

In Everything Give Thanks

| Thessalonians 5:18

November 2012

Sermon by Elder Bro. Ben Wiegand, Philadelphia, PA

Jeremiah 7:1-15; St. Luke 2:41-52

Greetings Loved Ones in our precious Savior's name. I had to think as we often do when we come to God's house and have the privilege of song worship, it helps set our minds in the right places. Did you notice as we sang one of the first songs tonight, How Great Thou Art, it says "then sings my soul". You probably thought about it much deeper than I have, but tonight before we'd open the Word, I just have to think a little bit about how a soul sings. We know how we sing with our lips, we know how we sing with our mouths, but how does a soul sing? It's a deeper thought, isn't it? It's actually not just expressions that come out of our lips that we read in a book.

I believe if we see through Scripture and if we see through whatever God desires of us, He wants us to love Him with what? Our whole heart, our whole soul, our whole strength, and our mind. I really believe if we look through the Word and we understand the thoughts that the singing of a soul is something that happens, not just on a Wednesday evening, Sunday, or wherever we are when we open a song book, but it's the thoughts that emanate from our heart. It's the thoughts that emanate from our very soul. It's the expressions that we have and what we're thinking about. It's where our treasure is. It's what's important to us in life.

Loved Ones, even as we sing in those hymns, it's easy for us and it's good for us, in fact it's a pattern in our lives that when we come to God's house, we sing the songs. In fact, we could see many people could sing even without the books open because they are familiar songs to us. That's good! Those are patterns written upon our hearts expressed with our lips.

We read in the Scripture that God knows the very thoughts and intents of our hearts. (Hebrews 4:12) He knows the very thoughts we are thinking about. He knows what's important to us. He knows the ups and downs of the days. He knows as we come, Lord willing, to tomorrow in the Thanksgiving season, He knows if our soul is singing of thanks or if our soul is singing of the things of this life. He knows if our soul is offering up to Him a sweet smelling sacrifice of desire of service to Him or if we are looking forward to the events of life that so often overwhelm us and surround us.

It is said that each of us think about fifty thousand thoughts in a day. That's a song. That's a cacophony. Lots of things come out of our minds in a day. The question that comes to us is, as the Father hears our song and our thoughts, what does He hear? Hearts full of love, thanksgiving, appreciation, as we sang, that our name could be written there in the Lamb's book of life not because of what we have done but because of what Christ has done? Thoughts of thanksgiving for His grace to help us throughout the day, His guidance in situations in life that He was the creator of heaven and earth and yet is mindful of us and cares and wants to help us in each decision we have? That would be best for us because the Father loves the child and wants to give us good gifts - some times admonishments, some times correction. So maybe it's a thought for us as we would consider it a Thanksgiving Day.

Today we were walking. There were those we would see, and it was easy for us to say, 'Hope you have a nice Thanksgiving' with our lips. But I believe the Father tonight reminds us as we look into His Word, as we have the opportunity to sing praises unto Him with our soul, that our thoughts would be thoughts full of thanksgiving, thoughts that would be heavenward, affections not on some of those things here below but of Christ and the Father. May it be, Loved Ones, even as we look into His Word in this evening hour, that that would be our desire and that through your prayers, God would teach us and help us that we could learn more of His excellent way.

It's amazing as we read these two

"These things have I written unto you...that ye may know that ye have eternal life..." (1 John 5:13)

The danger of labeling a complex subject is that we run the risk of oversimplifying to the point of distortion. Such may be the case with "once saved, always saved," the common name for the false doctrine of unconditional eternal security. Make no mistake: it *is* a false doctrine; the Word clearly shows that. However, in rejecting "once saved, always saved," we must be careful not to deny the power of God in the lives of His children. Let's review what we know from the Word about our salvation, the promise of eternal life, and the need to remain faithful.

First, we must recognize that God is sovereign and free to save whomever He wills (Rom. 9:15). When Adam sinned, God would have been justified in closing the book on His relationship with man. "But God, who is rich in mercy...even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ... that in the ages to come he might show the exceeding riches of his grace...for by grace are ye saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God" (Eph. 2:4-8). God chooses to save those who come in humble faith in Christ (Eph. 1:15-16; 1 Tim 2:4), and thus His people are repeatedly called the "chosen" and the "elect" (Col. 3:12).

Though God's gift of salvation is unearned, it is not unconditional. The answer to the Philippian jailer's question, "What must I do to be saved?" was a condition: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31). God's Word has many conditional statements, including 2 Chron. 7:14: "If my people...shall turn from their wicked ways," and Romans 10:9: "If thou shalt confess...and believe that God hath raised [Jesus] from the dead, thou shalt be saved." Thus, we know that God requires genuine faith on the part of those who are to inherit eternal life. Further basic responses are embodied in the "fruits of repentance," which result from true faith (Mat. 3:8): confession of sin, sorrow for and turning away from sin, and submission of one's will to God's by obedience to His Word. They are modeled in David's Psalm 51 prayer and proclaimed by God

as the type of heart He seeks: "...him that is poor and of a contrite spirit and trembleth at my word" (Is. 66:2). God promises to save those who choose to respond in faith to His free gift (John 1:12).

