here know that he has a deep care for us in the ministry of the church. We have meetings every other month, and he takes us in, and you know it is not without instruction. One of the things he has instructed us on is to try to learn to say the names a little better. So I am glad he is not here today to see how I did. But the names are important, aren't they? God knows every one of our names. He has either written them there in the Book of Life or He has not. They will either still be there or not when we get to that judgment day.

We know He knows every hair of our head, hearing every care and intent of our heart. He wanted to direct us this afternoon in His Holy Word and the Truth, and only the Truth. So I appreciate your patience as we look through the Word.

We think of the beginning of time there in Adam and Eve, and I just learned recently it would maybe be possible for each one of us to trace a name from Adam and Eve to ourselves. I don't believe that quite, okay. But there are a lot of people who have spent a lot of

time on endless genealogies. We can see that we all have come from this sin nature that came into the world that we could talk about this morning. We can see the progression of those throughout time. How good it is when we can read the names of those that have been faithful to God and the pillars of the church, as we could hear in the prayer at lunch time. This does encourage us to think about those that have gone on before, and the children of God's children coming on here today.

This concluding chapter to the Galatians, I believe Paul wrote possibly from Rome. It's written to the brethren as it begins and ends. It's a collection of advice for us on varied subjects. It's kind of a summary, as we may put to the end of a letter. It does us good if we go verse by verse again, as we have been able to read.

Reminded in the Scriptures of the procedures we are to go through when we see our Brother with a spiritual need. We think about the guidance we are given to pray about this and examine our own lives and remove those things that we would have trouble with, maybe even in a similar way that we would see our brother or sister need. Then we could go in love. prayer and concern, and we could visit with the individual. We could try to be of a help and encouragement. It just seems like the Apostle Paul's advice here of this concluding chapter, might just be a little bit more urgent. And give us just a little more insight into some other situations where this procedure, if you will, for lack of better words could be modified a little.

We think of being in a boat on a lake and maybe there would be someone in our boat that would be falling over the edge. How much time would there be to pray and examine ourselves and to see if our hands were strong enough to help, could we get there quick enough and just what should we do? As we

Accountability Structures

Writings based on God's Word

August 2011

Perhaps the greatest obstacle to the spread of the gospel is our failure to live it out. The world may despise our faith, but there is something they despise even more, which is hypocrisy. The sinful lifestyles of many celebrities receive little notice, but when a professing Christian is caught living a lie, the public holds nothing back in its condemnation. Man inherently knows that he ought to live consistent with his beliefs. Christians are certainly no exception, as James writes: "Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only" (Jam. 1:22).

If hypocrisy is so despicable, why is it such a struggle even for the Christian? Paul lamented this very question as he acknowledged the struggle between the flesh and the Spirit. (Gal. 5:17) Sadly, even Peter yielded to his flesh, and he had to be confronted by Paul because of his dissimulation (hypocrisy) and the doctrinal error this represented (Gal. 2:9-14). Having learned his lesson well, Peter later wrote that we are to "(lay) aside all malice, and all guile, and hypocrisies..." (1 Pet. 2:1). He demonstrated, by God's grace and through the loving accountability of his brother, Paul, the truth of Romans 6:11-15 and 8:6, 13-14.

Man's sinful nature is a nasty thing. Indeed, any pretense of righteousness is "as filthy rags" (Is. 64:6). How thankful we are that God has cleansed us from our sin through the shed blood of His Son, Jesus Christ. But "shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? God forbid" (Rom. 6:1-2). We are accountable to God (Rom. 14:12) for "every idle word" (Mat. 12:36), and it is "required that [we] be found faithful" (I Cor. 4:2).

At the outset, God has provided two things to help us live a life of integrity. First, everyone is born with a conscience. Unbelievers "show the work of the law written in their hearts, their conscience also bearing witness, and their thoughts...accusing or else excusing one another" (Rom. 2:14-15). Second, when someone is born again, God sends the Holy Spirit to indwell him, to "bring all things to remembrance" (Rom. 14:26) and "guide [him] into all truth" (Rom. 16:13).

Still, "the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak" (Mat. 26:41). Thus, in His love for us, God has preserved His Word, built

the Church, and instituted the family to hold us accountable and discourage sin. We must actively seek this accountability, however. If we allow ourselves to be isolated from their influence, we may soon stumble and find ourselves counted among the hypocrites. Just as an animal separated from the herd is far more susceptible to attack, so are we more vulnerable to temptation when we try to go it alone. This is especially relevant in an age when personal travel for business, education and other purposes as well as "private" access to technology are so commonplace.