God desires that all men come to repentance (2 Pet. 3:9) and that those whom He saves possess their vessel in sanctification and honor, "for God hath called us unto holiness" (1 Thes. 4:3-4, 7). We are sanctified as a result of God in His mercy justifying us through Christ. It is His work, available by grace through faith (Heb. 10:10, 14; 12:14; Phil. 2:12-13). We are to be dead to sin and alive unto Christ, no longer under the dominion of sin (Rom. 6:11, 14).

Yet, as Christians, we are subject to temptation and if we yield it is sin. If we deny this, we deceive ourselves (1 John 1:8; 5:17). We are called to walk in faith and in the Spirit, whereby we can overcome temptation (Rom. 6:13; 1 Cor. 10:13). Thankfully, Christ is our "advocate with the Father" and "the propitiation for our sins," (1 John 2:1-2). We trust His ongoing sanctifying work in our lives (John 17:17; Eph. 5:25-26) which moves us to humbly repent for any sin we commit and be cleansed through the propitiating sacrifice of Jesus Christ, by which he is qualified to be our advocate (1 John 1: 7-9; Heb. 7:24-25; 9:14, 22; 10:19). Thus, we need not live in anxious fear of our salvation being snatched away. God promises to never leave or forsake us (Heb. 13:5), and He wants us to rest in the confidence of the gift of eternal life. The same Paul who warned of "every weight and the sin which doth so easily beset us" (Heb. 12:1), expressed confidence that "he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil. 1:6). We who are in Christ Jesus rest in the promises that no external forces can separate us from Him (Rom. 8:38-39).

We may, however, choose to walk away (Luke 8:13, Heb. 6:6). Man's free will does not end at the foot of the cross. Christ said, "*If any man will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me*" (Luke 9:23).

Indeed, the Word teaches that some will walk away. Paul writes, "The Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils, speaking lies in hypocrisy, and having their conscience seared with a hot *iron*" (1 Tim. 4:1). Christ warned the church at Ephesus: "*Remember therefore* from whence thou art fallen...or I will come unto thee quickly and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent" (Rev. 2:5). He later exhorts them to "be faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" (Rev. 2:10), which echoes his earlier words: "He that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved" (Mat. 24:13). Clearly, lifelong perseverance is another condition of God's free gift of eternal life.

These Scriptures refute any notion that man is free to do what he pleases upon finding salvation in Christ. They also counter the idea that a man who "falls away" was never really saved in the first place. We must remain diligent in our walk with God life-long. In Hebrews we read this warning: "Exhort one another...lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin, for we are made partakers of Christ, if we hold the beginning of our confidence stedfast unto the end" (Heb. 3:13-14). 2 Peter 2:20-22 removes any remaining doubt: *"If, after they have escaped the pollutions* of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein and overcome, the latter end is worse with them than the beginning. It had been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness than, after they have known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered unto them. But it is happened unto them according to the true proverb: the dog is turned to his own vomit again, and the sow that was washed to her wallowing in the mire."

What a joy to undergird our peace by simply trusting in the whole counsel of God. "Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith..." (Heb. 10:22); "Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast..." (Heb.6:19).

Winter Heating Needs in Eastern Europe

As the scorching heat of the summer fades into autumn and winter, the realities of providing fuel for heat is a concern in the minds of many Nazarean brethren who are already faced with challenges in obtaining basic necessities.



While the earth remaineth, ...cold and heat, summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease. GEN 8:22

As with most other commodities in Eastern Europe, fuel for heat is generally in ample supply. However, due to ever-present economic difficulties and obstacles, the ability to afford that fuel is an entirely different matter, especially for the elderly and infirm, those most destitute and those unemployed with large families.

Harsh climates

The in-land countries where our Nazarean brethren live are similar to latitudes in the North Central areas of the United States. As such, their climates are often more harsh and extreme. Summers are extremely hot and often parched with drought, made all the more uncomfortable by the lack of air conditioning in homes, businesses, and vehicles.

Winters frequently bring extreme cold and wind, and sometimes-

copious amounts of snow. This past winter brought up to fourteen feet of snow in one blizzard to portions of Hungary and Romania; the worst winter in over forty years. Thanks to God's protection and winter heat assistance, no believers suffered or lost their lives during that period.

Fuel not affordable

The countries of Eastern Europe are blessed with many natural resources, including vast fields of natural gas in Ukraine. During the decades of Communism, cheap natural gas heated endless complexes of dull gray apartment buildings as the populations were herded to the cities for cheap labor in Soviet-style factories.



In addition, many village homes, businesses, and churches were also connected to the natural gas pipeline network for easy and convenient heating. However, after the fall of Communism and the dramatic rise in the cost of energy worldwide, natural gas is no longer an affordable heating option for most common folk. In response, most have resorted to the basic fuel over the ages... firewood.

Here again, these lands are blessed with abundant wood, as forests cover the foothills, peaks, and valleys of the fabled, mystical Carpathian mountain range. Because most nonfarming brethren own no land other than their homes, they arrange for a load of small logs to be delivered, which they then cut, split, and store for season-long heating. To assist with this effort, we have provided chain saws just for that purpose, to be shared among brethren in the villages.

Older homes and buildings often use the ages-old technology of ceramic-tile ovens for heating, cooking, and baking. Tended by a slow wood fire during the day, they radiant warmth and comfort throughout the long, cold winter nights. Newer buildings, including businesses and churches, use efficient wood-fired boilers to power hot water heating systems.

Radiating warmth and light

Despite ample fuel supplies and adequate technology, the primary challenge remains affordability for the most needy brethren, even as they maintain their faith in an area growing ever darker and more turbulent. As physical heat and light are necessary for life, Nazarean believers continue to radiate the warmth and light of God's Word while they uphold the witness of Jesus Christ in Eastern Europe.

How you can help

Pray that believers will persevere against the adversary as they face physical, material, and spiritual challenges during the coming winter season. Your donations will be used to provide winter heat assistance to those most in need across all countries in Eastern Europe. Contributions can be given through your local World Relief representative and designated for the Eastern Europe Winter Heat Program.

Distribution Centers

The National Distribution Center Committee coordinates the overall operations of six distribution centers in the United States. These locations are Goodfield and Fairbury, Illinois; Wolcott and Bluffton, Indiana; Bay City, Michigan; and Smithville, Ohio.

The centers receive material donations from individuals and corporations, including food products, medical supplies, clothing, and household items. These donations are distributed locally, shared with other centers for their local distribution or packaged and shipped internationally. Volunteers often donate time and resources. Most of the centers serve as a collection site for quilts, kits, clothing and many other items.

Supporting the work

The distribution centers were started in order to support the work of the other World Relief committees. Initially, the purpose was to procure needed items through donations and bulk purchases. As the years progressed, this has expanded to shipping loads of well drilling supplies, clothes, disaster aid, canned meat, grain, hospital supplies, and many other items. Much can be done when we labor together for God.

Shipping the goods

Shipping goods is more complicated now than it once was. Having dedicated centers with years of experience helps keep things moving. Whether in small vans, sea containers, the trunk of a car, or a semi trailer, getting from here to there is accomplished by God's grace. A forklift or two along the way comes in handy also. All of the bills of lading, manifests, phyto certificates, donation letters, and master bills are collected and sent to brokers for shipping arrangements. The goods shipped are intended to to alleviate human misery and suffering and show God's love throughout the world.

Packaging the food

Packaging food at the centers is an important part of the work. Rising food prices have pushed us to find suitable replacements for protein. The dry soup mixes are part of the solution. Soups and rice pilaf are tasty, nutritious and provide projects for our brethren to work on, even when there is no center near them. Talk to your nearest center for information on ways to package meals in your local area. These meals can be distributed by one of the centers or kept for the needs in your local area.

Filling the need

The distribution centers are used to help fill needs in local as well as more distant locations. Examples of projects that help people in more distant areas are the disaster boxes packed in Bluffton, food sent from Bay City to a school in Honduras, clothes packed at Goodfield for Europe, and grain bagged in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois for shipment overseas.

We endeavor to do what the Lord asks of us. The efforts to help those in need could not be accomplished without you. Thank you for your physical and financial support, but even more for your prayers. With God's grace and your prayers, we can be His hands and feet during the time we are here on this earth.

This past spring, after three and a half years of serving with Bruce and Heather Drayer at the Oak House, God called Darren and I out of Residential Care. I switched departments and now work in Foster Care! Being removed from houseparenting induced a lot of reflection about the spiritual needs of Social Care Workers, specifically those that are working directly with the children on a daily basis.

While working as houseparents, Darren and I were sapped of our own strength and wisdom as the day-in and day-out work with children from hard places caused us to lean on the everlasting arms of our magnificent Savior. In my new position, where each week I visit many foster homes, I see these foster families in small snapshots, and I am encouraged as I see them being pushed by their unique circumstances continually closer to the cross. It brings back memories of when we were working in the Oak House. Memories of failing and needing to go back to a child and apologize for engaging in a power struggle. Memories of looking into Darren's eyes as he reminded me that we were at Gateway because we were called, and not because we were especially equipped. Memories of calling on my extended family and friends to hold up the Oak House and Darren and I in prayer as we dealt with different tough situations.