Let's examine the accountability structures available to us through God's Word, the church and family, and consider some ways in which we can be supported by them. First, God has given His inspired Word to reprove, correct, and instruct us according to the truth (2 Tim. 3:16-17). Nothing is more effective towards conforming us to the mind of Christ and calling us back when we stray. It is "perfect, converting the soul," "pure, enlightening the eyes," and by it, we are warned (Psa. 19:7-8). Quiet time to read and study the Bible should be ingrained in our habits as the first item on each day's to-do list. Bibles should be on display and easily accessible throughout our homes. It can also be very useful if we develop patterns which keep scriptural references in places which serve as frequent reminders of our accountability: in our homes, at work and when we travel. Memorization of Scripture is a wonderful tool for keeping the Word in the forefront of our minds. (Psa. 119:11)

Second, one of the pillars of our church mission is to nurture the believer. This includes efforts to "provoke unto love and good works" (Heb. 10:24), to confront sin, and to apply discipline when appropriate as instructed in the Word (1 Cor. 5; Mat. 18:15-18). We must not "forsake the assembling of ourselves together" (Heb. 10:24), no matter how busy our lives get. Church attendance should be the rock in our schedules around which we arrange everything else. If we have reasonable choices between living close to work or close to church, let's choose church. A shorter commute is not worth isolating our families from the body of Christ. As much as possible, let's plan our vacations around being in church on Sunday; if that's not feasible, we can still call in. When scheduling conflicts arise, let's prioritize church activities over other activities. When going away to college, let's favor campuses where we can live and frequently associate with other believers. Let's try to maintain healthy, open communication with our local elders, "who watch for [our] souls, as they that must give account" (Heb. 13:17). Let's also guard our hearts in our relationships. For example, find a way to include a third person if you must meet with someone of the opposite sex. Even if you are confident in your integrity, this will at least help you "abstain from all appearance" of impropriety (1 Thes. 5:22).

Third, God instituted the family in part to keep us close to Him. Husbands are to take the lead, bringing up their children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4) and nourishing their wives with the water of the Word (Eph. 5:26). When husbands fail to do their part, their wives are called to hold them accountable by their chaste conduct (1Pet. 3:1-2). Each of us should make sincere effort to keep in close contact with family, whether that family is by bloodline or by spiritual mentorship. When traveling alone, call home frequently. Be committed to acknowledging struggles and to confessing any failures to those who will hold you accountable to the standards of God's Word - and then make sure you do.

There is another source of accountability worth mentioning: the people around us. Like Paul, we should invite the accountability of watching eyes (Phil. 3:17). Hopefully, our lives will testify of the joy, peace, and contentment of a child of God. If/when we stumble, however, our willingness to repent and make sincere efforts to overcome will both acknowledge the reality of sin and show the way to salvation to a watching world. "Though he fall, he shall not be utterly cast down: for the Lord upholdeth him with his hand" (Psa. 37:24).

Finally, let's remember the One who is always watching. Do you *really* believe that God is omnipresent? If so, then even moments of isolation won't cause you to become careless. God is the ultimate accountability partner. May we be faithful witnesses of His grace.

A Message of Hope in India

The Rural Gospel and Medical Mission of India (RGMMI), founded in 1938 by Mr. B.B. Bhagwat, remains an active outreach of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. The mission of RGMMI is "to share the gospel of Jesus Christ primarily with the unsaved of rural India by providing discipleship training, medical services and education."

We are thankful this work can be carried out by faithful men of God who are devoted to sharing God's word and nurturing many faithful believers.

Format for worship

RGMMI shares God's Word not only in the rural areas of India but also in the large, sprawling city of Nasik. Believers are thankful for the opportunity to hear the message of salvation and a promise for peace with God and an eternal hope because of Jesus Christ.

Many that worship in this church are employed in various government jobs in Nasik. They gather each Sunday at the Nasik church where God's Word is shared. The church is simple in design. Shoes are removed and left at the front entrance and plastic chairs are provided for adults.

Children come to the front of the church and sit on a thin carpet. Hymns are sung that have similar melodies to many that we sing, such as "Sweet Hour of Prayer" and "Come Thou Fount." Meditation by the minister is both from the Old and New Testament. After the services are completed, those in attendance file out very orderly, meeting the

ministers, and then gather in the courtyard before departing for their homes.

These believers also have weekly cottage prayer meetings on Friday evenings. Small groups come together in private homes, and God's Word is shared. Special prayer requests are made by those in attendance and updates are given for those that might have medical needs or stressful situations in their lives.

Rural areas

In the rural areas of India served by RGMMI, the worship format is considerably different. Rather than meeting in a large church, small prayer halls are constructed in villages where there is an interest in God's Word. In many cases, the home of the minister is attached to the place of worship. Their dwelling is very simple, consisting of a few pieces of furniture and utensils for cooking and eating. There is no running water and indoor bathroom facilities do not exist.

The prayer hall is made with teak beams for support of the tile roof. Bamboo sticks are on the side with a plaster mix of cow dung and mud for a covering. The floor of the structure is made of the same formula. Since a minister serves several villages and prayer halls, services are held on the day of the week the minister can arrange his schedule. This may be mid-afternoon during the week or on a Saturday or Sunday.

In some cases, believers and those interested in the Word must walk several miles to the spiritual gathering. There is no need for a parking lot for vehicles. A small cycle used for transportation for the minister can be seen.

Many of the RGMMI prayer halls do not have a traveled road for access. Only foot paths can be seen coming from various directions over very uneven terrain. All those in attendance sit on the floor, with the adults in the rear and children in the front. Small children sit very quietly on their mother's laps. She has no toys or treats to keep them occupied.

All songs are sung by memory and the service is led by the ministers. Sometimes local villagers who are not believers can be seen peeking through the open doors and windows. In remote villages too far removed from the prayer hall, the minister will gather in a private home and share God's Word with a few families that live in the vicinity.

Your prayers are needed

Today the RGMMI mission consists of church buildings at Balhana, Khardi and Nasik. Services are held at 12 prayer halls. Several dozen other locations have been identified where pockets of believers live and spiritual meetings are held on a regular basis by the traveling minister.

Your continued prayers for the work of RGMMI are very much appreciated. At this point the door has not opened for our brethren to serve and assist on a long term basis. That remains a goal of the USA Board of directors. If you feel directed to support the work of RGMMI in India, contact:

Athens, Alabama Tornado Cleanup

Wednesday, April 27, 2011 will long be remembered by many across the state of Alabama. On this date, more than one hundred tornadoes ripped across what is known as "Alabama the Beautiful." These fierce storms, spanning several hundred miles, crossed diagonally through the state destroying homes, businesses and anything in their path. In many areas, all that was left were the splintered remains of homes and tree trunks with a few large, leafless branches.

The path of one of the tornadoes came within two miles of the Athens Apostolic Christian Church. Thankfully, the only storm damage at the church was some water in the lower level. Among the Athens church family, only one case of damage resulted from the storm. Large pine trees fell all around the home of Sis. Corrine Thomas without hitting her house. Several outbuildings were destroyed as well as a carport. Her car was also damaged by falling trees. Sis. Corrine was inside her home along with two of her grandchildren praying that her house would be spared. The Lord surely heard her prayer!

First responders

Within just a few days of these terrible storms, a group of volunteers traveled from Illinois to Alabama with chain saws, generators, fuel, skid-loaders and other equipment hoping to provide support, comfort and assistance to this devastated community. Upon their arrival in Athens, the church and surrounding area was still without electrical power. Generators were put to use

and volunteers were housed at the church and fellowship hall.

One of the first projects was to remove the fallen trees from the property of Sis. Corrine. Volunteers were not allowed into the disaster areas without first registering at the emergency management office and securing an arm band for identification. This requirement was quickly dropped after a few days when the number of workers became too much for the office to handle. At that point, a sign was posted instructing volunteers to go directly to the affected areas and help anyone in need.

World Relief project

The USA Committee met to develop a World Relief project in Athens to assist the victims in the cleanup phase of their recovery. Members of the USA Committee and Brothers in Athens gave support to organizing a five week project. The need for volunteers was then communicated through the World Relief e-mail list and website.

The plan was to have 25 volunteers working Monday through Saturday. The Athens fellowship hall was transformed into a dormitory and dining facility. Bedding, cooking utensils and shower trailer were sent to Athens from Illinois. Midwest Food Bank was generous in supplying our needs for feeding the volunteers.