Working directly with children, whether as a foster parent or houseparent, is a grueling daily battle with Satan as he desperately clings to these children and refuses to forfeit his hold on their minds and hearts. It will change a Christian, there is no way around it. Being faced daily with this fight, and continually seeing the mercy and GLORY of our Savior will turn a content Christian into a fierce warrior. Apostolic Christian Way of Purity A Volcano of Filth

At nearly 10,000 feet, Mt. St. Helens was a majestic volcanic peak in the Cascade Range of SW Washington state, which lay dormant for over 100 years. But on May 18, 1980, it erupted in one of the largest explosions in North American history. A blast of stone, ash, and poisonous gas carried debris for 17 miles, and a volcanic plume reached 80,000 feet into the air. The disaster took over 60 lives, wiped out large numbers of wildlife, and destroyed 230 square miles of vegetation.

A description of the eruption of Mt. St. Helens is a very accurate parallel to the spewing forth of an ever increasing supply of pornographic movies, television programs, magazines, videos, and books. And just as a volcanic eruption results in devastation to everything around it, the use of pornography likewise results in devastated lives and broken relationships.

Only God Himself has sovereign control over the forces that shape and re-shape our earth and seas. The disciples said of Jesus, "What manner of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey him!" (Matthew 8:27). In the same way, we realize that only God has the power to enable a soul to overcome the forces of evil that have enslaved him in pornography and sexual addiction. Our enemy is cruel and deceptive, and he does not care who his victims are. If Satan tried to deceive the Son of God, he will certainly try to deceive us also. But the same weapon that Jesus used to defeat him will also work for us - the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God.

What is Purity?

The Bible is far from silent on what constitutes sexual purity. One of the major themes in Scripture is the battle between the flesh and the Spirit. "For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would" (Galatians 5:17). The first four items listed in the "works of the flesh" – adultery, fornication, uncleanness, and lasciviousness – are all related to sexual impurity or excesses of lust.

But God has given instructions in

His Word that clearly define what is acceptable and not acceptable in His sight: "Marriage is honorable in all, and the bed undefiled: but whoremongers and adulterers God will judge" (Hebrews 13:4). Jesus Himself gave the disciples a warning that even lustful looks are contrary to God's will: "But I say unto you, That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart" (Matthew 5:27).

These and other passages of Scripture give us a definition of purity – a sexual relationship is reserved for a man and a woman united in the bond of marriage. Any lustful or sexual act by a single person, or by a married person other than with his or her spouse, is sinful and against the will and commandments of God.

Divine Help

However, God has not left us to fight the battle alone. His desire is that each of us lives a holy life, and that everything we do can be to His glory. He provides the Holy Spirit to warn us of temptation and to chastise us when, in our weakness, we make mistakes (*Romans 8:11*). He also provides abundant grace to be the overcomers He expects us to be (*Revelation 2:7*).

One of the tools that God has provided for those who struggle with issues of sexual purity is a mentored program called the Apostolic Christian Way of Purity (ACWP). This program has been available from Apostolic Christian Counseling and Family Services (ACCFS) for over five years and has helped many brethren.

The program is distributed on a CD which the student installs on his or her Windows computer. It is a 60-lesson, biblically-based accountability program for persons struggling with pornography or any other sexual temptation. Each student is assigned a mentor who provides prayerful support, guidance, and feedback. As the student completes each lesson, they e-mail the completed lesson to their mentor and the mentor provides feedback, accountability, and encouragement.

These lessons contain much practical advice built on sound scriptural principles. There are five major steps that a course participant is led through in order to gain freedom from bondage:

(1) Recognition of the problem and desire to be free

"If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." (John 8:36)

(2) Confession and repentance, commitment to prayer, and studying the lessons and Scripture passages

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

(3) Radical amputation – complete removal of all sources of lust; cutting off all access to pornographic programs, movies, books, and magazines

"And if thy hand offend thee, cut it off: it is better for thee to enter into life maimed, than having two hands to go into hell, into the fire that never shall be quenched." (Mark 9:43)

(4) Daily accountability with a spouse or mentor

"Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend." (Proverbs 27:17).

(5) Walking in the Spirit, being filled with the power of God and the victory of Christ

"This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh." (Galatians 5:16).

The Anchor of Hope

Those who were living in the vicinity of Mt. St. Helens in May of 1980 received strong warnings that they should leave the area immediately. Those who heeded the warnings escaped, but those who didn't were buried under tons of volcanic ash and debris. Likewise, the warnings continue to be sounded that those who partake of pornography and perversions will be enslaved with the filth of the flesh until Christ sets them free. He is our only hope in being set free from sin.

^{*}... lay hold upon the hope set before us: Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and stedfast." (Hebrews 18-19)

accounts in the book of Jeremiah and the examples of the Lord and Master about our walk of life, we'll do probably some comparing and contrasting. We'll probably do some considerations of the different accounts and really look in our own hearts. I trust each of us can as we consider these things, to see where we find ourselves. Do we ever find ourselves as the children of Israel of old in terms of what God had asked them to do, and how they had not done things well? There was a temple there. There was a place of worship. There were things that were to be observed. In fact, in the time of Jeremiah, what happened? They were not used in the right way.