The Lord moved hearts to serve in various capacities needed to make this project move forward. Two brothers directed volunteers and located families needing assistance. The responsibility for preparing meals to feed the volunteers was also filled by a loving servant heart. Additionally, hearts were moved

to come and serve in the cleanup work. Volunteers responded quickly to the plea and work began almost immediately.

Work accomplished

Over the period of five weeks, work was done on fifty-two different home sites. For approximately thirty homeowners, total demolition of the partially destroyed house was required in preparation for the building of a new home. Depending on the location, debris was either burned or piled along the road to await pickup by a Federal Emergency Management Agency contractor.

In addition to a lot of hand labor, the work progressed nicely with the use of donated equipment. Three skid loaders and an excavator equipped with grapple buckets were a great aid in the cleanup work. Capable operators put equipment to good use greatly increasing the scope of the work that could be accomplished.

Much of this work was done in the community of Harvest, just east of Athens. A local church pastor was very instrumental in leading us to families in his community that needed help. The pastor believes strongly that recipients of aid should participate in the cost of providing that aid. When able, families made donations to World Relief to help cover the expense of the work done on their property.

Hopefully this experience was a lesson in responsibility and accountability as well as one of receiving the love of Christ through loving deeds of service. Although no decision has been made, this area has potential for a winter rebuilding project.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME

When I received our first call in 2001 inquiring if Gateway Woods could do an international home study, I did not perceive that ten years later we would have been involved in the adoptive placement of over 200 children. I was not even sure we could do an international home study at that time! We had written many home studies for Foster Care, but none for international adoption.

Gateway Woods, being a licensed Foster Care agency in Indiana, had the proper credentials and our Adoption Program unofficially began. Word spread about our work with adoptions and more requests followed. The Board officially approved our Adoption Program in 2003.

The program has since played a part in adoptions from our local area to all across the world. Our 200th placement was an infant girl born in a hospital about 20 miles from Gateway Woods. In contrast our 202nd adoption was of several siblings in Ethiopia!

So far we have been involved with adoptions from 17 different countries plus the United States. In Asia and the Middle East children were adopted from China, Korea, Vietnam, Russia, Ukraine, India, Moldova, Kazakhstan and Armenia. We have also played a role in adoptions from African countries including Ethiopia, the Congo, Uganda and Rwanda.

We have helped to make a home for children from Central and South America including Guatemala, Nicaragua, El Salvador and Columbia. We have worked with children from just a few days old up to 16 years of age. Also, we have been involved in families that adopted children with special needs including Down's Syndrome, Cleft Lip and Palate, Spina Bifida, Cerebral Palsy, Albino, heart defects, deaf and HIV+ children.

Along with the rest of our Adoption Staff, I feel so blessed to have worked with these Christian families who open their home to provide a permanent family in which children are raised to learn about Christ's love and the free gift of salvation. It is so amazing to see the hand of God in matching a family that has just the right gifts to a child from thousands of miles away! I can recall countless stories of this miracle. It is also amazing to see families that have previously adopted children come back to us a second and third time to adopt more children.

We plan to expand our Adoption Program into Illinois, as currently our license only allows us to work with Indiana families where we are licensed. We are working on obtaining an Illinois license, and hope to open the program later this year. We have hired Natalie Hoerr (Bloomington) to assist with obtaining a license.

saw someone close to the edge, to fall out of the boat we would probably pick up our pace a little bit and reach out and grab immediately, to try to help.

It says, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness Galatians 6:1. This is a very healthy thing we do one to another. How many of us have been benefactors of a brother or sister coming with a spiritual concern for us? They would express that in love and we could make a change. We think about how close we become to that brother or sister. It is just really a wonderful thing. Then we can all be benefactors together. We need to continue to practice that and help each other in love as we are our brother's keeper. There would be a time when we may be spiritual, and we see someone overtaken in a fault, and we can help right away. Not in a proud heart that we would never have a problem with whatever it would be or never have a weakness, or there would be no chance that we could have that same fault. We want to have the spirit of meekness. We don't want to be proud about that, otherwise we are going to end up in the same condition.