In the New Testament time, we see the same thing – there were examples, customs, things to be observed, and Jesus Christ shows us and teaches us the way to observe them. We see the difference in life of going through the motions and understanding the truths of God's Word as we read here of the time of Joseph and Mary. They went to Jerusalem as was the custom. It was the feast. (St. Luke 2:41-42) They had an order in their life, and Loved Ones, there's nothing wrong with order.

In fact, Scriptures are clear from Genesis to Revelation of God's desire for order in our lives - both in the terms of first things first and what those first things really are. The first fruits of our lives we give to Him - rising up early in the morning, we worship Him, we commune with Him, and without ceasing we have our souls praying to Him. Then there are events in life that He asks us to set aside with special preparation - whether it's a Sabbath day or whether it's partaking of Holy Communion, whether it's a time where the Brotherhood gets together and listens to a testimony of a soul. There was no question back in the time of the Jewish people of old that, when they had the three feasts, that's where they should be.

Yet, what happens? We read in this account of the difference of going through the motions, and we don't know exactly all that happened. We read here a portion of it. We see the difference of an observation of the Passover and an understanding of the Passover. We see the difference of who our Father is and where our focus should be. We have the difference and an understanding of what God, our heavenly Father, desires us to do and how we should be focusing on that. That's what we're going to consider this evening hour. It starts with obedience - the parents went to Jerusalem for the Passover. Again, it was a good thing. It was a responsibility, and I think each of us - parents and grandparents, maybe great-grandparents - have a responsibility to teach those that are younger in the ways of God.

It was interesting - I don't think I've shared this example with you before a man that I worked with was a Jewish man. He was able to trace his roots, and he was actually a descendant of Moses. Because of that, he had a special privilege in the Jewish synagogue where he was at. I often talked to him, and he said it was important for him to teach his two sons the Old Testament. It was important to him to teach of the Jewish beliefs. There was no question, and in fact, if you saw and observed him, when we talk about first things first, he lived it. He saw it. There are a lot of pressures in our life, but as he got older, he still taught. They were born in the United States, and he took them back to Jerusalem and Israel. They walked around the different places and things you could read about in the Old Testament. Yes, it's a shame - we'll talk later of his lack of understanding of a Messiah, but the principles, Loved Ones, I believe are there of his desire of the older to teach the younger and the examples that are there for us to be. In fact, I believe if we look through Scriptures, I don't think there's a time that it says God asks us to be faithful to our children, and then once we get a little bit older then we can sort of put the mantle down. I think in this world at times we think the children should be laying up for the parents, but the Scripture tells us the parents should be laying up for the children. (2 Corinthians 12:14) That's our responsibility. I speak to myself and to all of us of what our responsibilities are.

Here it was - there were good examples and the parents took Jesus there. "And when he was twelve years old, they went up to Jerusalem after the custom of the feast. And when they had fulfilled the days..." (St. Luke 2:42-43) We could see they fulfilled the days - they did that which they were supposed to do. Yet, what do we read here? What do we understand? What do we think about? What is the understanding of God's teachings when we come church? It is easy for us to come tonight at 7:15, and we can fulfill the moments of time that we have in the sanctuary - twenty-five minutes, fortyfive minutes, whatever it is - and then we can return, as we read here, back home.

The question for us is, if we go back and read here in the book of Jeremiah, Jeremiah came and spoke to them, and he asked them about the ways that they were walking in. The words that he used were, "If ye oppress not the stranger, the fatherless, and the widow, and shed not innocent blood in this place, neither walk after other gods to your hurt: Then will I cause you to dwell in this place, in the land that I gave to your fathers, for ever and ever." (Jeremiah 7:6-7) The worshipping that God desired of His children of old was to appreciate the teachings that He laid out for them of compassion, love, care, and separation and sanctification - Old Testament teachings relevant to us in the New Testament world today.

Yet, what do we read here? It says if you don't, "Will ye steal, murder, and commit adultery, and swear falsely..."? (Jeremiah 7:8) The question comes to us, when we come here in a place where the Holy Spirit resides and dwells with us, are we taught of those ways and is it written upon our hearts and our lives? Are we taught, are we exhorted, are we encouraged, and maybe pricked in heart of understanding who the stranger is and understanding our responsibility to the fatherless and to the widow. Thinking about those we are around and about, we can be teaching of innocent lives and the messages that were shared.

I hate to bring work in, but it's a thought that comes to me when I read words like stealing. We have a saying at work that when we are in meetings are we an oxygen thief. Are we sitting in there just sucking up oxygen and utilizing it but contributing nothing going forward? We often think about stealing money or other gifts, but you know when God gives us the breath of life, a day of grace, and the opportunity as we read here to fulfill that which He calls us to do and we don't use it wisely, in some ways are we a thief? If we think about it, in some ways are we not obedient to the Word we sang and read about tonight?