Probably all of us have had experience with pride, we can see just how damaging that is in our lives. We probably don't realize how much damage pride does in our lives. It's the force and motivation between all kinds of things that the human nature and the flesh would like to have. If we are tempted with the styles of today, if we think that we need to be more beautiful than how God has made us, we need to have our hair a certain way, we need to have our fingernails or toenails colored, or any kind of a thing like this, this would be pride in our lives. It would be dissatisfaction with the way God has made us. Don't we appreciate the spirit of meekness and humility we can find in one another and the beautiful appearance? Surely God is pleased when He looks at you. If you struggle with those kinds of things, thinking about pride can help understand maybe a little bit better how God would look at some of those things.

If we see another that's struggling with those kinds of things, let's try to be grown up. It's hard, isn't it? Let's try to get over the bluntness that may come for the moment. There won't be long lasting hatred when such things come about and communications. The person that's fallen out of the boat is not going to come back and yell at us for trying to help them. The Apostle Paul was very positive here. There is great benefit loved ones. There is change that can be made if we are honest with each other.

It says, Bear ye one another's burdens v.2. Yield not to temptation, for yielding is sin. Jesus can help us, to carry us through. Verse 2 and verse 5, call them complimentary verses in this chapter, and you have heard them spoken on many times, perhaps. It says For every man shall bear his own burden. v.5, and Bear ye one another's burdens v.2. Can those two things be true at the same time? When we think about it, it is so beautiful, isn't it. That each of us has in our hearts a desire to pick up our cross, to bear our own burden. What a comfort it is to know that we have brothers and sisters, the brethren looking on, then with a charge also given here, that we can help. It does go together very complimentary, when we think about it like we need to.

It says, fulfill the law of Christ. v.2. We could think about how Jesus lived when he was here. Did He care for others? Was He off in the entertainments of the day? Was He serving the people? Was He serving others? He was healing, teaching and loving. We can do that likewise for our brother or sister.

It says, if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself. v.3. There are so many different ways to do things in life. Probably not too many of us think the same. Probably, a couple of us think pretty much the same. But if we think we have the only way, even if it is some method to do something in the physical world, we are probably deceived.

We each have been born with a personality. Those that enjoy thinking about how people are and they may put different types of personalities, if you will, to names, and they've created a science in itself in studying these kinds of things. We would probably be deceived if we got caught up in that. When we work with one another it does seem that there is some benefit to understanding a little bit how others think of things. That helps in our humility, when we can think about someone else that may have a different way to do something, or a different opinion on a matter, it helps us to think that first of all, their ideas or opinions may be much more beneficial than mine.

I will often call an employee into my office because we have a decision to make. I will give them a three minute lecture on how an item needs to be done, and they will respond with one sentence, one comment completely different than what I said. I'll say, Okay, you go do it that way, and they leave. It is just amazing how wrong I can be at times. It is not necessarily always a matter of right and wrong, it's a matter of better or best. It is also a matter of how different people think. If you have someone you are communicating with, and they have a way that they can see it would work, and you can come to an agreement with that, according to the Word, then they have a better heart going through that to know that they were able to be heard, and that there is support there given. There is a face to face conversation of working things out.

If we can stick to the truth of the Word, we can bear one another's burdens and there is good gain. When these matters come to be spiritual matters, there are times Loved Ones, we take a real good close look with the Word. Then we can share the Word with one another and we can make discernment, through Gods Spirit. That we can come away knowing the Truth. Collectively, then, we can be free.

"let every man prove his own work..." v.4. We think about the results of the decisions we make with one another, with a group, individually, were going to know, aren't we, if whatever we are doing has been a success. We are going to see how the methods work out. That then would be the proving of our own work.

We are taught to work and labor. I often wonder as we have decisions in life to make, sometimes we put a lot of effort in the decisions. We may make a list and list the pros and cons of different things that we need to do and we pray about that. That's all good and fine, but God also may be very interested in the effort that we put in. Is He willing to bless, no matter what decision made in little things in life, if you will, this way or that way, whether we use the hammer to pound the nail or the air gun. Of course He cares. Is He not more concerned with the effort that we are up and doing? That we are bearing our own burden, doing our own work? Then we can have rejoicing. We can have rejoicing in the service to the Lord, and not always looking to another. For every

man shall bear his own burden.

Thinking just a little about teaching of the Word, and I want to encourage you, Brothers. I have heard a lot of good things this weekend, a lot of good advice, a lot of good conversation on the Word, teaching of the Word. I just want to encourage all of you. You each have an opportunity to share the Word. The ministry of the Word is just one element of that. There are far, far more jobs to do, whether it be at home, at school, at work, or in Sunday school. In all the communications we have with one another, though, we can look into the Word and we can teach. It says, Let him that is taught in the word communicate unto him that teacheth. v.6. We have all probably had an experience of being with a group of people and it is common where the teacher does all the talking and asks for response from the class and there is silence. We sit in the class and we don't want to say anything, we don't want to say anything wrong and we may be a little nervous. But we were really encouraged here to express our concerns one to another and communicate. That we can know the hearts of each other, and that we can grow together. I just want to encourage us all to take heed to that and to continue to seek the truth. God will be faithful to reveal that to us.

There is caution given in our conversations that no matter how we speak one to another it is in kindness, in love and again it is in humility. We can phrase our words and our thoughts, and I tend to have a problem with this even in a public meeting. I don't say anything for most of the meeting and then I stand up at the end and give a big long speech that no one wants to hear and doesn't say anything anyway. That's probably not good. Let's try to pay attention and give our input according to the Word often and communicate. So that when we do have an opportunity to speak it's not in a mode that were completely right and everybody else is wrong, and how dare they even think differently. That would not be the spirit of meekness.

If we think God does not understand us He has correction for us. He says, Be not deceived; God is not mocked v.7. We don't think that He hears and sees what we do? He says, whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. v.7. If we are out there as a business person and we are always trying to drive a hard bargain and trying to get the last penny, and negotiate things to the point where that becomes the most important in our life, we are going to reap the same, when we are on the other end of the business. It is going to come around. We are going to get a reputation, so we are going to reap what we sow.

So it is that this has a physical implication in our lives as we often find advice in the Bible for our physical walk. But then we think much more importantly of the spiritual walk, and how we reap what we sow. If we have a heart that is not fully focused on God, a heart that is not right with God, we can dress up in a suit and tie; we can come and act the part. Eventually what we are sowing is going to catch up with us. We are going to reap it. God is not mocked. The intent of our heart is so very important. It is pretty much a fact that the state of our heart, if not on God, is going to lead to sin. If we don't have our heart where it needs to be, we will find a way. We have these wonderful constraints in our life that help us to stay upon the way. But we will find a way out, and it will lead to sin if our heart is not fully converted, and have real desire to serve God.

I've mentioned this often. Do you remember the story about the Elder Brother and the man that was held underneath the water when he asked how much he should desire the Word? He came up gasping for air and the Elder Brother asked how that felt. Do we have that much desire in our hearts to serve God with our whole heart, with our mind and our soul? It is important for us to think about that. If we can get our hearts right then these other things will fall in line that we struggle with, the flesh and the pride of life, and God can then add His blessing, as we will have good things sowed in our lives that have good ground to grow. We are almost to the growing season here, and we hope as the seeds go in the ground that they can die and then bring forth new life.

It says, For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. v.8. We were at provings a week ago, and getting to talking about the Holy Spirit. That is one thing a babe in Christ can hardly hide is the lack of un-

derstanding of the Holy Spirit. Just because of the time generally that has been spent in repentance. There is just not a full understanding of that Spirit. All of us can say that, can't we, that we are still growing in our understanding of what the Spirit really does to us. It is encouraging, that's why I mention it. It is a wonderful thing because we can all just listen, and say, just wait, just wait. He's a wonderful Spirit and He's never going to let you down. Every day of your life you'll learn to love Him more. We walk in the Spirit and that keeps us from the lust of the That's just a wonderful, wonderful thing. So I encourage you converts that you can grow in this and it just gets better all the time. When you're asked a guestion, you don't need to say that you have full understanding of the Holy Spirit. We just want to be cautioned that we don't want to grieve the Holy Spirit, the still small voice. We want to be quiet and listening and He'll lead us on the way. Just keep singing in the Spirit.

We try to follow the leader. We try to sing it like it is written. But are we singing it in the Spirit? You can tell the difference. We don't stop and sit at lunch time and say, Okay now let's reconsider how long we are making our half notes. It just gets better and better, until we can sing on that We talk a little bit great day. about the songs well sing then; we talk a little bit about the song Jesus might have sung when he went out there to Gethsemane. ACCFS offers a wide variety of educational seminars and presentations to congregations as part of Church Outreach Services. All of the seminars and presentations are developed and conducted by ACCFS staff. Some of the benefits of hosting a seminar or presentation include biblically-based training and education in specific behaviors and relationships, heightened awareness of mental health situations, and instruction in spiritual growth and Christian living.