Are we no different than when we go back in Old Testament times where God provided a way of escape, God provided victories for the children of Israel time and time again? He provided a place to worship in. He provided pillars of cloud and fire to lead them just as it was no question as to His direction. But, what happened to them? They turned to other gods. (Exodus ch.12-ch.40) Their affirmation of service to Him was a false affirmation because it was a broken covenant. It's a challenge for us today because it's not just for the outward lips, it's not just with the outward dress or appearance that God wants, and yet that's important. But as in that first thought, it's the soul that He desires to sing to Him of thanksgiving, love, and obedience.

So the question is, as we fulfill the days and the examples that God calls us to, and as we return home, what do we take with us? We've probably heard these stories over and over again. It's no different - this morning it was amazing: our children haven't been here in a long time and the number of shells they want to take home with us because they just haven't seen this anywhere else. How precious the shells are!

Yet, what happens? I hate to say it, but I'm getting gray in my hair. I've been down here probably twenty times, and shells don't seem as precious to me today as they did twenty years ago. Have they changed? No. Has God's beauty changed? No. Has my eyesight changed a little bit? Probably so. Not because I need glasses but because we allow things of this life to change our outlook on things, and we don't appreciate the experiences and the beauties that God gives to us on a day-by-day basis. It's almost something we might say as a natural man, we need to have something bigger, more stimulating, brighter, more whatever, and the motions that maybe we can go through year after year after year could rob us of the blessing that God desires for us.

So on a Thanksgiving night, and every night, God desires to be real in our hearts and lives if we would be still and know Him and appreciate and understand how great He is and what He desires for us - a wonderful home in heaven.

We read they fulfilled the days and returned, and we see all that happened. There was more work to be done. There probably always will be, and yet this work was what? It was a work that was ordained of the Father. It's important for us because we probably all have Outlook calendars or some sort of binder that says here is the time we have allotted for certain activities in life. Why is that? We almost say this is what we think is relevant. From what we understand, we can read in Isaiah and other places that God's ways are so far above our ways. His thoughts are above our thoughts. (Isaiah 55:8-9) His time is above our time.

So the question comes to you and me: are we the one defining things or are we allowing the Master to define the business of our life and the time that is necessary for service? It would be easy for us to say we came on a Wednesday night, we came on a Sunday, and so our time there is done. But what do we see here? The time of the Master wasn't done. While the days of the feast were fulfilled, and that was what we might say the law had ordained, what was the spirit of the law? Not the letter of the law. The spirit of the law was to teach others the more excellent way.

Where, so where do we find Him? It says they found Him in the temple. (v.46) Where else would you find Him? He was there in the place where God was to be found. We read here *"hearing them"*; I appreciate that. Did you notice that as we read it in verse 46? Listening. But not just listening but answering.

I don't know about you, but I can tell you by personal experience, when there are those who come, and we can almost see them from a ways away. They come to us, and we know they have a question. Before they are finished, I already have the answer. Why is that? Because you know what? I have other things I need to do. If I listen to the whole question, they may ask me a different question, and that might require additional answers, and that may ruin my next meeting and my next meeting. I know I'm exaggerating a little bit, but the thought is that Scripture tells us of the example of Jesus - whether He saw the woman at the well or whether He listened to the thief on the cross, He listened. (St. John 4:6-26 & St. Luke 23:42-43) He didn't just listen. He heard them. There's a difference isn't there?

At times words can come into our ears. We can sort of hear what they say, but our mind is on something else. We don't get the examples of this in the Master do we? We see Him, as we read here, that He heard them, and He spoke back to them. He asked them questions. He taught them because the work was still to be done.

I think on a day like today, probably any day, if we really understand who God is, how much He loves us, the beauty of His creation, and His care for us and His creation, would we not all say with an affirmation, there's more work to be done? Would we not declare with our hearts and our lips, Lord send us. However you want us to go - if we are to listen, if we are to speak, if we are to be quiet, to go, or to stay.

What do we read here? Because He was about the Father's business, verse 47 says, "And all that heard him were astonished at his understanding and answers." We read throughout Scripture that the Lord never spoke of Himself. He always spoke of God. He wasn't trying to draw attention to himself. In fact, many were the times when

He healed the lepers or others and told them to go tell the priest what things have been done. The focus wasn't to be on Him. The focus was to be on God because man could be concerned or miss out on the truths that He was trying to teach.

So He reminds us, are we about the Father's business today? Are we on His time or are we on our time? Do we think it's just the words we say or is it the thoughts that He wants to hear? I think we all understand - it says *"out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh"*. (St. Luke 6:45) That which is in our hearts will come out. There's just no question about it.

In fact, we all have experienced in our lives where we try to do good. I remember over thirty years ago, in an unconverted state, I kept telling myself I was going to try to do things better and will myself to do what was right. Maybe for an hour or two hours a day you could try, but invariably what would happen? When we least expected it, something would happen, and in an unconverted state, unconverted thoughts became unconverted words became unconverted actions. We would try to grab them back, but they were gone. Invariably we would try to change them, and we couldn't.

But, God in His goodness shows us a more excellent way. He is willing to change our hearts that we could be born again to a new creature, perfect unto salvation. God works in our hearts so that what? We might say before in the vials were water, now He's changed us into wine. He's changed us into something useful for Him. Now what happens?