SEMINARS

Seminars are a series of PowerPoint presentations and exercises presented by one or two ACCFS staff at a church-provided venue. Seminars typically take an entire day and, in the case of marriage seminars, a day and an evening.

Churches vary in their meeting room availability and seminars can be given in a Fellowship Hall, Sunday School room, or in a hotel conference room. Marriage seminars are often conducted in a hotel as part of the Overnight Getaway option.

Anyone interested in hosting an ACCFS seminar should contact his or her local elder and he may contact ACCFS himself or assemble a committee to handle arrangements. Since schedules fill rapidly, interested churches should begin making plans well in advance of the target date and contact ACCFS early in the planning process. The cost to the local church will vary according to the seminar and includes printing for handouts and travel costs for the presenters.

More information on the individual seminars as well as preparation guidelines for the host church can be found on our website at www.accounseling.org/presentations or by requesting information from ACCFS.

The Man of God Men's Seminar

The Man of God is a day-long seminar designed to encourage men to live godly lives according to biblical principles and includes topics such as: Christian Values, Godly Masculinity, Authenticity, Christ-Centered Heart, Relationships, Communication, Roles & Responsibilities, Models & Mentors, Boundaries, Accountability, Adapting to Life's Stages, and Specific Challenges for Men.

Women's Seminar

This is a day-long seminar designed to strengthen and encourage women of all ages. Common women's issues are covered and practical, up-lifting, biblically-based helps for living an overcoming life are discussed. Topics include: Developing a Christ-Centered Self-Worth and Identity, Developing an Accurate Concept of God, Dealing with Perfectionism and Distorted Thinking, Healthy Supportive Relationships, Dealing with Stress and Unpleasant Emotions, Emotional and Sexual Purity in Male-Female Relationships, Developing an Accurate Body Image, Overcoming Emotional Eating, and Living a Christ-centered, Balanced Lifestyle.

Parenting with a Purpose

This seminar focuses on providing parents and those that work with children specific principles and applications in "training up their children in the way they should go". Strengthening the role of the parent as a purposeful leader who points their child toward Christ is a significant element of this seminar. Topics covered include: Relationships, Seasons of Parenting, Communication, Instruction, Discipleship, Resolving Challenges, Parenting Styles, Shaping Your Child's Sexual Character, Shaping Your Teen's Character, and Personality/Temperament.

Marriage Seminars

Marriage seminars are designed to encourage couples in applying Scripture-based principles in practical ways in marriage. They are delivered in three different options: Saturday Only, Friday evening-Saturday, and Overnight Getaway.

Foundations for a Loving Marriage

Topics included are: Understanding Love and Love Languages in Marriage, Couple Communication, Dealing with Conflict, Developing the Spiritual Union in Marriage, God's Design for Sexuality in Marriage, Gender Differences – His needs/ Her needs.

The Three C's of Marriage

The cost to the local church will vary according to presentation and includes printing for handouts and travel costs for the presenters.

The concluding remarks of Elder Noah Schrock on church history at Phoenix, Arizona (which are brief) are giving way to subsequent data we were able to learn about this talk from ministering Bro. Ron Kipfer of Bluffton, Indiana, who was present at the talk. Also, biographical data on Bro. Noah is included.

Bro. Ron and some young, single brothers in faith from his local church had flown to Arizona over a semester break and were present to hear Bro. Noah talk on church history. According to his recollection, the talk was attended by now Elder Bro. Jon Kokanovich, who at that time was not yet a member in the church. Also, Bro. Loren Schrenk, later a minister for many years, was there. It was thought Bro. Noah spoke after a singing in Bro. Henry and Sis. Ora Schrenk's community gathering place in a mobile home park they owned.

Noah Schrock 1892-1976

The following are excerpts from Marching To Zion, pages 316-317, pertaining to the life of Elder Bro. Noah Schrock.

Noah Schrock, who was born August 29, 1892, near Congerville, Illinois — and later moved to Oakville, Iowa in 1916 — served in the ministry fifty-nine years. He was ordained Elder at Oakville on May 10, 1940, and served until his death in April, 1976. During many years of service to the church, he was known as an orator with gifts from the Lord. During his era, his influence was perhaps as wide as anyone's in the church.

In addition to preaching and serving as Elder over many churches west of the Mississippi River, he was a meaningful force in the highest councils of the church. For several years he served in a leadership capacity in the Elder Body of the Apostolic Christian Church. He made many trips to Japan to assist the church's missionary efforts there. He also was instrumental in helping to establish a small congregation in Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada.