We see it in our own lives when the pressures of life come. No longer is it self that should be there, although that's a daily battle. Invariably we experience in life, that just as we read here, the questions of life come, and questions don't just have to be verbal, Loved Ones. Questions can be when we might be driving and someone cuts us off. Questions of life come when we are trying to be in the front of the line. Questions come when we always want to get the last word in because we think we want to be the most important.

If we understand that we are just pilgrims passing through, we have no continuing city, and we are going to a better place. Then out of the abundance our heart comes the other cheek, comes soft words that turn away wrath, comes patience, comes compassion so that we can make a difference, not because of what we've done, but because of Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit working through us.

As He heard them and asked them questions, they were astonished at His understanding and His answers. So it behooves us - how did the Saviour know what to say? We read as His custom was, He was up early in the morning, and He prayed. Why do Scriptures tell us the noble Bereans searched the Scriptures daily, and they were diligent in understanding? (Acts 17:10-11) Why do the Scriptures always tell us to study the Word that we would be that workman that can rightly divide the Word of Truth that we would not be ashamed but approved? (2 Timothy 2:15) So when the questions of life come, it's the Word of God hidden in the depths of our hearts that comes out wherever we are because we are about His business.

I know we are focusing a lot on the Master tonight, and I believe that's a good thing for us to do. It's also important for us to realize, Loved Ones, that Joseph and Mary were parents of the Master. They observed Him. They saw Him. They were right next to Him. They held Him.

Again, if you think about it, in some ways it parallels Old Testament thinking that just because we are in the right place, around the right people, seeing the right things, that doesn't change the heart, does it? It's a good start. We could learn more that way. We're a blessed people because as a young child many of us were brought to church, but that of itself is not enough. What's the difference? It's a heart issue. It's a soul issue.

Here we can see they were concerned about themselves. They were concerned about what happened, why He was doing this to them. They were concerned about all these other things, and the Master had to tell them what was most important. The Master had to tell them how to think about, we might say, family relationships. He spoke to His father and said, "How is it that ye sought me? Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" We don't read Joseph pondered. We know it says Mary pondered things, but Joseph probably thought about that a little bit and started gaining a little bit of a glimpse - here was the Son of God in his midst. He didn't completely understand it.

Loved Ones, we still see through the glass darkly. We don't completely understand, but what do we know? What does Paul write to Timothy? Consider what I have told you through the Word. (2 Timothy 2:7) If we consider, it says I will give you the understanding that you need in the situations in life - to answer the questions of the doctors, the teachers, the co-workers, the bus drivers, whoever they are.

If we trust Him that it's His time, it's His ways, it's His understanding and not ours, and be submissive to His will, the Lord will use us wherever we are. Then we won't look at the time as being fulfilled or the feast being over, but we realize it makes it easy in our lives, we don't have to say we have to be on or off. The Father says what? Each day, each hour, each second, He says serve me. I have a wonderful home for you in heaven above.

May we in a time of Thanksgiving, show Him our thanksgiving. Not just by the words we say, although that's a good start, but by the actions of our heart and soul - our thoughts being heavenward, reflecting the actions of true love one to another and for our heavenly Father who loved us so much that He gave us His Son who died for us on Calvary.

"Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth." (3 John 1:2)



After the series of articles containing the autobiography of Elder Ernest Graf, Sr., of Akron, Ohio, it seemed appropriate to record additional facts of his church life.

Elder Ernest Graf, Sr., 1873-1946

Ernest Graf, Sr., was a native of Oberhallen, Canton, Schaffhausen, Switzerland, and arrived in America in 1883. He, like millions, was an immigrant and schooled in hard work and endurance.

In time here in America, he was called into the ministry, and finally into the eldership where he served from 1922 to 1946 or so. While serving at Akron, Ohio, his leadership duties took him to many locations where he served as needed. Included were congregations at Girard, Ohio, Rockville, Connecticut, Croghan and Naumburg, New York, Union City, New Jersey, Sardis and Mansfield, Ohio, and Maywood, California. He helped organize churches at Phoenix and Tucson, Arizona. He served briefly as elder at Cissna Park, Illinois in the early 1930's. Elder Graf also traveled to northern Alabama to help with the establishment of churches in that area.

In 1917-1918, when an official name for our American church was listed with national authorities, Ernest Graf (not yet an elder) suggested that the name "Apostolic Christian" be used. The elder brothers at that time adopted this suggestion. The church's name in Europe was Evangelical Baptist.

He helped translate hymns in the Zion's Harp from the German into the English language. The first edition was published in 1924. He served on a translation committee with Bro. Henry Beer of Milford, Indiana. He also translated 54 hymns from the *Heftli* (called the "long book") into the English language. This translation was published in 1931.

He did another large work of translation when he translated a book on prophecy from German to English. It was written by Elder G. M. Mangold and entitled *Meditations of the Past, Present, and Future.*

His life of selfless devotion to the gospel of Jesus Christ, and to the ongoing upbuilding of the Apostolic Christian Church serves as a legacy to those who have followed him. He worked to preserve "our precious faith" and was dutiful to its preservation.

His Christian life, and work among the flocks, stemmed from a good foundation. He recounted his conversion: "I had always intended to become a member, but now something awakened in me which I recognized as a call from the Lord to repent and give Him my heart. It took me a whole week to decide between this and a worldly career which opened up to me at the same time. I thank the Lord that I chose to endure the reproach of the world, rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season. I was led to repentance, spent several weeks in conflict with the evil one and in earnest prayer. Finally I won the victory, and grace and peace filled my heart. On Christmas Day, 1889, I was baptized by immersion in a brook by Elder Henry Schwier, who had come from Mansfield. I felt that in this new birth I had become a child of God, and still feel so."

Elder Ernest Graf's ministry and service lasted a long time. His eldership covered a time span that dealt with challenges and opportunities. He was involved with choosing an official American name for our church denomination, with changing our worship language from German to English, with bringing in the King James Version of the Bible, with helping to translate hymns from German to English, and with helping military authorities improve policies that allowed our young men to serve in the army without bearing arms. -His life was a busy one. And God's work through him was beneficial to many in his era, and we yet today benefit by his God-inspired influences.

The Mystery of It All

I've been thinking that our life is a mystery and so is this universe. I just have the feeling that there is much more in existence than what meets the eye of our telescopes and our space vehicles. Surely the universe known to our scientists is not all there is. It seems incomplete. So far as we know there is no end to space. We are dealing with infinity which is defined as the point where parallel lines meet. Parallel lines are defined as two lines equal distance apart at every point. That being the case, the two lines should never meet. However, we have the feeling that surely they must meet somewhere and that point we call infinity.

The word "mystery" is used a great deal in the New Testament. In Mark 4:11 we read, "And he said unto them, Unto you it is given to know the mystery of the kingdom of God." How do we define the "kingdom of God?" There may be different definitions. One definition is "heaven" where God reigns supreme without any interference from the devil. It is in the spiritual world but still, it may be an actual place somewhere out in space.

Another definition of the "kingdom of God" is that it refers to Christ's thousand year reign here on earth with His holy angels and His saints which He brings with Him. In Jude, verse 14, we read, "Behold, the Lord cometh with ten thousands of his saints." In Mark 8:38, we read, "When he cometh in the glory of His Father with the holy angels." It sounds to me that when Jesus comes to earth to set up His millennial reign, he will bring with Him all who are redeemed and also His holy angels. It is difficult for us to understand how the disciples knew the mystery of the kingdom of God. We don't understand; we live by faith. We leave it with God. "*Be still and know that I am God.*" (*Psalm 46:10*)

In 1 Corinthians 2:7 we read, "But we speak the wisdom of God in a mystery." I reckon the wisdom of God is a mystery all right. If wisdom is the ability to make right decisions, and I think it is, then God is the best decision-maker ever. He knows the future which in itself is a mystery. It is too much for us. But we trust in God and in the Lord Jesus Christ. We have reason to be more humble and never to exalt ourselves. God is worthy of all honor and glory and of our complete submission and obedience.

In 1 Corinthians 15:51 we read, "Behold, I shew you a mystery; We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed." When Christ comes for His saints, the bodies of those believers who died in Christ will be raised in a changed or new, spiritual form, and those who are alive and remain, will be caught up together to meet the Lord in the air, in a changed and spiritual form. No scientist can explain that. It is a mystery.

In Revelation 1:20 we read, "The mystery of the seven stars which thou sawest in my right hand, and the seven golden candlesticks. The seven stars are the angels of the seven churches: and the seven candlesticks which thou sawest are the seven churches." Here we are told that the seven stars which Christ held in his right hand represent seven angels. By ourselves we would hardly think that those seven stars are angels. The idea of holding angels in your hand is foreign to us.

Christ was in the midst of the seven candlesticks which we are told are the seven churches spoken of in Revelation. If we were not told, it would be a mystery as to what those candlesticks represent or mean. Thereby we know that the book of Revelation uses a lot of symbolism but what it all means is a mystery, except where the meaning is explained to us. We live by faith.

We have considered space and all the stars, planets, asteroids, etc., that are out there twirling around. It is mind-boggling.

However, there is another section of our universe which is very thought-provoking. It is the world of tiny microbes which can only be seen through a microscope. Without those microbes or bacteria we would be inundated with refuse or rubbish. Nothing would decay or disintegrate. All I can say is that God didn't forget anything to make our world functional and livable. The question that comes to mind is, "Will God make more worlds or universes in the future?" The mystery of God stimulates my thinking and I stand amazed at the mystery of it all. With that amazement comes a realization of how small you and I are and how we should never think more highly of ourselves that we ought to think. Romans 12:3. The mystery of it all, but how wonderful!