In addition to his church and farming duties, he served nineteen years as president of the Upper Mississippi Flood Control Association. He annually made trips to Washington, D. C., to testify before Congressional committees on requests for flood control appropriations that would help to protect the area's bottom land. In 1946, he was among those who suffered flooding losses — losing 125 head of cattle and 90 hogs.

On April 8, 1976, his funeral was held at Oakville, Twenty-seven Elders of the church from eight states converged together in his home church nestled in the bluff adjoining the Mississippi River to pay their last respects to this beloved and respected church leader.

His esteem in the community was such that the Burlington Hawkeye sent a reporter to cover the funeral and burial service. A headline on page three of that publication's issue the next day read, "Shepherd Of The Flock Has Gone To Rest."

Bro. Noah was noted for his interest in the history of the church. He often would make historical presentations as he traveled to the various congregations he served. In his generation, it is quite likely he was as well informed as anyone concerning the history of the Apostolic Christian Church.

He was married to Sis. Hattie Lanz, originally from Rockville, Connecticut.

Bro. Noah was succeeded in the Eldership at Oakville by Bro. Edward M. Lanz, who had been ordained one year before his death.

The Light Of Hope

"Life At Its Best"

You and I are alive, living here on earth. In spite of the sovereignty of God, we have something to say about what kind of a life we live. Then the question arises, what kind of a life should we live? We would like to live life at its best but not everyone agrees on what is the best life.

One idea is to have enough money to buy anything you want and to do anything you want would be the best life. Another idea is that self-indulgence in everything you feel like doing would be the best life. However, it is possible to have either or both of these life styles and still be quite miserable.

What does the Bible say about life and how we are to live it? In Luke 12:15 Christ is quoted as saying, "For a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." The Apostle Paul wrote in II Timothy 2:22, "Flee also youthful lusts." Timothy was still young so Paul used the word "youthful," but the exhortation applies to people of all ages. Evidently, neither great wealth nor self-indulgence is the answer to the living the best life.

Life at its best requires that we be at peace with ourselves and with God in our inner souls. Therefore, to repent and to become a follower of Jesus Christ is one step in experiencing life at its best. Thereby the fear of what lies beyond death and the grave is pretty much taken away.

The next important thing after becoming a follower of Jesus Christ, is to walk in the light or to abide in Christ. I John 1:7 reads, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the

blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." Christ said in John 15:5, "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing."

I believe we can say that in order to live the abundant life we should abide in Christ and we should walk in the light. In order to do this we would do well to follow Paul's advise in Romans 12:1 which reads, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." In order to present our bodies a living sacrifice I suggest that we all promise God that we will always take the path that brings Christ the most glory, regardless of personal will or desire in the matter. This helps us in making decisions.

I believe that life at its best is to have an appreciation of nature, to notice the flowers, the trees, and the sky. I believe it includes being friendly and having friends, brothers and sisters in Christ, whom we appreciate and love.

Having food, clothing, and shelter, and to be content therewith is important in having or living life at its best. It is also helpful not to have debts that you cannot pay. Debts that are more than covered by your assets don't cause much concern.

To be amiable and easy to get along with helps us to live life at its best. Conflict and strife is one thing to avoid, as much as possible. Philippians 2:3 reads, "Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but

in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves."

It is important to have a good relationship with members of your family, and also with your church. Jesus said, Matthew 5:41, "And whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain." This is an exhortation that we should not make an issue over something that does not need to be an issue. Do more than what you are compelled to do. I doubt that anyone who is determined to be a non-conformist will ever have the truly abundant life, or life at its best. Speaking of the abundant life, Jesus said in John 10:10, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

It takes effort to live life at its best. We need to have certain practices of prayer and Bible reading every day, pleasant and appropriate ways of greeting each other, a willingness to eat and drink what is good for us, and to be dedicated and consecrated to Christ.

This may not be true for everybody but for me, at least, life at its best includes going to bed early and arising early in the morning. There is something about getting a good start in the morning, with an exercise routine, which adds to life at its best, for me.

In the final analysis, it is the condition of our soul and what we are doing for eternity that contributes the most to living life at its best. It is also helpful to be forgiving and to use "Please," and "Thank you," frequently, with members of your immediate family.
